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CANADA YEARLY MEETING

OF FRIENDS.

Held at Pickering, Ontario, from the 20th day of the Sixth Month, to the 24th of the same, inclusive, 1890.

SIXTH DAY—the 20th of Sixth Month.

1. The reports from the Quarterly Meetings show that the following Friends were appointed as their representatives in this Meeting, viz: from

YONGE STREET—Francis Starr, Jeremiah Lapp, William V. Richardson, George Rorke, and Joseph Cody.

Norwich—James McLaughlin, Harvey H. Haight, George Pollard, and Joshua Clayton.

Who are present except four.

2. The caretakers are: from

WEST LAKE—Amos Bowerman, and John C. Garratt. Yonge Street—Gervas Cornell, Benjamin Phillips, and William V. Richardson.

Norwich—Henry S. Moore, and Joseph Henceson. Who are present except two.

3. We have at this time in attendance with us Friends, Members of other Yearly Meetings, who presented credencials expressing unity from the meetings to which they belong; whose company, with that of other dear Friends from distant parts, is accepted by us as a token of the Lord's goodness.

The following Friends were appointed in conjunction with a like committee of Women Friends, to have the subject of preparing Returning Minutes under care and to act therein as way may open:

Benjamin W. Wood, and Joshua N. Richardson.

4. Epistles have been received from Western, Iowa, Ohio, and New England Yearly Meetings, the reading of which has been comforting, encouraging and instructive.

To prepare replies to these epistles as way may open therefor, and to address one to Kansas Yearly Meeting whose epistle has not reached us, and to present the same to a future sitting, the following Friends were appointed, viz: James T. Richardson, Jeremiah Lapp, Joseph Henderson, George Pollard, Henry S. Moore, Benjamin W. Wood, Royal Rogers, Bernard Baker, Francis Starr, Moses Yourex and Thomas Robinson.

5. The Representatives were directed to audit the Treasurer's accounts and determine the amount necessary to be raised the present year.

They were also directed to confer together, and propose to the next sitting of this Meeting the name of a Friend to act as Clerk, and one for Assistant Clerk, to this Meeting.

Adjourned to meet at 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.

SEVENTH DAY MORNING-the 21st of the Month.

About the time adjourned to the meeting convened.

6. Allan M. Dorland on behalf of the Representatives

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2nd. towards a speedily avoided reported that they had conferred together, and are united in proposing the name of George Rorke for Clerk, and Arnoldi Haight for Assistant. These nominations having been separately named and considered are approved of, and they are appointed to those services for one year.

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They also propose the names of Joseph Henderson, and William Cornell, as Messengers for this meeting; these are united with and appointed to that service.

- 7. We have at this sitting received the epistle from Kansas Yearly Meeting which was read to the satisfaction of the Meeting, and directed to be handed to the Committee on Correspondence to prepare a reply thereto as way may open.
- 8. The Meeting entered into an examination of the state of its members by reading the Queries and Answers thereto from the Quarterly Meetings and proceeded as far as the answering of the fifth Query.

Meetings for Divine Worship are to be held to-morrow at 10 o'clock, a.m., and at 3 o'clock, p.m.

Adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock on Second day morning.

SECOND DAY MORNING—the 23rd of the Month.

About the time adjourned to the meeting convened.

The reading of the Queries and Answers thereto from the Quarterly Meetings was resumed and concluded.

A SUMMARY OF THE ANSWERS IS AS FOLLOWS:

ist. Friends are mostly careful to attend all our meetings for religious worship and discipline. Some slackness in this particular, which has had care, appears in the middle of the week. The hour is nearly observed. No unbecoming behavior to remark, except that one meeting says some instances of drowsiness.

2nd. We believe Friends are preserved in love one towards another—when differences arise care is taken speedily to end them. Tale bearing and detraction are avoided and discouraged, so far as we know.

3rd. Friends endeavour to train up their children and those of other Friends under their care in the principles of the Christian religion as professed by us, although more care as to plainness of dress, language and deportment is desirable, and also as to the example of parents themselves in these respects. We believe they endeavour to guard their children and others under their care against corrupt conversation and reading pernicious books.

4th. Nearly all Friends are diligent in reading the Holy Scriptures in their families collectively.

5th. Friends avoid the use of intoxicating drinks, except for purposes strictly medicinal, and are clear of frequenting taverns and of attending places of diversion so far as we know.

