Wednesday, April 29—George Gee was sentenced to death at 11 o'clock this morning by Chief Justice Tuck, for the murder of his cousin, Miles Gee, at Canaan. When Gee was brought into the court he looked quite composed but very pale. He stood up for the sentence. The judge said he would hold out no hope of commutation of sentence. The date of execution was fixed for Friday, the 22nd day of July.

BLACKVILLE.

BLACKVILLE, April 27, 1904.—The thriving village of Blackville is just commencing to boom. The boys are off for the drives and the Duncanson, Cain and Remond will start again in the old way. "Come all ye" as the hardy sons of toil go about their duties. And as wages are good there is a fair look out for a prosperous season. The village is informed that Mr. Gibson's mill will start on Tuesday next so there will be plenty of employment here.

There is one thing the village has every facility for and which it should possess, that is electric light. There is sufficient water to run a plant that would light the whole village and part of the outlying districts very little cost. There was some talk of installing an electric plant about a year ago, but the matter was dropped, which is to be regretted, as if the village was lighted by electricity it would not only be a convenience and improvement, but would greatly assist in its progress, and in the end pay. It is to be hoped ere long that the matter will again be taken up and terminated in a successful issue.

Again, what would assist in the advancement of the village would be the completion of the Inland Waterway. Evidently the government seem more than careless in this matter, which has been so frequently urged upon them. The writer understands that very strong memorials have been presented to the department of railways, but have always been placed aside for "a more convenient season" or a further consideration. Little wonder that the parish with its 600 or more voters feel themselves slighted and left out in the cold, but there may come a time some day when the government may regret their negligence in this matter.

Would it not be well for the merchants and leading citizens of the village to form an association and join with the Newcastle board of trade in presenting another memorial on the subject, and urge their views and claims upon the government, but with greater force.

Election is brewing and this is only a little game of bluff on the part of the minister—if not let the government take over the road—Put on new rolling stock and make it as up to date as the I. C. E., and the inhabitants of the parish will rise up and bless them—No more bluff games, that is played out now—Let the government take over the road before the coming election and these people will know they are in earnest. She was a complete wreck, only the foremast with the yardarm hanging to it.

Death of well known Western Union Telegraph Operator.

Moscow, N. B., April 29—Herbert Horvath, an employee in the general offices of the International, committed suicide this morning by jumping from the top of the building. He was 35 years of age, and had been married. He left a young wife and two children. He was supposed to have been employed for some time.

Wilford P. H. was in the telegraph operator, and will arrange to attend this morning on a matter of a year, aged 22. He was a son of Charles H. Thomas, of Montreal, and a nephew of Rev. W. B. Thomas, of Montreal, P. E. I., and George P. Thomas, of Montreal—St. John Star.

Deanery Meeting at Newcastle.

The quarterly meeting of the Rural Deanery of this diocese was held at Newcastle April 25th and 26th. The meeting opened with a corporate session of the Holy Communion in St. Andrew's church.

The chapter met at the Rectory at 10 o'clock, those present being: Venerable Archbishop Forsyth, Rev. W. J. Wilkinson, Mr. A. E. D., H. A. Meek, Geo. L. Freeman, P. H. T. H. Cuthbert, J. H. Hooper, and G. M. Snowdon. Resolution 5 was then read in French and English. On Tuesday afternoon there was a meeting of the St. S. S. P. A. at St. Andrew's School House. The Rural Dean was elected President of the Society presiding. After the opening services a paper was read by Mr. J. C. K. on the best means of arranging more interest in St. S. work so as to obtain better results. An animated discussion took place over this paper in which all who were present took part.

After discussing other matters of interest connected with St. S. work the closing service was read and the meeting adjourned.

The following paper was read as the Rural Deanery paper on the subject of the Church's methods used to present the gospel, and Rev. H. A. Meek read one on Baptism, both of which were discussed at some length by those present.

