The progress in rape culture in England is one of the marvels of latter-day husbandry, says a London letter. Five years ago the plant was little known and less understood. Last year millions of aeres were devoted to its culture, and other millions of necess will be added to its broad green compain the present year. All prodomain the present year. All pro-gressive English and Canadian shep-berds cultivate it, and the perfection of their flocks attests it great value. The English and Canadian shepherd The English and Caradian shepherd cultivate it mainly for sheep, but pro-gressive American farmers are turn-ing it to broader uses, having found it quite as profitable as a grazing and wolling plant for their cattle and

To say that rape is revolutionizing To say that rape is revolutionizing the sheep industry in England, observes the correspondent, is putting the case none too strong. It adds immiesasely to the popular tendency the part of the case as the strong of the case tearrying capacity of the farm. It tides the sheep farmer over the dry bot season when the grasses are dead

and the fields are brown.

Generically, rape belongs to the same order as cabbage, kale, turnips, etc., and is a grazing and soiling plant, not susceptible of conversion into how. It may be sown broadcass? plant, nor susceptible of contrastors into hay. It may be sown broadcass or planted in drills from 26 to 30 inches apart, if desired for cultivathe plough or cultivat From 4 to 5 pounds of seed may be used for seeding broadcast, and from 2 to 3 rounds per acre if planted in

growth, it is without a rival; growing on good rich soils to a height of 12 on good rich sold or 8 weeks, and in its growth 3 to 4 feet high, producing 20 to 30 tons of feed to the acre. Sheep, 20 to 80 tons of feed to the acre. Sheep, cattle or swine may be turned into the field of rape when it has reached a height of 10, 12 or 15 inches, the owner using caution to limit sheep or cattle to an hour, ot less, of grazing for the first four or five days to prevent the possibility of bloating until they are accustomed to the feed.

For early summer grazing, rape should be sown about oat-seeding time, in April or May, according to latitude, and for late summer and fall feeding, it may be sown in June, July and early August. It may be sown alone for a full early crop, or sown alone for a full early crop, or sown with oats, in which case it makes slow growth until the oats are harvested, when it comes forward with great rapidity. It is often sown with great rapidity. It is often sown on oats, wheat or barley stubble, with-out ploughing, and harrowed in with a light tooth harrow; in this way making an abundance of fall feed. As making an abundance of lan reed. As a supplemental crop, however, it is more extensively sown in corn, by penttering the seed ahead of the cul-tivator at time of last cultivation. The corn shades and protects the young corn shades and protects the young plant during its early growth, and within six or eight weeks lambs may be turned in for weaning. Rape in the cornfield is a paradise for lambs te ore corn harvest, and makes a splendid fall feed for sheep, cattle or swine when the rorn is harvested. In a good plan to use about 2 pounds of rape seed mixed with 1-2 pound of common flat turnip seed for each acre. The same mixture may be pro-fitably used in seeding with oats, or on stubble land.

While the population increased 60 per cent. One of the causes of change is the whole modern movement of liberation—of subjects from sovereigns, slaves from masters, wives from husbands, and children from parents. Another is the disappearance of the ecclesiastical view of marriage. A more special cause has been the growth of large cities, which completely alter the environment of the organism. Men become less dependent on women for their home needs, and women have resources and interests which the simple life of the country denies them. Then, too, attachments formed on slight acquaintance of underlying traits of character are less likely to prove lasting. The number of marriages among women of higher education is less than among the uneducated. Of 1,486 ex-students of the chief women's colleges of England only 20s married. The new economic opportunities for women of the middle class rival the domestic and social life which marriage affers, and also bring into the individual. Among the working class marriages are not less frequent; but the home is apt to be less comfortable on account of the tendency of women to go out to work. In the light of these facis it is held by many that the monegamic family is a relic of a decaying form of civilization.—Philadelphia Press.



The well-known agriculturist, W. D. Hoard of Wisconsin, was greeted with a round of applause at the recent New York dairy convention when he stepped forward to speak on the conformation of the dairy cow, says The American Agriculturist, The various posits were litustrated as brought out by large charts on the stage. He said in part as follows: Form is everything to purpose. Every machine has its specific form, according to its purpose. Students of the cow have gradually come to believe in this theory, as applied to the cow. A dairy cow must have a dairy form, even as the race horse has a racing form. Temperament establishes form. Four animals, a race horse, a dairy cow, a sheep and a goat, are feeding side by side, from the same bale of hay. The horse gains speed, the cow milk, the sheep mutton, the goat—well, I de not really know what the goat would gain, unless it was to become the butt of ridicule. The dairyman must show as much intelligence in dealing with the laws of nature, as the banker, lawyer or merchant does in dealing with the laws of man. Become as little children, teachable.

