In his speech, which he read with deliberation, the Governor, who is making fprohibition a leading issue in Pennsylvania, handled the subject without mincing words. He declared that Federal officials were encouraging the breaking of the law and that the Federal authorities were responsitive for illegal liquor coming into the country, while some enforcement officials were acting as graft collectors.

Governor Pinchot suggested that the law could not be enforced until the prohibition enforcement service was taken out of politics.

Says Law is Flouted

"Not only has the political hamstringing of the Federal Enforcement Service had its seat in Washington," he said, "but it is notorious that disorbedience to the Eighteenth Amendent has been flagrant in the capital city. Stories are innumerable of the active practice and encouragement of law breaking by officials high in the Government of the United States. We icannot expet other communities to respect and obey the law if the Capitol of the Nation itself is a leader among the law-breakers. Washington has set the bad example and it is for Washington to repair the damage."

New London, Conn., Oct. 18.—(As-

Finlay Simmons has been scouring the country for a staff and crew to take the schooner Blossom into the South Atlantic and Indian Oceans, the ship itself has been prepared for one of the longest cruises ever undertaken by a vessel her size.

The expedition to the Antartic islands which will start from New London this week for the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, is said to be one of the largest ever undertaken for purely scientific purposes. Every one of the sixteen men aboard ship, except the three ship's officers, is trained in some line that will aid in the collecting of animal and bird speciments and in taking notes on the geology, plant life, sometimes human life, and climatic conditions in the regions that will be visited.

Last Two Years

The Blossom will visit the least brown portions of the world on her into the Rev. Dr. Henry van Dyke in a sermon last Sunday in the Park Avenue Presbyterian Church, of which his only son, the Rev. Tertius van Dyke is the pastor.

"When Elijah went into the cave he had a bad case of pessimism," declared Dr. van Dyke. "He thought all the world was wrong, going to the bad, and that he only was faithful to God and to duty. He attempted to prove this by having nothing more to do with the world and isolating himself in a cave.

"There are many men today affected by this form of self-righteons pessimism. They tell us that the 'great Nordic race' is vanishing, that 'the revolt against civilization' is sure to succeed, that Europe is hopeless,' and therefore America should keep out of it, and so on.

"What is this but going into the cave? The still, small voice of God

The Blossom will visit the least known portions of the world on her two-year cruise. Explorers have gone over the Pacific islands and other tropic regions with fair thoroughness. Even the polar regions have been visited in recent years by men who have taken acurate observations of the lands through which they traveled. The South Atlantic islands, however, have been visited only by seal and sea elephant hunters, who brought back romantic stories, but little accurate information of scientific value.

At the helm of the ship will be John da Lomba, a Cape Verde Portuguese, who has sailed the seven seas for thrity-two years under one master. Captain John Cleveland, of New Bedford, said to be the "last of the old sealing captains." De Lomba is reputed to know "every rock in the Atlantic," and has made several voyages to the island which he will now visit in aid in a search for knowledge of the world we live in.

At the head of the ship's staff is

Captain Simmons will command the the navigating and scientific personnel of the vessel. Members of the crew are all college trained men, who will, in between their duties of hoisting sail and scrubbing decks, carry out their additional duties of surveyor, ship's clerk or whatever additional capacity they are selected to fill

fill.

The Blossom is a three-master, built originally for the coastwise cargo. The expedition will spend the coming Antartic Summer in the South Atlantic, then cruised along the West African coast, visiting the islands of that region, and then make for the Indian Ocean. She will restock at Indian Ocean, or the return voyage, and, at each stop will ship home the speciments collected.

Mr. Gray, who had been called to Ottawa in connection with the proposed work, said that the specifications for the extension of the breakwater were now being prepared, and would call for stone and rocks. About 200,000 tons of stone, weighing from five to ten tons each, would be necessary for the top of the extension, while about 400,000 tons of smaller stone would be needed for the bottom. Mr. Gray said that the specifications would be ready in the course of a few weeks.