Venerable Arch Deacon Forsyth was re-elected Rural Dean and Rev. W. J. Wilkinson Secretary. Rev. Geo. L. Freeman and J. P. Buchell Esq. were re-elected members of the Diocesan Mission Board. During the morning and evening prayers were said in St. Andrew's Church. On Tuesday evening the addresses were given by Rev. H. A. Meek and Geo. L. Freeman, and on Wednesday evening the Deanery session was presided by the Rev. J. H. Hooper of Fairbury. The next meeting will (D. V.) be held at Bay du Vin July 26th.

All the bulwarks were gone, and a tattered flag which had been ragged up on a jury-mast as a signal of distress attached to the corner of the cabin, was all that was left.

We sailed up to within 50 yards of the wreck, blowing our whistle, and firing 2 guns, without any sign of life being given from the derelict, and as the water was washing over her, the Captain decided there was no chance of anyone being alive on her and we proceeded on our way with rather sad hearts, not knowing what had been the fate of the crew.

I made enquiries at Lloyd's immediately on my arrival here, and was rejoiced to find that her people were taken off by the steamer "CAIRFIELD" and landed at St. Michael, Azores, the 14 inst. It was at 8 a.m. on the 18th inst. that we passed the wreck. You may imagine my surprise when we got up to the derelict to find that she was a vessel hailing from New Brunswick, namely the "MARY ANN TROOP" 115 tons. Your nautical friends may be interested to know that when seen by us she was in Latitude 34.07 N. and Longitude 58.87 W. which placed her 333 miles from Bermuda nearly due East of that island.

I find on enquiry that she had left Pensacola with timber for Rio Janeiro on the 3rd January, so she had made very little progress on her voyage when disaster overtook her. I hope in a day or two to learn particulars as to the fate of the crew, and whether they were all saved when the rescuing vessel arrived. Harris. (France.)

THE WAR IN THE EAST.

All Quiet at Fort Arthur again.

PORT ARTHUR, April 27—The situation here and in this vicinity today is unchanged.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 27—It is stated in Railway circles that the government has decided to double track the trans-Siberian Railway, and that Prince Hilkoft, minister of railways, has submitted to the Emperor an estimate, according to which this work will be completed in eighteen months.

LONDON, April 27—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Standard says that a battleship under construction on the Neva is reported to have been seriously damaged.

The To io correspondent of the Times says that one of the Japanese spies shot at Mukden was identified at Sondé, a judge, and not a military man as has been stated.

PORT ARTHUR, April 27—The successful trials of the submarine boats here are regarded by the Novi Krain as opening fresh prospects for active operations on the part of the Russian fleet.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 26—M. Baubnob, who has been awarded \$12,000 for improvements in submarine boats, in an interview says:

There is less danger in navigating a submarine boat than a torpedo boat, and during a battle the former is safer than other vessels.

LIAO YANG, April 26—Between last night and this morning the Japanese forced a passage of the Yalu, two companies crossing between Tchaugdjou and Siaopous-sikhe.

Heavy firing was heard near Tatung Kau, in which it is believed the Japanese made a tent in order to distract attention from the real point of passage.

So far no bridge spans the river. It is believed the Russian fire succeeded in destroying the floating parts of the Japanese bridges.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 27—On account of the refusal to deliver the Argentine cruiser before the money is paid it is understood that a committee is being organized to arrange for the sale of the vessel in New York.

KOREA, April 27, 1 p. m.—The German steamer Imago has arrived at Chemulpo with bullion from the mines at Fusan. The wage payments of the mines amount to about \$7,500 per month. The mine will pay in the value of gold the difference between the mine's bullion output and the amounts advanced. The uninterrupted operation of both the American and British mines at Fusan is assured.

GEE MURDER TRIAL.

Evidence for Defence Heard. Council addresses the Jury—Insanity the Plea.

WOODSTOCK, April 28—In the Gee murder case on Wednesday, after the medical men had testified to the nature of the wound received by Millie Gee, Mary Hall of Holmesville, swore that on the morning after the crime the prisoner said that he shot Millie Gee, and he was not trying to get out of it.

Cross-examined by Mr. Ketchum witness said prisoner did not seem under the influence of liquor. She smelt liquor on his breath. He seemed sorry for what he had done, and was in great haste to get the doctors.

