The Daily Telegraph says:—"According to the latest information from Constantinople the Russian forces, despite the completion of the preliminaries for peace, are hastily pushing into Gallipoli and Constantinople. These circumstances are serious and menacing in the extreme, and will have to be considered by the Ministers in Cabinet Council to-day. The issue of other deliberations will, in all probability, be this evening communicated to Parliament." The Telegraph is furious in its comments on the course of Russia.;

Rumors were affoat last night that some such entrance has been made, or was on the point of being made. At the utmost such occupation could be only of such a minional character as the German entrance into Paris. A London special says it is thought that, had prompt action been taken on the credit vote, Austria would have joined England and prevented the occupation of Constantinople. The rage of the people against Gladstone as d his following is unbounded.

Minister Layard has telegraphed to Lord Derby from Constantinople, via India, that the Russians have arrived near to and are but entering Constantinople, and are also taking up a position near Gallipoli.

The excitement in London amounts almost to a war fever on account of the wires being cut, which prevents prompt communication between London and Constantinople.

In consequence of the representations of the Powers, Greece seems disposed to stop the further advance of her troops, referring the question of their withdrawal to the Conference. She also demands that, pending such decision, hostilities against the insurgents in Crete, be suspended.

No confirmation has been received at the Russian or Turkish Embassies of the Russian Ortent of Constantinople.

Schouvaloff, the Russian Ambassador, declares that he does not believe it.

The Chronicle states that the British Government and Russian Embassy had both received information that the Russians had entered Constantinople.

The same paper states that a telegram from Bucharest received in London says: "In addition to the transfer of men-of-war on the Danube, Russia is negotiating for the acquisiation of the entire Turkish iron-clad fleet."


