KINGSTON, June 15th, 1875.

The Bishop then delivered the following Address :

BISHOP'S ADDRESS. My DEAR BRETHREN-

My remarks on this occasion will be brief, as I am not aware of the existence of any subjects which concerns us as a Diocese to which it is necessary to refer; not that the past year has been uneventful, because I consider the Session of the Provincial Synod to have been fruitful in much useful legislation, as you know it has always been the rule for Diocesan Synods to promulgate the decrees of Provincial Synods. I would therefore draw your attention to three very important acts of the late Provincial Synod. First, the enactment of a Canon respecting "the shortened forms of Divine Service." Second, the enactment of a Canon concerning the Book of Common Prayer and the authorized version of the Holy Scriptures. Third, the appointment of a Special Day of Intercession for the Missions of the Church. Touching the last of these resolutions, the appointment of St. Andrew's Day as the Day of Intercession, I hereby request that the day be observed and that the offertory be devoted to the S. P. G. and be forwarded to the Venerable Archdeacon of Kingston. It appears to me that some means should be devised whereby the Clergy generally should be supplied with the Canons and resolutions of the Provincial Synod. At present the members of the Synod alone are provided with the report of proceedings, and I have met many of the Clergy who seemed altogether ignorant of the laws they were expected to obey. I am

happy to be able to say that the past year has been marked by general harmony and progress throughout the Diocese. My public official acts have been as follows: In October last I ordained three Deacons, and promoted one Deacon to the Priesthood. I consecrated four Churches—St. Peter's Church, Alfred; Grace Church, Clayton; St. John's Church, Ottawa; and St. John's Church, Prescott. Two burial grounds were consecrated—that of St. Peter's Church, Alfred, and of St. George's Church, Trenton. I visited the following Parishes and held confirmation in all of them.

By Dr. HENDERSON, Q.C.-

That the Synod do apply to the Local Legislature at its next Session to amend the Act incorporating the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario by adding thereto the following sections:

"That notwithstanding anything contained to the contrary in an Act of Parliament of the Province of Upper Canada, passed in the third year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chaptered seventy-four, and known as 'The Church Temporalities Act,' or of an Act of the Parliament of the Province of Canada passed in the Session held in the-twenty-ninth and thirtieth years of the reign of Her said Majesty, chaptered fifteen, and known as 'The Church Temporalities Amendment Act,' the said Synod shall have full power and authority to make by-laws regulating and providing for the formation and organization of a Vestry in every Church erected or to be erected in the said Diocese, as well where the pews and sittings therein are free as where they are let; and also declaring and defining the duties and powers of such Vestries and the Churchwardens; and the Churchwardens for the time being of any such Church or Churches shall, until changed or modified by the By-laws of the Synod, have like rights, privileges and powers; and shall, until changed or modified by the By-laws of Synod, be subject to like duties and liabilities as Churchwardens appointed under the provisions of the said 'The Church Temporalities Act,' now have and are, and they and their successors may as a coporation hold such real estate as may be given, granted or devised to them for the use of their Church as a size for a Church, a Parsonage, or a School-house; and may from time to time, with the approval of their Vestry, signified by a resolution passed at a meeting of such Vestry, mortgage such real estate for the purpose of raising money to be expended in the erection thereon of a Church, a Parsonage, or a School-house, as the case may be. The said Incorporated Synod may invest all or any of the funds intrusted to its care, including those derived from the sale of Rectory Lands, in government securities, municipal debentures, the stocks of any permanent building society, or in mortgages of real estate. But nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to give the said Incorporated Synod power or authority to apply the income derived from any such investments otherwise than in strict accordance with the special trusts relating to such funds respectively.

and the Churchwardens for the time being of any such Church or Churches shall, until changed or modified by the By-laws of Synod, have like rights, privileges and powers; and shall, until changed or modified by the Bylaws of Synod, be subject to like duties and liabilities as Churchwardens appointed under the provisions of the said 'The Church Temporalities Act,' now have and are, and they and their successors may as a Corporation hold such real estate as may be given, granted or devised to them for the use of their Church as a site for a Church, a Parsonage, or a Schoolhouse; and may from time to time, with the approval of their Vestry, signified by a resolution passed at a meeting of such Vestry, mortgage such real estate for the purpose of raising money to be expended in the erection thereon of a Church, a Parsonage, or a School-house, as the case may be. The said Incorporated Synod may invest all or any of the funds intrusted to its care, including those derived from the sale of Rectory Lands, in government securities, municipal debentures, the stocks of any permanent building society, or in mortgages of real estate. But nothing in this Act contained shall be construed to give the said Incorporated Synod power or authority to apply the income derived from any such investments otherwise than in strict accordance with the special trusts relating to such funds respectively .- Carried.

