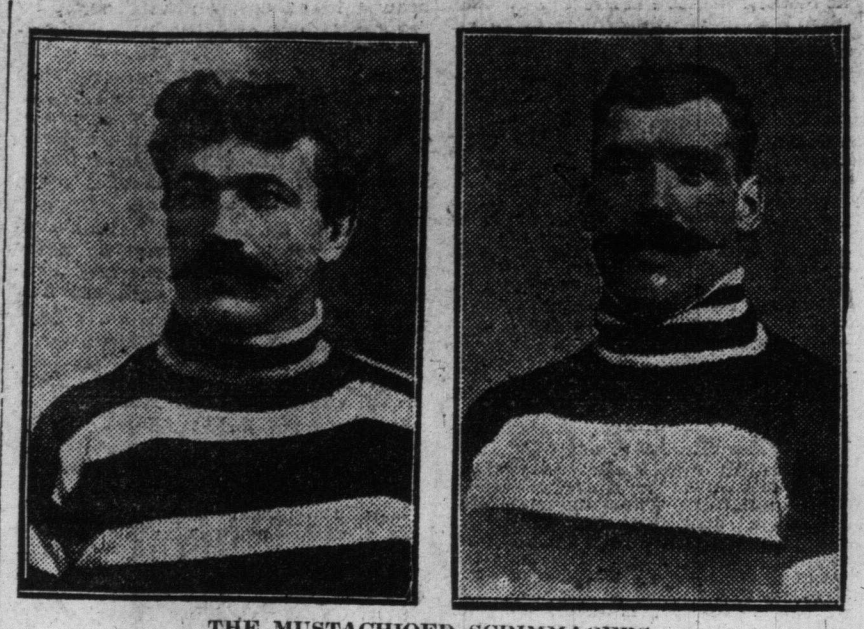

A POWERFUL PERSUADER.

Tubes are a powerful "compeller," to use our word of three days ago. It was only last Monday that Controller Hooken announced his plans, and on Saturday Mr. R. J. Fleming, manager of the Toronto Railway Company, declared his entire willingness to construct all the lines that are required to serve the suburban districts.

But, of course, Mr. Fleming would make the best of the bargain for the company. He would impose conditions. He would build lines. The condition is that no percentage be paid to the city upon the traffic. Mr. Fleming and the company must reflect again. The city has thought hard over the whole question for several years, and Mr. Fleming's proposal does not look good enough. Provided the division of traffic could be arranged, and there are obvious difficulties in settling such a problem, the city is most unlikely to entangle itself further in the Street Railway Act. The building of additional lines by the company at this stage would mean a further complication in the negotiations for final possession in 1921.

If there is any more track-building to be done, the city should do it.

If the railway company build new tracks the city must buy them back. The city can borrow money more cheaply and finance the business more economically now than later when dealing with the whole system.

It will be very much easier to arrange for the company to pay track allowance and percentage for the city built tracks than to arrange with the company for a modification of the agreement which has been so badly modified already against the city's interests by the courts.

Besides, if the city builds a tube system, as appears certain from the feeling of the people, Mr. Fleming's new lines will be superfluous. Any new lines needed will be short feeder lines connecting with the fast-running tube-trains, and the street railway has never shown such a disposition to cooperate with the city, or to carry out the spirit of its agreements, as to make any further agreement desirable that is not quite unavoidable.

This deplorable state of affairs arises from the well-recognized fact that the company regards the city as fair game, out of which anything almost may be got by concentrated and unscrupulous effort. The city, less unitedly organized, bound by municipal

pal honor, and weakened by judicial deference to corporate power, fights at a disadvantage. Any advantage it possesses it must preserve.

A tube-system will deliver the city from many immediate inconveniences, and will remove the greatest of its approaching difficulties, the recovery of the street railway franchise in 1921.

Manager Fleming shrewdly perceives this, and offers his sop, with its condition.

The street railway's organs will now declare themselves for a new deal with the company, and chant themselves hoarse over the magnanimity of Mr. Fleming's proposals. The citizens will not forget the number of lawsuits, the long delays, the frequent impediments and the refusals to oblige the city in the past that have chiefly characterized Mr. Fleming's communications with the city. Nor will they forget that within a week of the proposal to build tubes Mr. Fleming talked concessions.

Like the con, he saw Controller Hooken's tube well-aimed, and is looking for a soft place to drop.

AN IDLE DREAM.

William Randolph Hearst, proprietor of The New York American, the first of a string of newspapers that stretch from ocean to ocean, is a man of hopes and ideals. Some he may live to see realized, but one certainly he will not, tho he attain the orthodox age of Methuselah. Needless to say, it is that which contemplates the absorption of Canada into the United States. The American again trotted out this favorite hobby-horse in an editorial of Nov. 28, after a somewhat long withdrawal from public view. It professes to believe that Canada entertains a very tender feeling for Uncle Sam, and that sappy assurances have been vouchsafed him to that effect.

