London, Feb. 28.—The British forces on the Tigris have pur-tile Oktoman troops which fled from Kut-el-Amara fully 30 miles along the left bank of the stream, and have engaged the enemy from three sides. The scene of the fighting is on the opposite bank of the river from the Tomb of Ezra, a place of pilgrimage for the Jews. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions.

A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre

Duties—Six months residence is each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation.

Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead tent on certain conditions.
