FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, the fourth of July, A.D., 1860, being the day appointed by the Lord Bishop, for the meeting of the Diocesan Synod, Divine Service, including the administration of the Holy Communion, was held in the Cathedral Church, at half-past ten, A.M. The Revds. Dr. Percy, Professor Thompson, and C. P. Reid, officiated at Morning Prayer. The Revds. George Milne, M.A., and Dr. Falloon, read the Ante Communion Service. The Sermon was preached by the Rev. G. V. Housman. The Lord Bishop consecrated, and assisted by the Revds. S. S. Wood, G. V. Housman, Dr. Nicolls, and A. W. Mountain, distributed the elements.

At two o'clock, the members of the Synod, of the Bishop, Clergy and Lay Delegates, met in the National School House.

The Lord Bishop called upon the Rev. G. V. Housman to open the Synod by Prayer.

His Lordship called upon the Clergy to elect a Secretary, when the Rev. E. C. Parkin, was unanimously chosen.

His Lordship called upon the Lay Delegates to elect a secretary, when F. A. Andrews, Esq., was unanimously chosen.

The Clerical Secretary proceeded under the direction of the Lord Bishop to call over the names

Thirty-four answered as being present.

The Lay Secretary called over the names of the Lay Delegates.

Moved by Rev. H. Roe, seconded by Rev. W. Richmond:

"THAT a Committee of two, with the Secretaries, be named by the chair, to call over the roll of Parishes and Missions and examine the certificates of the Lay Delegates, and that a list of the Lay Delegates be made by the Committee and read by the Secretary."

The Lord Bishop named the two Secretaries, Rev. 1. R. G. Plees and Col. Rhodes, a committee to investigate certificates

Moved by Mr. Scott, seconded by Rev. Dr. Nicolls:

"That this meeting do now adjourn, while the certificates are being examined, and that it do re-assemble at the Lecture Hall, St. Ann Street, at halfpast 3 o'clock."-Carried.

The Committee proceeded to examine the certificates of the Lay Delegates.

The Synod having reassembled at a quarter to four, the Committee presented their report, declaring all the certificates to be in due form.

Moved by Mr. Montizambert, seconded by Mr. Scott:

That the Meetings of this Synod be open to the Public and to the Press .- Carried.

The Secretaries read a letter from the Revd. A. Pearse, stating his inability to certify as to the qualification of the Delegates from Portneuf and Bourglouis, owing to their being non-residents.

Moved by the Revd. Dr. Hellmuth, seconded by the Rev. A. J. Woolryche:

Resolved,—" That the Lay Delegates of Portneuf and Bourglouis, be requested to declare in writing that they are communicants of one year's standing."

Clergy,—Yeas, 26: Nays, 2. Majority 24. Delegates,—Yeas, 23: Nays, 8. Majority 15.

Amendment by Mr. H. S. Scott, seconded by Mr. W. G. Wurtele:

"That the Revd. Mr. Pearse, having granted a certificate to the delegates from Portneuf and Bourglouis, they are duly elected, and that Mr. Pearse have leave to withdraw his letter."—Lost.

In answer to this Mr. Hale handed in his certificate of election.

Mr. Sewell declined to make any declaration.

His Lordship referred the matter for the action of the Synod.

Revd. Mr. Pearse made a verbal statement, that he was satisfied as to Mr. Sewell's qualification.

Moved by Mr. G. Irvine, seconded by Revd. W. S. Vial:

"That inasmuch as the gentleman claiming to be the Lay Representative for Portneuf, has declined to comply with the Resolution of the Synod just passed, and there is nothing before the Synod to shew that he was, at the time of his election, a communicant of one year's standing, he be declared to be not duly qualified to act as such Representative.

His Lordship the Bishop then read his address and laid the returns of the Clergy before the Synod.

ADDRESS.

