Whole communes in the neighborhood of Perpignan, in the Pyrenees, are cut off from communication with the rest of the world, and wayfarers in those districts have been frozen to death. At Saragossa the mercury is 14° Fahrenheit, and snow is falling. The Seine, at its confluence with the Oise, is jammed with pack ice ten feet high. The Loire at Nevers is frozen oven. A large number of vessels are ice-bound at Bordeaux.

The notes invariably said that if he did not take warning he would regret it.

Buss paid to attention to the missives, which were invariably signed with a cross. Whoever committed this outrage were evidently experts, for they did one of the neatest pleces of tattooing ever seen in this vicinity. They began at the point of his nose and ran the India ink up as far as his eyebrows, where they made a cross. They then began work at the top of the forehead, but did not finish, as they only pricked it and did not use the ink on it.

When Buss awoke in the morning he had a terrible pain in his head, and there was a

a terrible pain in his head, and there was a strong odor of chloroform in the room. He called one of the inmates of the house, who, strong odor of enfortering in the house, who, shocked at his appearance, asked him what he had been doing to his face. A glance in the mirror revealed his condition. Soap and water were used, and then a physician was called, who told him that it would be practically impossible to remove it. Last night he received another communication from the same source, telling him he must leave the place inside of 24 hours or he would be a corpse. He informed Detective Cook, of the Lake Erie road, about the matter, and empleyed him to work up the case. Buss asserts that he has not one known enemy in the world, with the exception of his wife.







In the morning the doctor based his remarks on Romans, x., 14: "How, then, shall they call on him in whom they have not believed, and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they hear without a preacher?" The reverend gentleman, after pointing out the growth of Christianity during the past 1,800 years, when there still remained two-thirds of the human race who had not heard of the Gospel severely criticised the action of the churches for spending such a large portion of the money collected on church-building and church decorations. There seemed to be too much pride taken by church members in the growth of home missions. The church in America gloried in building at the rate of four churches a day, while it gave but two-thirds of a cent per member every 30 days to convert the heathen. In the early years of the Methodist Church the contributions to missions amounted to about 2 cents per member a week. It raised until in 1862 it amounted to 5 cents per member; but at the present it was a fraction less. "Suppose," said the doctor, "that every member of the Methodist Church in the United States, Canada and Europe gave just 1 cent a day for one year, about \$17,000,000 would be raised, which amount would be more than the total contributed by all the Christian churches for the same period of time." The distribution of the funds collected for missions in Canada he declared to be unjust, and stated that there were men in Toronto, who were manipulating almost 50 per cent of these funds for their own use. In conclusion, the preacher urged the Methodist Church to waken up, not that they were behind other churches, but because they could do more if they wished. They did not need more preachers, but they needed more of the spirit of Christ, Th