6th. The circumstances of the poor and of those who appear likely to need assistance are inspected and relief afforded them, and they are advised and assisted in suitable employment, and their children and all others under our care, are in a way to be properly educated for the ordinary duties of life.

7th. Friends are clear of complying with military requisitions or of paying any fine or tax thereof.

8th. Except one case of a failure to meet engagements, Friends appear to be just in their dealings and punctual in fulfilling their engagements, and are careful to conduct their business, as becomes our religious profession. When any give occasion for fear on these accounts they are seasonably laboured with for their preservation and recovery.

9th. Care is mostly taken to deal with offenders, we trust, in the spirit of meekness and agreeably to our discipline.

9. During the foregoing examination the meeting was introduced into a travail of soul for the removal of deficiencies and for a growth in the Truth within our borders, and much counsel was imparted, a digest of which is as follows:

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The attendance of all our meetings is a reasonable service which we owe to the Giver of all good by whom the many blessings we enjoy are dispensed, "Not forsaking the assembling of ourselves together as the manner of some is, but exhorting one another, and so much the more as ye see the day approaching." Heb. x. 25. In the performance of this incumbent duty our forefathers suffered great persecutions, and their faithfulness in this particular was blessed to them and to their children. Shall we, their descendants, who at this age of the world are permitted "to sit every man under his vine and under his figtree and none to make him afraid," neglect the privilege we now enjoy of worshiping the God of our fathers in the way we believe to be well pleasing in His As we are willing to make the sacrifice called for at our hands, we, even as they, shall be blessed abundantly therein.

It is all important that we experience a preparation of heart to worship God in spirit and in truth; then we shall know of holding all our meetings in the power of God, and be enabled to "present our bodies living sacrifices, holy, acceptable unto God," and know of being fed with the bread of life to the satisfying of the hungry soul. In this condition no drowsiness will be known, and the weaknesses of our nature will be overcome.

As the mind is turned to the inward teachings of the Holy Spirit, the Lord will teach us of His ways and lead us in a plain path. He shows us our different states and conditions, and as we are faithful to His teachings, we shall experience a growth in grace and in the saving knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

Let us remember, the Crown of Glory is at the end of the race, and he that turneth back after putting his hand to the plough is not worthy of the Kingdom of Heaven.

Our Christian discipline is the outcome of the doctrines and principles of the Christian religion as professed by us and held by the early followers of our Lord and Master Jesus Christ, and as our hearts are subservient to the teachings of Christ, the requirements of our discipline will not be irksome but will be looked upon as a help in our Zionward journey.

It is a duty we owe to God to train up our children in these principles, the foundation of which is love to God and to our fellow men. Let us not be backward in speaking to our children on religious subjects. Their young minds are capable of grasping the simple truths of the Gospel, and are easily wrought upon by the "Anointing, that teaches us of all things." As the twig is bent, the tree is inclined.

A change of garment does not make a Friend, but our Saviour says, "ye are my Friends if ye do whatsoever I command you," and His teachings lead into plainness and simplicity, of dress, language and deportment.

Let us not be ashamed of our profession; seek above all things to be approved of God.

"Faith without works is dead being alone." True faith works by love to the purifying of the heart, and qualifies us to glorify God with our bodies and with our spirits which are His.

It is necessary for us to be continually on our guard, that neither in our words nor our actions, we bring reproach upon Christ. It is not sufficient for us only to love the good old way, but we should walk therein.

Friends have ever been looked upon as a temperate people, but do we raise our voices against, and use all rightly available means to annihilate the scourge of intemperance, more deadly in its effects than war, pestilence and famine combined?

We look upon the horrors of the opium traffic as a national sin of the deepest dye, and fervently pray that it may not continue a stain upon a Christian people.

Our allegiance to the Prince of Peace calls for a positive testimony against war, or anything tending to create a warlike spirit; holding these views, we should discountenance the introduction into our public schools of everything likely to foster a martial spirit.

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"Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfil the law of Christ."

10. Information has been received from Norwich Quarterly Meeting, that all their Meetings for Worship are held at 10 o'clock a.m. from 4th month to 10th month inclusive, and at 11 o'clock a.m. from the 11th month to the 3rd month inclusive.

Norwich Preparative Meeting is held on the first Fourth day in each month, and Norwich Monthly Meeting on the second Fourth day in each month at the aforesaid hours.

