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

AUDITORS REPORT VERY SATISFACTORY

Shows Where Departments Have
Been at Fault and Other
Matters Set Out.

A meeting of the town council was held on Monday evening Deputy Mayor Belle-Lale in the Chair, with Councilors St. Onge, Patterson, Wallace, Moore and Chamberlain present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr. Lasey addressed the council at some length. He had considerable experience in concrete work, had put down permanent streets and sidewalks in Amherst, New Glasgow, Lunenburg and several other places. For the past six or seven years he had been practically making a specialty of such work. All work put down by him was giving entire satisfaction. He felt the concrete sidewalks here could be put down at \$2.00 per yard, and the grading done at about 20¢ per yard.

He had all the necessary material for the work including steel plates for forms which saved much labor as well as cutting out all lumber. The work being done today on our sidewalks was very satisfactory. The material being used in the bottom was very muddy, the bond was completely destroyed. He was prepared to superintend the work of putting down the sidewalks in about two weeks time when he had completed the contract he was now engaged upon. On motion it was decided to let the matter stand over until the next meeting of the council.

Auditor McNiece then submitted the complete report of his work in connection with the audit of the town books, giving the exact standing of all town departments. The audit covered a period of two years, and in the electric light department covered all goods purchased in that department since 1910. The report was a lengthy one, going fully into all details. In the electric light department the auditor found it necessary to comment upon the amount of oil purchased for the department. Comparing our plant with that of others he pointed out that for several years past our plant was purchasing about three times as much oil as was required, and in 1918 had purchased over six times as much as was required.

He also gave the number of tons of coal purchased since 1910, the number of lbs. of wire, and in fact everything purchased for that department, and made many valuable suggestions as to the manner in which all town purchases should be made and how an accurate account could be kept of all goods purchased which would show where every particular piece had been used. These suggestions applied to all departments. In the water and sewerage departments he also felt there was room for improvement, as it was not known under the present system just what particular department was chargeable for certain material purchased for this department. This was absolutely necessary in order to be able to keep a record of the capital account of each department. Auditor McNiece's report and suggestions which undoubtedly entailed much research can have no other effect than saving this town considerable money, if the valuable suggestions offered are followed out. During the reading of his report which occupied some one and a half hours every councillor present gave a most attentive hearing and was deeply interested as every detail in the various departments was being fully explained.

At the conclusion of his report the Deputy Mayor and several of the councillors highly complimented the Auditor upon the efficient manner in which he had completed his work and tendered their thanks for the valuable suggestions he had offered for the better management of town affairs. The report was then referred to the finance committee by them to be taken up with the various committees effected.

Returning to the regular order of business a communication from John H. Johnson making application for the position of fireman at the electric lighting plant was referred to the Electric Light Committee.

A communication was read from S. Blanchard, Sec. Sub. District Board of Health advising the council that the Board of Health made all Board of Health appointments, but with reference to the appointment of a meat and milk inspector for this town the town would be required to pay the salary. If they wished such an inspector appointed the Board would appoint the man the council named for the position. Consideration of the matter took place over the matter in which the importance of having such an inspector was made quite clear.

The question of the appointment was laid over until next meeting.

Several applications for trucking licenses were referred to the Police and License Committee and several others were referred to the Police.

The usual departmental accounts were then fully gone into and ordered paid.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported that Wm. Morrissey had not paid a poll tax since he had

EASTERN EDITORS TO VISIT THE WEST

Party Leaves by Special Train
on June 2nd—Will Stop Off
at Many Places.

On Thursday June 2nd, at 4 p.m. a special train bearing many eastern publishers and their wives will leave to attend the annual convention of the Canadian Weekly Newspapers Association, which is to be held in Vancouver on June 9th and 10th.

The party is made up of representative editors from Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec and Ontario, and when gathered along with the 200 or more of the Western Province members, will contribute the largest press gathering ever held in Canada.

Through the courtesy of the C.P.R. the C.N.R. and G.T.R. a very fine special train of ten cars will be made up. The Easterners will use this train on the entire trip.