A year has elapsed since we were permitted to hold our first Synodical Meeting, under the powers conferred upon us by Provincial Statutes and sanctioned by the Crown. In the time then left open to us, contracted as it was by circumstances peculiar to this Diocese, it was much that we achieved the completion

of our Constitution, with some other points necessary to the immediate working of the system thus established among us; and we owe many thanks to those members of our Communion, whose zeal, ability and diligence were the means, under God, of enabling us fairly to launch our undertaking. And here we are permitted to meet again; and I believe I am fully warranted in saying that in convoking this assembly, during the present season, I have fallen in with the sense of the Diocese, and have done that which is called for by the exigencies of the Church. We shall now proceed to take up and, so far as may be found practicable, to dispose of such matters of regulation and such measures of improvement as may have suggested themselves to the thoughts of our members; to settle or to modify the course of action to be adopted by the Church in different departments of her sacred task; and to put in full train,-what must be followed up upon future occasions of the like kind,the amelioration, in order to the enlargement of her usefulness, of her temporal resources as well as the more efficient administration of her affairs and inter-God, by His Spirit, and for the sake of ests at large. His beloved Son, be present with us, and guide us and prosper us in the work thus committed to our human hands!

It cannot be concealed that we have had and have now great difficulties to be faced. We have lost the countenance and recognition of the government: we have been despoiled—side by side as we stand with the magnificently endowed Church of Rome, in all her lofty pretensions,—we have been despoiled of our patrimony: and the great society which has nursed the Church in the Colonies, has been carrying out for some years, a system of gradual reduction in the aid

heretofore extended to us. Our people, in the meantime, have become habituated to lean upon extraneous aid and are slow to learn the necessity of making adequate exertions and sacrifices of their own. And, after all, in that section of Canada, which constitutes the Diocese of Quebec, the real poverty of their resources, as a body, is sufficiently conspicuous. Less favored by nature, less prosperous in secular pursuits and undertakings, less calculated to gain desirable accessions from emigration, and actually far less peopled by a comparative amount of Protestant population, while that population itself is scattered over a prodigious surface of country, a few here perhaps and a few there, demanding, in order to meet, in any efficient measure, their spiritual need, a number of clergy, out of all proportion to the mere number and still more to the means of their followers,—the Diocese of Quebec does not, humanly speaking, present a very encouraging aspect to those who have its wants and interests in charge. Yet in the review of the past and in the faithful observance of a maxim which was the heraldic motto of one among our Governors of noble blood, Ora et labora, we may take heart in our present work and cherish hope for the luture of the Diocese.

I have just spoken of the review of the past; and it may be natural and proper, upon this particular occasion, and standing, as we do, at a marked point, in the history of the Diocese,-before proceeding to any specific suggestions of a practical kind, -to give a very slight retrospective glance at the establishment and progress of the Church of England, as connected with the See of Quebec.

The first Anglican Bishop of Quebec, within the life-time of the more aged men among us, began his

task with nine clergymen for the whole of Canada. and after thirty-two years, left the Diocese, upon his decease, with sixty-one, having three Archdeacons and two Corporations of the Clergy, in Upper and Lower Canada respectively, for the management of the Clergy Reserves. His successor, whose Diocese was also co-extensive with the whole of Canada, raised the number, in ten years of Apostolic labour, to eighty-five. That was the state of the charge upon which I entered twenty-four years ago. Since that date Canada has been divided into four Dioceses: Upper Canada or Canada West, now comprehending the two Dioceses of Toronto and Huron, was under my Episcopal supervision, as administering that of Quebec, for three years, during which I was enabled to add nineteen clergymen to the number of fifty-one which I had found within those limits. In that portion of Lower Canada which now constitutes the Diocese of Montreal, the number was raised during its continuance under my direction for a space of fourteen years, from seventeen to forty-eight. From causes already indicated, independently of the larger amount of Church population, the advances which I was permitted to make in this way in parts of Canada. which are no longer within my jurisdiction, were greater than I have made in that which now constitutes the Diocese of Quebec, where the increase, in my hands, has been in twenty-four years, from seventeen to fifty. The whole increase in Canada, within my own proper administration, (not noticing what has occurred in any of its ecclesiastical divisions and subdivisions after their passing out of my hands), has been from eighty-five to one hundred and sixty-five Since the meeting of the Synod last year, I have admitted four gentlemen to the Order of Deacons and