(D) AUDITORS' REPORT.

We the Auditors appointed to examine the accounts of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Synod of Ontario for the year ending the thirtieth day of April last, submit the following Report of our labors :

We have examined the Securities belonging to the various funds under the control of the Synod. Those belonging to the Clergy Trust Fund were ascertained by us to be in the joint possession of the Treasurer and Secretary, with the exception of the London debentures mentioned in the Auditors' Report of last year, which are still in possession of the City Bank of London, for the purpose of conveniently collecting the interest accruing due from them. The certificate of the Manager of that Institution, showing the purpose for which these debentures are held by it, was produced to us. The total amount of the Permanent Clergy Trust Securities, not including interest, is the sum of \$275,291.63. We have also examined the Securities held by the Synod for the undermentioned funds, and have found that those transferable by delivery were in joint possession of the Treasurer and Secretary, and that the mortgages, with the exception of one which is in suit, were in possession of the Secretary. A voucher was produced for the mortgage in the hands of the Synod's Solicitor. The capital sums represented by these securities are :---



REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

REPORT OF MISSION BOARD.

It again has become the duty of the Chairman of the Mission Board to render the Synod a statement of its receipts and disbursements during the year ending on the 30th of April last, and the duty is now performed with a feeling of great regret. The receipts from the Missionary collections are about \$420.91 less, and the parochial collections \$463.47 less than those of last year, making in the whole an apparent decrease from the previous year of \$884.38.

This will be the best place in which to make some remarks about the parochial collections. When the Mission Board met in the first week of May last, no fewer than forty-four Parishes had failed in their duty of forwarding to the Clerical Secretary the amounts collected, thus rendering it impossible to say what the receipts on account of the Mission Board actually were, for all that the Clerical Secretary can account for and all that can be reported is the amount paid to him. The consequences are that a considerable portion of last year's receipts must unavoidably be acknowledged as received during this year, and an apparent decrease in the receipts will appear in the report, when, perhaps, had the whole of the collections been paid in, there would have been an increase, or, at any rate, no deficiency, and this Diocese is thus exposed to the taunt of being unable not only not to increase its means, but even of not keeping up to what it has been accustomed to obtain; and so this Diocese, which has been generally looked upon as most prosperous will be considered as beginning to go backward, and this simply and altogether through the carelessness of those in whose hands these monies have been kept back.

It is difficult to assign a reason why these collections have been kept back. paid to the Clerical Secretary, and it is by no means pleasant to have to make these remarks; but it must be done to show why so great a falling off appears in the accounts of last year. The money, perhaps more than in 1873 and 1874, has been collected, but in consequence of its having been kept back cannot appear in the accounts for 1874 and 1875. One more observation, and this is that the number of parishes omitting to make their returns in due time is increasing. Two or three years ago only fourteen parishes were defaulting. In 1873 and 1874 they had increased to thirty-two, and now last year to forty-four. And the Mission Board feel it to be their duty to recommend to the Synod, and to urge, that Episcopal notice be taken of this now almost systematized default in the transmission of monies, at the proper time, to the Clerical Secretary ; and that, if the evil continue, the defaulters be proceeded against as by Canon provided.

From the reports of the Deputations we may gather that the one chief cause for the deficiencies in the collections of the Deputations was the severity of the weather and the bad roads occasioned by the high winds acting upon the snow and making the drifts very deep. And we all know that last winter was the most severe experienced for many years.

The Sustentation Fund, as will be seen by reference to the printed report of the Investment Fund Committee, amounts now to \$29,697.80, and the yearly interest to \$1,884.48.

The number of Missionaries receiving aid from this Fund is thirty-six, and their names and the annual stipend paid to each now follows.

DEPUTATION No. 1-Rev. J. J. Bogert, Convener.

The Convener begs leave to report:

That early in January he held Missionary Meetings at the following places in the County of Prince Edward, viz: Carrying Place, Glenn's School-house, Red School-house, Massassaga Point, Gerow Gore, Preston, Milford, Wellington and

That the other member of the Deputation, Rev. E. Loucks, on account of illness, was able to attend only the meetings at Gerow Gore, Preston, and

At Massassaga Point, a promising outstation of Carrying Place, where a large and successful meeting was confidently expected, a heavy snowstorm was the cause of disappointment to all concerned. The severe illness of Rev. C. P. Mulvany affected injuriously the meeting at Milford, and prevented the holding of a meeting at Marysburgh. The Convener understands that supplementary meetings have since been held in this Parish.

That, with these two exceptions the attendance was large, and the collections in the aggregate showed an increase of 13 per cent over those of last year.

The Convener desires to acknowledge gratefully the valuable assistance received from Mr. Patterson, Lay Reader, who delivered able and effective addresses at Carrying Place and Glenn's School-house, and regrets that such addresses by laymen are not more frequent at our Missionary Meetings.