The going journey will be made over the Canadian National lines and the return over the Canadian Pacific. Numerous stops will be made ranging from three hours to a day, and these stops will include many important points in the West.

On the way out stops will be made at Winnipeg, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Calgary, Banff, Kamloops, while on the return visits will be made at Lake Louise, Banff, Calgary, Regina, Port Arthur. At Vancouver there will be much entertainment, and at Victoria the Lieut.-Governor will give a party in honor of the visitors.

As the press party is to stop at a number of places, there are no doubt many persons now in the west, who still subscribe for the "old home paper" and who will take the opportunity to see "their editor" at one of the stopping places. If this is done it will make the trip much more enjoyable, as nothing would delight the editors more than to shake the hands of old friends and subscribers in the West.

The Eastern editors will have a very pleasant duty, that of "writing up" the trip. The railways will endeavor to show the party the most resourceful parts of the Great West, and no doubt the western men and women will have a hearty welcome ready.

The taking of such an extensive trip by Eastern weekly newspaper publishers may mean that some of the local weeklies will have to make temporary arrangements. In the case of the Graphic, Mr. Colin McKenzie has agreed to look after the editorial work while Mr. Anselow is away, and the regular staff will look after business interests. We hope the little difficulty will be overlooked for these three weeks. This is really the first vacation of more than a week which the manager and editor have taken since 1913.

But we are sure that the people of the East will be well repaid, for their editors will come back home inspired and encouraged and prepared to furnish some interesting reading about the Canadian West.

CHARACTER SKETCH OF REV. MR. KENYON

President and Founder of Bethel Bible Institute and Evangelist.

Rev. E. W. Kenyon who is conducting a most helpful Evangelistic Campaign in Campbellton is an American by birth. He has, however, a special liking for the Maritime Provinces because his "better half" is of good old Nova Scotia stock. On this ground and because of Mr. Kenyon's evangelistic campaign within the bounds of our province we may fairly claim him as our own.

As Dr. Livingstone rose from a factory boy to be a missionary to dark Africa and tell to those black races the love of Christ; so Mr. Kenyon has risen from a factory boy to be a teacher, lecturer, preacher and evangelist of the strongest type.

Mr. Kenyon has carried on a number of evangelistic services in the Maritime Provinces, notably at Moncton, St. John, West St. John, Marysville, Fredericton and now at Campbellton. Perhaps the one just completed at Fredericton is the most marked in the number who stood for Christ and the strong and prominent men who identified themselves with the campaign, but in all of these series of services wherever held larger numbers have come out for God and united with the churches. These campaigns are strictly speaking town or city movements, for the moral and social betterment of the people. They are wholly undenominational, so that all the churches show in the result of the special meetings.

Mr. Kenyon's method of presenting his thoughts, reminds one of Joseph Cooper the famous Boston-noon lecturer. He states a number of propositions and then takes them up one by one and proves them. He is argumentative, logical, forceful and biblical. He emphasizes the greatness and holiness of God; the dignity of man in his creation; the terrible calamity of the fall; and the wonderful provision of God's grace in the cross of Christ. Mr. Kenyon builds his discourses around two great fundamentals: First, man is ruled either by God or the devil. Second, the new birth is the impartation of the divine nature which drives out of the believer the fallen nature and puts God on the throne of the heart, rather than the devil. He is absolutely loyal to God's word. With Mr. Kenyon, the declaration of God's word on any proposition under discussion is absolutely conclusive.

As a platform speaker he has large ability. He holds the attention of his audience easily for an hour or more while he discusses with them the great issues of life. He is uncompromising in dealing with sin and insists on men giving up every sin and all evil habits. He sometimes says to professed Christians about their crooked lives, but honors the Church of God and has a deep reverence for all the church standards.

Altogether Mr. Kenyon is a safe man to have come to a town. His efforts all lie along the line of nobler manhood, happier homes, purer living and better social conditions.