My venerated predecessors in the See, are too well remembered to make it necessary for me to disclaim any pretensions which, if I had the smallest disposition to advance them, would readily be open to repudiation, to equal myself in the discharge of my office with them. But it has been so ordained to befall, that the Church should not, till after my assumption of the episcopal charge, reach that stage in which she began to form her permanent institutions and provide her settled organizations within the Diocese. I entered upon my charge in the latter half of the year 1836. The Church Society was established in 1842, and incorporated in 1844; its objects and its operations are too well known to all who are present, to need any notice here from me. The Church Temporalities Act having been reserved for the Royal Assent, finally became law in 1843. The corner stone of the College was laid in 1844: the College was opened in buildings temporarily occupied, in 1845: the Royal Charter conferring upon it the privileges of a University, was procured in 1853; the junior department consisting of a first-rate school,* was opened in 1858: the whole institution is still, in a manner, in its infancy, and will never be exempt from imperfections attaching to all things here below; but it has now four efficient professorships (including that which is immediately connected with the junior department,) a library of between four and five thousand volumes, the

A school had been established long before under Udliege auspices, and most successfully carried on for several years.

promising commencement of a museum, and a Chapel which may be cited as an architectural pattern. Of the fruits of the institution I forbear to speak, because I should speak before their faces, of some men moulded within its walls; and men who do best are least pleased to have their doings proclaimed. I will simply say, therefore, that the benefits of the College (speaking only, though I might give some farther extension to my remarks, of its supply afforded to the Church), have by no means been confined to the single Diocese of Quebec. I might also refer to certain advantages reserved within the institution to the sons of the Clergy. And, with help as well from this institution, as from other quarters, we have, notwithstanding the meagreness of our resources and the dimunition of extraneous aid to which I have adverted, been still taking up new ground, year by year, and have penetrated to remote and destitute quarters where no other Protestant ministrations have been

The Bishopric Endowment Fund was formed in 1846, being the appropriation for that object, of a block sum, which, together with a certain amount of annual revenue made available, at the same time, towards the payment of some of the Clergy, was at the disposal of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. It was conceived important to secure the permanent support of an office which is essential in the Church, and which was almost the only one for which there was no prospect, upon the occurrence of a vacancy, of any provision. And it may be proper to state here, because some misconception has existed upon the subject, that not one clergyman in the Diocese, was made a loser by a single shilling, in consequence of this particular ap-

The Society had then fixed the allowance of its Missionaries, and had proved itself absolutely inaccessible to any remonstrance, immoveable by any appeal for the augmentation of their advantages:-Not, it is needless to say, from any want of kindness or consideration towards the Missionaries, but upon a principle that a limitation should be distinctly attached to the amount of its allowances and from a necessity felt to satisfy the public at home of its doing no more in this way, than the real good of the Colonists, according to prevalent though notalways well founded opinions, required to be done. Nor did the appropriation in question interfere with the enlargement of the Missionary force in the country: for the Society, far from taking advantage of the new funds which came into its hands, to make chargeable upon them, the maintenance to any extent, of its missionaries, actually made an uddition, after this arrangement, to the expenditure from its home funds, in behalf of the Diocese. The management of this Bishopric Endowment Fund, the Society subsequently transferred to our Diocesan Church Society, certain conditions being attached in legal form to the transfer, to the effect that when the salary for the Bishopric of Quebec, should be placed upon a respectable footing, and that of the Bishopric of Montreal, should be brought up to the same mark, (making it equal to about one third of the annual allowance paid by the government to the first two Bishops of the See,) the surplus arising from any further accumulation, should be at the disposal of the Church Society for the general pur-