REPORT OF DEPUTATION NO. 2-Rev. G. J. Low, Convener; Rev. C. P. Mulvany.

I entered upon the duties of this Deputation with some anxiety, as I had chosen a very unusual time for holding its meetings, viz., before, instead of after, Christmas. My reasons for doing so were that there being now seventeen Deputations in the Diocese, it would cause much clashing of interests if all were to choose January as the time for their operations; that those Deputations which visited the back townships and more scattered missions, whose journeys by carriage would consequently be longer, should have the preference of the sleighing season; and that since my route was along the front and principally by rail, its success would not be affected by the want of snow. I am happy to state that events fully justified the experiment, and, thank God, all our meetings were successes.

We began our work at Trenton on Wednesday the 9th December. Here we were kindly assisted by the Revs. W. J. Muckleston and E. H. M. Baker. The congregation was large, and indeed this may be said of all our meetings. On Thursday the 10th the meeting was at Christ Church, Belleville; the Rev-Messrs. Burke, Halliwell, Mockridge and Muckleston all rendering valuable aid by their effective speeches. The following day was spent in Shannonville. Here, too, we had good success. Sunday was devoted to the Mission of the Rev. T. Stanton, Tyendinaga. Divine Service was held at Grace Church in the morning, and all Saints' in the afternoon; and in the evening in the "Union Church" in Mill Point. Here we had a very large attendance in spite of a severe snowstorm. The Rev. Mr. Finlay drove over from his afternoon service at Frizell's Mills, and helped us. On Monday night we closed our labors with a meeting at Frizell's Mills; the previous night's snowstorm aided us here, as it made very fair sleighing; and though the weather was intensely cold, the congregation was good.

The annexed table will show that the contributions at all these meetings were far in advance of those of last year, the aggregate being more than *double*. We have also to acknowledge the services of two Laymen—Mr. Young, of Trenton, and M respect De

DEPUTATION No. 3-Rev. J. Carroll, Convener; Rev. R. S. Forneri.

The Deputation appointed to visit the several Stations in North Hastings most respectfully reports that owing to the dangerous condition of the roads the meetings were not generally so well attended nor the collections so good as those of last year.

This was not only a matter of regret to us but to the people of the several stations also, who, anxious that so discouraging a state of things might not again occur, requested that the next Deputation should visit them, if possible, in the month of October or early in January, because there is a probability of the roads being blocked up in the latter part of February.

The recollection of the fearful roads recalls to memory the kindness and courage of Rev. Mr. Finlay and Messrs. Samuel Graham, Elliott, Thompson, Brown, Johns, and Kenny, by which we were enabled to keep every engagement.

DEPUTATION No. 4-Rev. W. Lewin, Convener; Rev. W. J. W. Finlay-

This Deputation began its labors at Kingston on Sunday evening, November 15th, 1874, and after holding several meetings during the same week in different Parishes, brought its tour to a close on Sunday evening, Nov. 22nd, in the new Church of St. Mary Magdalene, Napanee.

The meeting at St. James', Kingston, having been held on a Sunday evening, by the special request of the Incumbent, was well attended; and the congregation, after hearing the appeals on behalf of the Missions of the Diocese, gave a collection which exceeded that of last year by nearly \$11. The junior member of the Deputation having been detached to take the Sunday duty at Prescott, the Convener would have been alone at this meeting had he not obtained the effective and valuable aid of the Ven. Archdeacon Parnell, who is ever prompt to respond to the calls of duty. At Tamworth the Deputation were delighted to find that the heavy debt on the Church, which had been a source of very great anxiety, had been completely wiped out by the strenuous exertions of the Missionary, the Rev. J. H. Nimmo. At the remote settlement at Clareview a meeting was held in the log schoolhouse. The day was very unfavorable; the roads bad; yet in spite of these drawbacks the few Churchmen in the neighborhood turned out to manifest their interest in Church work. When the collection was taken up not a copper was found on the plates-only bills and silver. If the example thus given by these backwoodsmen were followed and people gave of their substance in some proportion to the means given them by their Heavenly Benefactor, the work of the Church would not languish in this Diocese. At Newburgh the Service was very hearty, and the excellence of the singing showed the skilful training of the Rev. Mr. Roberts.

