The City Council established a com mendable precedent at their meeting last Monday evening, when they refused to re-open the Joseph street pavement matter, after it had once been settled to the satisfaction of the majority of the residents on the

In times gone past the aldermer have been put to no end of trouble, through pavement contractors and promotors, with their petitions, counter petitions, withdrawals, etc. until they look for trouble whenever they hear of a new pavement being promoted. When the original Joseph street petition came in, it was commented upon as being the cleanest and most unanimous petition ever presented at the board, and it was thought so much of, that the by-law was immediately put through.

The Council, therefore, deserv credit for unanimously refusing to grant the request of a few agitators on the street who wished to re-open the matter for the consideration of another petition which would only cause delays and wrangling. isfaction that The Planet notes the fact that the Council have directed an inspection of the market building, and will receive a report, from an expert, on the condition of the building before they accept the work. This is indeed a wise proceedure, in view of the fact that so many complaints have been recorded in connection with this structure. Ald. fit to be accepted. Nothing should be left undone in safeguarding the city's interests, and in seeing that the citizens receive full value for the money they expend in public works. The matter of the investigation is safe in the hands of Ald. Potter and the other members of the Property committee, whe will see that written statements are obtained from the architect and con-tractor, before the final accounts are settled.

The Council made no mistake when they decided to request Mr. H. S. Clements, M. P., to represent the city at the Convention at Ottawa, which has been called for the purpose of considering the question of tuberculosis. New York and Paris Capital Is Finance ing An Army Expedition to Capture Venezuela.

New York, April 3 .- One of the large est merchants in New York said Sunday night that arrangements are being perfected here and in Paris for a revolution in Venezuela which will annihilate Castro and open up that country to American capital and enterprise.

A number of rich New York merchants are said to be interested in the movement, which the promoters declare will involve the employment of 15.000 soldiers and the expenditure of 15.000 soldiers and the expenditure of

15,000 soldiers and the expenditure of \$5,000,000 in the campaign. President Castro, if the plans do not go astray, is to be expelled or destroyed and a na-tive Venezuelan statesman to be in-

stalled as his successor.
In this connection it is said that Castro, anticipating a successful revolution against him sooner or later, has converted some of his alleged \$40,000,000 fortune into cash and has sent it to America and France.





Henry and his wife lived harmoniously enough until the King met Anne Boleyn. Then his Majesty's royal conscience betan to trouble him. In marrying Catharine he had become the husband of his deceased brother's wife. This was a victation of the rule laid down by the Church, and the only remedy that he could see was a declaration that the marriage was invalid, whereupon he PRINCESS ENA OF BATTENBERG. marriage was invalid, whereupon he

marriage was invalid, whereupon he would do penance by marrying Anne Boleyn, whom he liked better. This situation was the forerunner of the Reformation. The King repudiated the supremacy of Rome in order to repudiate the contract with his wife.

Henry's daughter, Queen Mary, who was also the daughter of Catharine of Aragon, made a Spanish marriage that was equally miserable. Mary had been betrothed to Charles V. of Spain, and the marriage was to have followed in due course. But when her father divorced her mother, who was a Spaniard, the Spanish monarch declined to divorced her mother, who was a Spaniard, the Spanish monarch declined to hold to the bargain, Of course, Henry could not reasonably expect Charles to accept his daughter as Queen of Spain after he had declared that his marriage with the young lady's mother was not valid. But Mary waited. Her lover—if he really was a lover—made another alliance, and had a son—Philip. This gentleman Mary married after she had become Queen of England. Philip was not a good husband. He was brutal in his conduct to the Queen, and his influence was exerted against the Protestants of England. To his power over Mary is attributed in some quarters the terrible religious conficts of that period. These disturbances are chalked up against Spain, and the account will never be obliterated.

While England had a prejudice

while England had a prejudice against the Spanish owing to the operations of Philip, the feeling was intensified by what occurred later on. Philip was personally so well satisfied with the position of consort to the English Queen that after the death of Mary and the accession of Elizabeth

he sought marriage with the new monarch. Elizabeth toyed with the proposition, but finally rejected the suitor. The theory prevails that Spain would bring Britain under the Papal jurisdiction, either by craft or by force, if it could, and that the only way to prevent such a situation is to avoid the Spaniards.

The Princess Ena, in her matrimonial movements, is met by this historic prejudice. She is also faced with the opposition of the British to the transference of a British Royal personage to the Catholic Church. "There are on the other side at the present time mountains of hard coal, but there is an alarming scarcity of soft coal. Therefore, it was thought wise to use discretion. If the supplies were to run out, private and civic works, which are larger consumers of soft coal, would certainly suffer thereby. It is a well-known fact that the P. M. supplies coal to nearly all of the manufactories west of Toronto, and the railway company must protect themselves in the matter of these contracts.
