LAST SAD RITES FOR P. M. LOVE

Order of the Funeral Which Will Be Held On Monday Afternoon Next. OLDFRIENDPALLBEARERS

Family Receive Very Many Messages of Condolences in Their Hour of Affliction.

The funeral of Magistrate Love, which will be held on Monday afternoon to Woodland Cemetery, will be one of the most imposing that has ever been held in London.

The services will commence in St. Andrew's Church at 10 o'clock, and one hour before that time the doors will be opened, as the remains will lie in state.

At the conclusion of the service, which will be conducted by Rev. Dr. Ross, the cortege will form up on Queen's avenue.

Rev. Dr. Ross will lead, followed by all the members of the police force in command of Chief Williams.

The active pallbearers will be six members of the police force, including Detectives Nickel and Egelton.

The honorary pallbearers will be Samuel Munro, of John Marshall & Co.; R. H. Dignam, registrar; J. A. Cairncross, J. B. McKillop, county coroner; Hon. Adam Beck, M. P.; ex-Mayor W. M. Spencer and T. G. Meredith, K. C., city solicitor.

So many flowers have been received from friends throughout the city and from outside points that it will be necessary to convey them.

W. A. WILSON BEGINS SUIT TO UNSEAT ALD. GEO. E. ROSE QUALIFICATIONS ARE DISPUTED

Action Is Entered By Mr. J. M. McEvoy, While Sir Geo. C. Gibbons and Mr. N. Parke Graydon Will Defend Mr. Rose's Seat—Mr. Wilson Claims the Council Honor.

There is likely to be some trouble over the qualifications of Ald. G. E. Rose.

Yesterday proceedings were taken on behalf of Mr. W. A. Wilson, thirteenth man in the recent elections, by Mr. J. M. McEvoy, to upset the qualifications of Ald. Rose, and thus prevent him from taking his seat in the council.

Ald. Rose does not care to sit idly by, and allow the matter to go by default. He has secured as counsel Mr. N. Parke Graydon, who with Sir George C. Gibbons, K. C., will make a battle for the position.

For some time there have been rumors that the qualifications of certain aldermen would be carefully scrutinized. In fact, those of Ald. P. G. Mitchell, Ald. James Donnelly, and Ald. Rose were gone carefully into.

There was absolutely no chance of unseating Ald. Mitchell, and there seems to be no possible chance of keeping Ald. Donnelly from taking his place on Monday next.

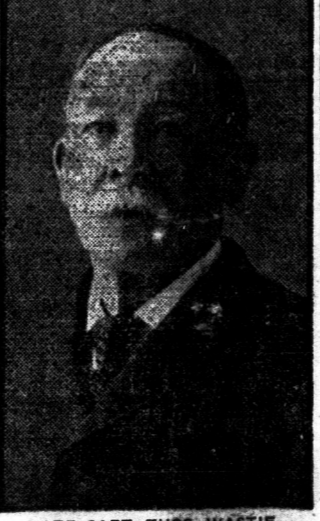
Ald. Rose was the only member whom it seems possible to get at, and Mr. Wilson is going after him at once.

MR. McEVoy SPEAKS. "Yes, I have been instructed to take action against Ald. Rose," said Mr. J. M. McEvoy. "I was informed that he would resign, but if that is not the case, legal proceedings will have to be taken. That is all I have to say."

"I understand that an effort is to be made to disqualify me," declared Ald. Rose. "I have more than enough property to qualify on, but if by any means there is a technicality on which they can put me out, I want to know it. Mr. Parke Graydon, and I expect Sir George Gibbons, will look after my interests. I guess we might as well go the limit. I would not want to take a seat to which the people had not elected me, if it was not mine legally."

LABOR MEN DISPLEASED. A number of Labor leaders in the city discussed the matter, and they are certainly far from pleased at the action taken.

REMAINS WERE LAID AT REST

Funeral of Late John W. Pocock Was Held This Morning to St. Peter's.

A REQUIEM HIGH MASS Beautiful Floral Tributes—Irish Benevolent Society Lost Three Prominent Members Since May Last.

The funeral of Mr. John W. Pocock, of Toronto, who died very suddenly, was held this morning from the residence of his brother, Mr. Phillip Pocock, 360 Queen's avenue, to St. Peter's Cathedral, and was very largely attended.

Requiem high mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Kennedy, of Sarnia, a relative of Mrs. J. W. Pocock, and he was assisted by Fathers Aylward and Tierney.

The pallbearers were Messrs. Senator Coffey, Stephen Grant, John Forristal, Joseph F. Nolan, James Hickey, of Toronto, and T. M. King, of Toronto.