Mr. Kenyon is the author of a book "The Father and His Family," which contains the outlines of many of his lectures and sermons. It is a book that any Christian man might welcome to his home. Mr. Kenyon is also the founder and president of an interdenominational Bible School for the training of ministers and Christian workers. This is situated at Spencer Mass. It is the beginning of what promises one day to be a large and strong school. The catalogue for 1920-1921 is an attractive presentation of the work done at this Institute. This school is unique in two things: First, the place given to the Bible; and second the fact that students are not asked for tuition or board. How then is the school supported? For fifteen years Mr. Kenyon has put into the school all his earnings from his evangelistic campaigns. Then many friends of the institute are financially supporting it, and the students are re-

TREASURE IN STRAIT OF NORTHUMBERLAND

Party of Six Will Dig for Gold Which Tradition Says Was Buried in 1758.

Pictou, N. S., May 17.—Treasure hunters of Trenton, New Glasgow and Carleton, six in all, have "handed" together to dig for a long buried pot of gold, or chests of money, which they believe are hidden beneath the soil of Caribou Island, twelve miles from Pictou. The island is located in the Northumberland strait, off the mouth of the Caribou river and is situated between Pictou Island and the mainland.

Caribou Island residents, who are few in number, have held the idea for a long time that the crew of a French frigate on her way to Quebec late in the fall of the year 1758 had taken off a large amount of gold destined to pay the French forces in Quebec and buried it on the island for safe-keeping, the commanders fearing to fall into the hands of the English vessels which at that time circumscribed the mouth of the St. Lawrence river. The tradition goes that as winter came on the vessel feared to go to the St. Lawrence, but wintered in the ice in Pictou of Shediac harbor, leaving the money on the island so that it would not fall into hands of the enemy.

Several of the residents say that they have observed signs of digging on the island. They have engaged the services of a mineral road expert recently who went over the ground. He is reported as saying that prospect for precious metal are exceedingly bright. The place where the supposed treasure is buried is at the east end of the island near the famous Gull Rock lighthouse, a spot as yet untouched by the hand of the builder or summer tourist.

The locality will be ploughed up and a thorough excavation made, capital having been furnished by six men of the places named.

FRASER MILL RAID CASE DISPOSED OF

Men Guilty of Illegally Entering Yard But Let Off With Warning.

Newcastle, May 19.—The preliminary examination of the men who were summoned to appear in the police court on the charge preferred against them by the Fraser Companies Limited was resumed today before Police Magistrate Lawlor. The men through their counsel admitted that they had illegally entered the yard and mill of the Fraser Companies, during a strike but did not admit the charge of intimidation. A. A. He closed the case by imposing the costs upon the men. A. A. Davidson, K. C., appeared as counsel for the Fraser Companies and George M. McDade for the men.

P. for Northumberland, who was present, in an address to the court said that he was not there in the capacity of president of the union but as the elected representative of the laboring class of Northumberland to see that full justice was given the men. These men had acted without the sanction of the union and he had no personal knowledge of the matter at the time.





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

will be taken to the coroner's court
for the inquest.Several witnesses have been secured
by the detectives who claim that
the case is complete.As far as the detectives could learn,
Griffith was employed as a cook on
the dining cars of the Grand Trunk
Railway while Proctor was employed

