Canada Must Do More!

Ottawa So Reads Kitchener's Call-Likely 200,000 Fighting Men by Spring

Consider the urgent necessity of recruiting in order to bring the war to a speedy and successful conclusion is taken as involving the need of Conada contributing a more effective quota than at present.

It is reasonable to anticipate that in the course of a few weeks or at any event before long, authority will be issued for raising additional troops in this country. By spring it is probable that upwards of 200,000 will have been enlisted or will be in process of recruiting.

At the present time about 140,000 men have been enlisted. There are 60,000 at the front, 30,000 in England, 32,0000 training in Canada, about 10,000 doing guard duty in different parts of the dominion, while to this should be added about 10,000 c sualties, probably half of the victims having been able to return to the front.

On October 6, Major A. V. Roy, 22nd Battalion, Montreal, was standing in a trench issuing orders to Company Sergeant-Major Marion and others. The shell did not burst on impact and rushing towards it, Major Roy bent down with the object of seizing it and throiwng it over the parapet in order to save the lives of those near him. Before he could grasp it, the projectile exploded, inflicting wounds from which Major Roy shortly afterwards died. His gallant self-sacrifice has been specially reported by his brigade and divisional commanders.

On the afternoon of October 8, Lieutenant J. G. Anderson, accompanied by Private A. H. Wythe, both of the 5th Battalion, encountered five of the enemy in a German sap. One of the enemy was killed and three were wounded. On the morning of October 9, reinforced with three bombers, they re-visited the sap driving off a German working party and bringing in two rifles and other articles of value for identification purposes.

On the morning of October 10 we exploded a mine in front of our first brigade. The enemy was heard working in his mine gallery a few feet away, just prior to the explosion. It is believed his losses were considerable. On the afternoon of October 13 a demonstration was carried out along our front. The first of our artillery was effective both against the enemy's wire and parapets. While the enemy's supporters were being brought up they were subect to heavy artillery, machine gun and rifle fire.







PROBLEMS AND PEOPLE

(Montreal News.)

With the close of this war, humanity is going to be faced with some of the most tremendous and insistent problems of social betterment that have ever been known. In the past there have always been problems of a similar nature, although they have not been so serious as the ones now on the way, nor have they been so urgent. Until new, it has been the practice of statesmen and municipal authorities to drift more or less, to cater for the approval of the voter rather than for the needs of the community, to work on a basis of expediency.

That spirit will have to be eliminated from public life; and both the authorities and the public will be forced, by the stress of the demands that will assuredly be made upon them in the near future, to take their responsibility far more seriously than they have done in the past. That, of course, will make for improvement in every way, and it is likely that the country will in the ultimate result derive a distinct advantage from its difficulties. Canada will probably be tried less than any of her neighbors because her available natural resources are far in excess of her population, but that fact will provide its own problem, because all the unplaced labor of Europe will flock across the Atlantic, and the greater portion of it will crowd into this country in preference to the United States. The experience of the latter, its successes and failures in handling the hitherto unprecedented rats of immigration during the last half-century, should provide some invaluable data for the Dominion, although, for obvious reasons, the problem is going to be far greater and more urgent in the case of this country.

What are the people of Canada and of Montreel gring to de about it? Are they

What are the people of Canada and of Montreal going to do about it? Are they content to leave it entirely to paid officaldom or party politicians or civic representatives who represent no other interests than their own? Or will they bestir themselves to organize a force of public opinion that will make itself respected and feared in every department of national and civic activity? The choice is with them, the future—their future, the future of their country and their native city—rests with them. And the way to assure that future, to take up their share of the burden of honest government, especially in the municipality, is by taking an active interest in each problem as it arises, by looking ahead and building for the future, by making their own unit of public opinion alert and efficient in every respect.

All responsibility begins with the individual, and the community is merely the individual on a larger scale. Every hope of progress rests upon the individual, and no man is entitled to say or to think that because he is insignificant in social position, he is for that reason insignificant as an influence either for good or evil. In every sphere of human activity, man is what he makes himself, and his influence upon his neighbors, and upon the creating and moulding of public opinion, is correspondingly great or small, or good or bad. The vital point to remember is that a dishonest administrator invariably accepts indifference on the part of the public as acquiescence.

There are thousands, and perhaps tens of thousands, of citizens whose apparent indifference to the problems of the day arises, not so much from lack of patriotism as from a lack of energy in their patriotism.



British Headquarters in France, Oct. 16.—Among the Hulluch-Haisnes line, where the fighting has been almost continuous since the laking of Loos, a correspondent had an unprecedented view of the British attack which took the Hohensollern redoubt.

From a vantage point in the flat country was witnessed a stupendous panorama of artillery operations and glimpses of infantry rushing through smoke and shells. So rapid was the fire that an effort to count the number of auditie shots per minute from the British guns failed. In front, to right and left, and far in the rear, guns flashed and scattered shells over the landscape. A second hull in the firing by batteries of the immediate neighborhood was filled by those farther away.

The line of both the British and German trenches was undiscernable in long clouds. of smoke and dust from bursting shells. The Bulgarians also lay claim to a rapid advance into Macedonia, although the French are already reported to be in contact with them at Gievgeli, while both the French and British continue to land troops at Saloniki.

Neither Russian nor Italian assistance has yet developed, but the Italians have begun a more vigorous offensive along their frontier, and have captured Pregasina, an important advanced point of the fortified Riva group on Lake Garda. This will be of indirect aid to Serbia, preventing, as it does the movement of any more Austrian troops from that frontier.

positions, capturing a large number of prisoners and some guns. On the rest of the eastern front the of-fensive remains in the hands of the

On the whole, it appears to observers here as if the Germans were satisfied merely to hold their present line, except in the north, where they have made repeated attempts to take Dvinsk. This would mean the fall of Riga, and would compel the Russians to withdraw behind the Dvina river. This ambition has already cost the Germans many thousands of men, but they keep on trying, first in the north, then in the south, and then on the Dvinsk front. At present their attacks are developing the greatest force in the north. There is somewhat of a lull in Flanders and Champagne on the western front, probably the calm before the storm of shells.

Except for the gaining an important barricade in Artois, activity, for the moment has been transferred to Lorraine, and to the Vosges, where the Germans have again withdrawn from Hartmanns-Weilerkopf, which has changed hands many times.




