FINDS A SUPERFICIAL SENTIMENT STRONG FOR BRITISH CONNECTION

Correspondent of Minneapolis Paper Discusses Canada's "Manifest Destiny" in the Light of Recent Events—Appreciation of Prof. Goldwin Smith's Views.

Minneapolis, Dec. 20.—The Journal's staff correspondent in Toronto says: Throughout its investigations in this city of the attitude of the leading Canadian statesmen to reciprocity with the United States, I have been struck by the prevalence of the opinions that would be voted here. Toronto is supposed to be the seat of a very strong pro-British feeling and the headquarters of all movements tending towards the establishment of closer relations between Great Britain and Canada and more distant relations between the United States and Canada. Superficially, at least, the people here, or, any way, their prominent men, are strongly British in sentiment.

BY-ELECTIONS ON JAN. 7 Government Will Take a Chance in Three Counties Opened by the Courts.

The bye-elections to fill the seats recently vacated by the courts for North Perth, North Norfolk and North Grey will be held on Wednesday, Jan. 7, at 10 o'clock. The Liberal party will take place on Dec. 31. Two of the seats—North Perth and North Norfolk—are carried in the Conservative column, Mr. J. P. S. C. being a majority of 23 in North Perth and a majority of 10 in North Norfolk. In North Grey, which was held by a Liberal, Mr. J. P. S. C. was defeated by a majority of 5.

EDWARD DROVER KILLED BY FALL SCORES HURT ON SLIPPERY WALKS

Streets Covered With Coating of Smooth Ice Saturday Night, Making Outdoor Walking Dangerous—Trolley Cars Collide With Vehicles on the Glass Rails—List of Casualties.

Edward Drover, a hotel porter, employed at the Holly House, Queen and Peter-streets, was killed and a score of persons were injured on Saturday by falling on the icy sidewalks. The city streets were converted into a mass of ice by the downfall of rain, which commenced between 6 and 7 o'clock, and was accompanied by a strong wind blowing from the west.

MARCONI SUCCEEDS

The whole civilized world will be electrified by the announcement, printed in another column, that Marconi has succeeded in transmitting a message across the Atlantic Ocean, and that the message has been brought into actual communication with each other by means of wireless telegraphy.

That new the crucial test has been made, and it has proven successful. From his Glace Bay station, in Cape Breton Nova Scotia, Marconi has communicated with Poldhu, Cornwall, England. The first transatlantic wireless telegraph message was signed by Lord Minto, Governor-General of Canada, and addressed to His Majesty King Edward VII., and the British monarch is now in receipt of the marconigram.

UNIQUE CATTLE GUARD.

Automatic Platform Will Be Tested by Commission in Ottawa. One of the cattle guards to be tested at Ottawa during the end of this week by the Cattle Guard Commission is a unique invention of W. H. Calligan and George Puddy of this city. A feature of the guard is simplicity. It consists of two gates, one on either side of the highway crossing the railway track. The gates rest flat on the ground and are raised automatically by cattle that may approach them in an attempt to get on the track, the weight of the cattle pressing down a platform which is so arranged that as it goes down the gates go up. Those who have seen the contrivance have pronounced themselves most favorably upon it, and think that it will fill the long-felt want of an adequate protection against cattle getting on railway tracks and preventing the innumerable accidents that happen.

Known as Ankylostoma and First Symptom is Disinclination for Exertion. ONE CASE FOUND IN BALTIMORE. Thousands of Parasites Attack Intestines and Death From Loss of Blood Eases. Baltimore, Md., Dec. 21.—A patient at the Johns Hopkins Hospital is said by the physicians there to be suffering from a disease which has, as far as records go, only once before appeared in this State. The disease is known as ankylostoma, or "lousy disease," and acquires its name from the fact that the most striking visible symptom is an increasing disinclination for physical exertion of any kind and the most extreme fatigue.

PATIENT NEAR DEATH.

Quickness of Dr. Lorenz Saves a Child From Strangulation. New York, Dec. 21.—Dr. Lorenz had to do a few stunts in the way of covering magnificent distances yesterday, aside from his very active work at operations. He was taken in charge of the child of the morning, and hurried away to the Kings County Hospital in the Flatbush section of Brooklyn by Dr. Charles Dreyfus, orthopaedist at that hospital, where he performed two operations. He was then whisked back to the Kings County Hospital in Manhattan, to lunch and inspect St. Luke's Hospital.

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HUMBERTS BORROWED 12 MILLIONS ON STRENGTH OF A MYTHICAL WILL

French Gang Bounced Bankers for Twenty Years With Story of a Fortune Left by an Imaginary New York Millionaire—Captured in Madrid.

Madrid, Dec. 20.—Mme. Therese Humbert, her husband, her daughter, Eva, her brother, Romain d'Aurignac, and her sister, Marie d'Aurignac, the notorious swindlers for whom the French police have been looking all over the world, have been arrested here.

The French Ambassador to Spain has been informed that the prisoners are at his disposal. Spanish officials had noticed that a French family was living quietly in the house at 33 Calle Ferraz. They saw no one except the charwoman. They bought and cooked their own provisions, which were always of the best quality.

The police informed the French Embassy of their suspicions, and procured photographs of the gang, by which all were identified. Frederic Humbert had grown a beard, but was recognized from the portraits.

The family, it was learned, arrived from Paris on May 9. They never received letters at their lodgings, but frequently went to the postal office to receive the mail. The daughter, Eva, was ill all the time.

