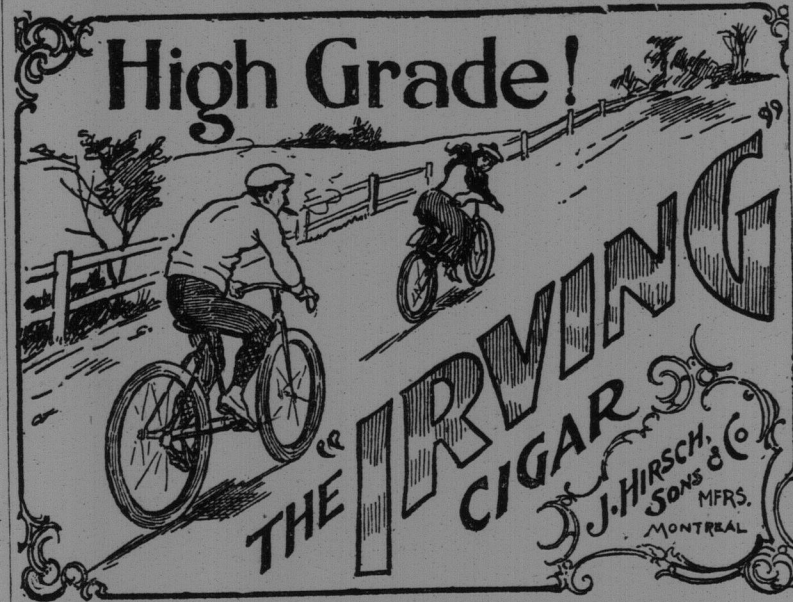

THE CHILDREN

THE WHITE PLAGUE

There were nearly seven hundred deaths from tuberculosis in Montreal in 1904. There were seventeen last week. The following facts gleaned by the Anti-Tuberculosis League for 1904 are particularly interesting in view of the effort now being made to do something along similar lines here.

During 1904 no fewer than 692 deaths were caused by pulmonary tuberculosis, or phthisis. In connection with 479 of these statistical records were made regarding the duration of the disease, the patient's occupation, mode of living, condition of house, etc.

During the eighteen consecutive months ended Dec. 1, 1904, three hundred cases were under the surveillance of the league. Of these 136 deaths have been returned, twenty cases have been returned to their native places, forty-three have died in the hospital for incurables, twenty have been sent into the country for varying periods, and fifty have received financial assistance for maintenance, travelling and other purposes.

The water board has wisely decided to rush the work of clearing up the ground around Robertson Lake, to which the Times called attention a few days ago, and which there is little enough time to have cleared before the date on which under the contract it should be flooded.

EXPORTING LATH EDGINGS

Taken From St. John to New York in Schooner Loads for Kindling.

Lath edgings have not heretofore been regarded of any value as an article of export, but the schooner Charlotte T. Shipley is now loading 500 cords here for shipment to New York.

Paul M. Kaminsky, president of the Hayes Coal & Wood Co. of 106 Meit St. New York, is the purchaser, and is now in the city. He is a guest at the Martello Hotel, west side.

To the Times yesterday Mr. Kaminsky stated that he had purchased the whole output of lath edgings from the mill of John E. Moore & Co. and, through Alex. Clark, that of the mill of Hilyard Bros. He will take away about a schooner load a month.

When these edgings are received at his place in New York they are cut into pieces 24 inches long, by an 18-gang saw, which Mr. Kaminsky himself invented. It will cut two cords per hour. From the saws they are taken by a carrier into a drying kiln, where they undergo a steam process that whitens the wood. They are then put up in little bundles, 9x7 inches, which are sold to the grocery trade at one cent per bundle, and by them retailed for kindling wood.

The idea of buying kindling wood in that quantity seems odd to people residing in a country of abundant wood supply, but Mr. Kaminsky finds a good business in a product that is here considered almost worthless.

Discussing the lumber business, Mr. Kaminsky expressed surprise that planned lumber made to order is not produced here for export. If contractors could get what they wanted for building purposes here they would come down here to purchase.

Mr. Kaminsky is looking for a schooner of American register to purchase and use in the carriage of edgings to New York. He leaves for home today, but expects to visit this city again a little later in the season.

MEXICO AS A MARKET

Splendid Opportunity for Canadian Exporters Says, A. P. Blouin.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2.—The importance of the new direct steamship service recently inaugurated between Canada and Mexico is emphasized by A. P. Blouin, of Montreal, who has just returned from a six months' trip to the latter country. If Canadian merchants will only take advantage of their opportunity, he says, there is an enormous trade to be done with Mexico. The country is on the eve of great prosperity. Its almost unbelievable resources of minerals, such as silver, copper, iron, lead, zinc, tin, and gold, are being developed by a great influx of American and English capital, and except fruits, the country has to buy practically everything that it needs. For Canada's agricultural products and manufactures it offers a splendid market.

The greatest engineering work being carried on in the country at the present time is the development of the route across the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, by which a saving of 2,400 miles will be made between the two oceans. They already have only 125 miles. Already there is a railway across, and three deep water ports are being created to be used in connection with this railway. They are at Salina Cruz, Oaxaca, and Manzanillo.

Mr. Blouin has not a very high opinion of the natives of the country. They are dirty in their habits and most immoral. So dirty are they that the paper he has been advocating a reduction in car fares to people who are clean, and the payment of higher wages to motormen and conductors who keep themselves clean.