Among the large number of beautiful floral offerings which were received from friends in London and Toronto was a magnificent wreath, which had a wide streamer on it with the words "From the Irish Benevolent Society of London," in letters of gold.

The London Shoe Company also sent a splendid "Aid" to St. Peter's. Interment was made at St. Peter's Cemetery.

During the past year death has been very busy amongst the members of the Irish Benevolent Society. The society has lost three of its most prominent members, Dr. John D. Whelan, Ald. Donnelly, and Mr. J. W. Pocock, since May last.

PRESIDENT TAFT IN BIG HURRY BUT CANADIANS ARE CAUTIOUS

Washington Dispatches Intimate That There Will Be No Revolutionary Changes in Canadian Tariff as Result of Reciprocity Conference—U. S. Government Anxious to Pacify Insurgents.

(Special to The Advertiser.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 7.—That no revolutionary changes will be brought about in the Canadian tariff as a result of the meeting in this city of Messrs. Fielding and Paterson with the United States Government over the question of reciprocal trade relations is practically guaranteed by assurances which reached our correspondents through a semi-official and wholly reliable channel.

Another estimate may be confidently set down, namely, that the recent conference on reciprocity held at Ottawa, and which the late Henry M. Hoyt declared to be "eminently satisfactory to the United States," was, in plainer words, a deadlock, with few signs of progress.

Canadian Cautious. In other words, it is understood that the Canadian representatives, through the negotiation and in the presence of Washington conference, have followed a policy of such elaborate caution that the urgent programme of the Republican Government had been at important points checked, and at all intents defeated. This does not mean, however, that the negotiations have been abandoned altogether, or that some tangible understanding acceptable to the Canadian and American people may not be the outcome, but that in all likelihood there will be no surprising disturbance to the present schedule of duties in either country.

Taft in a Hurry. Haste is an imperative necessity with President Taft and his colleagues in driving home some measure of tariff concession that will pacify the Republican insurgents, and a great deal of the election ammunition of the Democrats. To get a treaty ratified by the Senate, as must needs be, he is allowed 53 working days before March 4, when the session must close. In this very brief period he must complete the joint commission's conference, and submit the treaty for treaty it will likely be, if any agreement materializes—to the House of Representatives in the form of a bill containing all the details.

LONDON'S FIRST FIRE CHIEF DEAD. Captain Thomas Wasie Passes Away in California. ORGANIZED DEPARTMENT YEARS AGO WAS PROMINENT IN MILITARY AFFAIRS OF THIS CITY.

Word of his death was received by his sister-in-law, Mrs. Robt. Kliner, Burwell street, this city.

Among the old residents of this city Capt. Wasie was a well-known figure.

For many years he was captain of a company in the Seventh Regiment. He was a popular soldier, and old members of the regiment testify to his ability in matters military.

He was given the task of organizing the paid fire department. In the early days fire-fighting was done altogether by volunteers.

For years he was connected with the excursion steamers on the River Thames. He was captain of the ill-fated Victoria, but left London in the spring before the accident, going direct to California, where he had since resided.

Deceased is survived by one son, Edward Wasie, who is in Montana, and four daughters—Mrs. Geo. V. Fraser, Vancouver; Mrs. Frank Fuller, San Francisco; Mrs. C. Ravlin, Portland, Ore.; and Miss Clara, at home.

Fort Hope, Jan. 7.—The unknown man who was drowned in the harbor here is believed to be a man named W. P. Fishley, who registered at St. Lawrence Hall and has been missing since late Thursday night. He was believed to come from Western Ontario. He is about 40 years of age.

Associated Press Cable.] Madrid, Spain, Jan. 7.—What is believed by many to have been an attempt upon the life of King Alfonso occurred during his brief visit here on Thursday, and threw his attendants in a panic. The facts became generally known for the first time today.

At the railway station his majesty was proclaimed by a great throng that joyously followed the carriage in which he drove with the mayor to the palace of the governor-general.

Arriving at the palace the king stepped down from the carriage and turning for a moment again acknowledged the salute of applause, and then entered the palace. As the door swung closed behind him an explosion in the crowd outside drowned the cheers before the alarmed and stampeded host fully realized just what had happened.

GUARDING THE EYESIGHT.

Don't go to sleep or even take a nap in such a position that your eyes will open directly on the light when awakening. 4. When a book or magazine has to be held at arm's length in reading, it is a sign that glasses are needed. Don't delay in having your eyes tested. 5. Always hold your head erect when you read and hold your book fourteen inches from your face. 6. Use a shade over every light, even a candle. Shades are cheap, or they can be easily made. To these specific rules should be added the following: Be sure, when reading, that the light is clear and good, neither too yellow nor too white. Avoid books or papers indistinctly printed or in small type. Educators and school officials are coming to realize the importance of safeguarding the eyesight. "Proper care of the eyes," says Ella Plaque Young, Chicago's superintendent of schools, "is one of the essentials of education." She, therefore, recommends that concise directions, embodying the ideas here stated, be printed on the front flyleaf of every school book.

