war, which has already dethroned two monarchs, now seems to menace the ancient throne of Spain The utmost exertions of the Spanish censors have failed to completely suppress the reports of grave happenings in the peninsular kingdom. From what little is known the Spanish army is taking the lead in the revolutionary move-ment, which is further accelerated by the food scarcity and industrial unrest. Rumors of revolt have been current for several months. and at the end of May it was announced that the constitutional guarantees would be suspended while the Government prohibited all public manifestations in respect to international questions. This was followed by an outbreak at Barce-lona on June 1, the seriousness of which was indicated by the fact that the soldiers aided with the revolters and imprisoned a number of

People Are Pro-Ally. The exact part which the issues of the war play in the Spanish crisis is difficult to determine. The masses of the people have been generally credited with being strongly pro-ally in sentiment while the aristocraty leaned toward the side of Germany. At the same time the demand for internal reform and other domestic questions have apparently had a leading role in the growing unrest. No new developments have occurred in the Greek situation, but the triumphant return to Athens of Venizelos is predicted in England, a step almost certain to be followed by the definite alignment of Greece on the side of the Entente. Stockholm, June 16, via London. - The Social Demokraten says Germany has made an offer of peace to Russia through a member of the Swiss Federal Council.

Various moves on the part of Germany and Austria since the Russian revolution to arrange a separate peace with Russia, have been reported, although not in the form of an offer directly by either government. A week ago the Council of Workmen's and Soldlers' Delegates of Russia made public the fact that the German commander-in-chief on the eastern front had sent a wireless message inviting the Russian armies to a separate armistice to be followed by secret negotiations with the German leaders. This proposal was denounced by the council. A BULGAR ATTEMPT.

Maxim Gorky, the Russian author, last month made it known that D. Rizow, the Bulgarian minister at Berlin, had attempted to inveigle him into secret peace negotiations. It was reported recently from Petrograd that two Austrian generals, ten other Austrian officers and fifteen privates had appeared in Kishinev, Russia, declaring that they were peace delegates. This report was denied in Vienna.

\$57,300 is Sum Asked.

London citizens will be asked next week to contribute the sum of \$57,300 to extend the accommodation at the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium, so that 150 returned soldiers may be treated at 150 returned soldiers may be treated at one time. That is a small sum, after all, when it is considered that it means

all, when it is a small sum, after all, when it is considered that it means the restoration to health and usefulness of scores and scores of men who without it would have small chance of life. The investment that is made in the sanatorium will pay dividends of hundreds per cent in the work that men saved by its agency will perform in years to come.

The central committee has prepared a careful statement of the expenditure which must be made in order to bring the sanatorium to the required capacity. The chief expenditure 13, of course, the permanent building for bed cases accommodating 85 patients, equipped with X-ray plant, bacteriological laboratory and small overating room. Furnished complete this will cost \$145,000, and towards this there have already been grants of \$25,000 each from the Military Hamiltand.







Official Notification Betrays Failing Food Supply.

MORE POTATOES

21-2 Ounces of Bread for Each Ounce of Tubers, Says Tageblatt.

COPENHAGEN, June 15 .- via London Official admission of food difficulties in Germany, resulting from a shortage of potatoes and the inadequacy of grain stocks to afford a supplementary bread ration, is made in an announcement of the food control department. The announcement states that five pound potato ration, which has long been only official fiction, will hereafter be abandoned and that while an attempt will be made to supply bread in the place of potatoes, the quantity must be reduced. The Berliner Tageblatt after having made inquiries, reports that two, or at the highest three, pounds of potatoes weekly is all that can be supplied until new potatoes are available in mid-July and that instead of 140 grammes of bread, hitherto supplied as of potatoes and the inadequacy of grain grammes of bread, hitherto supplied as a substitute for each failing pound of potatoes, only seventy grammes or less than 2½ ounces can be furnished hereafter. The Tageblatt's statement regarding possible potato rations are interpretable as erring, if anything, on the optimistic side.

BONAR LAW TO RESIGN AS CHANCELLOR OF EXCHEQUER AMONG CABINET CHANGES

LONDON, June 15 .- It is rumored that Bonar Law will resign as chancellor of the exchequer almost immediately.



Arthur Henderson is no longer a member of the war cabinet of five, it having apeared to his late colleagues that his presence in Petro-grad is essential at this juncture order that the view of the over whelming majority of the British working classes on the war snall not be misrepresented. His place in the war cabinet has been taken by G. N. Barnes, formerly minis-ter of pensions, and another solid Labor party stalwart, with a great outside reputation for sound and sane leadership of the workers. Lord Devonport has stepped down from the food controllership -partly, no doubt, for reasons of health, and partly because the machinery which he set in motion was too deliberate to satisfy friendly critics.

DOMINION CROP REPORT WITH HARVEST PROSPECT

ottawa, June 15.—The census and statistics office has issued a preliminary estimate of the areas sown to grain crops this spring, with a report of their condition on May 31, as compiled from the returns of crop correspondents. The reports from the prairie provinces state that the spring there is very backward, and seeding is consequently late. At the end of May severe frosts cut down the growing wheat plant; but rapid recovery was anticipated. Rain was needed for the germination of the later sown crops and of wheat sown on stubble.

It is estimated from the reports of correspondents that the total area sown to wheat for 1917 is 13,450,250 acres, as compared with 14,897,000 acres in Sakatchewan and 158,000 acres in Alberta.

The average condition on May 31, in per cent to the standard representing a full crop is for all wheat for Canada \$4 per cent as compared with 90 per cent on May 31 last year, and with 91 per cent the average condition on the corresponding date for the seven sears ended 1916.

Thus, the area sown in this year, whilst nearly 10 per cent less than the area sown this year, whilst nearly 10 per cent less than the area sown for 1916, is about 4 per cent more than the area harvested for 1916.

Mr. LaPointe said that for years there had been an anti-British campaign in the province of Quebec, directed against Sir Wilfrid Laurier, on the ground that he was too British. Armand Lavergne, Tancrede Marsil and Mr. Sevigny were all engaged in this delightful task in 1911.

Hon. Charles Marcil said that the articles in Le France Parleur had not attacked recruiting generally, but had attacked the manner in which the militia department had treated French-Canadian regiments in the province of Quebec.



LIBERTY LOAN BIG FEATURE OF WEEK WITH WALL STREET

New York, June 17.-Two factors stood out in the week's operations on the stock exchange to the exclusion of all other considerations. These were the liberty loan, which closed yesterday the liberty loan, which closed yesterday to the accompaniment of a very large over-subscription, and the unexpected rise in call loans to 6 per cent, the maximum quotation of the year.

The latter development was almost altogether the result of the former enormous amounts of money having been tied up to pay for subscriptions to the \$2,000,000,000 undertaking. Financial institutions were heavy losers to cial institutions were heavy losers to the local federal reserve bank, but this situation is susceptible of automatic readjustment in the near future.

Stock Dealings Light.

Dealings in stocks, while fairly large, were not up to the heavy daily transactions of recent weeks. Trading differed also in that much of the activity centred about minor rails and obscure specialties. centred about minor rails and obscure specialties.

The enlarged dealings in some of the reorganized railroad shares were believed to presage important changes of control, especially in some of the soft coal properties. Improvement in other parts of the list was caused by more technical reasons, the recovery in motor issues, for instance, causing considerable short covering.

Foremost industrials, like Uited States Steel and the Bethlehem Steels registered highest prices in their history, their gains being coincident with another advance in the price schedule of fabricated Zealand iron. Coppers were responsive to similar trade conditions, together with other metals, including silver.
