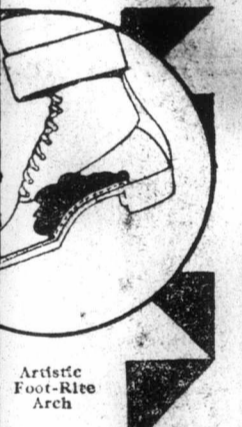

THREE BIG GANGS OF MEN AT WORK ON NEW RAILWAY

Courier Reporter Goes Over The Road Yesterday--Work is Being Rushed Ahead to Complete Brantford and Galt Line this Year--1100 Men will Find Employment this Year on New Road.

A Courier representative, on his own initiative, took a trip to Galt yesterday to see what was doing with reference to the Lake Erie & Northern Railway.

GRADING STARTED. Grading has been started between Paris and the Harrisburg line of the Grand Trunk. A big steam shovel is being unloaded to help handle this section of the enterprise.

TO GALT THIS YEAR. The plan of the company is said to be to have the work accomplished in sections, so that the entire line between Brantford and Galt and Brantford and Port Dover will be graded by about Nov. 1st.

THE SERVICE. There will be an hourly service all over the line, and Galt will be made in sixty minutes and Simcoe in sixty minutes.

COAL AND STEEL. It is expected to carry coal and steel from there to Brantford, Paris, Galt, Berlin, Preston, Hespler, and so on, and very likely to Toronto over the C.P.R. tracks.

ADAM BECK SAYS HE'LL FIGHT

He Dares Toronto to Load Hydro Up With Old Company.

Startling Interview is Handled Out To-day in Toronto Paper.

[Canadian Press Despatch]

ORONTO, Ont., April 19--The Evening Telegram publishes a startling interview with Controller Church in today's issue in which the attitude of Hon. Adam Beck towards the proposed sale of the Toronto Electric Light and Toronto Railway Companies to the city, is put forth with dramatic emphasis.

"I don't believe in secret meetings," said Controller Church, "and I only wish that the citizens of Toronto could have heard the appeal that we heard from Adam Beck."

"Mr. Beck went on to say that the whole Toronto electric system, stock, lock and barrel was not worth \$1,000,000 to the Hydro system.

HOPE FAITH AND CHARITY ALL DEAD

GREENWICH, Conn., April 19.--The death here of Mrs. Hope Trower Alicorn, the last of the triplets born in England 80 years ago and named Faith, Hope and Charity, was announced to-day.

New Light is Shed on Prolonged Opposition to Navy Bill--It Was a Means to An End.

A PERTINENT QUERY. OTTAWA, April 19--The prevailing uncertainty as to who is really leading the Opposition is expressed in the following question, of which notice was given last night by Dr. Edwards of Frontenac:

"Is the Government aware that the Indemnity Act provides for the payment of \$7,000 each year to the recognized leader of the Opposition? Can the Government inform the House to whom the above mentioned salary will be paid this session?"

OTTAWA, April 19--Things are happening in the Opposition. The events which led up to the early morning row in the House yesterday have brought the leadership competition to the point where there must be a show-down.

It is now evident that the aspirations of Mr. Pugsley were the first consideration, the blockade itself being a means to the end rather than an end in itself.

Graham Pathos. The campaign has been partly successful. Hon. George F. Gammie, the former first minister and, whose parent has been shadowed in the background, the Pugsley group have supplanted him.

It is said that this will be his last session, that he will resign his hardy won refuge in South Renfrew and go into business. It is quite possible that this was foreseen by the New Brunswickers, and that the heroic efforts of Mr. Pugsley was intended to prevent the succession going to another man, E. M. Macdonald, of Picton.

Crowding the White Plume. Mr. Pugsley has been in the running against either Graham, Macdonald, or anyone else. His success has emboldened him to nibble little at the unripe fruit. He has been crowding the white plume.

When the House finally got into committee of supply in the small hours of this morning Premier Borden was willing to adjourn, the sitting having been a very long one. To his proposal that the committee rise for the purpose of adjournment Sir Wilfrid Laurier assented.

At the expiration of the hour the doors opened, and the announcement was made that the debate on the closure would conclude by the middle of next week. 12 MILLIONS STRIKE LOSS

Belgium Figures Out Loss For The First Six Days of Strike.

