THREE MILE LIMIT

The following are the answers given by the supreme court of Canada to the questions in the referred case as to the rights of the Dominion government and the provinces respectively, in the fisheries, sea coast and inland, submitted to the court on 23rd February, 1894, and argued two terms ago:

- 1. Did the beds of all lakes, rivers, public harbors, and other waters, or any and each of them, situated within the territorial limits of the several provinces and not granted before confederation to the British North American act of the property of the Dominion? or the property of the province in which the same respectively are situated? and is there in that respect any, and what distinction between the various classes of waters, whether salt waters, or fresh waters, tidal or non-tidal, or navigable or non-navigable, or between the so-called great lakes such as Lake Superior, Huron, Erie, etc., and other lakes, or the so-called great rivers, such as the St. Lawrence river, the Richelieu, the Ottawa, etc., and other rivers or between waters directly and immediately connected with the sea coast and waters not so connected, or between other waters and waters separating (and so far as they do separate) two or more provinces of the Dominion from one another or between other waters and waters separating (and so far as they do separate) the Dominion from the territory of a foreign nation? Ans. The beds of the waters referred to in this question did not become the property of the Dominion, but subject to any trusts existing in respect thereof, and to any interest other than that of the province in the same, and subject also to the regulations of the parliament of Canada, respecting 'seacoast and inland fisheries, trade and commerce, and shipping and navigation,' remain the property of the province in which the same are situated, without any distinction between the various classes of waters, and without any exception whatever, save the exceptions contained in sections 108 and 117 of the B. N. A. Act.
- 2. In the question as to public harbors, the court is bound by the judgment of Holmes vs. Green, which says that the beds therein belong to the Dominion. That is the title to public harbors belongs to the Dominion, but the title to all other waters is in the province.
- 3. In the act of the Dominion parliament, Revised Statutes of Canada chapter 92, entitled 'An act respecting certain works constructed in or over navigable waters,' an act which the Dominion parliament had jurisdiction to pass either in whole or in part? Ans. Yes, with the exception, perhaps, of the last part of section 9.
- 4. If not, in case the bed and banks of a lake or navigable river belong to a province, and the province makes a grant of land extending into the lake or river for the purpose of there being built thereon a wharf, warehouse or the like, has the guarantee a right to build thereon, subject to the work not interfering with the navigation of the lake or river? Ans. Yes.
- 5. In case the bed of a public harbor or any portion of the bed of a public harbor at the time of confederation had not been granted by the crown, has the province a like jurisdiction in regard to the making a grant as and for the purpose in preceding paragraph stated, subject to not thereby interfering with navigation or other

The man who made devils, angels, and other attractive things out of straws and thread

At this moment, Mr. Bailes, whom he had robbed the day preceding, was getting breakfast at Mr. Vail's, and writing advertisements in quest of the robber. About eleven o'clock, he, with the Indian, started again, leaving Mr. Vail's unknown and undetected; but not without taking with him a set of silver teaspoons from a side closet in the parlor. The time was now come for the sitting of the Court, and about eleven o'clock on Tuesday morning, the Attorney General arrived from Fredericton, with very unfavorable impressions on his mind, bringing information that the robber was still traversing the country, stealing and robbing wherever he came, without sufficient effort being made for his apprehension. The jury also was collecting from the different parishes of the County, bringing with them unfavorable ideas, from the reports in circulation concerning his escape. Among the many opinions that were formed on the subject, one, particularly, was very indigestible. The prisoner was a Freemason, and it will be recollected that Mr. Dibble, the govt. agent, was stated in a former part of the narrative to be a Freemason also, and that there was a Freemason Lodge held at Kingstown. The public mind was wrongly prejudiced against us, unwilling to believe the real circumstances of his escape, and the Court assembled under the strongest impressions that his escape was committed at The Honorable Judge Chipman presided on the occasion.- 11. Had the Dominion parliament jurisdiction to pass section 4 of the revised statutes of Canada, chapter 92, entitled 'An act respecting fisheries and fishing,' or any other of the provisions of the said act, so far as they relate to fishing in waters, the beds of which do not belong to the Dominion and are not Indian lands? Ans. Same answer.
- 12. If not, has the Dominion parliament any jurisdiction in respect of fisheries, except as provided by or from the rights incident to the ownership by the provinces and others, but (subject to such property and rights) providing for the improvement and preservation of fisheries, for example, by forbidding fish to be taken at improper seasons, preventing the undue destruction of fish by taking them in an improper manner, or with improper engines, prohibiting obstructions in ascending rivers and the like? Ans. The jurisdiction of the Dominion is limited to the passing of laws in respect of fisheries.
- 13. Had the legislature of Ontario jurisdiction to enact the 47th section of the revised statutes of Ontario, chapter 24, entitled 'An act respecting the sale and management of public lands,' and sections 5 to 8, both inclusive, and sections 10 and 21 both inclusive, of the Ontario act of 1892, entitled 'An act for the protection of the provincial fisheries, or any, and which of such several sections, or any and which parts thereof respectively? Ans. Clauses 7 of the O. R. S., ch. 24, is intra vires; and likewise the sections referred to of the Ontario fisheries act, as far as they relate to public harbors and other Dominion property within sections 108 and 117 of the B. N. A. Act, and also when inconsistent with Dominion regulations on 'land fisheries.'
- 14. Had the legislature of Quebec jurisdiction to enact sections 1375 to 1378, inclusive, of the revised statutes of Quebec, or any and which of the said sections, or any and which parts thereof? Ans. Yes, except when inconsistent with Dominion regulations on 'Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.'
- 15. Has a province jurisdiction in legislation in regard to providing highways in dams, slides and other constructions, and otherwise to regulate and protect fisheries within the province, subject to laws passed by the Dominion parliament within its constitutional competency? Ans. Yes.
- 16. Has the Dominion parliament power to declare what shall be deemed an interference with navigation, and require its sanction to any work or erection in, or filling up of navigable waters? Ans. Yes.
- 17. Had riparian proprietors before confederation an exclusive right of fishing in navigable lakes, rivers, streams and waters, the beds of which had been granted to them by the crown? Ans. Yes.

young man that he might be mistaken, and asked the stranger to let him see the watch. THIEF, to take up in their canoe on their return, and was to meet them at the intervals above, early the next morning. This well-ventured and characteristic story procured him a speedy passage over the lake, and now our adventurer is in undisputed possession of the country, at liberty to choose which way he should turn his face.
