U. S. MINERS KILLED

WINNIPEG STRIKE LEADERS SERIOUSLY CONSIDERING MOVE TO END WALKOUT, IS REPORT

Central Strike Committee of Manitoba Capital May Be Brought To Time As a Result of Veterans' Attitude Against Sympathetic Strike in That City.

Winnipeg, June 5.-It was rumored today that the central strike committee was considering the advisability of calling off the sympathetic strike in view of the impending action by war veterans.

It was stated at the board of trade that hundreds of union men were ready to return to work, despite contrary orders from the strike committee, as soon as they were assured "adequate protection.

The strike situation seemed to be completely reversed. Labor leaders, who have publicly and aggressively attempted to combat every federal and provincial and municipal attempt to restore tranquility in Winnipeg, were asking "for protection," it was learned at the city hall.

Winnipeg, June 5.—Both the anti-trike veterans and those who have adorsed the walkout here planned to hold street parades again today. Con-ciliation offers have been transmitted by both sides through the railway brotherhood officials, but neither the metal workers nor employers have replied so far as is known. Plans for presenting as strong a show of force as possible to preserve order were agreed on yesterday at a conference here of civic, provincial and military officials, when fears of clashes between rival parades was expressed. Further efforts to hamper the food supply were made by strikers, when engineers for milk depots and bakeries were called out. The mayor countered with plans for opening public food stations.

Agent General Wade Attribut es Unrest Among Canadian Troops To Delay in Repat riation Caused by Lack of Tran sports.

London, June 5 .- Agent General Wade of British Columbia, in a letter to the press, attributes unrest among Canadian troops here entirely to delay in repatriation, and protests against the military men of the dominions still fretting here in idleness and expense, and daily falling a prey to surroundings, from which they should be provided immediate escape to countries which they have represented with so much honor to themselves and their native land.

Sparks From Broken Trolley Wire Running Into Wilkesbarre Mine Ignited Car of Black Powder Attached To Train Carrying Miners To Work-Women and Children Shrieking and Crying, Endeavor To Find Trace of Relatives Among Dead.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 5.—Seventy-eight mine workers were killed and 40 injured at the Baltimore No. 2 tunnel of the Delaware and Hudson Company near here early today. A car of black powder attached to a train of cars on which the men were riding to their chambers in the mine exploded. An electric motor drew the cars. The trolley wire broke and sparks ignited the powder. Men were blown everywhere, but most





CAPITAL-LABOR NOT ISSUE NOW, **BUT COMMUNITY**

Goderich Conference Told by Mr. Thomas To Bring Men Together.

[By Staff Reporter.]
GODERICH, June 4.—"Business is a means by which, through love, we may serve one another," declared Mr. Thomas of the General Conference of the Methodist Church, speaking here last night before the laymen's session of the London Conference. "Our task is to aid in bringing about conditions so that modern industries can give aid to the soul.

is to aid in bringing about conditions so that modern industries can give aid to the soul.

"A man may get stirred with the spirit of Christianity, but when he comes to consider his stock in the Union Pacific Railway, which killed and maimed thousands of lives, he wonders how he dare keep it, or even unload it on someone else. Then he thinks of his position as a citizen, simply remaining helpless while the state permits bad housing conditions and poor salaries, and thus kills more babies in Canada in one year than the whole death list at the front. And, again, he knows his fife is not Christian. His will then be perfectly willing, but he

knows his life is not Christian. His will then be perfectly willing, but he is helpless before the unchristian conditions about him which force themselves upon him.

"What can we do about it? Some say, 'Hurrah, boys! We've got our Flavelle, and are perfectly organized against him.' I say that is no way to do. We have got to keep on attacking evils, but leave persons alone."

have got to keep on attacking evils, but leave persons alone."

Parsons Controversy.

Mr. Thomas referred to the controversy between the Methodist Church and Mr. Parsons, ex-president of the Manufacturers' Association of Canada, on the question of labor.

"I tell you what Mr. Parsons says is absolutely untrue. Yet attacks are good for us. When we must face things like that, it shows that the world is moving. It is not the work of the church to lay down the details of a reformed business world, but it the work of the church to say that the Christian motive of love shall be supreme.

"The issue today does not concern labor and capital. That is a back number. The issue today is the relation of the community as a great mass of men and women with that particular aspect of its life on which depends its food and clothes. What we ask is that the state bring them together.

and clothes. What we ask is that the state bring them together.

"Labor unrest has come because of the superior education of the labor leaders and the lack of education on the part of the capitalists. Isn't it about time we quit talking about ignorance? The ranks of unskilled labor in Canada are honeycombed with university men thoroughly mastered in economics.

Christian Men Met.

"The church realized this, and in Vancouver the great clash was averted because 80 Christian men met and studied the situation there. I venture to say that if this had been done in Toronto the strike would never have been.

"So the church asks its men as a consecrated labor to study this question, to pray, and be patient, and not to use the words Bolshevik and socialism, of which we do not know the meaning."

GODERICH, June 4.—The county council meeting here has received several important deputations. The Y. M. C. A. is asking for the renewal of a grant of \$2.400 made last year. This was paid up to \$1.200, but the rest was cancelled, as it was thought to be no longer necessary. The association is claiming the adidtional \$1,200. A deputation was also received from Lambton County asking Huron County to pay half for the repair of a bridge at Grand Bend on the boundary line between the two counties. The county of Huron says that the bridge is wholly in the county of Lambton, and refuses to do anything. On the other hand the county of Lambton disclaims any responsibility in case of accident.

Representatives from the village of Exeter presented their claim to be a high school district. A movement was also brought forward for consideration, which has been fostered by the Teachers' Association, asking for improvements, planting of trees, etc.

Several resolutions were submitted, asking that the council give \$50,000 or more for hospitals. Delegations were present from Goderich, Clinton, Wingman and Seaforth.

The department of public highways granted \$20,685.67 as under the highway improvements tax on county roads made in 1918.

A resolution was also put forward by two councillors favoring the abolition of capital punishment.







> TAKES HEAVY TOLL OF WORK HORSES

Farmers, Already Behind in Work, Worried Over the Present Situation.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
INGERSOLL, June 4.—Throughout the surrounding districts horses have been dying daily since the beginning of the present heat wave, and the list has grown until the situation is unusually alarming.
The deaths during the last eight or ten days will probably aggregate 40, and the farmers, already worried over the delay on their seeding operations, have had matters compliover the delay on their seeding operations, have had matters complicated by the danger to which they and their horses have been exposed on account of the almost unprecedented heat. The majority of horses that have died in this district were taken to the fertilizer factory here. On one day, soon after the beginning of the hot spell, ten dead animals were received. On another day eight bodies were received, all in each case having died from the extreme heat.

Every succeeding day has added its quota to the list. Today, it was stated, five calls had been received at the factory to send out for the bodies of horses. 