BRUSSELS, April 19.—Twelve million dollars is the figure compiled in trustworthy circles of Belgium's loss in the first six days of the strike for equal political rights which has been joined by about 400,000 men, or half the male working population of the country.

Two-thirds of this loss of \$2,000,000 a day falls, according to the Socialist trade union leaders, upon the employers and supporters of the existing system, and the organizers of the strike affirm that the men, by exercising self-denial, can hold out as long as the capitalists are willing to endure their deprivation of dividends for a political reason only.

All appearances go to show that the strike will continue for a considerable period, as the determination of the men is met by the equally firm rejection of any idea of compromise by Premier Charles De Broqueville and the other cabinet ministers. The Premier declares that he did not offer his resignation to King Albert on Thursday, as reported, nor will he consent to submit to a referendum of the country the demand of the men for equal suffrage.

The printers of the capital struck work at midnight, but as the newspapers were practically ready for publication at that hour, all appeared this morning. Even the men employed on the Socialist organ Le Peuple walked out, but enough will be permitted to stay to print a sheet containing strike news. Some of the evening papers came out to-day in reduced form.

The strike also extended to the tailors in Brussels to-day and there is a marked increase in the total of men who have joined the movement. From the provinces come reports of firm intention to succeed on the part of the men, while reports of minor incidents of violence have been received from various quarters, but as a rule all is pacific.

IMPORTANT MOVE AT WELLINGTON

New Scheme For the Financing of Church is Arrived at.

An important meeting of the official boards of the Wellington Street Methodist Church was held last night. The chief item of business was the receipt of the report of the finance committee, which has been making a canvass of the membership with a view to introducing a new finance scheme in connection with the affairs of the church. The report was most encouraging and showed that the members were almost unanimously in favor of the adoption of the new scheme and had showed their faith in it and the church by so increasing the amount of their weekly contributions as to cover the entire financial budget of the church for the coming year.

The boards last night received the report of the committee with pleasure and passed unanimously a resolution carrying out the recommendations of the committee, which provide that after May 1 all pews be free, no pew rents and no pew allocation, which means free pews in deed as well as in name. Further, the constant appeal for funds for the different connectional schemes of the church will be done away with. These are to be consolidated into one general fund and provided for in the church's financial budget which will be covered by the regular weekly contribution.

Prospects for the future of Wellington Street church are very bright and encouraging and consequently the officers of the church is in a happy spirit.

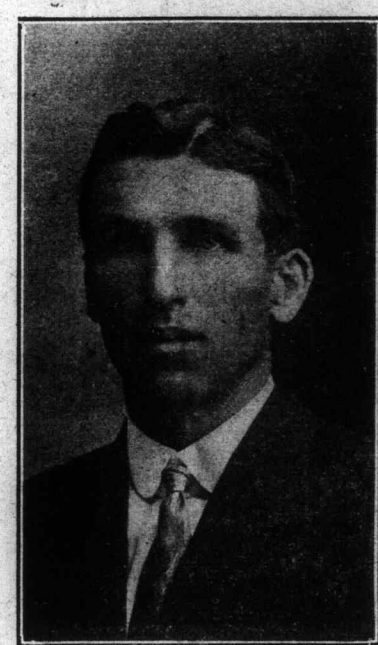

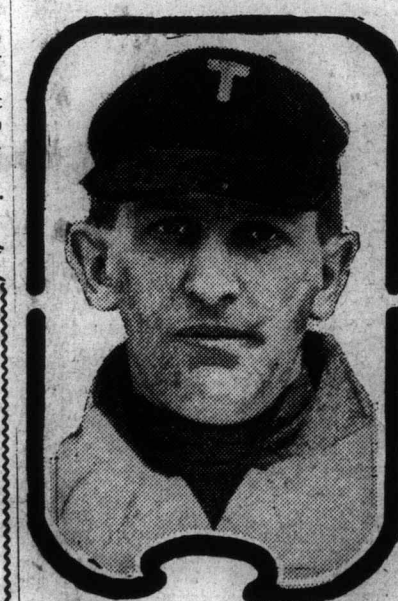

Mr. Winston Churchill Denies that the British Navy is 20,000 Men Short--Canada's Part in the Imperial Plan of Defence.