RadicalsPOTENTIALIST of direct action,
uncompromising opponent of
the present economic order in
Great Britain, opposed to the
war in England as was Eugene Debs
in America, friend of Soviet Russia,
ardent advocate of the miners and
their families, informed and skillful
in discussion and acutely embarras-
sing to opponents because of his hu-
man sympathies and knowledge of
the mining industry—such is Robert
Smillie, leader of the British miners.
In order to understand him per-
sonally I visited his home in Lark-
hall, near Glasgow, in mid-August,
1919, and during the same week a
conference of the Scottish miners at
Ayr by which he was signally hon-
ored.The Smillies live in a miners' stone
cottage, one of a long row of two-room
cottages built end to end, flush with
the sidewalk, and with gardens in
the rear. The Smillies have added
bath and sleeping rooms, but they
live simply, like their neighbors, the
other miners with whom Mr. Smillie
used to work. Mr. Smillie was not
at home.Mrs. Smillie is a typical Scotch-
woman—gentle, religious, devoted
to her husband and nine children.
Two of their sons were in the service,
James, whom I found at home, had
been gassed twice, and had been ill
for three years as a result of shell
shock. Two other sons confessed
to being conscientious objectors, and one
of the two had been imprisoned. Mrs.
Smillie told me that during the Boer
War her husband had openly op-
posed the war, but that James, who was
then a boy, was an ardent defender
of the Empire.One evening she sent James to the
door to get the evening paper, an
anti-war journal. He returned
without it. Questioned, he confessed
that he had thrown it behind the
door. Threatened with a punishment
if he did not bring it once, he said:
"I will take the whipping, mother,
but I will not get the paper." Later
James came to his father protesting
against having to argue against two
of his brothers on the rightness of
the Boer War. He told me he held his
own, he said, with one of them, but
it was not fair that he should have
to face the two, and they older. Mr.
Smillie took the lad's part.The Smillies are members of
Trinity United Free Church and read
a family pew, but are not regular
attendants. Mr. Smillie is absent a
great deal, and Mrs. Smillie is taxed
by the duties of her home. The pew
is not, therefore, regarded as a
manifest and growing estrangement
between the family and the church.
The church did not seem to me to
realize the significance of Mr. Smil-
lie's membership.At the Ayr conference I met Mr.
Smillie personally. My journal for
the day has this description:
"He is tall, a little stooped, slender,
dark-reddish hair, a little grey,
deep-set eyes, bushy eyebrows,
thick-lipped, somewhat fleshy nose. He
speaks with simplicity, precision,
great earnestness, but quietly and
with wisdom and force. I was im-
pressed by his courage, earnestness,
and capacity."After the address of the new pres-
ident, Mr. James Robertson, M. P., Mr.
Smillie spoke to the delegates.
"Labor," he said, "has a great work
to do through the House of Com-
mons. We must use political and in-
dustrial action at the same time, but
it will be a long-time before we can
give an direct action for political
action. I have always been a peace-
maker in Scottish mining, trying to
keep men at work and to avoid loss
of time."Mr. Smillie then advised the dele-
gates to avoid incidental strikes. He
advised the lightning strike, pre-
ceded by negotiations.He went on to remark that "the
main thing to keep in mind is our
wives and children." (I observed
that note in all his speaking.)Speaking of the wives and chil-
dren of the miners more than of the
miners, he said: "We have made our
case before the commission (the
Stanley Commission) and are en-
titled to nationalization. Capitalists
are fighting because they know that
the nationalization of minerals means
the surface next, then the factories."Mr. Smillie's injunction to Mr.
Robertson, the new president of the
Scottish miners, his own successor,
was characteristic. He advised
Robertson to rule with a strong
hand. If he made a mistake, hold it
till it was a good one later. (Laughter.)
His own power, such little as he had,
was because of his earnestness, he

Byronville, Ga., May 18.—Two negroes were killed, four others wounded, and L. C. Davis, of Somerville (N.J.), perhaps fatally wounded, in a clash between twenty negroes and a sheriff's posse near here last night. Twenty negroes have been arrested and taken to Vienna, in Dooley county, for safe-keeping.

According to the county authorities the negroes barricaded themselves in a house on a farm near after the chief of police had sought to collect taxes from one of them. Sheriff Vinton deputized a posse and undertook to arrest them. The negroes were said to have opened fire as the officers approached, Davis falling with eight wounds.

Threats to fire the house caused the negroes to leave their retreat and they soon were rounded up after two had been killed and four injured.

PRINCE DIED IN ABJECT POVERTY.

Rével, Esthonia, May 18.—Prince Kropotkin, the famous Russian author and revolutionary, whose death occurred in Moscow, February 8, died in miserable circumstances, says Dr. Morris Zucker, of Brooklyn, who recently was set free from Russian prisons.

