Rain Prevents Open Air Meeting and Gathering is Held in Church—Large Assemblage on Convent Grounds at Night—Prominent Acadians Present

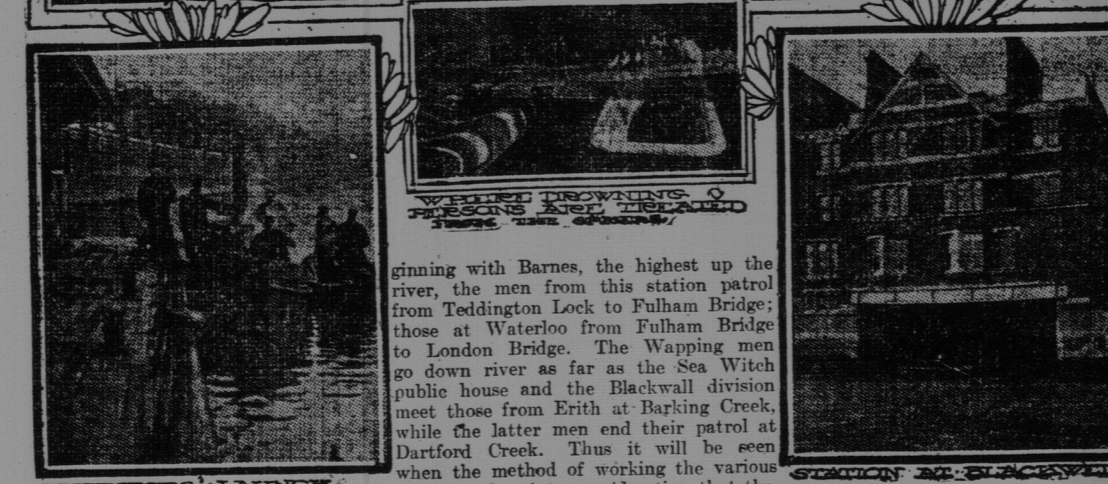

MAKING UP LISTS FOR ELECTION

Boards of Registration Formed in Un-organized Districts of Ontario

Ottawa, Aug. 19.—Under the compromise act of last session whereby provision is made for the direct preparation of federal voters' lists in the unorganized districts of Ontario, boards of registration have been formed in Alton, Nipissing, Muskoka and Thunder Bay and Rainy River. These boards consist of the senior judge of the district and two other judges selected by him. The board names a body of enumerators to prepare the lists in sections without municipal organization.

BORDEN NOMINATED AT HALIFAX CONVENTION

TROUBLE BEGAN TWO WEEKS AFTER MARRIAGE

New York, Aug. 14.—Charging gross cruelty, beginning two weeks after her marriage, Mrs. Minnie F. P. Hemmway, once known in society in Battle Creek (Mich.), and later as Minnie Ballantine, a vaudeville star, applied to Judge Pound, in the supreme court, for temporary alimony of \$100 a week and counsel fee of \$250 pending her suit for separation from her husband, Lewis M. Hemmway, of Littlefield (Conn.), and New York. Her husband, the defendant, was accused of having shot at his wife on two occasions and of having set fire to their home in Connecticut, shouting that he would burn her alive.

THE SULTAN'S LATE WASHINGTON MINISTER

Washington, D. C., Aug. 14.—An announcement was made officially at the Turkish Legation that Mehmed Ali Bey, Turkish minister to the United States, had been recalled. No reasons were given for the announcement and the Turkish minister did not discuss it in any way. Little surprise is felt in diplomatic circles here, as advices from abroad indicated the recall several days ago, and it was believed on all sides that an announcement to that effect would soon be made at the Turkish Legation. The change in the Turkish ministry is considered solely responsible for the minister leaving Washington. He was appointed under the old regime. The general expectation is that the Porte will adopt the practice of recalling all ministers appointed before the constitution was proclaimed and substitute in their places men known to be in sympathy with the new order of things in Turkey.

FIVE DAYS OFF VOYAGE BETWEEN SHANGHAI AND LONDON

Shanghai, Aug. 14.—The Japanese subsidized mail boat has begun a weekly service between Shanghai and Dalny, connecting with South Manchurian and Siberian railways and making possible the Shanghai-London journey in sixteen days against twenty-one by Vladivostok. It is hoped soon that the service will be tri-weekly. The Japanese ambition is to destroy the Vladivostok route. At the same time the costly Japanese subsidized steamship service on the Yangtze is losing money so heavily in face of the competition of the unaided British lines that it is believed it must eventually be abandoned.
