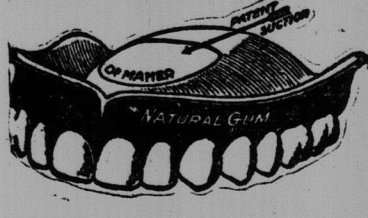

WHY THIS DELAY?

Mrs. Edith Rogers, the only woman elected a member of the Manitoba legislature, was born in Norway House, where her father was an officer of the Hudson Bay Company.

Perhaps a review of the facts of the case will suggest an answer to these questions. Last year the harbor revenue was \$188,872.73, and the receipts from fisheries \$11,044.10.

"But," argues the pessimist, "the wharves will need renewing, and we cannot afford it. Suppose one of the west side wharves slid into the harbor?"

Well, suppose it did. There is an agreement, duly signed, by which the federal government is pledged to provide needed facilities on the west side.

There is also an agreement of June, 1888, with the C. P. R. which ought to be of some value. If these two agreements were carried out, the west side would not be short of terminals.

It is not due to any action in relation to St. John by the government at Ottawa that increased facilities are needed here.

The growth of the west and of Canada's trade has brought the business to this national port, and will bring it in ever increasing volume.

Why consult the C. P. R. in regard to harbor commission? Will that corporation be anxious to get into a controversy between St. John and the authorities at Ottawa?

Premier Meighen when in St. John asserted that Canada could never be independent until she could conduct her own business through her own channels.

What does that mean? Simply that Canada will not be independent until her Atlantic winter trade is handled at the ports of St. John and Halifax.

Why does the city council go on wasting time? Just as surely as the harbor commission plan is submitted to the citizens they will reject it.

DEFENDING AMHERSTBURG

The middle of July, 1812, saw the British engaged in a heroic attempt to save Amherstburg from capture by the invading force of Americans under General Hull.

The garrison at Amherstburg consisted of about 600 men in all; Hull had a force of about 1,200 men under his command. He was established at Sandwich, about sixteen miles away.

On July 15 Hull sent Colonel Cass to take the bridge; he made three separate attempts to gain possession of the strategic place, but each time he was repulsed with losses.

Hull called a conference and decided to move heavy guns up against Amherstburg. The British force advanced to the attack again. Then an attempt was made higher up the stream.

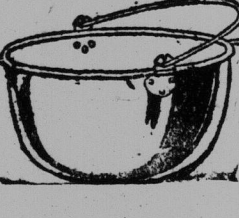

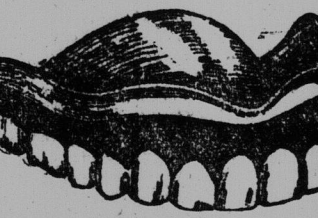

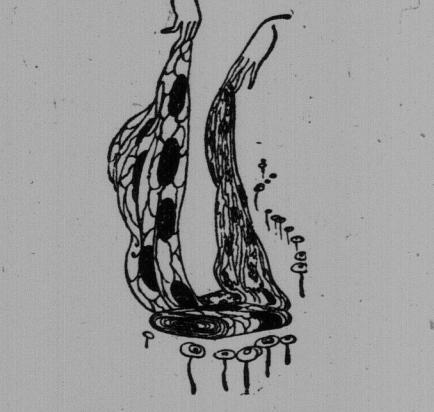

UNKNOWN PERSON TELEPHONES HE IS ELWELL'S SLAYER

Says He Was Formerly a Soldier and Was Prompted by Romantic Motives—Regarded as Crank.

Detroit, Mich., July 16—A telephone call from a man representing himself as the slayer of Joseph Elwell, New York turfman and card expert, was received by I. H. Polzner, assistant United States district attorney, without disclosing his identity.

The man said: "I desire that the government discontinue the persecution of my New York friends who were persons suspected of the murder of tricky Joe Elwell. I alone know how Elwell died. I'll give myself up when I'm good and ready and that will be only when I have evidence enough to show that the murder was fully justified."

All efforts to learn the identity of the man or whence the call came were fruitless, although the prosecutor said the conversation lasted fifteen minutes.

The man told a story of an unsuccessful suit for the hand of a Bohemian countess a decade ago in the capital of Europe. A final refusal, he told Polzner, led him to abandon his country for America, where he settled about eight years ago.

During the early months of the war, Elwell, then visiting Europe, was said to have made the acquaintance of this woman and her sister, several months later the sisters came to New York, living there since.

When District Attorney Swann was informed of the despatch from Detroit, he said: "That is in line with many anonymous communications I have received in connection with the Elwell murder. It is either a hoax, in my opinion, or is the vaporing of a disoriented man. I shall not even bother to communicate with the Detroit authorities about the matter."