Winslow Dyer, of Bath, said the prisoner looked dissipated. Frank Doherty of Holmesville, said he saw the prisoner at Bath on Saturday, March 12. The prisoner appeared to have been drinking.

Dr. Pugsley pronounced the case for the crown closed.

The case was resumed this morning. As today is expected to be the last day of the trial, a very large number of people packed the court room, not a few being ladies, to get a look at the prisoner and to hear the decree of the jury as well as the addresses of the Attorney General, Mr. J. C. Hartley and the Chief Justice. The prisoner was brought in by Deputy Sheriff Foster and chief of Police Kelley, looking as downcast as ever.

Mr. C. G. L. Ketchum addressed the jury, saying that he would show by witnesses that Geo Gee was irresponsible for the crime committed; that he has insanity in his veins.

Benjamin Gee, of Canaan, the father of the prisoner, examined by Mr. Ketchum, said he was the only son. Witness' cousin was insane and died in the asylum. Witness' uncle, Levi Kenney, was also insane and was in the asylum. Witness thought the prisoner acted queerly and was restless and acted odd generally, particularly the last year. Cross-questioned by Mr. Pugsley, witness said he did not think the prisoner was restless because of pain.

Zora Gee, the prisoner's mother, said her cousin Ezekiel Crane, was insane and in the asylum; also her first cousin, Joseph Demerchant, witness' uncle, Fred Demerchant, also was insane. The prisoner acted strangely and was restless at nights. Witness told the prisoner he was crazy. Witness was married twenty-four years. Cross-questioned, witness did not

think the prisoner restless on account of physical pain. The prisoner kept company with Millie Gee for a year and a half, and liked her much. Witness did not know of any strained relationship between the prisoner and deceased.

John Demerchant, the prisoner's uncle, said the prisoner would undress his feet for practically no reason whatever and mended moccasins with no hole in them. Prisoner appeared restless while living with witness. He saw the prisoner on Sunday, March 31, with Sheriff Foster and spoke to him. Cross-examined, witness said prisoner asked Millie Gee to enter the house on one occasion if prisoner would mend a moccasin. He mended a moccasin which had no hole in it. Did not think the prisoner had physical pain. The prisoner would lie on the floor alongside of the bed, and not get into bed.

Amos Demerchant said the prisoner looked very wild and hunted in the eyes during the past three months. Insanity ran in the Gee family.

Frank Sweeney said on Saturday, March 12th, prisoner's countenance looked strange. Some of the prisoner's relatives were crazy, and insanity ran in the Gee family.

regards insanity to offset the argument of the defence.

His Honor impressed upon the jury when a dispute arose that it was the prisoner's condition, and not the condition of the Gee family they were to consider.

Mr. Hartley addressed the jury, claiming that Gee was insane. Intoxicating liquors would increase his insanity. Jealousy will likely produce insanity, as well as disappointment. It has been shown that the prisoner has of late greatly changed. May not this deed of which he is charged be the culmination of his insanity?

The Attorney General addressed the jury, saying that the unfortunate position of the prisoner was a matter of general regret. They will take the law from his honor, and they must not be influenced by sympathy. The crime is either wilful or deliberate murder, or nothing. Impelled with strong passion and jealousy, he committed the deed. He stated beforehand that he would shoot the girl. On Saturday, March 12, he borrowed a gun and said he was going hunting. BATHURST. Continued from page five.

The improvements to the streams made in recent years by damming and clearing them out, very little danger in getting out the drives is anticipated. This was not always the case, and the writer can remember when stream driving time was a season of great anxiety to all lumbermen on the North Shore of New Brunswick. None but the larger operators have any idea what it has cost to build the various dams and clear the rivers of large boulders, roots of trees and such like, during the many years they have been engaged in doing it, but at the same time such work pays in the end drives which formerly cost big money can now be got out with very little expense in comparison.

We understand that the rotary operators, Mr. Freeman Goodwin, the Gloucester Trading Co. and others who were working some distance from the port or Railway have all been successful in hauling out their saw lumber, which is now piled in safe places ready for shipment. Messrs. S. Hunter Co. who own a mill at Red Pine Station have been steadily shipping the out put of their operation there during the winter, and have only a small quantity on hand there at present. Some of the sleeper operators are yet working but the bulk of them have closed down for the season, which has been a successful one as regards prices, etc. for them all around.