In judging a cow do not rely too much on the scale of points, for it is not our rect. There is no straight back, from the horns down, in a good dairy cow; there is a street of a beef cow. r Their Care and Instruction—"ost of Their Maint-nance Over a Million —8177 Persons Taken Care of.

According to Commissioner Wright's latest report. 15 states of the Union are supporting institutions for the care and instruction of feeble minded persons of all ages. The outlay for grounds and buildings for their use is \$4,040,000. The annual expenditure for their support is \$1,362,000. As caretakers and teachers 823 persons are employed, and the number of pupils or immates is 8,177 of whom about 55 per cent are men.

Against Those

Who Treated Childhood Inh Dickens and Froebel and Their Work for Children

Work for Children

Froebel and Dickens, it is claimed, are the best interpreters of Christ's ideals of childhood. The philosophy of Froebel and the stories of Dickens are in perfect harmony. The two great reformers protested vigorously against the interference of intermeddling adults with the full development of the individuality of the child. They recognized the divinity in each child so fully that they objected to all "stamping and molding" processes by which its self-hood was dwarfed or warped. Other educators and reformers had considered the problems of human evolution from the standpoint of the adult and had asked, "What can we do to fit the child for its work?" Froebel and Dickens asked, "How can we help the child to grow by its own self activity?" They were the great apostles of childhood. They began the struggle for the freedom of childhood from the restrictive interference of adulthood.

dom of childhood from the restrictive interference of adulthood.

Dickens is commonly regarded merely as an educational critic. This is a narrow and unfair view. He was a great critic. He aroused the indignation of the civilized world against those who treated childhood inhumanly, and the hatred of adult tyranny which he awakened developed a loving sympathy for children. But he could not have so clearly exposed the wrong in education without having a definite conception of the right. He was the greatest destructive educational critic, but he was also a most advanced, positive, constructive a most advanced, positive, constructive educator There is no great ideal of the "new education" which is not revealed by Dickens in his novels or his miscel-

laneous writings
Dickens was the first Englishman of Dickens was the first Englishman of note to advocate the kindergagen. In July, 1855, he published an article of 11 columns in Household Words, which would take a leading place if compared with the papers read at a meeting of the International Kindergarten union today.—James L. Rough Hark on this Trees.

The gradual shickening of bark on trees is often objected to as an evidence of unthriftiness. But it almost always comes on trees when they get to be of bearing age, and except for harboring the cocoons of the codelling moth it does no harm. Soraping this bark off through the winter removes the protection and the cocoon stypesd to snow and rain periables. These cuck one will be usually found en the side opposite where the prevailing wind blows, as this is partly protected against the beating rains, especially if the tree trunk leans that way. Only the bark that readily comes off should be removed. Scraping the trunk down to the green bark will cause some kinds of trees to sun scald and is injurious. Make the tree grow vigorously and the rough bark will roil off of itself or with very little effort.

FIRED BY A FIEND

The Andrew's Conflagration in New York City

Was Not an Accident-Threatening Letters Were Sent.

New York, April 10.-Despite reticence on the part of the police facts have become public which make it ap-pear that the fire ir the Andrews house by which twelve persons perished was of incendiary orgin. It transpired that a few, hours before the flames were seen a policeman was sent for from the Andrews house, and was mysteriously dismissed by a servant, who said he was not wanted. Letters threatsning the lives of the Andrews and the children were found. It is believed that the motive for the incendiarism was revenge and that the affair arose out of a quarrel among the servants. Until some arrests are made it will be practically impossible to unravel what now seems to have been a plot. Foley, the butler in the Andrews family, is under surveillance, and the police are hard at work investigating the clues, which chiefly rest upon the anonymous letters. Had Mary Flangan lived the police would probably have been able to quickly determine whether the suspicious they now harbor are correct or otherwise. The letters made charges against Mary Flangan in the butler. The writer said in part:—'I hope you and Mrs. Andrews don't think for one moment that I am reconciled or pacified with Mary Flangan, for indeed I am not, and what is further I never will until I get my revenge. I feel that I have given warning enough and I am going to fix her for life, and because you and Mrs. Andrews did not give heed to warning I'm going to fix you, too. I'm going to make some one throw something in your nurses' and children's faces that will disfigure them and eat all the feel off the bone. It is the postical medium of expression for what is not in the province of literature of sculpture, of painting, of acting or of architecture. In the Roman arenas trumpets of various kinds were used, all the military musical instruments were of brass, and comprised the tuba, a straight trumpet, like the modern post horn, near in shape; the arena of horn, bent nearly in the form of a circle; the litnut, or clarion, slightly bent at the end; and the buccina, shaped like a horn, but of much greater size, the tube being twelve feet long.