The Brooklyn man declares that the Prince's last days were spent in abject squalor and throughout his illness he had lacked the comforts that would have made his sick bed somewhat endurable.

Englishwoman Braves Libyan Desert and Penetrates Headquarters of Savage Senusi.

Women like Lady Baker and Livingston's wife have done wonderful things in the way of travel in Africa, and she has written a new chapter in the history of indomitable womanhood.

Now a brave and venturesome young married lady, Mrs. Rosita Forbes, alone and unsupported by European help, has achieved new wonders on her own account. She has braved the horrors of the Libyan Desert, with its risk of death by hunger and thirst.

She had escaped repeated attempts at murder, and she has penetrated to the headquarters of the powerful Senusi tribe at the oasis of Kufra, where no white woman had ever been before, and only one white man even long ago.

She has discovered mountains unknown to geographers, and she has written a new chapter in the history of indomitable womanhood, her marvelous achievements, which have been told in the Times.

A Terrible Tea Party.

The journey from Benghazi, on the Mediterranean coast, to Jedabia, 80 miles south, performed on horseback in the company of an Egyptian servant, was easy, but at Jedabia the local chief, Sidi Kuda, though very friendly, was unable to prevent a plot by fanatical followers to assassinate his guest.

Mr. Forbes was warned of the plot. She invited her would-be assassins to drink mint tea with her one night, drugged the beverage threw the conspirators into a deep sleep and escaped dressed as a Bedouin, with five natives.

They wandered until weary in a circle, as it proved, for when dawn broke they were still only a mile from Jedabia and its numerous ploters. But the distance was soon lessened, and for two days the party fled south. Then, joined by two more natives, they traveled for a further four days, when they were rescued by a caravan.

Lives as Arab.


At Taj, Mrs. Forbes lived the life of a veiled Arab woman for nine days, eating with her fingers as she sat on the floor and having scent poured over her by a slave at each meal. She carried a kodak hidden under her garment, and took secret photographs through a specially cut hole.

On the return journey, Mrs. Forbes traveled by a new route, her caravan walking 13 hours a day through a terrible land of drought and sandstorms, with the thermometer below freezing point at night. She had no tent, but slept in fleas. For 17 days she could not wash, and for 12 days the journey lay through a desert that was absolutely waterless.

There were many plots against her life and many hairbreadth escapes, but at last she reached Alexandria after a wonderful journey of nearly 1,000 miles.

Any team of the league violating the bye-laws or refusing to abide by the decision of the Executive shall be expelled or suspended such suspension or expulsion to carry with it forfeiture of all moneys due the said team or club, until such time as may be seen fit by the Executive to lift the ban.

The net gate receipts, less expenses shall be divided equally among the competing teams or clubs of the league and the Executive, the settlement to be made at the end of the playing season.

All protests arising out of any of the league games must be filed, in writing with the Sec-Treas., within 24 hours after the playing of the game on which the protest is based. All protests to be dealt with by the Executive within one week after such protest has been filed.

The Executive Committee was authorized to have Season Tickets printed and distributed to the representatives of each team for sale at the cost of \$2.00 per ticket.

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

Through her efforts this Club was maintained and flourished up until 1914, when every member of the Club with the exception of one who was not eligible, enlisted in the great war.

Soldiers' Memorial Hospital in Campbellton as a monument to our fallen heroes Mrs. MacKenzie took a deep interest in that work, and was largely instrumental in organizing the Ladies' Aid of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, an organization which is doing a grand work in assisting in the erection of that monument. The ladies of that organization honored Mrs. MacKenzie by making her the first president of the Association. It was under her capable management the first fair was held, and which proved such a financial success.

Some five weeks ago Mrs. MacKenzie was stricken with paralysis, and although all that medical skill, loving hands and careful nursing could do for her was done she passed peacefully away Saturday evening at 7:30 as above stated. During her five weeks illness she was unable to converse with anyone, the paralysis having left her speechless.
