ELEVEN KILLED, 26 WOUNDED

Explosion at Military Station Causes Death of Eleven Native Soldiers and Non-Commissioned Officers and a Score of Injured Will Die.

Calcutta, Dec. 7 .- An explosion in the magazine at the military station here today resulted in the killing of eleven men and the wounding of twenty-six others. Most of the injured will die. The casualties were all among native soldiers and non-commissioned officers. At the time of the explosion the men were engaged in converting ball cartridges into blank cartridges. It was at first reported that the accident was the work of agitators, but this rumor was quickly disproved.

Terrible Toll of the Storm King

Halifax, Dec. 7.-More than half a hundred seamen have lost their lives off the upper North Atlantic Coast during the past few days as the result of a storm of unprecedented severity, and it is possible that the turbulent sea has claimed even a greater toll of lives. The reckoning, itemized as accurately as the meagre reports will allow, is as follows: Dec. 3.—Seventeen members of the crews of three fishing

schooners drowned off the Newfoundland Coast. Dec.4.—Twenty-eight members of the crew of the steamer Soo City, which is believed to have sunk in the Gulf of St.

Dec. 5 .- Seven members of the crew of barge 101, which went down off the coast of Nova Scotia.

In addition to this death toll, which includes no passengers, there developed a mystery tonight in the discovery of life, belts, bearing the name "S. S. Stanley," which were washed ashore with the wreckage from the Son City. No steamer of that name navigating in this vicinity has been reported, and in lieu of any other explanation it is said that those life belts might have been a second-hand purchase for use aboard the

The system is not a new one. has been established in the New England States between Portland and Boston and New York. It is a system of automatic rapid telegraphy that sends messages over the telephone wire (without disturbing the simultaneous connections) at a speed of 1,000 words a minute, automatically recording them at the delivery end.

The interests are consolidated. The money is in the Bank of Hamilton as guarantee, and the deal is completed. It may mean a blow to the present existing telegraph companies and the Bell Telephone Company.





BARNATO DEATH DUTIES

British Government

London, Dec. 6 .- The death of Harry Barnato, whose estate is estimated at \$25,000,000, is a fortunate windfall which is much needed by the chancellor of the exchequer. Harcourt's famous death duties laid a heavy toll on big estates, but the finance act of 1907 \$5 65 per cwt. There was a carload was merciless regarding these big fortunes. Indeed, the complaint that it approaches confiscation seems justified, when it is realized that Barnato's estate, in one way or another, will be mulcted to the extent of nearly onefifth. The death duties will amount to \$3,500,000, being 10 per cent on the first million sterling, and in case of estates of £3,000,000 and upwards, 15 per cent on the remainder. The legacy duty and succession duty will amount to some \$1,000,000.

The late Lord Gleneske's estate will make another large contribution to the public funds. His income from the Morning Post is believed to have been \$300,000 to \$400,000 a year.