That Meeting also requests that the time for holding Norwich Quarterly Meeting be changed as follows:—to be held the first Seventh day after the second Fourth day in the Third, Sixth, Ninth, and Twelfth months; in Sixth and Ninth months at the hour of 10 a.m., and in Third and Twelfth months at 11 a.m.

This meeting appoints Thomas Robinson, Arnoldi Haight, Henry S Moore, Benjamin W. Wood, and Harvey H. Haight, to take the proposed change of the time of holding Norwich Quarterly Meeting into consideration, and report to the next sitting of this Meeting.

11. The Minutes of the Representative Meeting were read and approved.

The time for which the members of that meeting were appointed having expired, Francis Starr, Allan M. Dorland, Gervas Cornell, Valentine Dale, Henry S. Moore, Harvey H. Haight, and Thomas Robinson, are appointed to propose the names of Friends to act in that capacity.

12. At the request of the Representative Meeting the following Friends are appointed to collect an account of the losses sustained by the Society in regard to property and the causes therefor and forward the same to the clerk of that Meeting, viz: George Pollard, Arnoldi Haight and Adam H Garratt.

13. Allan M. Dorland, Wellington, Ont., William V. Richardson, Pickering, Ont., and George Rorke, Thornbury, Ont. were appointed Correspondents for this Yearly Meeting.

14. The Committee on First day Schools reports as follows:

(For report, see Minutes of Women's Y. M.)

The following Friends were appointed to act in conjunction with a committee of Women Friends, as a First day School Committee:—James T. Richardson, Walter Richardson, Moses Yourex, Elihu Rogers, Arnoldi Haight, Henry S. Moore, Allan M. Dorland, Joseph Cody, and George Pollard.

15. The subject of procuring copies of our Discipline so that every family in the meeting may be provided with one, was brought before the meeting. After due consideration this meeting appointed Arnoldi Haight and Benjamin W. Wood, to obtain in sheet form 200 copies for that purpose and have them bound and distributed, and draw upon the Treasurer of this meeting for the necessary funds.

The meeting now adjourns to meet at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

To Canada Yearly Meeting of Friends:

DEAR FRIENDS,—Your affectionate and brotherly epistle so kindly and promptly responding to our first one to your Yearly Meeting, has been read to our great comfort and joy; confirming us in the belief that you have the cause of Truth and the salvation of souls at heart, and that the Lord's servants shall see eye to eye when He shall bring again Zion.

Our number is much smaller than yours, so that it is with trials and embarrassments that we continue to hold our Yearly Meeting. Many of the fathers and mothers in our Israel have been removed from works to rewards, even such as have borne the burthen in the heat of the day, and whom the Lord did own and dignify with a large portion of labor in the church militant. Let your intercession be raised for us as ability is afforded, that a succession of standard bearers may be found among us. We have learned something of your peculiar and painful trials, even of your perils among false brethren. Some of our older members know how to sympathise with you and to feel with and for you by a similar experience.

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Our Friends who were with you last year, were comforted in mingling with you in your annual assembly and brought a very good report to us of your meeting. In this we rejoice—for it is the sweet privilege of the Lord's dear children not only to suffer with each other but to rejoice in one another's prosperity.

We of ourselves can do nothing towards maintaining our ancient principles and testimonies, much less the spread and propagation of Christianity in the world. But we are comforted in believing that it is the Lord's will to continue His gracious regard towards the workmanship of His hands; and that He will still raise up from among the dear youth, judges as at the first and counsellors as at the beginning—even such as dare not go forth in the armour of Saul, but like the stripling David trust in the Lord God of Israel, and await His commands.

Be encouraged dear brethren to cast all your care upon the Lord, and wait for His putting forth and going before, keeping a single eye to the pointing of His finger; but when He commands be valiant for the Truth. Amid the many commotions in the world, the snares and the temptations laid for the unwary—we find by our own painful experience that our only safety is in watchfulness unto prayer, and we entreat you to be gentle and tender with the erring, remembering the pity and the compassion of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Saviour of men, while in that prepared body in which He came

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to do His Father's will, and to suffer the just for the unjust, that He might oring us unto God. His great mission was and is to call sinners to repentance. True He came not to save us in our sins, but from our sins. Yet we believe it is profitable to review our own experience as individuals, and recount the times and seasons when we have stepped aside or been unfaithful, yet have been followed with the reproofs of instruction which are the way of life. Are we not then ready to exclaim with the Royal Psalmist, "Surely goodness and mercy have followed me all the days of my life?" and if we can only add, "I shall dwell in the house of the Lord forever!" what more need we ask?

