

## CONCLAVE OF WARRING POWERS

German Chancellor Asks For Exchange of Views.

GERMANS CAPTURE REVAL Chief Fortress of Russia Defending Petrograd Falls to Teutons.

Amsterdam, Feb. 25.—Speaking before the Reichstag today, the imperial German chancellor, Count von Hertling, made this declaration:

"I can fundamentally agree with the four principles which in President Wilson's view must be applied in a mutual exchange of views, and thus declare with President Wilson that a general peace can be discussed on such a basis.

"Only one reserve need be made in this connection: These principles must not only be proposed by the president but must also not only be proposed by the president of the United States, but must also actually be recognized by all states and

peoples.
"But this goal has not yet been reached. There is still no court of arbitration established by all the nations for the preservation of peace in the name of instinction.



## Industry, Thrift, Banking, Insurance, Investments

#### GENERAL INDUSTRIAL CONDITIONS.

The institution of "heatless" days in the central industrial district of Canada which derives its coal from the United States shows how inevitably the impairment of transportation facilities affects production. Conditions in Ontario have been serious, but not much more so than in other parts of the Dominion. The chief cause of the present serious shortage of steel is the in-ability to secure the transportation of the raw material in sufficient quantities. At their recent conference with the war committee of the cabinet the gteel manufacturers expressed their desire to meet the wish of the Government on the street car system, but it did not fix any prices for the increase of their output by 20 per cent over that of 1917. This will be impossible unless the Government takes steps to improve transportation and labor conditions. To man and equip the railways adequately for the greater demands which will be made on them during the current year, and company's business would take care of any increase in making, will necessitate industrial readjustments of a drastic character. Arbitrary limitations may have to be imposed upon such industries as do not serve essential purposes or do not contribute to our export trade. On the New conditions—totally unforeseen and unforseeable other hand, by a timely provision for future needs, a steady flow of orders must be maintained in order that by keeping manufacturing establishments steadily employed their organization and labor forces may be preserved intact.

Spasmodic orders make this difficult and hamper efforts to increase production. The coal output in Canada is almost equal to that of previous years, but an extraordinary demand has been created by the activity of manufacturing industries and by the severity of the weather. In Nova Scotia the enlistment of so many men has reduced the output with serious results on steel production and shipping. In Alberta and British Columbia there is no apparent diminution in the output or in the number of men working in the mines, but the difficulties of transportation are serious.—Monthly Commercial Letter, Canadian Bank of Commerce,

#### "WHERE YOU MUST YOU CAN."

A young newspaper man in the East had worked his way up from "cub' reporter to city editor, and with a fair salary was able to support his little family in comfort. But at thirty he had not saved a cent.

After some trial and tribulation, he secured another on a rival sheet in the same city. But his salary was much smaller. The result was that there had to be considerable readjustment in the manner of living of that family, a little more careful management of household finances, and a pruning down We accepted them as a part of the burden of war. But of the personal expenses of its various members. This period of enforced economy lasted fully a year. During that time the husband and wife found that they were able to get along all right and did not have to give up much that was really worth while. So when the breadwinner got a "raise" they decided to save the greater part of the increase and put it into the bank. Five years later, their savings in the bank and good investments that

prang from them amounted to enough to add \$20 a month to their income, and the fund was always growing and constantly making its owner more independent .of the pay envelope and more fearless of the "blue" one.

Most men on salary live as this newspaper man did at first, just as if their income was sure to increase and never diminish. It is seldom that an increased income does not bring about a somewhat more expensive scale of living and a greater total of family expenditure. It is also, seldom that a man's family expenses diminish unless a smaller income forces their reduction. STORIES OF THRIFT, BY T. D. McGREGOR.

#### DEAN JOHNSON AND BANKER VANDERLIP.

The joke, may I add? is that the man who received the advice has lived up to it more scrupulously than the man who gave it!

Mr. Vanderlip is regarded as one of the best-dressed men in America. Dean Johnson would take no prize at a fashion show. The last time I saw him he looked as if he was before or after indulging in a game of golf—soft shirt, collar, etc. The two have this in common, however, that each has risen to the very top of his profession and both have attained enviable reputations for what is inside