The meeting at Selby was held in the beautiful little Church erected there by the exertions of the Clergymen in charge, the Revs. Messrs. Bogert. The memorial windows erected by the Rev. D. F. Bogert and the members of his family are chaste and neat. In the Church is a font of exquisite design, made in Brockville and presented by a young farmer as a thank offering. Mention must be made of the large and interesting meeting at Napanee. It was held in the basement of the new Church, a handsome structure which reflects great credit on the liberality and enterprise of this thriving and rapidly growing town. The erection of so beautiful a Church in a central and growing part of the town displays great pluck on the part of the Rector, the Rev. J. J. Bogert, and very great solicitude for the welfare of the Church and an earnest determination that the Church shall not be left high and dry. It deserves, and we feel sure will command, the substantial sympathy and support of the different sections of this prosperous and wealthy community. Nor can we conclude our notice of this interesting meeting without referring to the exquisite rendering of the chants and hymns by the choir of young people trained by the Rev. D. F. Bogert, and presided over at the organ by Mrs. J. J. Bogert. May they go on in their good and arduous work and prosper.

It may be added that the substantial and elegant new Church of St. Mary Magdalene takes the place of the unsightly and out of the way structure built in that nondescript style which that learned archaeologist Canon Bleasdell characterizes as "Canadian Gothic."

DEPUTATION No. 9-Rev. F. W. Kirkpatrick, M.A., Convener.

The Convener reports as follows:

In pursuance of instructions received, in company with the Rev. T. W. Barry, I visited during the last winter the Missions of Carleton Place and Innisville,

Our work began at Carleton Place on the evening of the 19th of January, where we were kindly assisted by the Ven. the Archdeacon of Ottawa and the Rev. G. W. White. A successful meeting was held, though it was somewhat interfered with by the excitement occasioned by the election held on the previous day. An apparently very great falling off in the collection (\$10) as compared with that of the previous year (\$65) needs explanation. On that occasion the parochial collection was principally given in at the meeting, a plan which was not adopted this year. A contribution of \$14 to the Algoma Episcopal Stipend Fund was presented from the Sunday School with well chosen words spoken by

On the next evening a meeting was held in St. John's Church, Innisville, where the Deputation were effectively assisted by the Rev. J. A. Morris and-

A. Code, Esq., M.P.P. The collection here amounted to \$16.40. No meetings were held on the Thursday and Friday of this week, those already noticed having been put forward on the programme in order to suit the arrangements of another Deputation. During the interval we were on Saturday hospitably entertained by the Rev. G. W. G. Grout. We were kindly forwarded to Lanark by Mr. W. Code, and received in charge by the Rev. W. Hudson, in whose Mission several days were spent. The success of the meetings in this Parish was much interfered with by the absence of the Missionary in charge on Deputation work during the weeks immediately preceding the time appointed for our visit to his Parish. Sufficient notice did not reach several of the Stations, as our arrangements were not completed before the Missionary left home. Meetings, however, were held on Saturday evening at Lanark with a collection of \$5.20, and at Balderson's on Sunday morning with an offertory of \$3.69. The meeting announced for Bathurst Church on Sunday afternoon was not heldnotice having failed to reach this portion of the Mission. A meeting was appointed for Wednesday evening, and we were kindly taken to Perth by Mr. White, of Bathurst, in time for our appointment. A good meeting was here After a statement by the Rector of what the Parish had done for this held. and other causes during the year, addresses were delivered by the Deputation. The offertory was not so large as a year previously, but then the morning collection was also added, which was not done on the occasion of our visit. The sum now added to our funds was \$36.94. After hospitable entertainment in Perth we were forwarded, on the next afternoon, towards Rokeby as far as the neighbourhood of Bathurst Church, whence we were taken by an obliging parishioner to our destination. Here we were welcomed by Mrs. Bowles with her usual warmhearted kindness, and in the evening held our meeting. A fair attendance was present, and a collection of \$3.15 made. On the next day we were taken to Oso, where we held what I believe was the first Missionary Meeting in connection with our Church. The Deputation were very favorably impressed with this new field. The country itself is rough and uninviting, but the inhabitants are anxious to enjoy the privileges which the Church can give A Church building is here in process of construction, and may be them. finished at an early date if funds are forthcoming. The Deputation felt that their duty here was rather to encourage the little flock than to seek to carry away a liberal collection. The Convener promised to make special mention of this portion of his route in his report to the Mission Board. The Mission of Lanark, comprising the Stations of Lanark, Balderson's Bathurst, Rokeby and Oso, is too great in extent for the ability of one Missionary. The distances between his Stations are such as to necessitate the spending of much of his time upon the road; and the discouragements of undertaking so much beyond the ability of the most willing can be readily appreciated by those of the Clergy whose field of labor lies in the country. The Deputation, without undertaking to suggest a plan, would represent that scarcely a Parish in the Diocese stands more in need of readjustment. A large Church population is to be formed in several of the townships in the rear of Frontenac, and these are largely without the ministrations of the Church. The meeting in Oso was followed on the next evening by one in Bathurst, where a collection of \$1.75 was made. At an early hour next morning we were again kindly brought to Perth by Mr. White, and our work in connection with Deputation No. 9 terminated.