Mr. Swann said that, at no time during his investigation of the Elwell case has he received any information that Elwell had been on intimate terms with a countess.

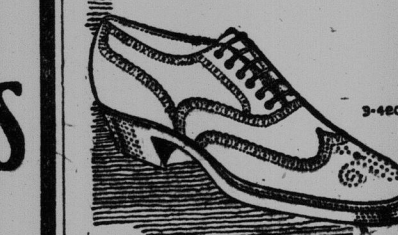

ANSWERS CHARGES OF IMPROPER USE OF UNION FUNDS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, July 15—A special despatch to the Citizen from Detroit, says: Allen E. Barker, departed grand president of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way employees and railway shop laborers, charged by the brotherhood with improper handling of \$172,000 brotherhood funds admitted, to answer to charges filed in circuit court here that he had authorized a check to P. M. Draper, Ottawa, Canada, for \$60,000, to be used in combatting the "one big union" movement in Canada.

Barker is alleged to have pledged the brotherhood for large sums to support the Fluh plan and other labor projects, also to

have invested brotherhood money in Detroit real estate. He holds a life pass, on Canadian railroads, presented by the government for services in labor disputes. Negotiations for a settlement of the case are pending.

Interviewed here, today, P. M. Draper said: "A year ago, a sum of money, around \$50,000 was sent to Canada to carry out certain work which I am not at liberty to speak about because it relates to private affairs of the labor movement. I may say, however, that it was all for perfectly legitimate work in furthering the interests of organized labor."

DENMARK CLAIMS CANADIAN ISLAND

Ottawa, July 16—Canada will probably establish a mounted police post at Ellesmere Island to establish jurisdiction, which is challenged by the Danish government. Greenland Eskimo have been slaughtering the muskox herds on Ellesmere, and representations from Canada have been met by the Danish government with the claim of sovereignty over that territory. Canada has notified Denmark, through the British foreign office, that Denmark must restrain her Greenland citizens or Canada will take measures to do so.