The lobster fishermen expect to get traps out in several places this week but up to time of writing they have been prevented doing so by the ice. In this connection many of our lobster fishermen grumble at the regulation which gives them the right to put out their traps on the 20th of April, when it is impossible for them to do so at any point on the south shore of the Bay of Chaleur. We understand from them that in their opinion the Department should arrange these regulations so as to permit traps to go over local conditions. Thus while it may be possible in some parts of the gulf and bays to get out traps at the time stipulated and the fishermen at such points be able to take advantage of the fact, our fishermen complain and their time of fishing is thus necessarily curtailed. They therefore claim that they should have ten days added to the time for fishing at the end of the lobster fishing season, in order that they be put on the same footing as those who can begin to fish at the time stipulated by the regulations. No doubt, however, they will be one of the points which will be considered by the Fisheries Commission Representatives of which lately visited Gloucester County.

Although the sun has been fairly powerful during the past week, the frost throughout the country in the vicinity of Bathurst and down the shore as yet to a very bad state. Owing to this principle, our merchants complain of rather dull times, and very little country trade coming in. Butter and eggs are bringing good prices and are in demand. Owing to the fact that the potato trade from Prince Edward Island has opened up, the buyers who were shipping from here and along the shore have merely all left for the Island, and we presume our farmers can consider that business over for the spring season.

The Country.

An Epitome of Events Gathered by ADVOCATE Reporters.

DOAKTOWN.

The spring freshet has come and about all the young men have gone to the drive and our village presents a lonely appearance to some of Doaktown's fair ones as compared with what it was a few days ago.

Swims saw mill started to day. Their factory has also been running for some time and Mr. Henry Swin is absent down river superintending his business as a hatching compressor, while F. D. Swin, looks after the business at home.

Mrs. Hurley of Blissfield who was given up to die about three weeks ago by a Chatham doctor is now improving and the same medical gentleman now has good hopes of her recovery.

Since the Hon. Minister of railways passed through here on his tour of inspection of the Canada Eastern many rumors are afloat regarding the transfer of the road. One of them is that Mr. Gibson has threatened to withdraw his support from the government unless they buy the road. Would uncle Sandy be so hasty as that? Somebody at my elbow says no, it would give the McLeod family too good a chance.

Salie Bice who has been ill for about three weeks is slowly recovering and it is now thought she is out of danger.

Reports from Boiestown are to the effect that all the men have left for the drives and that somebody stole from the express office at Boiestown and that its good people are trying to get along without that convenience. The obliging station master in that place can be relied on to give any information in his possession about the matter.

The trip which the Minister of railways has just made over the Canada Eastern has again revived the important question of the purchase of that road by the Dominion government. Since the present administration came into power this question has been discussed repeatedly, and the former minister of railways, Hon. A. G. Blair passed over the road once or twice in his official capacity with a view it was said of recommending its purchase to his colleagues in the cabinet. But all negotiations up to the present time have failed. The future ownership of this railway is a matter of great importance to the people of the County which it traverses. It is not likely that the Canada Eastern will always remain in the hands of its present owners. The present is an age of combines and monopolies and therefore the smaller lines of Railway will be absorbed by the greater ones. The two great railways of New Brunswick, are the Canadian Pacific and the Intercolonial and there is very little doubt about the Canada Eastern becoming a part of the one or the other of these great lines. If it should become a part of the Canadian Pacific then the people of the upper Miramichi the Nashwaak and indeed the city of Fredericton as well would be at the mercy of that great corporation because there would be no competing line. On the other hand if the government controlled the Canada Eastern there would be a competing line from Moncton and the Upper Province. Moreover the merchants of Blackville, Doaktown, Boiestown and that vicinity could impart goods from St. John and Halifax cheaper than at present, because now shipments from St. John and Halifax to these places are handled by two roads independent of each other, whereas if the government owned the Canada Eastern there would be one freight carrying the whole distance not only lessening expenses but avoiding delay. There is no question but that it would serve the interest of the public better to have this railway become a part of the Intercolonial. As the traffic on it is large and constantly increasing it would pay handsomely as a part of the Intercol-

onial and there is no good reason why the government should refuse to acquire it.