DEPUTATION No. 12-Rev. J. W. Burke, Convener; Rev. H. Auston.

Almost at the last moment before leaving home the Convener received a letter from Rev. H. Auston announcing his inability, on account of illness, to accompany the Deputation. The work was therefore undertaken by the Convener alone, and commenced at Prescott on Wednesday, 13th January. [This was a very memorable and delightful day for the congregation of St. John's Church in that town, as the consecration of the beautiful edifice which had been so long looked forward to by those who through years of anxiety and difficulty had longed and labored for the welfare of the Church, took place on this day. The Bishop and a goodly number of the Clergy (there were twelve present) assembled at 11 o'clock a.m. in the Church, and after the solemn service of consecration the Bishop confirmed 26 candidates, and then gave one of those deeply earnest and practical confirmation addresses for which he is so well known, and which in this case as in many others was attended with most beneficial effects. A large and attentive congregation of 312 persons showed by their presence and devout and reverent conduct the interest and the benefit they received.] The weather was unfavorable as a snow-storm prevailed all day; but notwithstanding a large congregation (260) assembled to attend the Missionary Meeting held in Church at 7 p.m. The Bishop occupied the chair, and gave a very interesting statement of the progress of the Church and Mission work in the Diocese. Revs. Canons Mulock and Preston addressed the meetag: the Convener also spoke. The offertory amounted to \$55. The Rev. W. Lewin, the Incumbent. placed the offertory of the Sunday School, amounting to \$20, on the plate with a few appropriate remarks, and the Bishop pronounced the Benediction. A large portion of the morning offertory was also devoted to the Mission Fund, which thus increased, amounted to \$76 exclusive of \$20 from Sunday School. This total of \$96 and the circumstances connected with it made the commencement of the work of the Deputation cheering indeed.

The next meeting was held at Edwardsburgh on Friday, 15th January, at 7:30 p.m. The beautiful little Church here with its pleasant Christmas decorations was pretty well filled. Addresses were made by Rev. W. Lewin and the Convener, the Rev. W. B. Carey presiding as Incumbent. A very cold evening and election excitement perhaps contributed to reduce the attendance. The offertory however was about equal to that of last year, and amounted to \$11; congregation 70.

On Sunday the 17th three meetings were held. The first in the forenoon at Iroquois was not encouraging, as although the day was very fine and roads good there were only about 70 persons present. The offertory was \$13.40, with a pleasing addition of \$10 from the Sunday School for the Algoma Bishopric Fund.

The next meeting was held at Williamsburgh at 3 p.m. Here also the attendance was not what could be wished-congregation 90; offertory \$12, not quite up to that of last year; but the offertory of the Sunday School (\$3.30) was more than double of that in 1874. The work of the day was concluded by a Missionary Meeting at Morrisburgh. This was very cheering after the former ones: congregation 120; offertory \$26.81; Sunday School offertory \$13.20. I may observe that both in this and the Parish last referred to (Iroquois) successful efforts are being made for the erection of substantial Parsonage Houses. On this day (Sunday, 17th January) the Memorial Church at Cornwall was opened, and in consequence of the services to be held during the week there, I was induced, at the request of Canon Preston with consent of Rev. R. Garrett to postpone the meetings in Osnabruck Parish, which I was the more willing to do as Rev. Canon Preston volunteered to conduct them himself at a subsequent period. Having attended and assisted at services at Cornwall, I proceeded on Thursday the 21st to Roxbor A snowstorm all day and heavy roads made the meeting small. The Incumbent, Rev. W. Early, was from his delicate state of health and the bad weather unable to attend, so I concluded the proceedings alone. The congregation numbered 27; offertory \$3.42, made up at close of meeting to \$5.12. Next day I went to Finch, and in the evening the Missionary Meeting was held in the Church. The service and singing here were very pleasant. The pupils of the Sunday School particularly by their hymns and offerings showed the effects of the pastoral care and instructions they had received. Congregation 60; offertory \$14.59; Sunday School offertory \$18, or nearly double that of last year. My work ended here, and next day I I now mention with much gratitude to the Rev. Canon returned home. Preston the result of the meetings at Osnabruck, Mr. Preston, in pursuance of his kind promise, held at great inconvenience to himself and not without some risk, owing to badness of roads. Meetings were held at St. Peter's, St. George's, and Eamon's Schoolhouse in Osnabruck on Sunday, 7th February. Terrible roads, many drifts, and cold (34° below zero) in the morning combined to render the work difficult and discouraging. However at St. Peter's the congregation was 70, and offertory \$10.10. At St. George's the congregation was 110, and offertory \$11.58; and at Eamon's School-house the congregation was 113; offertory \$11.98, making a total of \$33.66 from this Parish, a result very gratifying considering the unfavorable condition of roads and the intense severity of the weather. The Deputation (including Canon Preston's meetings) travelled about 113 miles from beginning at Prescott to close at Osnabruck; addressed 990 persons, and received offertories at meetings from congregations then present, \$192.58; and from the Sunday Schools \$64.50, making a total of \$257.08. In conclusion I beg to draw attention to the peculiarly pleasing increase in Sunday School offerings. In no one case was there a falling off; in

