### THE KNIGHTS AT RICHMOND

Adoption of the Revised Constitution—A Women's Appeal.  
The Knights of Labor at Richmond, Va., Oct. 16.—At the session of the Knights of Labor to-day the consideration of the revised constitution was continued. Section 1, relating to name, jurisdiction and membership, was passed without dissent. Section 2, relating to the constitution of the General Assembly and representation, was amended so as to change the basis of representation from one delegate for every 1000 members to one for every 500, and to make an allowance for mileage payable by the General Assembly. It was then adopted. Section 3, relating to the General Assembly, was adopted after two amendments had been amended so as to read: "Any general officer, whether a representative or not, is eligible to re-election."