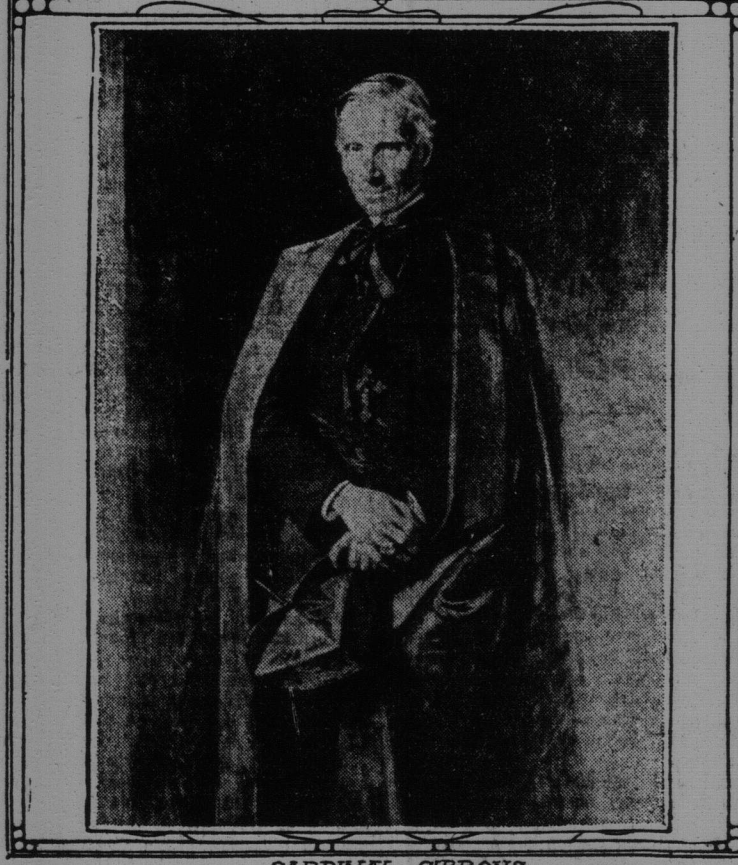

CARDINAL GIBBONS TALKS ON COMMERCIAL CORRUPTION



New York, Aug. 2.—Cardinal Gibbons, who is spending his vacation at Southampton (L. I.) has issued a statement concerning commercial corruption which is likely to attract much attention. "Corruption is a fixed evil that we must reckon with just as long as the present condition of society exists in this country," said the Cardinal. "Whenever there is an amalgamation of great capital, or a large collection of men interested in one money making concern, there is sure to be corruption. It is not a new story. It is a story as old as the world's history. The only reason that it comes so much to the fore at present is that the methods of its detection are daily growing stronger. "Corruption has always existed. Corruption, I am much afraid, will always exist, as long as human nature yields to the attributes that lead to temptation. "The bright spot in the whole swamp of present moral degradation is the fact that the degradation is made known. Corruption cannot exist nowadays without being discovered after a while. The greater the evil the greater the possibility of remedy. And that possibility of remedy has now become such an assured fact that it counterbalances, almost, the evil which the present condition of money madness creates. "The fear, the dread of exposure, is the counterbalancing element, and that fear, that dread, that horror of having a name once respected dragged down is due to the efforts of the metropolitan press. "It may not be good theology, it may not be good ethics, but it is certainly very good common sense, and a very good moral element, that the fear, the dread of exposure in the public press keeps

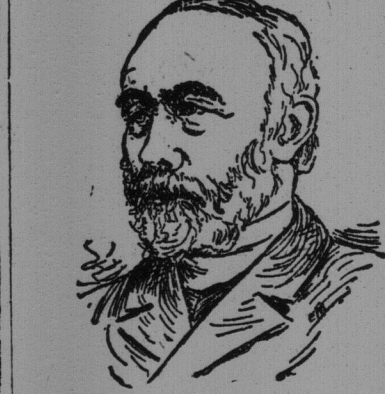

THE SCHOOL OF MISSIONS

Dr. Carman and Rev. Mr. McConnell the Principal Speakers Last Evening--A Love Feast.

At the afternoon session of the Methodist School of Missions yesterday Principal Riddell, in the continuation of his address on Prayer and Bible Study, spoke about Hebrews I and II chapters. The remainder of the afternoon session took the form of a love feast under the leadership of Rev. Charles Condon. There was a good attendance and those present manifested great interest in the proceedings. Those who attended the sixth session last night had the pleasure of listening to the very eloquent and earnest address by Rev. J. W. McConnell, of the First Methodist church, Moncton, and Rev. Dr. Carman. There was a very large attendance. Rev. Dr. Howard Surgeon was in the chair. After devotional exercises the chairman



DR. CARMAN introduced Rev. Mr. McConnell, who spoke on the relations of modern commerce to the missionary enterprise. He briefly referred to the beginning of trade with the Jewish patriarchs, the Phoenicians, Greeks, Romans and other nations of antiquity and mentioned the deficiencies under which these pioneers of commerce labored in means of transportation and other matters. In 1837 the first steamship crossed the Atlantic. In 1850 the total number of steamships owned in Great Britain was only 80. Last year according to Lloyd's the total amount of steam shipping owned by Great Britain had reached the enormous total of 8,500,000 tons. In railroad transportation since 1832, the year that the first railroad was set going in England, the progress was equally astounding, and now in India alone there are 25,000 miles and "the cough the modern locomotive is simply satisfying the gods of that country." In telegraphs and telegraphic cables the progress had been equally astonishing.
