Important Battles Are Probably Pending In Flanders and Italy

THE BRITISH ALARM HUNS BY CROSSING THE PIAVE RIVER

Patrols Force Passage of Stream at Various Points MACKENZIE KING -Heavy Artillery Fire on Italian Front Between Frenzela Valley and Brenta Valley-British and French Repeatedly Shell Austro-Germans.

Germans Repulsed With Loss Near Ypres — Hun Raid on French Trenches North of Hill 304 in Reported That Laurier Meuse Valley Beaten Back by French Army-Heavy Artillery Fighting in France and Fland-

The British patrols have again crossed the Piave River the war office announces. They forced a passage at various points, causing alarm in the enemy lines.

The text of today's communication follows:

There have been reciprocal bursts of fire between Prase and Cimego in the Guidicaria-Valley and more intense activi ty on the part of medium calibre enemy guns in the Zugna region of the Lagarina Valley. On the Asiago Plateau our batteries made effective shots against enemy transports and troops on the march behind the lines.

Persistent Shelling.

"There also has been activity by re-connectering detachments. North of Costalunga Austrian parties were driven back and followed up by our patrols, which made a few prisoner Violent concentrations of fire by ou tween the Frenzela Valley and the Brenta Valley have been answered by persistent shelling of our lines. "At some points British patrols have forced the Plave and caused alarm in the enemy's lines. On the plain there has been moderate artillery activity.

"In Albania, on the Osum river, a large enemy detachment, which at dawn Sunday attacked our Albanian bands, was driven back by our regular troops who had promptly arrived on the scene."

NO ACTION ON THE **CONSPIRACY CASES**

Washington, Jan. 7. Every contention raised against the selective draft act was swept aside by the Supreme Court in an unanimous opinion delivered by Chief Justice White, upholding the law as constitutional. Authority to enact the statute and to send men to fight the enemy wherever he may be found, the court held, lies in the clauses of the constitution giving congress the power to declare war and to raise and support armies. "As the mind cannot conceive an army without the men to compose it, said the chief justice, "on the face of the constitution the objection that it does not give power to provide for such men would seem to be too frivolous for further notice."

IN THE U.S. At Various Points in Three Great War Zones Intensive Artillery Duels Are Going on Night and Day—They Are Particularly Severe in Region of Ypres, in Cambrai Sector and Along Moselle River on Verdun Front.

> Although infantry operations in the major war theatres are of a minor character, signs are not wanting that big battles are in the process of making in Flanders, France and Italy. At various points in these war zones intensive artillery duels are going on day and night. They are particularly severe in the region of Ypres and the Cambrai sector, where the British are facing the Germans, along the Aisne, on the Verdun sector and along the Moselle River, where the forces of the German Crown Prince and Grand Duke Albrecht of Wurttemburg are opposing the French and in the Italian highlands from the region of Lake Garda eastward to the Piave River, where the Austro-German troops are aligned against the Italians, French and British.





The chiefs also advised His Excellency of grievances which the Six Nations have against the government. They objected to the application of the conscription law, and requested that it be not enforced against the indians on agount of their aiready splendid record. They also protested against some of the actions taken by the department of Indian affairs. His Excellency promised consideration of their complaints.
