

review of business conditions in Canada during the year 1912, presented at the recent annual meeting of the President and directors of the Canadian Bank, of erce. In the President's address, the ever pressing problem of the in-creased cost of living is touched upon, and the effect of poor carriage transportation in this connection is discussed : One of the most powerful and inexcusable local causes for the high price of
food is the condition of our country roads.
It must be clear that if a farmer has to
travel ten or twenty miles to a city to
sell his produce, every hour of delay to
himself and his horses and wagon, every
bushel or pound less he is able to carry,
every day lost in the length of the life of
his horses and wagon, cause just so much
increase in the cost of the article he has
to sell. To the extent that this needless
and cruel loss might, if avoided, partly
add to the farmers' profits and partly
lessen the cost to the consumer, the state
of our roads is little short of a crime.
If the bad roads around a city cause the
price of food to be much higher than it
need be, one of the results is to enable producers hundreds, perhaps thousands of
miles away to enter into competition with
the farmer in his own country, because the

A first class system of carriage roads is just as important as a system of railroads, large quantities of oysters and very little or nearly so. At present the public high-ways come under provincial jurisdiction, but there is no province in the Dominion whose revenues are sufficient to anything like adequately look after these. The Feder and from their fast augmenting revenues provide sums sufficient to really be effec ive. A few thousands doled out now and merely to keep roads in passable repair treasury, divided according to population and supplemented by provincial votes, amounts to each province: Nova Scotis \$200,000; New Brunswick, \$150,000; P. E. Island, \$50,000; Ontario, \$1,000,000; Que bec, \$800,000; Manitoba, \$200,000; Sa katchewan, \$200,000; Alberta and British Columbia, each \$175,000. And three milyears. Here is a chance for the Federal Government to really do something to alleviate the high cost of living. The President of the Bank of Commerce also erred to the dreadful waste of food try, both in private families and in hotels, and there is much in this. As compared with the densely peopled countries of Cor tinental Europe, we in this country and in

the United States are hideously wasted; and the power, divine or otherwise, which would teach intelligent economy would be indeed conferring a favor whose value is immeasurable.

Canadian Naturalist Tells of the Hab its of One of America's Most Interesting Fur-Bearing Animals-Raccoons Will Live In Deserted Caves of Foxes or Woodchucks and Often Make Their Nests In Hay-Mows. I wandered across the fields as the

shades of twilight were giving way to bright moonlight, and as I drew near the river I heard a whistle. Raccoon no doubt! Sitting down quietly, I waited for some time. Then came a faint splashing in the water. Still I could see nothing. Another wait of tenminutes, and the reward came. There
was a family of raccoons fishing for
river clams. Wading in the shallows
they reached down into the waters.
One would fetch up a clam or crawfish; there would be a scramble for
a moment; then the lucky chap would
open the shell, wash the clam, and
devour it. The careful manner in
which they washed all this kind of

which they washed all this kind of food, proved of more than passing interest. interest:

A wild-grape vine growing close by was inspected, fruit sampled, then a whistle sounded in the distance. Was it a call? They all at once started across the field, and soon were lost to view. As I returned to the house I passed some corn stacks. There was a rustling sound in the stubble. Next morning there was evidence that my friends of the previous evening had sampled the milky cobs of corn after passing through the orchard, where no doubt they sampled some tempting "snows" and "wealthys."

I recall a fight my faithful collic had with a large raccoon. I never saw a fiercer battle. It was nip and tuck at the start until the raccoon got into a corner, where two logs lay at right angles. Then the dog lost ground Two friends and myself watched the contest, until the dog gave up and lay down at our feet bleeding and beaten, while the raccoon ran off to safe retreat in a tree close by never saw this dog beaten in battle with other dogs and had seen hir with other dogs and had seen him fight with and kill a large bob-cal

A large raccoon will weigh from twenty to thirty pounds. They are covered with a heavy grey fur. Or good specimens the fur is quite black along the back. The head, owing to the short neck. has a flat appearance with sharp nose, black on end. The face is light grey, with a splash of black around the eyes. The ears are short like a cat's. The fore legs are short with a hand-like paw, with five long fingers and claws, the entire length of the paw being about twand a half inches. The hind legs are longer and more powerful, being built more for sitting up on and jumping. The hind paw is about five inches from the point of the claws to the heel the body of the foot being shapes similar to that of an infant. The tai is quite short and bushy, with alternate rings of light grey and black fur. The eyes are large, and when seen at night shine like balls of phosphorus. They have a large mouth and powerful teeth, which they can us very well.—Mark Robinson in Satur day Night.