Finally, we have, after a long struggle, obtained the privilege of Synodical action. And here we are assembled with all the solemn responsibilities entrust-

ed to our hands, of men who have to administer and to promote, so far as in them lies, the interests of the Church of God within their sphere. I shall proceed to specify certain points which have suggested themselves to my own mind as requisite to be dealt with, in our deliberations: it will be for the wisdom of the Synod in each several case, to entertain the consideration of them, or, if cause should be so seen, to forbear from doing so, as well, as upon the former supposition, to provide for the manner of their being disposed of and practically carried out.

1. The department of FINANCE appears to me to have the first and most urgent claim upon our attention. The want of a decent provision for our Clergy is a grievous hardship upon them and one which is severely felt: it is also a grievous evil in the effects which flow from it, in different ways, to the community at large. I am strongly inclined to the belief that we shall never adequately remedy the mischiefs thus created, till we shall have organized some system by which an institution, at the centre of the Diocese, shall be charged with the duty, so far as concerns the support of the Clergy, both of raising and distributing, under proper conditions made with the respective congregations, the revenues of the Church.

2. The establishment of certain clear and fixed principles respecting the LIMITS of the CURES held by the Clergy and respecting the SUBDIVISION of the same, as demands may arise and means may be found for enlarging, from time to time, the number of pastors in the Diocese, is a matter, in my apprehension, deserving the attention of the Synod; and it is particularly desirable to provide for placing upon a legal and permanent basis, the Chapels which, with the increase of population, it becomes necessary to erect,

The sense of this Diocese was long ago expressed in favour of the claim which resides in the Church, to enjoy the privilege of the issue, for her own people, by her own Bishops, of LICENCES FOR MARRIAGE, the question having been taken up with much spirit as well as with entire unanimity by the Diocesan Assembly of the Clergy and Lay delegates who met in this city in January, 1854. The Synod will judge whether the subject may not now be followed up. And in connection with this subject, I would observe that both the law of marriage in the Province, and that which prescribes the mode of registration in the performance of baptisms, marriages and burials, are very obviously susceptible of amendment, which it would not seem to be foreign to the objects of the Synod, if possible, to Procure of the Synod such of the procure of the Pro

4. The regulation of Free is placed by the Church temporalities Act, in the hands of the Bishop; but I am desirous of receiving help from the Synod, in this particular, and should be very glad that a Committee should be appointed to digest a report upon the subject. It might perhaps be confided to the same Committee to frame regulations for the orderly division and general management of Burring Grounds.

I have said nothing with reference to the important communication received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, relative to the arrangements for the future administration of the funds derived from that venerable body, because I have anticipated, in my circular convening this Assembly, all which I could desire to say in inviting the attention of the Synod to that subject.

I was favored some time ago, by a communication from a clergyman of some prominence in the Diocese of Toronto, accompanied by a MS. copy of the compilation of hymns (prepared in the first instance to be offered for use in that Diocese,) to which he solicited my attention in order to its being examined and considered among ourselves. But as it appears to be now agreed, upon all hands, that whatever may be proposed in this way, for the joint adoption of the Canadian Dioceses, should be reserved for the consideration of the expected Provincial Synod, it is sufficient simply to mention that such a communication has been made.

No official intimation has yet been received of any steps taken in relation to the appointment of a Metropolitan: but I am not without reason to hope that the appointment will be made without any considerable delay.

I have to present to the Synod such of the returns from the Clergy rendered in compliance with a Synodical Resolution of the past year, as have reached my own hands. A list has also been prepared in conformity with another Resolution passed at the same time by the same body, exhibiting the names of the Clergy within the Diocese with other particulars specified in the Resolution,—and this list has been passed, as required, to the hands of the Secretaries just appointed.