two cases the amount was, we may say, double; and in Morrisburgh \$13.20 was presented, and I do not see that there was any offering last year in that Sunday School. This, I think, gives a convincing and practical lesson as to the value of regularly collected contributions, however small. I believe a similar plan pursued in our Parishes with respect to our parochial collections would speedily nearly double our Diocesan Mission Fund. I would venture very humbly but earnestly to press on my clerical brethren the duty of regular attendance on the deputations to which they are named. If the Clergy relax their efforts we may look for corresponding carelessness on the part of the people and a disastrous effect on our Funds. It is most discouraging to congregations and Conveners to find at the last moment a failure on the part of members of deputations, while a little self-denial would produce most cheering results. Let every clergyman appointed feel bound to go as one sent by God, and if it be impossible for him to go let him be bound in conscience to provide a substitute.

DEPUTATION No. 13-Rev. Thomas Hudson, Convener.

By oppointment the Rev. S. Tighe and I met at Brockville January 4, 1875. Mr. Tighe, when he arrived at Moulinette, was obliged to take to his bed. I advised him to proceed no further, which afterwards proved salutary as it turned out to be small-pox. Mr. Tighe desires me here to express his gratitude to Mr. Raymond and family (one of the Church families at Moulinette), for their unremitting kindness and Christian care of him during his illness. I therefore was obliged to proceed alone, but at Moulinette the Revs. Mr. Preston and Garrett lent me their kind and valuable aid in pleading the cause. I think it well to premise that two causes intervened to prevent the attendance of Church people, being one fourth of last year, viz. the piercing cold weather and the roads being rendered well nigh impassable by reason of snow drifts; also the election contests, which caused the absence of many staunch and freehanded Churchmen. However with a few exceptions those present gave freely of the means wherewith God has blessed them, and I trust and hope the large deficit will make its way through the Missionary cards and other channels. There has been a notable decrease in the funds contributed at Alfred, but this is accounted for by the fact of considerable emigration having taken place there: four families have sold their farms and moved westward, and their places have been occupied by French Roman Catholic families. At the close of our labors the Rev. Mr. Jarvis and I had the pleasure of being present at the opening of the Memorial Church at Cornwall (built at a cost of \$36,000), where his Lordship the Bishop of Ontario presided twice and gave a soul-inspiriting address to the candidates for confirmation. The local clergy, Rev. Messrs. Jarvis and Phillips, accompanied me throughout their Parishes, and everywhere kindness and hospitality awaited us. And I am now to give particulars.

In justice to North Gower it may be said that last year the Deputation visited the Parish twice and added the two collections together.

In the City of Ottawa we met with heavy losses, as follows:

In St. John's the meeting was held on a Sunday night, and there seemed every prospect of a larger collection than that of last year; but the result did not fulfil the expectation, though the meeting was addressed forcibly by the Bishop himself, who was present.

In Christ Church the meeting was held on a week day evening, whereas the year before it was on Sunday. Hence a loss was naturally looked for here, and that loss was augmented by a combination of adverse circumstances in the way of numerous entertainments which were held in the city that evening.

I regret then to state that the loss compared with last year's collections in this district was considerable, as will be seen by the following statement:

We had some things against us. In the country the roads were badly blocked up, so that people in some cases could not turn out. It was with the greatest difficulty that even the Deputation got from place to place; while in the city the two large congregations being placed under the same Deputation rendered it impossible to give a Sunday evening to both; and, except on Sundays, Missionary Meetings in large places are usually failures.

DEPUTATION No. 15-Rev. K. L. Jones, Convener.

As Convener of Deputation No. 15 I beg to report that in company with the Rev. Arthur Phillips, Incumbent of Vankleek Hill, I commenced the work of my Deputation at Almonte on Sunday morning January 24th. Here we addressed a congregation of 160 people, and collected \$72.46, being \$12.12 in excess of the offertory of the previous year.

A snow storm and heavy roads interfered with the success of the meeting in the afternoon at Clayton; and though the meeting was a hearty and liberal one, the offertory fell \$6.43 behind that of 1874.

