### ELECTRIC RAILWAY DEVELOPMENTS

Col. Clarke's Offer Considered by the

Aldermen.

A Typewriter Development and its Out-

come.

Col. Clarke's application for a franchise? to run an electrical system of street railway was considered at a special meeting of No. 1. Committee Wednesday. Each clause of the prospectus presented was given separate perusal and passage.

It was decided that all the poles, wires and rails used in constructing the new lines should be subject to the supervision and approval of the city engineer.

The fourth clause was amended so that the company will have to construct part of the crossings at its expense.

The committee wanted it expressed in the provisions under debate that the city should be able to purchase the company's property at the end of the specified twenty years, on a basis of the material value of the property and not take into account the amount of its earnings.

One of the clauses provided for the hour limits during whichcarathould runeach day. Ald. Parnell wanted the words "Sundays excepted" inserted. Ten tickets for 25 cents will be asked for school children instead of eight.

It was decided to ask that the company pave two feet six inches on either side of their rails, in place of eighteen inches, as in the proposal.

Col. Clark and his solicitor, Mr. Johnston, were then called in and the chairman proceeded to enumerate the various amendment which the members of the committee had suggested.

Col. Clarke was willing to have the system of motive power which he adopted—the trolley in this case—submitted to the city council for approval. He objected to the two feet six inches paving proposal.

Col. Clarke will give all the proposed amendments due deliberation.

Mayor Essery said he understood that the street railway company had been expressely ordered not to build a double track on Dundas street west. He noticed that they were disregarding this injunction. "Why is the city engineer not attending to his business?" ejaculated his worship. "Is he acting on behalf of the city or in collusion with the railway company? If not the latter, why does he not intercept the work?"

The mayor's subsequent motion asking the city engineer to forthwith proceed to make the company refrain from building the double track was passed.

The committee decided, upon the casting vote of the chairman, to purchase a Smith-Fremier typewriter for the use of the city treasurer's office. THE COMING HARVEST. Bulletin of the Ontario Bureau of

Industries. Hay Excellent-Fall Wheat Below the Average, Spring Wheat in Excess, Barley and Oats Look Well— Potatoes and Roots in

Toronto, July 13.—The latest bulletin of the Ontario Bureau of Industries gives the condition of crops down to July I. In fall wheat the prospects are that the total produce will fall below the average, and the production per acre will also fall somewhat below the average. The average of spring wheat has also diminished, but while taking the Province as a whole, the spring wheat crop is not altogether satisfactory. The production will be inslight excess of 1892.

The barley crop will be a little late, and will be quite a bit under the average in quantity, but unless unfavorable weather occurs during July it will be fully up to or above the average in quality.

The yield of oats is expected to be above the average weather permitting.

Rye appears to be limited, but in good condition.

The corn crop was backward, but is do-

The corn crop was backward, but is doing well, and prospects were exceedingly good on July 1.

The pea crop will be quite up to the average and generally satisfactory.

Buckwheat and beans are doing well, the former with an increased area.

The hay crop is excellent, especially for clover, and the yield will be unusually high.

Potatoes are doing well, but are in Potatoes are doing well, but are in danger from the Colorado Leetle.
Indications as to roots are not numerous, but are hopeful where given.
In fruit the indications are that the yield will be a little below the average, small fruits doing better than the large

small fruits doing better than ones.

The bulletin closes by pointing out the advantage and necessity of more thorough drainage in Ontario, the reports generally showing the best crops on high and well drained fields.

Clover and timothy hay stand ahead of all other crops so far. The grain crops are fair, fruit crops poor. All crops will be a little late in being harvested.

THE strongest plea for Christian unity that we have seen for some time comes unintentionally from Dr. Chunnoolal Pundit, Benares, India, a high caste Brahmin, who, with two others of his countrymen, are on a tour through this country. They were in Toronto the other day, and the Empire reporter interviewed them. This representative Hindoo was asked what he thought about the progress of Christianity. He expressed the opinion that it would be a good thing for India if her people were converted to Christianity. A simple mechanical contrivance is being adopted by English builders by which window sashes may be given two movements, the one upward or downward, and the other inward. Practically, only one action is required to effect the change from an ordinary sash to a casement window. By dropping a catch at one side of the sash the cord is secured, the window frame being released from the sash and slipping into pivot hinges, when it can be opened as a casement and keys itself in so doing; when closing, the sash again engages with the cord, which runs in a groove in the pulley slide and serves as one of the guides to keep it in its place when working up and down as a sash. 



The young man, standing up straight, seems to take suddenly a downward dive. He catches on the wire with his knees and then again with his toes. 
