

#### AND REGULATIONS RULES

OF THE

# Guelph Branch Bible Society.

1. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the City of Toronto Auxiliary Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing towards the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment,

-the English of the Authorized Version only.
2. That this Society be denominated, "The Guelph Branch

Bible Society."

3. That any Person shall be a Member of this Society upon the payment of 2s. 6d. currency, annually, or £1 5s. upon his entrance

4. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and Committee, three of the Committee to form a quorum.

5. That every Minister of the Gospel in the Society shall be a

Member of the Committee.

6. That the whole of the Subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting Incidental Expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Toronto Bible Society, to supply this neighborhood; which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell at Cost Price,—to Members, at the reduced price, one-fourth less,—and to furnish gratis to those who they know cannot purchase; and the overplus to be remitted half-yearly to the Toronto Bible Society, for the purpose of Translating the Word of God into the Indian Languages, and supplying other Nations with the Word of God.

7. That in the formation of a New Committee, the President-Vice Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three fourths of the other Members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

8. That the Quarterly Meetings shall be held on the First

Thursdays of February, May, August, and November.

9. That the year of the Society's operations hereafter terminate with the month of January in each year, -and that all accounts and

statements be made up to the 31st of January.

N. B.—This rule has been found necessary to secure uniformity and system in the mode of doing business, and it is hoped will meet with general approbation.

#### ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Guelph Branch of the U. C. Bible Society, was held in the Wesleyan Church, on Friday, the 15th February.

T. Sandilands, Esq., President, in the Chair.

Meeting opened by singing, prayer, and reading the Scriptures. J. Hough, Esq., Secretary, read a report which stated that 104 Bibles, and 108 Testaments, had been sold during the year; the cash sales amounting to £18 15—.



# The Twenty-fifth Annual Report

Of the Guelph Branch of the Upper Canada Bible Society.

Your Committee, in presenting their Annual Report, would call attention to the fact, that the Society whose affairs they have been called to manage during the past year, has now been in existence for a quarter of a century. What wonderful changes have taken place during this period, and how marked the contrast in the aspect of the world as a field for Bible circulation, twenty-five years ago, and now. No intelligent Christian can survey the varied points in this marked contrast, without discerning abundant cause for thankfulness to Almighty God, whose providence has so mightily wrought with his people in their efforts to spread Divine truth through the earth. Events tread so closely on each other's heels in this age, that to give even a bird's eye view of the chief occurrences of the past quarter century, in their bearing on Bible Society operations, would make a respectable volume. But, as it is often easier to see, after an interval, that a plant or tree has grown, than it is to satisfy one's-self that it is growing-so it often helps a just appreciation of a holy enterprise, to view it at two points or periods of its history, and note the progress made through intervening years. Such a contemplation of the Bible cause as a whole, would be a good spiritual prescription for those hypochondriac Christians, who for want of observing the wondrous works of God in the Earth, are evermore taking despondent and gloomy views of things, in their bearing on the kingdom of Jesus Christ.

The past year has been inferior to no preceding one in signs of promise and tokens of encouragement. Indeed, the year 1860 will ever be memorable, if for no other event, for this, the opening up of Italy for the circulation or the Word of God. That interesting country, where until recently, priestly tyranny punished the cravings of souls hungry for the bread of life, with torture and imprisonment, is now free, and Christian sympathy can minister unimpeded to its moral needs. Nowhere had the Bible been more rigidly interdicted than in Naples, but no sooner was the dictatorship of Garabeldi established, than the interdict was done away, and men might be seen standing behind their stalls holding up the Book of Books, and exclaiming, "Who will buy the Bible?" In Tuscany and Florence, where, a few short months ago, parties were imprisoned for having a copy of the Scriptures in their pos-

The cheering appearance of things, on the European continent generally, is somewhat marred by the persecuting attitude still assumed by the Spanish Government; which has recently treated two men most barbarously, simply for the crime of reading the Word of God. It is to be hoped that an effectual remonstrance against this outrage has already been sent by the British Government to that miserable and decrepid power, as an earnest and influential appeal for that purpose has been made to the Foreign Secretary, by a large deputation representing the allied Protestantism of

England.

The noble parent Society of Great Britain shows no symptoms of weakness or decay, but on the contrary seems renewing its youth, and girding itself for its gloriously expanding work. Its last report contains these charming passages: "The prominent characteristic by which the Society has been distinguished during this fifty-fifth year of its history, is enlargement. The receipts amounting to the noble sum of £160,062 tell of enlargement. The issues reaching to more than 1,625,000 copies, tell of enlargement. In fields of labor already occupied, there are enlarged demands for the Scriptures. There is enlargement, too, in the opening of countries, where hitherto, little or nothing has been accomplished for the dissemination of the Bible."

An interesting movement has lately commenced in the British metropolis, designed to provide "Bibles for the Million." Its objects are "the reading aloud of the Word of God in the squares, lanes, courts, roads, &c., of the City of London and its suburbs,—together with the sale of Bibles at cost price, and the giving away printed papers containing small portions of the Word of God only.

It is hoped and believed, that the attention of many careless ones will be arrested, and much good done by this novel agency.

The Upper Canada Bible Society is also pursuing its work vigorously. Its receipts for the year prior to its last Annual Meeting, show a very considerable advance on the preceding year, while the Report supplies many cheering facts in reference to Bible work in this land.

The signs of the times, and the aspect of the cause in which we are engaged, justify a cheerful courage and a large faith, while they call on God's people to redouble their efforts and prayers that the Word of the Lord may have free course and be glorified, until it shall become a household book, and a heart treasure all over the world.
