

ROMAN BUILDING

Mussolini Will Excavate for Ancient Senate House.

Rome, March 1—(By mail.)—Mussolini has decided to start excavations on the site of the Church of S. Ardiano in Via Bonella, hoping to recover and restore the Curia, or Senate House.

The Curia was originally erected on the Comitium by Tullus Hostilius, but was burned in 53 B. C. Twenty-four years later Augustus reconstructed it under the name of Curia Julia, and it was later restored by Diocletain. Centuries after its first inception, the Senate was abolished by Justinian, and in 630 the Curla was only a deserted hall. In that year Pope Honorius I built the Church of S. Adriano, incorporating part of the old hall into his facade. A few years ago some partial excavations,

undertaken by the archaeologist, Guiseppe Boni, brough to light part of a beautiful tesselated pavement, but it was not possible to continue the work of excavating at that time, as S. Adriano belonged to a convent of Spanish monks who were not willing to dispose of the building so that further excavations could be carried out.

A coln of Augustus' reign shows the Senate House as it was in those days. Its portico was supported by four columns and the pediment adorned with statutes and sculptures, súrmounted by a winged victory. The interior, tradition tells, was of great splendor. The cilling was gilded and the marble walls were hung with pictures. Golden busts of distinguished citizens of Rome were ranged round the room.

In the centre stood the altar, glittering with precious stones, which had been brought from Egypt, and above it was the famous statue of Victory, which was carried through the city in processions.

The last historical meeting of the Senate took place in 533, when that once world powerful body met to discuss the best micans of regulating Papal elections.

No half measures will be adopted, Mr. Johnson said last night at the Hotel Astor. It is intended to abolish forthwith all objectable shows, posters and all unsaferiors and all unsaferiors.

The "hot dog," famed in song and story, hereafter must adorn itself with a "pure food" tag, certifying that it contains certain ingredients guaranteed by the Board of Health to represent a specified food value. Vendors of all food articles will be required to comply with the pure food laws. At least 80 per cent. of responsible showmen throughout the country have subscribed to the new regime, it is said.

Will Clean Up Industry.

Mr. Johnson added:
"Decision to clean up this great amusement industry by means of a major operation was reached after careful deliberation resulting in conviction by those with reputations and capital at stake that only radical measures would suffice. Less than 8 per cent. of the personal in the industry will come under the band, but that element will no longer be tolerated in it.
"There is no question in view of the virtually unanimous support given this reform by American showmen, that decisions of my office will be completely effective.

BRITISH PARTY ALIGNMENT IS BEING CHANGED

Law Faces Unionist Schism; "Die-Hards" Advance

Alliances Outworn - Political Significance in Chamberlain's Dinner to Old Colleagues.

London, March 20—An undignified squabble over Unionist party funds, which has amused political circles in the past few days, is only the latest manifestation of important movements among politicians of the parties. The old alliance have been found outworn and there is on all sides a feeling out for a fresh alignment and the formation of new groups.

The trouble in the Unionist party has arisen through the proposal that Viscount Farquhar should resign from the treasuryship of its funds. He is an admirer of ex-Premier Lloyd George and seemed willing to step down until he heard that Lord Younger was to be appointed in his place. Now Younger was the man who engineered the great victory of the Coalition in 1918, but as the representative of its Conservative wing he prevented Lloyd George from precipitating a general election last spring, at a moment that appeared propitious to his personal fortunes. Consequently, as soon as Farquhar heard who was to be his successor he withdrew his resignation and has declined to tender it again, even after a personal interview with the Prime Minister.

He asserts that a large part of the money he collected was subscribed really in support of Lloyd George and that the Unionist party as such has no

This argument reveals the growing signs of a schism in the Unionist ranks. There remains the Labor party, which in its anxiety to live up to its new role of official opposition still insists on its unity. But after all its name is little more than a convenient appellation. There is really little in common between a philosophic Socialist like Sidney Webb and a rude dock laborer like Jack Jones, and even the internationalism of Ramsey Macdonald may clash with the real patriotism of J. H. Thomas and J. R. Clynes. It is held together by the theoretical belief in Socialism, but differences would inevitably occur if it actually acquired power to put it into practice.

But if the old ties which bind professional politicians are loosening, they are still weak among the masses of the voters.


The country is beginning to think out things for itself, so while the Government seeks tranquillity and fails to find it, deep and lasting developments in the political world are in process of fermentation.