Now that the question is engaging the attention of the government our representative in Parliament should not fail to use his influence to make the transfer an accomplished fact.

BATHURST.

The first robin of the season in the trees today and the ice is slowly floating out of the harbor. How pleasant is the spring. Next week the boys will be hunting up fishing tackle and getting ready for the big sea trout which come into the harbour after small and other small fish, and are taken with bait at the points, and later on in the lower part of the Nepequig, with either fly or bait. These sea trout do not properly belong to our rivers. That is they go away again about the first of June and we seldom see them again during the season. It is generally supposed they spawn in the North Shore or Quebec rivers, though such trout of large size are sometimes taken in the Nouvelle, Cascaquet and occasionally in the Chatham and Jacques rivers later in the season. Spawning of trout fishing, now that the angling season is about opening we might say that in our opinion out trout rivers are not protected as they should be. It is true that the Government has made good regulations for the protection of trout but they are not properly carried out. In the eastern part of this county and Northumberland we have the Caraque, Pokemouche, Tracadie and Tabusinat rivers particularly, besides a number of smaller streams, which with protection would afford some of the very best sea trout fishing in Canada. Several of these streams are systematically fished by fish hunters, and it is asserted that some of the fish merchants buy the trout and ship them to the states. Of course this is against the laws and regulations of the Fishery Department, but all the same it is done. The writer has taken more than one net out of one of the rivers named above, nets made of fine black twine which were anchored to the bottom and were stretched from side to side of the stream at one or more of its narrowest places. In these nets were dead trout of large size, and the guides tell us this is no unusual thing. Now no angler or other sportsman objects to a settler taking fish for his own or family use by lawful means, but taking them in such a manner is hardly fair. If the settler needs fish he can catch any quantity required for family use with rod and line. A boy with a wattle and short line can catch enough fish in the Tracadie or Tabusinat rivers in an hour to feed a family for a day, and there can be only one reason for setting nets of the kind described, and that is to catch fish wholesale for the purpose of selling them to some greedy fish merchant who cares nothing for the preservation of our rivers.

Now that our salmon rivers are taken up by lease holds, our young men are fond of angling have to depend on the trout fishing, and it would be to the interest of everyone to protect our streams, and even the settle a shambles that they are killing the goose that lays the golden eggs, for very soon, as the country is opened up more and more to tourists and others, these streams will afford employment to young men in the way of guiding sportsmen, and be the means of bringing money into the country. The government again should have a special guardian on every one of these streams, and this guardian should be a good man sufficiently paid in the season to give his whole attention to his work. What would the citizens of the Northern States give if they had a trout stream as we have, and it is not so long ago since the rivers and lakes of Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont were teeming with fish, and now the American Govern-

ment is spending immense sums in restocking some of the lakes and rivers which were netted and poached to such a degree that a pound trout is considered a great prize to an angler who catches one in a day's fishing.

We consider that nothing our newspapers can do to teach the people who live along the banks of our rivers and lakes the value of the splendid heritage they enjoy is too much trouble. Everything possible should be done to protect our fisheries, so that the generations to come may enjoy them as we have.

Reports from the various stream driving operations are to the effect that the men employed are making good progress in getting in landings and starting the logs. Of course the ice is not yet running in all the rivers, but now that the harbours are free we may expect all the rivers to be running fairly free very soon. There is a very good quantity of snow in the woods all along the North Shore and with

COLD STORAGE AT CREAMERIES.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture calls the attention of creamery owners to the following facts: A large proportion of butter for export is not cooled to a sufficiently low temperature before leaving the creamery. Investigations by this department during the last two years have shown that the temperature of butter on its arrival at the railway stations varied between 40 and 50 degrees F. It is very important that butter be cooled to the center of the box at a temperature below 38 degrees F. as soon as possible after being manufactured. Every moment that butter is left at a high temperature lessens its keeping qualities. Butter left at a high temperature for some time is subject to a rapid deterioration on its arrival in Great Britain. The Refrigerating compartments of steamers are not intended to cool warm butter and such butter does not get sufficiently chilled before arriving in England.

