

### PEN NAMES

OTHER PEN NAMES.

It is a curious fact that two of the men who have largely influenced the world's thinking are known both in history and in their works by pseudonyms. Reference is made to Plato and to Voltaire. None save close students of history or those to whose attention the fact has been called are aware that the real name of the Greek philosopher who gave to the world the teaching of Socrates and much wider deductions therefrom was Aristocles. That name has been lost in the mists of antiquity, but it was what was given to him by his father, Ariston, in the fifth century before Christ, when the greatest expositor of idealism who has largely controlled the progress of speculative thought down to the present day, was born. The name Plato, which is the Latin form of the Greek Platon, meaning broad, was bestowed on him derisively, as a nickname, on account of his broad shoulders. But he accepted it, and made it far more famous than his patronymic.

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# PROVINCIAL FACTORIES ARE NOT EMPLOYING CHILDREN

At a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council of St. John on Thursday evening W. R. Trotter of Winnipeg, general organizer for the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, referred to John McMulkin, factory inspector, in terms to which the latter takes decided objection. He emphatically denies Mr. Trotter's assertion that he is not attending to his duties. Mr. Trotter stated that if the factory inspector in this province were doing his duty there would be hundreds of children now in the factories of New Brunswick sent back to their homes. Mr. McMulkin states that this is not the case, for he is aware of only two children under age working in the factories of this province at the present time, and they are restricted to a definite time and employed because their families needed their support.

The factory act was only introduced in the province three years ago and during the time intervening the law has been enforced to the utmost extent. Considerable labor was expended at first to expel the child labor from the factories, but owners are now complying with the act and the public are schooled regarding its conditions.

The factory inspector is given authority by the act to use his own discretio in certain cases and the two children previously mentioned were permitted to work after the inspector had thoroughly inquired into the circumstances.

According to the inspector's statement it is impossible for him to ascertain the age of children in every case and the only means of receiving the information is through their parents. He is guided entirely by them and finds in most cases the information

#### WHERE WOMEN GO TO PARLIAMENT

But Sit as Representatives.

Reforms Concerning the Status of Their Sex.

Finland is the only country in Europe where women not only enjoy Parliamentary franchise, precisely to the same extent as men, but also are eli ible to sit in parliament. If anybod were to ask, and, in fact, many peop have asked, how this has affected pub-lic life in the Grand Duchy, the answer must be that the short time that has clapsed after the introduction of this reform, in 1906, is hardly sufficient to afford the basis of a well-founded opinion. Also in the future, when we will have the benefit of many years' experience, it will probably be very dif-ficult, perhaps impossible, to decide whether such changes in public life as

was a very sudden one. Large sections of the community, which previously had to be contented with the counsels of their betters, found themselves invested with political rights, and they meant to use them. The result was not altogether an encouraging one. The 200 members returned to the Finnish Diet contained an undue proportion of people very little conversant with public affairs, and very deficient in education. So much is generally admitted in Finland by democrat and aristocrat alike. But the Democrats are confident that in the long run the common sense of the nasses will prevail and that they will find out in course of time that it is necessary to return members who are not only supporters of their views, but are also experienced and efficient law-

makers.

But if the composition of the first
Democratic Finnish Diet was not an
unqualified success, this cannot be laid
at the door of the women's votes.
Though there are no statistics available, except from a few election divisions, it appears probable that at least as many women as men went to the poll. But it is not believed in Finland ooll. But it is not believed in Finland that women's votes all turned the scales of the proportion of parties, nor is there any indication that women should have prefered incompetent can-

the establishment of insurance funds for poor women in case of their becoming mothers, for the recognition of women's rights to be eligible to public posts to the same extent as men.

In all there were about thirty varius proposals signed by women memers alone, while many women had laded their signatures to proposals alsupported by men.