Nothing should be done, he said, until the city gets legislation to permit the purchase of property adjacent to street improvements. Mayor Oliver has had two years to procure such legislation, repeatedly urged as necessary during that time by The World. The city must now suffer for his worship's omissions, he argues.

What has Mayor Oliver done during the past two years to get street railway legislation? This has been advocated over and over again, but Mayor Oliver has done nothing. If the city had power to expropriate the street railway company, there would be less recalcitancy in observing the terms of the agreement. The citizens would like to know what steps Mayor Oliver has taken to bring up necessary legislation in this respect at the next session of the local house.

Mayor Oliver, whether by inclination or accident, is playing the street rail-

way game, one move in which is to block the Bloor-street viaduct. The Bloor-street viaduct, like the tube system, means a loosening of the toils of the radial railways on the city, and that the railway interests are of course dead against. They will be delighted to find Mayor Oliver on their side. And they will feel gratified that he has done nothing about expropriation legislation.

A CORRECTION.

Editor World: That the people in this country govern themselves has been our boast. Is it coming to this that a democratic people, instead of promoting plans consistent with its principles, must guard itself against its representatives, must watch out or it will be exploited, and legislated out of its eyes teeth? 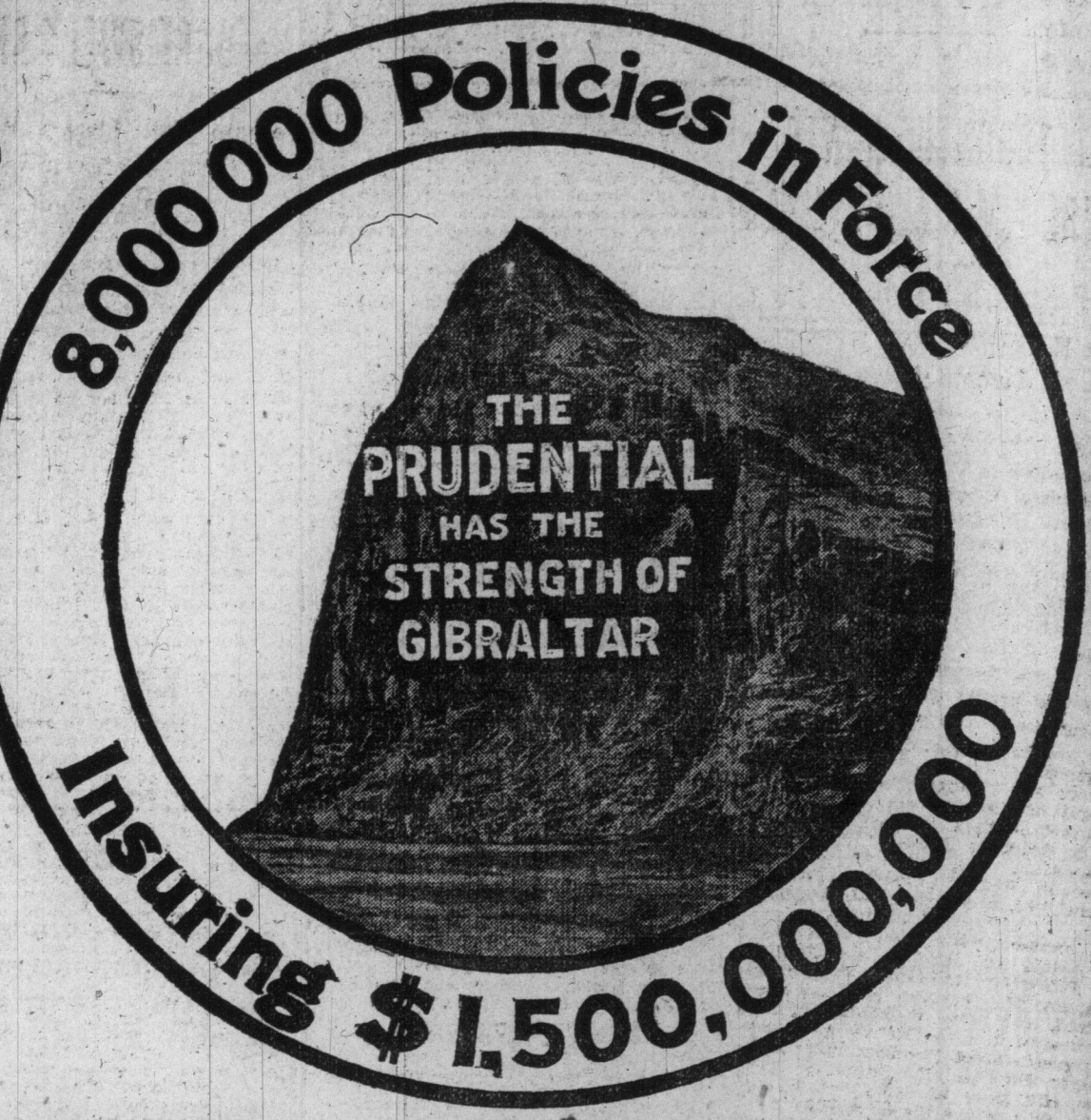
LORDS DESTROYING BUDGET. Asquith Expected to Reaffirm the Uncontrollable Right of Commons. LONDON, Nov. 27.—The coming week will be memorable in the parliamentary annals of Great Britain. A majority of the lords, despite the warnings of such experienced politicians as Lord Rosebery and Lord Balfour of Burleigh, have decided to withhold their consent to the budget, and it is a foregone conclusion that Lord Lansdowne's motion to reject the finance measures will be carried by a large majority. But while the result is foreseen, interest in the debate remains undiminished and the speeches to be delivered on Monday and Tuesday preceding are eagerly anticipated.