In order to lower the temperature of the butter below 38 degrees it is not sufficient to lower the temperature of the refrigerator one or two days before the shipping of butter. Butter boxes should be exposed to a temperature below 38 degrees for at least five or six days.

The way to find out the temperature of the butter is by putting a reliable thermometer into a box of butter. The butter maker should not be guided entirely by the temperature maintained in the cold storage room.

Two hours of exposure to the heat of the sun will lessen considerably the keeping qualities of butter. It should be protected from the heat of the sun during transport from the creamery to the railway station. The butter maker should find out the hour at which the refrigerator car is to pass, so that butter may not have to stand a long time on the station platform or in a warm shed.

A well built cold storage room may be kept at a temperature below 38 degrees F. with a mixture of salt and ice. Creamery owners who wish to improve their refrigerators may obtain necessary specifications by applying to this department.

This department will extend the offer of the bonus of \$100 for the building and maintenance of Creamery refrigerators for the season of 1904. Creamery owners who build a cold storage room according to satisfactory plans this spring will be entitled to the first instalment of the bonus at the end of the season of 1904, provided that they observe the following conditions meanwhile: Manufacture of at least 2000 lbs of butter per month; Maintenance of temperature of cold storage room at a sufficiently low degree; Forwarding of monthly reports of temperature will be mailed to any address on application to this department.

THE CHEESE TRADE 1903.

In his report regarding the cheese trade of 1903, Mr. A. W. Grindley, Agent of the Department of Agriculture in Great Britain, makes some suggestions that merit the attention of makers and exporters. He says: The cheese season of 1902 was a most successful one; there was a large increase in the quantity and the steady improvement in the quality was so great, that in spite of very heavy supplies the prices realized on the whole were satisfactory. The mild, sweet, palatable flavor, as distinguished from the heated and biting character so noticeable in former years, has created a large consumptive demand, which will have a tendency to do away with the disproportion in value between Canadian and English Cheddar.

The practise of shipping too new or green cannot be too emphatically condemned as it not only spoils the sale, but hurts the reputation of Canadian cheese. The salesman as well as the exporter is to blame for sending these immature cheese, and the patrons of factories should insist that their cheese should be held in the curing room until it is such a condition as will give satisfaction to the British consumer.

The difference in the quality of cheese held in the Government cool curing rooms was very noticeable, not only in quality, but in general appearance.

This improvement is due to cool curing and waxing the cheese which also has the advantage of preventing a considerable percentage of shrinkage. During the season of 1902 when waxed cheese first appeared on the British market, some of the Grocer Associations objected, and even went so far as to demand an allowance in weights, but it was soon proved that there was less shrinkage, which, added to the improved quality and appearance of the cheese, quickly created a brisk demand for cheese coming from the Government curing stations, at an advance in price compared from the ordinary factories.

The percentage of broken boxes was not so high during 1903, although it still runs very high, ranging from 5 to 25 per cent. The falling off in breakage is due to (1) damp season, which makes the boxes less brittle; (2) More care on the part of the shipping companies in loading, stowing and discharging cargoes, this work being closely watched by the Inspectors of your Department; (3) The use of boxes of better quality. The latter point was very noticeable in cheese coming from the Government curing stations, the boxes being made of heavier material the percentage of broken boxes did not run above two per cent, which proves that it is false economy to buy cheap boxes.

Care should be taken not to use green, unseasoned boxes, as the cheese, particularly the top and bottom, may be damaged in quality from this cause alone.

Leading British importers of Canadian cheese are in favor of branding cheese indelibly with the month in which they are made. Some years ago September cheese became the favorites, but owing to the improvement in the quality of cheese made during July and August, brought about by the system of cool curing introduced by the Department of Agriculture, the makes of other months have proved to be nearly as good in quality as September.