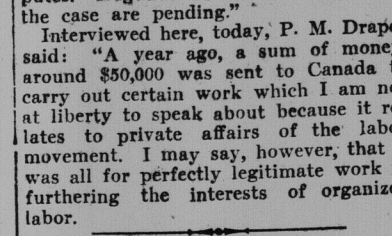

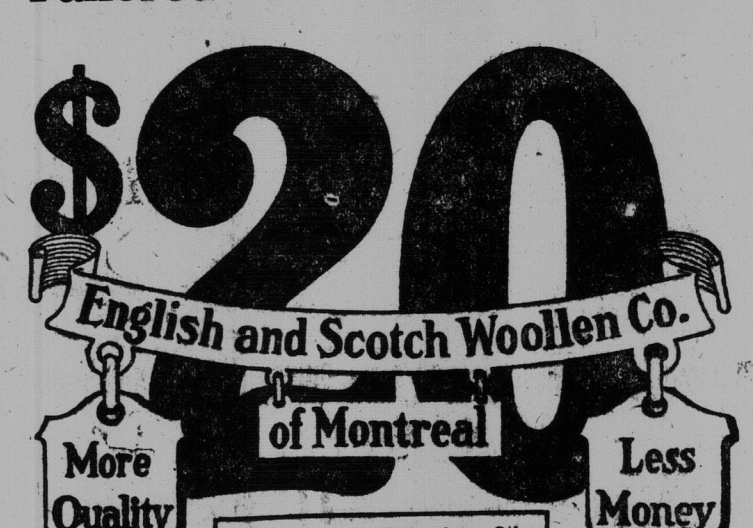

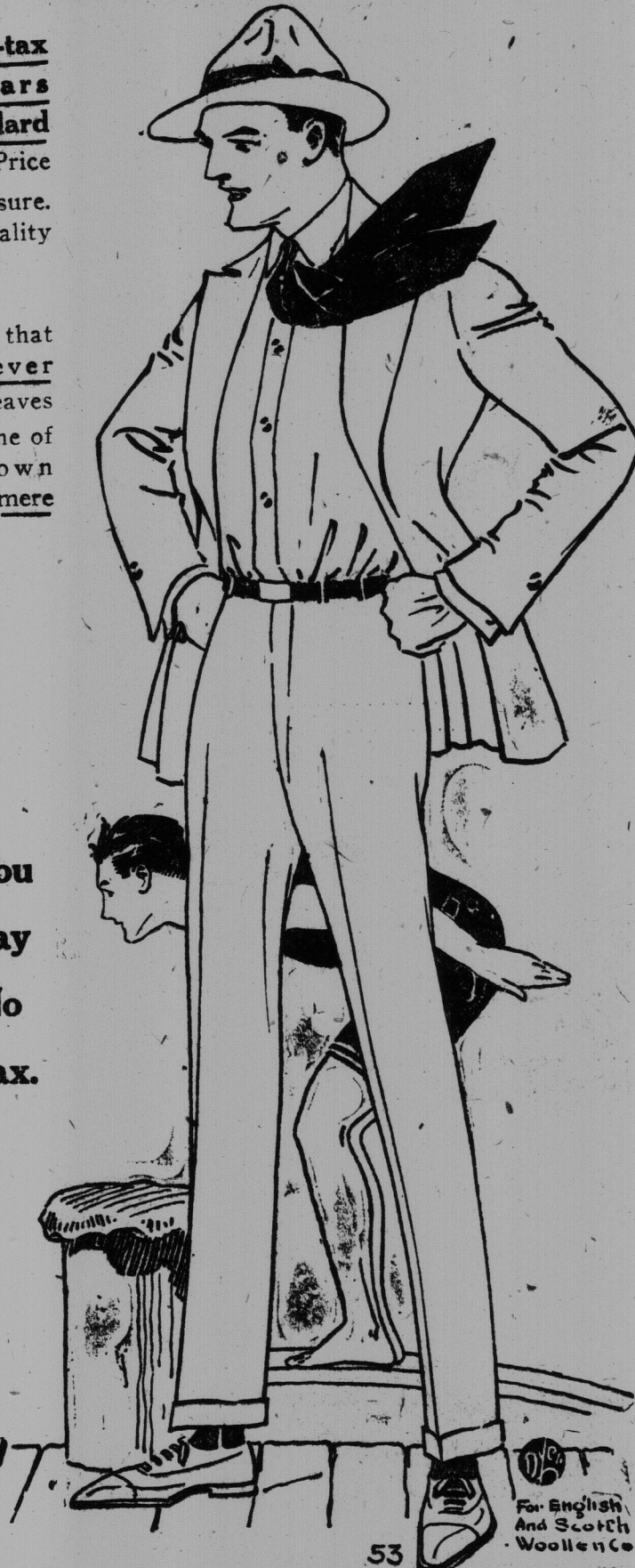

SONS OF TEMPERANCE

Moncton, July 16.—The National Division Sons of Temperance session was continued yesterday. The legislation committee recommended that steps be taken to urge upon the congress of the United States the necessity of prohibiting the sale of intoxicants on all American ships; that no increase in the percentage of alcohol in temperance drinks be allowed; that the amount of alcohol now permitted to be sold in the United States for medicinal purposes be curtailed; that temperance forces of Canada be called upon to unite and demand that there be a Dominion-wide law doing away with the importation, manufacture and exportation of intoxicants for beverage purposes; that number of certificates issued by doctors be greatly reduced; and that the Canadian government be called upon to have alcoholic contents of temperance drinks now sold reduced to one half of one per cent, as is law in the United States.

Nova Scotia Fatality. Stanley Sutherland of Brookfield, N. S., was killed yesterday afternoon when a car in which he was driving was struck at a railway crossing by the east bound Maritime express. He leaves his wife and five small children. His wife's brother died a few weeks ago as the result of an accident at Shubenacadie station, when one of his legs was cut off by a train.

YESTERDAY'S TEST OF ONE MAN CAR

The one-man street car was given its first test yesterday afternoon. The car ran on Indian town and later along the king and British street routes. Those on board were the mayor and commissioners, T. H. McCauley of the New Brunswick Power Company, the city engineer, E. J. Terry, representing the Rotary Club; R. E. Armstrong, representing the Commercial Club; Fred Campbell, Ira D. Ferris and Gus Langheim, representing organized labor, and representatives from the newspapers. McCauley said the trip was reasonably fair but Mr. Campbell said inefficiency of the car was demonstrated. Mr. McCauley said that a further demonstration of the car would be made this afternoon a little after 3 o'clock, and other afterwards until the public was acquainted with the operation of this new type.

SUITS OVER PROPERTY. Before Judge Chandler in the Supreme Court on Tuesday judgment was given in the case of Frank Browley, plaintiff, and George H. Waterbury, defendant. This was an action brought by the plaintiff for the return of deposit paid by the plaintiff on the purchase, by him at public auction, of property in Ches-

ter street. The defendant also made a counter claim for damages, giving as reason that the plaintiff has not carried out his agreement to purchase. Judge Chandler gave judgment for the defendant on the plaintiff's claim with costs and also gave judgment for the defendant on the counter claim for the sum of \$1 without costs. G. H. V. Belyea, K. C., Myles B. Lines were for the plaintiff and Kenneth A. Wilson for the defendant.

INQUIRY INTO CHARGES.

