A Summary of Foreign, Dominion, and Provincial Happenings.

Hon. J. C. Abbott, has been re-elected Mayor of Montreal, by acclamation.

Two hundred men are on strike at the Londoners, N. S., iron mines.

A new Salvation Army barracks has been completed at Ottawa, at a cost of \$17,000.

A terrible earthquake has occurred in the province of Yunnan, China, and two thousand lives are reported lost.

Gideon Boudreau, deputy provincial secretary of Manitoba, is reported to have abandoned his post with heavy defalcations.

At North Sydney, C. B., on the 13th inst., Mrs. Collins, a lady over 98 years old celebrated the 32nd anniversary of her marriage.

A young daughter of A. A. Cole, at St. John's, Quebec, Monday, fell into a water trough near her father's door and was drowned.

The North of England, Monday, experienced a storm of unusual severity. The weather was intensely cold, and the railroads were completely blocked. There is much suffering among farmers and several deaths have occurred from exposure. Thousands of sheep in pens were buried in snow.

It is stated on good authority that Sir Hector Langwill will be married to Miss Madam LaTouche, better known in these parts as Marion Grant, a well known actress, whose arrest was announced a few weeks ago in New York, for obtaining money as a stock broker under false pretences, has been discharged from custody, the evidence being considered insufficient to convict her.

The joint citizens and aldermanic committee for holding the Dominion and Provincial Exhibition in Halifax next summer has been fully organized, with Mayor O'Mullin at its head, and has energetically gone to work with a determination to make the affair a success. The Provincial Government will give a grant of \$4000 to the undertaking.

At the Belfast Police Court the other day, six members of the Salvation Army band were convicted on a charge of every day through the streets on Sunday, and ordered to pay a fine of one shilling each, or 24 hours imprisonment. They were not given with sympathies, and after consulting together in the deaf and dumb alphabet, the defendants refused to pay the fine. They were then taken to the cells amid great excitement.

E. H. Bronson, M. P., head partner of Bronson, Weston & Co., of Ottawa, the wealthiest lumber firm in Canada, has bought a timber limit in California for a million dollars, and is negotiating for another limit at a similar sum. These timber lands are said to be the best in the Golden State, and are covered with a growth of cedar, of what to Canadian ideas are almost incredible dimensions. The trees are 12 feet in diameter at the stump and hundreds of feet high, straight and without a knot.

At an inquest held on the body of Daniel Hunter, who was killed on the Northern and Western railway, the railway company and its employees were exonerated from all blame. Hunter, who belonged to Minneapolis, P. E. I., traveled constantly around the North shore buying old iron, produce, etc. On his person was a memorandum book showing dealings with several persons, and a wallet containing a list of several notes ranging from \$30 to \$100, some falling due this month.