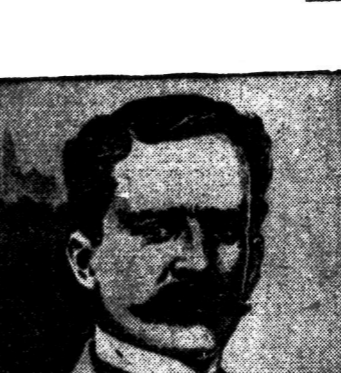

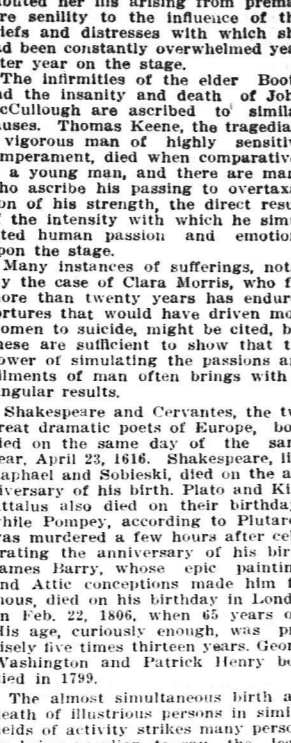

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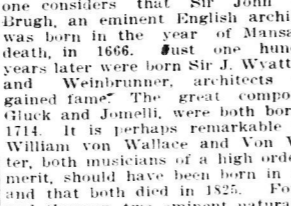

COMIC OPERA JAILS.



Prison life in Switzerland is more of a luxury than a punishment. The comic opera jail at Thorberg, where the inmates did as they pleased, has only recently been suppressed by the Bernese authorities, yet details are published of a similar institution at Sarnen, in the canton of Oswald. Sarnen is apparently an ideal penal resort for the happy criminals who are sentenced to terms of "detention" in that institution have a far better time than hundreds of "free" Swiss citizens who are forced to earn their bread. A correspondent of a Lausanne paper states that he was passing through Sarnen when he saw a number of men dressed in dark blue clothes with white stripes, walking about the village smoking and joking. Others were seated in a cafe and some were working in leisurely manner carrying bricks for the construction of a new building. To his astonishment, the correspondent found that the men were convicts from the cantonal prison close by. These convicts are permitted to leave the prison early in the morning and find work around Sarnen or walk about the country until nightfall, when they return of their own accord to prison. They are unaccompanied by a warder and there is nothing to prevent their escaping, but they are far too comfortable to think of relinquishing their quarters, for they have as much liberty as other men and are, moreover, fed and lodged for nothing. The money earned by these convicts who choose to work is spent as they like. One convict who is employed as a gardener by a local magistrate sends his monthly salary to his wife and children. Two or three convicts "escaped" not long ago, but they eventually returned to the prison in a half-famished condition and after being severely reprimanded they were allowed to return to their apartments.

A PRANK OF THE SEA.



Some years ago a certain Captain Hodson, afterward an inspector in the Honolulu customs force, had a remarkable experience when the schooner of which he was in command was caught in a storm. While Hodson stood with the man at the wheel, to see that the schooner was kept ahead of the wind, an enormous wave swept the vessel from stern to bow, throwing the wheelman flat on his face, and tossing the captain overboard. As Hodson was swept over the side into the foaming water the ropes holding a boom broke and let the hook drop to the deck, with one end hanging over the side of the schooner. A broken rope dangling from this end hit the captain on the head, and instinctively he seized it. The speed of the vessel dragged him along until he finally weathered the storm and brought the schooner and her cargo safely to port. It is thought that this is the only instance on record of a man having been washed overboard and then washed back again.

Uncle Sam Studying Great Salt Lake

Special Investigation Being Made by the Geological Department.

The present behavior and past history of Great Salt Lake is attracting more and more attention each year, and is now the subject of a special investigation by the United States Geological Survey. The United States Weather Bureau precipitation records, beginning in 1862, present a comparatively accurate record of the levels of Great Salt Lake dating back to the year 1826. In 1826 the lake stood at three feet. In 1868 the water rose to fourteen feet, dropped to seven feet five inches in 1877. The lake then gradually lowered until the water stood at two feet two inches in 1902, and the water has gradually risen, reaching the six-foot mark in May, 1910. The lake is now falling.