After leaving Clayton, Sunday afternoon, we travelled twelve weary miles through snow drifts to the Church on the hill near the Village of Pakenham. Here we found a small but earnest congregation; indeed Churchmen and Churchwomen would have had a zeal and interest in Missionary work not often met with had they climbed the hill and waded through the storm and drifts to service that evening.

After this we have little to report. The history of our Deputation is a history of cold, of storms and long journeys through the snow, of small meetings and small offertories.

One meeting deserves special notice. It was in a log school-house in the Township of Torbolton, in the Mission of Fitzroy; and the name of Henry Poole; an earnest Churchman of the congregation of Fitzroy Harbor, deserves to be mentioned in connection with it. He it was who drove us from the parsonage at Fitzroy Harbor eight miles to the school-house. The roads in some places were drifted to the tops of the fences, but he forced his horses through them, and with a zeal worthy of the cause brought us safely to our destination, We would not have been disappointed to have found the school-house dark and empty. As we approached, however, light in the windows showed us we were expected, and we were received by a large and earnest congregation. say that many of the people walked to the meeting, and young girls waded When I some two miles through the deep snow, I simply put on record an instance of devotion that in an age too much inclined to make religion a matter of convenience, justly claims a word of praise. Such earnestness on the part of the people must have been begotten of a like earnestness on the part of their Missionary Priest. It was midnight when we reached again our hospitable shelter at Fitzroy Harbor.

We finished our work on Friday evening, January 29th, with a meeting in the School-house at Sand Point, having addressed eight meetings and collected \$115.17. Throughout the whole tour we experienced the kindest hospitality from clergy and laity.

DEPUTATION No. 16-Rev. G. W. White, Convener.

I beg leave to lay before you a short statement of the labors of Deputation No. 16, consisting of Rev. A. W. Cooke and myself.

The sum raised was not as large as might have been wished, chiefly owing to the unfavorable state of the weather but also in part to the fact of many of the men and horses being in the shanties, though how this can be altogether avoided when there are so many Deputations and so many circumstances to be taken into account, it is difficult to say. Perhaps it would be as well for the Deputations in the northern part of the Diocese to make use of the week between Christmas and New Year, when all would be at home.

The first meeting was held in Rochesterville, a promising station in the environs of Ottawa, in charge of Rev. J. G. Jemmett. The collection at the meeting, which was not large, was very satisfactory. The next meeting was at all Saints', Nepean, and the third in the Missions at Hopper's, more properly called Merivale, where the Church people, though few, seem zealous, and gave a handsome offertory for Missions. The amount collected in the Mission was \$24.88. The next Parish visited was that of Richmond, and the Deputation was met by the Rector, Rev. C. B. Pettit, at Bell's Corners. The meeting, however, was only a fraction of what it would have been owing to the drifted state of the roads. At Richmond the Deputation was assisted by Rev. A. J. O'Loughlin, of North Gower. The meeting at 9th line of Goulbourn was well attended, and though the offertory was not large, it was gratifying to learn that this Station gave last year the largest parochial collection in the Parish. Total for the Parish of Richmond, \$14.23.

The Mission of Huntley, in charge of Rev. S. Tighe, in addition to the continued storms and consequent bad roads, labored under the disadvantage of having a violent disease in its midst, from which three of our clergymen had but just recovered. Many therefore stayed away from the meetings who would otherwise have been present. Meetings were held, however, in six parts of the Mission, though one at least might with advantage have been omitted. The collections at the meetings in Hazledean, Stittsville, Huntley 9th line, Carp, North Huntley, and Fitzroy 9th line amounted to \$32.96. The Mission next visited was that of March, which gave such a good account of itself last year both as regards Missionary Meetings and parochial collections, but after arriving at the house of the Incumbent, Rev. Mr. Fleming, such a violent storm arose as to make the meeting at South March an impossibility. However it is hoped that the good people of that congregation will add what would have been given at the meeting to their usual subscriptions. There was a hearty meeting at North March in spite of the bad travelling; and the amount, \$8.64, was slightly in advance of last year.

DEPUTATION No. 17-Rev. Canon Bleasdell, Convener; Rev. G. W. G. Grout.