We have received epistles from all the Yearly Meetings with which we are in correspondence, and we have felt as they were read in this meeting that they were instrumental in encouraging us to make renewed efforts to serve the Lord in our day and generation, even in the way of His requiring and in bringing us into the fellowship of our Lord Jesus Christ, as expressed by Him when He said in speaking to His chosen apostles, "By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one to another."

The Testimony of Norwich Monthly Meeting of Women Friends, concerning Lydia P. Stover, a Minister, deceased.

"And I heard a voice from heaven saying unto me, "Write, Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from

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henceforth: yea saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labors; and their works do follow them." This, our much esteemed Friend, Lydia P. Stover, was born in Oneida County, N.Y. State, in the year 1818. She was the daughter of William and Avis Hakes. Avis Hakes was a lineal descendant of the first Friends, who suffered loss of property and imprisonment in Boston, and banishment therefrom for conscientious adherence to their simple manner of worship. We can truly say, the religious concern of her parents, to train up their children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, was not bestowed on her in vain. She lived in the home of her childhood until her 43rd year; when she was married to Jesse Stover, of Norwich, Ontario, Canada. Removing to the place of his residence she there filled the place of a faithful wife and companion until her death, being always more concerned for the comforts of others than for her Divine visitations were extended to her in early life, which she was made willing to accept.

This dear Friend, at one time was plainly shown in what way she was to make a certain part of her dress, which she felt to be a very heavy cross, but on contemplating the subject, this language was very forcibly brought to her mind, "See thou make all things according to the pattern shown thee in the mount." We believe it was the greatest concern of her life to live according to what was made manifest by the Holy Spirit in her own heart, believing that like as God spake to Israel on Mount Sinai by Moses, so now He speaketh to those on Mount Zion by His Son.

She was recorded a minister soon after her marriage; and her religious labors were appreciated by us. Although her communications were mostly short, yet they were accompanied with fervency of spirit. She suffered much reproach along with some others, at the time of the late separation, but she was undaunted in the cause of Truth, which she so much loved.

Although our dear Friend was from her childhood religiously concerned, yet she was sensible of great

weakness and many mistakes, and she was often heard to exclaim, "What frail and unworthy creatures we are!"

Although in much weakness of body she was seldom absent from our meetings, often making a great effort to be present.

Her health declining, the last year of her life, she was mostly confined to her home, but not to her bed, until the last week of her life in which time she suffered much. She bore her suffering cheerfully, being resigned to her Heavenly Father's will, often expressing a very humble opinion of herself. To a friend who was present, she quoted the passage, "Ye are of more value than many sparrows;" then after a pause, said, "Oh, how good the Lord is." These are they, who like her, have their lamps trimmed and burning, who are favored to fully adopt the language, "O death! where is thy sting? O grave! where is thy victory?"

This dear Friend departed this life the 22nd day of First month, 1889.

The minutes of the Representative Meeting were received and read at this time and were satisfactory to us.

An Address to our Absent Members

FROM

DEAR SISTERS,—While feasting on the Divine Manna as we have been privileged to do, we have desired for you, that some of the fragments might be gathered up that you also may partake with us of the same. We were admonished to pray for one another; remembering that the effectual fervent prayer of the righteous availeth much; and that, as we abide in the true vine we shall receive sap and nourishment therefrom, and know of a growth in grace, and in the saving knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; and that when we go from this place we should not forget the duty of prayer, but continue to put up our petitions to Him who is ever ready to hear and answer prayer, and who will strengthen and support His trusting children through all the storms and trials permitted to cross their pathway.

The importance of the mother's influence in training the lambs committed to her care was dwelt upon; to do this she must first know of a thorough grounding in the principles of self-denial and full consecration of heart and all she possesses to the Lord, knowing that He doeth all things well for those who love and serve Him with full purpose of heart. We must be learners in the school of Christ, before we can successfully teach others; whether we are in the position of mothers or otherwise. We desire that those among you and us, upon whom the Lord's chastening and preparing hand has been laid, may be willing to bow low at His footstool, and to abide in the furnace all the appointed time, until He has perfected the work of which He is the author and finisher, that these may be prepared to bring forth fruit to the honor of His great name.
