

Fleming on Saturday that the mpany will serve the districts at esent starving for transportation facilities if the city will forego its percentage of gross earnings on the

The controller is both elated and wary. He is satisfied that the underground railway project has given the city a power over the company which it never had before, but, at the same time, he thinks the Fleming an-nouncement is a counter move designed to affect adversely the affirmative vote on the referendum. What Mr. Fleming says now is di-

rectly opposite to what he stated offi-

cially in a letter to the city a few months ago," said Controller Hocken. "At that time, he said the railway had no intention of making extensions under the conditions the city set out. "The proposition about the city giv-ing up its share of receipts on those new lines is about as absurd as any man could make. How would it be possible to separate the business done on those lines from the general business? Upon what ground can he ask for such a thing? There is no such ground, and I think he is only finding a way for an unconditional sur-render from the position he formerly took, and that in order to block this movement to get an independent service the company will offer to do what they have refused to do up to this time. "My idea is that as we have sold them a franchise for a certain period, we should hold them to that franchise The city should exercise its rights in the additional area. If we let them extend their lines, we tighten their grip. upon the city, and open the way for an extension of the franchise when it expires. Dr. Cook, Arctic explorer, is again in Dr. Cook, Arctic explorer, is again in the limelight. As recorded in Saturday's World, it is reported he has suffered a nervous collapse. An unusual secrecy is maintained by his friends as to his whereabouts. His lawyer say he is on his way to Italy to recuperate; others deny this. One man is quoted as saying that Cook said recently he feared his mind would give way under the strain.

Meantime, Walter Wellman, journalist and explorer, whose third attempt a few months since to reach the North Pole by balloon falled thru accident soon after his aerial departure from Spitzbergen, Norway, issues a statement in which he plainly states that Dr. Cook is a colossal impostor. the strain.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.-Walter Wellman, whose preparations for a conquest, of the north pole in an airship recently were abandoned, issues tc-night a statement in which he analyzes the narrative of the two claimants of polar discovery, declaring that of Peary "precise, workmanlike, consistent, credible in every particular," and denouncing that of Dr. Cook as "self-evident, and even deliberate

imposture." "Cook's story is suspicious both in what it does tell and what it does not tell," Mr. Wellman declares. This is true of his figures, his descriptions, everything.