Owing to circumstances the Convener was deprived of the agreeable co-operation of his colleague, and was thus compelled to start alone on his Deputation in the County of Renfrew. He commenced the series of Missionary Meetings at Douglas on the 19th of Jannary, and those at Scotch Bush and Eganville followed on succeeding days and were more or less successful ones. At the latter a fine new parsonage reflected credit on the energies of the members of the Church there, as well as upon their late pastor, the Rev. T. Godden. Lake Dore, Wilberforce, St. Stephen's, and St. Patrick's, Stafford, meetings followed each other in due order; and here the Convener feels called upon to remark upon the niggardly amounts contributed at the meetings at the Townships of Wilberforce and Stafford, and especially the latter; and so disproportionate to the numbers assembled on the occasion of the meetings. There is a lack of Missionary liberality often existing amongst the farmers here and elsewhere which reflects no credit upon their Church feelings, and which contrasts unfavorably oftentimes with that of the sects around them. There was a very successful meeting on the evening of the 26th January at Pembroke; and the meetings at Westmeath Front and Beachburgh were of a similar character and contrasted favorably with the townships on the west side of Muskrat Lake to whose lack of Missionary liberality I have already referred. The Church interest at Forester's Falls is represented by only one Churchman there, H. Colman, Esq., but very liberally. The series of meetings closed with that of Renfrew on February 2nd, which was a successful one and was held in the neat new stone Church there recently completed, and reflecting credit upon the enterprise of the Churchmen there. The meeting at Alice was entirely frustrated by heavy snow drifts in that remote Township, and it was thus with the greatest difficulty the Deputation reached there. Horton failed from lack of interest in the Missionary cause and their attendance there of the people in that locality, and Cobden from failure of notice of meeting being sent there in due time. The Convener is deeply indebted for the valuable assistance given him at the meetings by the Rev. T. Godden, A. C. Nesbitt, J. H. Simpson, and W. R. Clark, the Clergy of the County, as well as in other matters. And he cannot but feel grieved to know that the Churchmen in the Townships on the Opeongo Road are still as sheep without a shepherd, and left a prey to the influences of sectarianism, which is not slow to avail itself of the remissness of the Church in such regions in the pastoral care of her own. The total pecuniary result of the Deputation's labors amounted to \$73.03, being a gain on the amount of last year by \$18.99. If possible the Deputation in the County of Renfrew ought to proceed on its tour in the fall or early winter for reasons of an obvious character, viz. the deep snows and the absence of teams and men at the shanties.

That as to the petition from the Rector of Napanee and Churchwardens of St. Mary Magdalene's Church, they recommend the sale of the site of the old Church exclusive of the burying ground, and the application of the proceeds of such sale towards the liquidation of the debt of the new Church, under the direction of the Rector and Churchwardens, so soon as the title to the new Church is vested in the Synod free from any incumbrance.

That as to the petition of the Incumbent and Churchwardens of St. Peter's Church, they recommend, under the direction of the Archdeacon of Ottawa, the sale of the glebe land and parsonage in the Mission of Mountain, and that the proceeds be applied towards purchasing land in the Village of South Mountain and building a parsonage thereon, the title to the purchased land being vested in the Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MANAGEMENT OF DEPOSITORY

The Committee appointed at the last meeting of Synod upon motion of the Rev. Canon Bleasdell, seconded by Judge McDonald, and consisting of the mover and seconder and E. Harrison, of Belleville, in addition to the Book and Tract Committee, to inquire into the principles—financial and otherwise—upon which the Depository of this Diocese is conducted, and to report thereon at the next Synod, beg leave to report as follows:

Your Committee met at Kingston in September, 1874, and after considering the matters submitted to them agreed upon the following report :

That in the autumn of 1862 a meeting was held at the City Hall in Kingston with a view to initiating measures to raise money with which to procure prayer books, and at that meeting a collection was taken up. With the money thus realized prayer books were bought. At the time of the establishment of our Diocese there was in operation in the City of Kingston, under the charge of Mrs. Ferns, a branch of the Church Society Depository, the books in which fell to this Diocese. This formed the nucleus of our Depository, and to it were subsequently added several hundred volumes belonging to the Rev. T. Bousfield, and purchased from him at the price of \$500. At this time Mr. Bousfield was placed in charge as Depositary, and has always since retained that position.

In the autumn of 1866 a Diocesan collection was taken up, which realized an amount to your Committee unknown, and by means of this money and the sums from time to time realized from the sale of books the expenses of the Depository have been met, Mr. Bousfield being remunerated for his services by an allowance of for some time ten and during the last eighteen months fifteen per cent of the gross amount received for sales. At one period of financial difficulty a loan was obtained from the Rev. F. R. Tane, who was subsequently repaid.

The Committee are satisfied that the Rev. Mr. Bousfield does all in his power to make the Depository a success, but regret to learn that there are some parties in the Diocese who, having obtained books upon credit, have not paid for them.

Mr. Bousfield keeps an order book in which he enters the orders which he receives. He then sends for the books so ordered and for such others appearing in booksellers' catalogues as he thinks will command sale. Mr. Bousfield claims that any objectionable book found in the Depository reaches there either through having been ordered by some person other than he, or, if ordered by him, through its title being deceptive and its author being a Church of England clergyman.

It is stated that stock was taken in May, 1874, when the net value amounted to about \$2,000. It is not thought advisable to state in a report which may Your Cellation to an that a gen should rest