The World's Largest Ship, the Olympic is Once More Afloat.

Amid the hooting of syrens, the hoarse bellows of foghorns, the clanging of bells, and vociferous cheers from people ashore and afloat the White Star liner Olympic, the largest vessel afloat, resumed her trans-Atlantic voyages from Southampton on Wednesday.

He would turn to the amiable and helpful suggestion made by Mr. Keir Hardie, that, owing to the congestion in the shipyards, it was impossible for the admiralty to carry out their programme, and that the proposal which he (Churchill) made in all good faith and sincerity, of a naval holiday, was simply a dodge to enable us to work off our arrears.

It would be possible, if it were necessary, to begin during the present year, at least four, and probably five capital ships, in addition to the programme of five and the Malayan and to complete these in British yards in from twenty-four to thirty months.

Mr. Churchill complained of the scarcely less mischievous suggestion of Lord Charles Beresford. He had repeated the wholly untrue statement which he had been making about the country that the British Navy was 20,000 men short of its proper complement.

Lord C. Beresford's Asses'tion. There were actually 10-day 139,000 full ranks of the active service personnel of the Navy. Of these approximately 95,000 were actually on board seagoing ships, in barracks, and in training establishments, and the remainder were in the home ports.

The Canadian ships were absolutely required for the whole-world defence of the British Empire, apart altogether from the needs of Great Britain in home waters, from the beginning of 1916 onwards.

The more effect of these ships would be far more valuable than many Dreadnoughts. The difference, which separated Mr. Borden from Sir Wilfrid Laurier were not of vital importance. The Admiralty had expressed their opinion, as was their duty, as to which was the most convenient and the most helpful method for the world-wide defence of the British Empire.

Co-Partnership Measure. Mr. J. F. Hope, Unionist member for Central Sheffield, introduced the Companies Acts Amendment (Co-partnership) Bill, which seeks to promote the adoption of co-partnership by statutory and other companies.

AEROPLANES TO FIGHT GERMAN ZEPPELINS

Mr. Cody has revealed a highly ingenious plan for fighting dirigibles of the Zeppelin type.

He says: "I call my method fishing for the enemy, and that is really what it is like. My device is based on the knowledge that aeroplanes can fly faster and higher than any Zeppelin and the process has been already tested and found practicable and efficient."

Much Loose Talk. "The vessel would be absolutely at the mercy of the man in the aeroplane sailing a thousand feet above it. He could trail his bomb backwards and forwards to any point. The enemy would meanwhile have nothing to aim at with their guns except the quickly moving plane, and would have to fire upwards. I have seen experience in firing from dirigibles and I am quite sure their work would be practically useless."

"Suppose a Continental enemy has determined to attack us with a fleet of dirigibles, she will have to employ vessels that can keep flying for long periods. All that we require to destroy them is a fleet of aeroplanes that will keep flying for a few hours."

"Following after the spurts of flame that will issue from my bomb pieces of lighted tow or other material soaked in some highly inflammable spirit, which will inevitably fire any portion of the structure of the dirigible that may have escaped the first effects of the explosion."

"With an aeroplane of my own and a 3-lb. gun I could circle round and round and above any airship I know of and fire a shot through every hole of it. I have been up over 7000 feet and could easily get above them."

DASTARDLY PLOT TO DESTROY BIG PLANT

Only a whistle on Wednesday saved the lives of hundreds of men at the great iron and steel works of Messrs Guest, Keen and Nettlefolds, Cardiff.

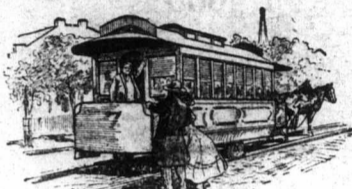

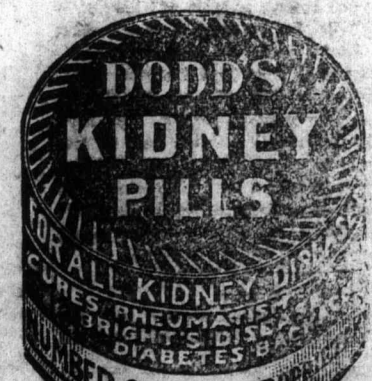

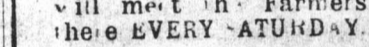
