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NEWS OF THE WEEK.

A Summary of Foreign, Dominion, and Provincial Happenings. Gathered from every Quarter.

Hon. J. C. Abbott, has been re-elected Mayor of Montreal, by acclamation. Two hundred and thirty are on strike at the London, N.S., iron mines.

A new Salvation Army barracks has been completed at Ottawa, at a cost of \$17,000. A terrible earthquake has occurred in the province of Yun, China, and two thousand lives are reported lost.

Gideon Borsau, deputy provincial secretary of Manitoba, is reported to have abandoned his post in London, Ontario.

At North Sydney, C.B., on the 13th inst., Mrs. Collins, a lady over 85 years old celebrated the 32nd anniversary of her marriage. A young daughter of W. A. Cole, at Sherbrook, Que., had been thrown into water through near her father's door and was drowned.

The names of the Irish M. P.'s, who have been imprisoned under the Censor Act, are O'Brien, Sullivan, Sheehy, Hooper, Lane, T. Harrington, J. Harrington, Ellice, Cox, O'Brien, Gibney and Pynes.

The North English, Monday, experienced a storm of unusual severity. The weather was intensely cold, and the railroads were completely blocked. There is much suffering among the poor, and many have occurred from exposure. Thousands of sheep in pens were buried in snow.

It is stated on good authority that Sir Hector Langevin will be married to Mrs. Madam La Touche, better known in these parts as the wife of the late Mr. J. S. Sundry, whose arrest was announced a few weeks ago in New York, for obtaining money as a stock broker under false pretences, has been discharged from the evidence, and is being considered insufficient to convict her.

The joint citizens and aldermanic committee for holding the Dominion and Provincial Exhibition in Halifax next summer, has been organized, with Mayor O'Mullin at its head, and has energetically gone to work with a determination to make it a success. The Provincial Government will give a grant of \$4000 to the undertaking.

Mr. C. N. Skinner, M. P. for St. John, is not an unambitious man. He has been a lecturer before the Orangemen in St. John, Monday evening he said "paralyzed" and fled away from the British Crown, Canada, to his bright home. That was an awful curse to utter against Mr. Ellis.

An error has been discovered in the constitution of the State of New Jersey, which, it is said, will open the prison doors throughout the State and liberate all prisoners committed since 1876. On the recommendation of the Minister of Militia, Major-General Middleton, Adjutant-General Fowler, Major-General Oliver, of Kingston, and Major-General Macleod, have appointed a committee to report on the condition of Canadian defence and to suggest a course of improvement. A force of military graduates will be conscripted to man the survey of the Dominion for military purposes.

The London Times thus refers to Canada's new Governor General, Lord Stanley of Preston, under the name of Col. Stanley, has been long and favorably known to the country. He is Lord Stanley's son, and has been Secretary of War and of the Colonies, and is now President of the Board of Trade. He is genial and popular, and he is a hard worker. At the Belfast Police Court the other day, six members of the Salvation Army band were convicted on a charge of being drunk through the streets on Sunday, and ordered to pay a fine of one shilling each, or 24 hours imprisonment. The court was made up of sympathizers, and after consulting together in the deaf and dumb alphabet, the defendants refused to pay the fine. They were taken to the cells amid great excitement.

E. H. Bronson, M. P., head partner of Bronson, Weston & Co., of Ottawa, the wealthiest lumber firm in Canada, has bought a timber mill in California for a million dollars, and is negotiating for another limit at a similar sum. These timber lands are said to be the best in the Golden State, and are covered with a growth of cedar, of what to Canadian ideas are almost incredible dimensions. The trees are 12 feet in diameter at the stump and hundreds of feet high, straight and without a knot.

At an inquest held on the body of Daniel Hunter, who was killed on the Northern and Western railway, the railway company and its employees were exonerated from all blame. Hunter, who belonged to Michigan, had been travelling on the Northern and Western railway, and was killed by a passenger train. He was carrying a large amount of money, and several persons, ranging from \$30 to \$100, some falling due this month. He had a \$2,000 bank account.

A cyclone struck the town of Mount Vernon, Illinois, Sunday afternoon, and did nearly three hundred residences and places of business, and unbound from 1200 to 1300 people. It is full of walls many persons were buried under the debris. Thirty-five were killed and twice as many injured, eight or ten seriously. Preceding the destructive wind was a heavy fall of rain for half an hour, which drove all the inhabitants to shelter. This was followed by a slight hail storm, accompanied by lightning and a furious blow which lighting and wind-fueled cyclone, struck the southern portion of the city, unroofing everything in its path and doing a great amount of damage through the business part of the town.