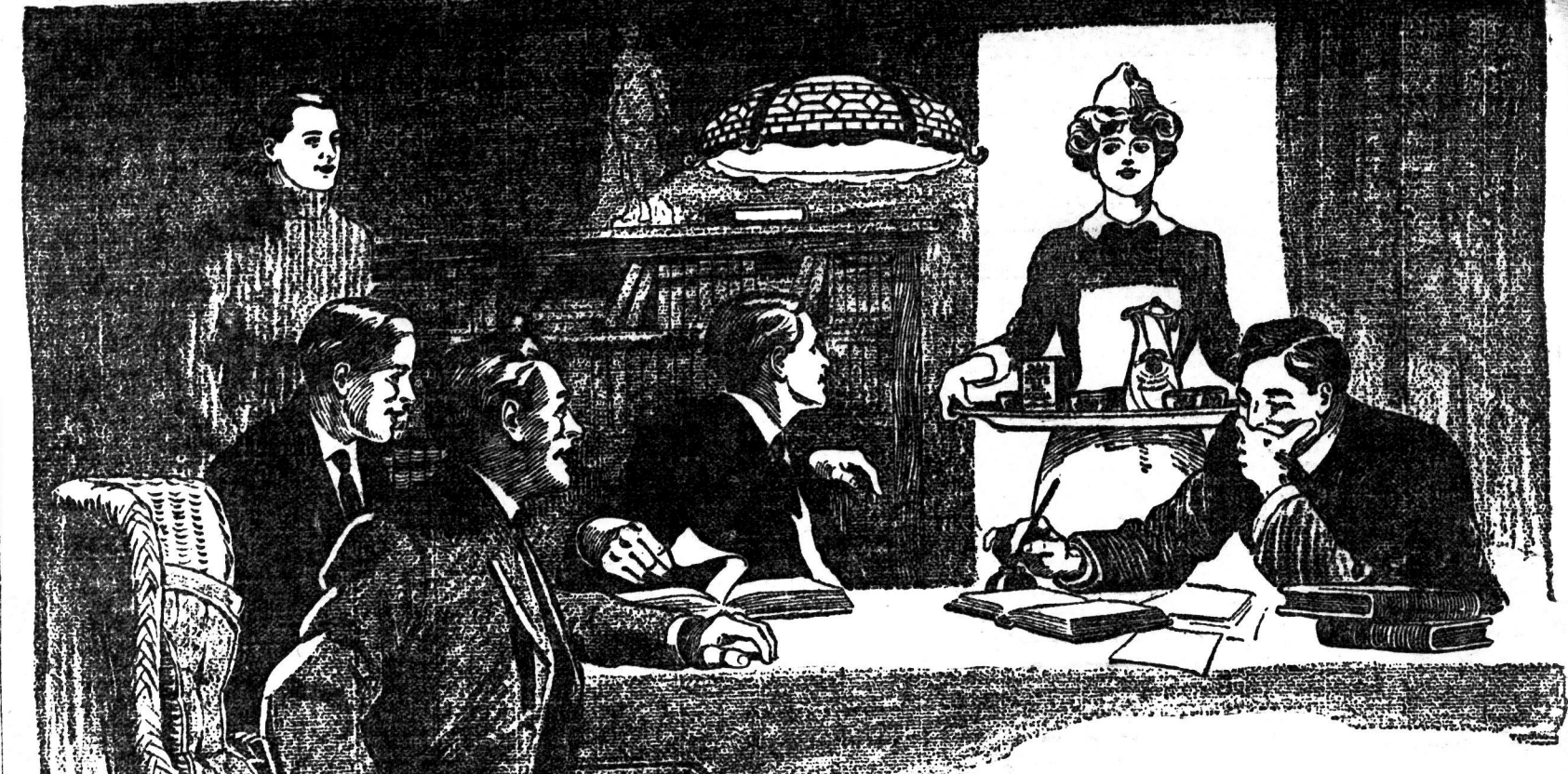

PERSIA TO FRANCE ON HORSEBACK

British Consul of Shiraz Makes a Remarkable Journey.

Mr. J. H. Bill, British Consul at Shiraz, Persia, recently arrived in England after travelling 2,500 miles on horseback from Southern Persia to France.

Mr. Bill left his post in Shiraz in April with one Indian orderly, a Persian servant, and three ponies, and slept at night in the Persian villages. For ten days out of Shiraz no incident of importance occurred, but the roads were very unsmooth. The post caravan immediately following his own was attacked and robbed. The consul and his party safely reached Shukistan.

After two months' travelling the consul reached the Turkish frontier at Urumiah, and a week later started for Van which he reached after ten days' ride through magnificent mountain scenery. In the Turkish territory he was struck by the good order prevailing on what were supposed to be dangerous roads. Mr. Bill