Yesterday the police saw Romain d'Aurignac enter the house, and obtained a search warrant. Meantime they kept a watch on the house. Today an inspector of police rang the bell door-bell. He received no reply, but hearing talking in a low tone within, he rang again and demanded that the door be opened in the name of the law. After a few minutes a man opened the door.

The Humberts attempted to escape by the windows, but the gentleman who had been posted at all possible exits, stopped them. When the party was arrested Eva Humbert was seized with a fit of hysteria. Mme. Humbert embraced her daughter and her sister Marie, and in a broken voice cried hysterically: "For the love of God, do not separate me from my daughter."

In the drawer of a table a packet was found which contained jewels of the value of 10,000 francs. Romain d'Aurignac said afterwards that they were all tranquil and hoped they would receive justice at the hands of the French authorities.

The Humberts and d'Aurignacs declared they were the victims of a most infamous proceeding. They uttered threats against certain French personages.

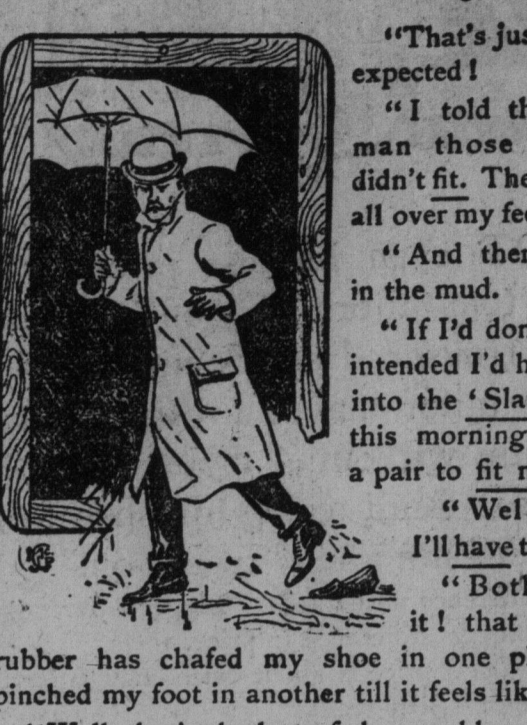
PARIS. Dec. 20.—The announcement of the arrest of the Humberts and d'Aurignacs in Madrid caused a great sensation in the Palace of Justice. The judges suspended the sitting for the purpose of verifying the report. The judges, lawyers and litigants lost all interest in their own particular affairs while discussing an event which was, apparently, done solely for the benefit of the Spanish police. It will probably be two weeks before the extradition formalities can be carried out and the swindlers brought to Paris for trial.

The widow Humbert, the mother of Frederic, who resides in the neighborhood of the arrests, exclaimed: "Oh, God, my martyrdom must continue." The widow advised her son to live all the time in terror of his wife, Therese.

M. Vallé, the Minister of Justice, said today that he felt the greatest satisfaction over the arrest of the Humbert gang. He said the matter of extraditing them would be a very simple act. The indictment had been forwarded to Madrid this evening and it was expected that the prisoners would be in Paris in ten days.

UNION ORDERED TO PAY \$140,000 CONSPIRACY AGAINST RAILWAY

English Society, With Its War Chest of \$1,250,000 Invested in Bonds, Deprived of Power of Inducing Workmen to Break Their Contracts.

New York, Dec. 21.—The Sun's London correspondent says: Friday's verdict against the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants for conspiracy in ordering a strike against the Taff Vale Railway Company in August, 1900, is welcomed by everybody except the trade union leaders as the most important victory for free labor and industrial progress in many years. It has changed the whole industrial situation of Great Britain. The defendant society, with its war chest of \$1,250,000 invested in bonds, was deprived of its power of inducing workmen to break their contracts and co-ordinating non-union men by its picket system.

Amid the universal comment upon the decision the prevailing note is one of rejoicing and satisfaction. The strike has been naturally discontinued. If they thought at first to carry the issue into politics, the company's happy results of the long litigation, the dominant voice of public sentiment is now in favor of the company.

The Taff Vale strike began suddenly at midnight on Aug. 19, 1900. More than 2,300 men quit work. More than 800 had not received notice to end their contracts. The company asserted that the Railway Men's Union maintained the strike by intimidation and picketing, and that the union officials induced the men to break their contracts. The jury yesterday, without leaving the box, returned a verdict for the plaintiffs, who will collect \$140,000 from the Railway Men's Union.

In the earlier stages of this important labor litigation the argument centered on the question whether the union was or was not a trade union.

SENT HIS HAND BY MAIL.

Victims of Civil War Forward Evidence for a Pension.

Washington, D.C., Dec. 21.—Representative Brown of Wisconsin has three hands. The third one came to him yesterday morning thru the mail. When he called at the House postoffice for his mail the clerk handed him a small package which looked much as if it might contain a Christmas present from an admiring constituent. Mr. Brown appeared to be pleased and walked smilingly away to his committee room. There he carefully unwrapped the package and to his horror and amazement found packed in a roll of cotton a human hand. The representative immediately reported the matter to a letter.

A letter explained the matter. The hand came from one of Mr. Brown's constituents, Adam Goshoge, who is an old soldier and wishes to have his pension. He exhibited evidence before the pension examiners. He was shot while in the army, and as a result of his wounds he has been disabled several years ago. Goshoge has since preserved in alcohol. Mr. Brown has placed the "evidence" in cold storage.