VATICAN IS TO BLAME FOR UNREST IN FRANCE

Paris Temps Says Religious Peace Will Come Only When Clergy Obey Their Conscience.

PARIS, Nov. 28.—The Temps considers the discussion of the church question in the chamber of deputies by Premier Briand, who spoke in reply to a speech of Abbe Gayraud, of great importance since it again emphasizes how, in spite of the wishes of a majority of the French bishops, clergy and the great body of Catholics, the Church of Rome has refused to recognize the separation law, and continues to repulse all efforts at conciliation, which have been proposed by parliament and even goes so far as to make war on the public schools.

CAMPAIGN IN BRITAIN NOW IN FULL SWING

But It is Not Yet Known Whether Parliament Will Prorogue This Week.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(N. Y. Sun cable)—Political oratory has risen to a higher plane this week than has been reached in this country since the height of the home rule crisis.

The entire absence of passion in the debate in the house of lords has been both stately and statesmanlike. The gravity and far-reaching complexity of the situation have brought out the traditional forensic talent of British political leaders to an extent which many had begun to think had perished with Lord Beaconsfield, John Bright, William Gladstone and Lord Salisbury.

The attitude amply, chiefly because the national campaign is Tuesday in full swing, which in itself is an unusual feature in this country, where governments usually go to the country on only a fortnight's notice.

It is not yet known whether parliament will be prorogued this week or merely adjourned until just previous to its dissolution. There is an important difference because resolutions whereby taxes have been collected under the pending budget since April will expire, if parliament is prorogued, but will remain effective if it is only adjourned.

Threat to Punish Lords. Members of the cabinet are threatened to produce financial checks to punish the lords for interference. The country knows that this is entirely unnecessary, and if the government is foolish enough to resort to such tactics they will be the worst sufferers.

Whip Telephone Manager Georgia Mob Go After Him Because He Ordered Negro Escort for Girl. Dawson, Ga., Nov. 28.—H. C. Gilchrist was superintendent of the telephone exchange here, was whipped this afternoon by a number of citizens on account of an attempt by Gilchrist to force girls employed in the exchange to accept a negro porter as an escort.

TWO INSURANCE BILLS CHANGE NOT UNLIKELY

Finance Minister Will Probably Be the Strongest Opponent of Proposal.

MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—(Special.)—News from Ottawa is to the effect that strong influence is being brought to bear upon the government to withdraw the insurance bill and substitute for the same bill two measures, the one treating fire and other life insurance.

It is understood that the prime minister has an open mind toward the suggested change, while the finance minister is against the suggestion from the other side of the house, as a member of parliament said to-day while discussing the matter with several insurance men of this city.

TUPPER AND THE NAVY Supports the Idea of a Canadian Fleet. LONDON, Nov. 28.—(C. A. P.)—The Times publishes a letter from Sir Charles Tupper to R. L. Borden, dated Nov. 28, on the question of the Canadian navy, which says that all that is required is that the government of the day should carry out the intention expressed in the house of commons at the last session, pledging parliament to proceed vigorously with the construction of a Canadian navy.

Bourassa's New Paper Will Have Prominent Contributors Who'll Sign Articles. MONTREAL, Nov. 28.—(Special.)—It may now be stated that the appearance of Henri Bourassa's paper is near at hand, or before the end of the year. The member for St. Hyacinthe will be the managing director and one of the leading contributors, and associated with him will be such men as Asselin and Fournier, both of whom have been mentioned for their political opinions, as well as Mr. Hereux and Armand Lavergne, M.L.A. together with other well-known writers in the Bourassa camp.

Armours in Line. CHICAGO, Nov. 28.—Officials of Armour and Company, according to reports in La Salle-street, are working out an insurance plan along lines more comprehensive than any ever before attempted, to provide financial protection for 17,000 employees. Armour and Company is the last of the packing houses to adopt such a system.