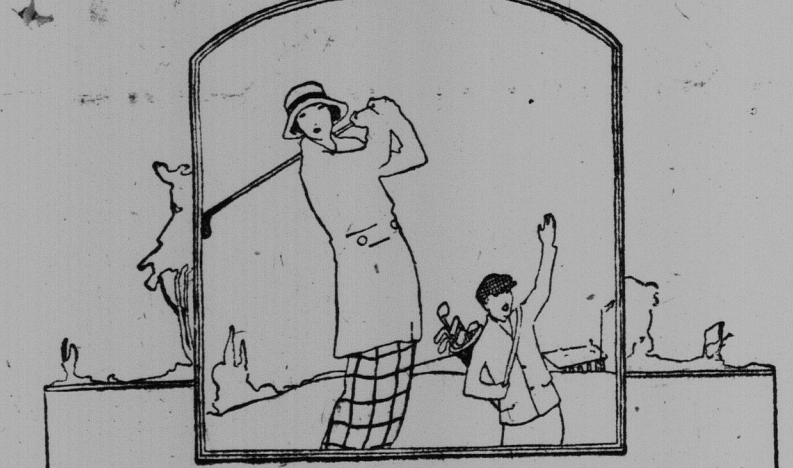

Wolvin, president of the Dominion Steel Corporation, announced that a gift of \$250,000 was to be made by the company to Dalhousie University to provide more professorships in research work in connection with the natural resources of the province of Nova Scotia.

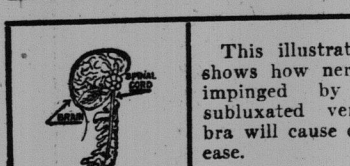

EXPECTS VOICE OF PEOPLE TO RULE

Lt.-Gov. Pugsley's Reference to Result of Recent Plebiscite on Prohibition.

The following is Moncton Transcript's report of Lieut.-Gov. Pugsley's address of welcome to the National Division S. of T. in Moncton:—
"Lieutenant Governor Pugsley warmly welcomed the visiting delegates to New Brunswick, adding an especial welcome to the delegates from the United States. His Honor briefly sketched the advantages of the various provinces of the Dominion, comparing New Brunswick most favorably with any referring to temperance matters. Lieut. Governor Pugsley said the torch of sobriety and right living had been held aloft in his boyhood days in the town of Sussex by a division of the Sons of Temperance, which still contains a good work along this line, coupled also with the torches of morality and Christianity. His Honor, referring to the recent referendum on the Prohibition question, said he did not in a position to say what action the government would take, as he did not know, but as New Brunswick formed a part of a very advanced democracy, it could reasonably be expected that the voice of the people would rule."

"His Honor compared the forms of government as they existed in United States and Canada, and expressed the conviction that the form of government in the Dominion was even more democratic than that of the American Republic. Governor Pugsley referred to the part played in the war by the sons of Canada and the United States and expressed gratification at the coming appointment of a Canadian Ambassador to Washington. In the best interests of humanity, and right it was for the people of both countries to work hand in hand for a common cause."

FIRST TAX BILLS ARE SENT OUT

About Three Weeks Needed Before They All Are in Hands of Citizens.

The assessment list was filed yesterday with the common clerk, after which the first instalment of tax bills were sent out. E. E. Murray, Olive, chairman of the board of assessors, estimates that it will take nearly three weeks to get all of the bills out. The total levy this year is \$1,618,245, an increase of \$317,971 over last year. The assessment values are as follows:

Personal estate 7,532,650
Income 16,857,650
Taxes levied from real estate aggregate \$762,600,000 or forty-nine per cent. from personal estate, \$225,008.57, or thirteen point nine per cent. from income \$488,119.97, or thirty point five per cent. Taxes levied from banks, corporations and companies specials amount to \$774,001.84, or 4.8 per cent. Taxes levied from the super tax amount to \$24,598.08, or 1.5 per cent.
The total number of rate payers in the city is 17,465, an increase of 371 over last year. The following shows the rate paid and other Canadian cities:

Toronto 3.00
Hamilton 8.50
London 4.00
The rate in St. John last year was \$2.62.

GET BUSY

Just think of the fine half mile track on an island of the river with a beautiful race surrounding it. The parade held on the 12th would have been a credit to a city as big as St. John, and on the race track on the 13th there were more than 8,000 people. Why is it St. John does not try to encourage the horse racing game, which is a sport that appeals to all. It is no wonder they call their race track the earlier track of Canada. I have seen a good many in my day, but Woodstock has the finest in Canada for a half mile track.

HON. E. K. SPINNEY STILL A LIBERAL

There is no salary attached to the position, and it will be a financial loss to me to accept."
