These, it is claimed, are only of a minor character. A drive may have an underdrain and still not be able to take care of the water as fast as it comes in a heavy shower. More or less refuse and fine earth is carried onto the drive in the way of mud from the street, and this fills up the interstices while the gravel fills those between the stones. If the mud brought upon the driveway is of a clay nature the drive in time becomes impervious to the rapid seepage of the water, and the result is the water forms a stream on top of the ground, channeling and cutting away all the fine gravel upon the top of the stones and leaving it in a bad condition. I notice that the railroad which passes through my farm has in recent years been balasted almost entirely with cinders in place of gravel. More than lers in place of gravel. More than a cof cinders is used beneath the ties and the result is that no matter how heavy the rain the cinders take all that falls, and part with it at their leisure. rais, and part with it at their resure. If the stones are selected in this way and carefully placed, the big ones will never come to the surface to bump a wheel and the gravel will never work down among the larger stones to obstruct the passage of the water. The bottom of the excavation should slope both ways to the centre with a drain

MOON'S RAYS ARE CATHODE.

An Electrician Finds That They Penetrate Both Metal and Wood.

That the rays of the moon are at times cathode and capable of penetrating opaque substances is the latest discovery. Professor Roentgen's apparatus is thus supplied by nature, and is within the reach of everybody.

The maker of the scientific discovery is a German electrician, G. Dohrman, of Bremen. He is now working with a number of other electricians, and the results they have obtained are receiving serious attention in Germany.

Mr. Dohrman claims that he has proved that a photographic negative protected from light receives an impression from the rays of the moon, while it is absolutely unaffected by sunlight. The only conclusion to be drawn from this is, he says, that the moon's rays are capable of penetrating the covering of the plate.

If you take a dry photographic plate and before any light reaches it enclose it in an absolutely light-proof box and expose this to the sun, it will, on development, be absolutely clear. When Lir. Dohrman made his experiments with the moon he took a number of plates similarly protected and further wrapped the boxes up in cloth. They were exposed at the time of the full moon in March, and on development the plates were found to be completely covered with impressions. That the rays of the moon are at

The experiments were carried on steadily. The first Boxes were of wood, and then iron ones were tried. These produced heavier shadows on the plates. In some instances no shadows were obtained. After, studying this point the investigators came to the conclusion that the penetrating rays were present for periods of a minute or so and then ceased.

The discoverer has a theory that the X rays from the moon are obtained in the following way: The moon possesses no atmosphere like that of the earth. It is, therefore, a body capable of producing cathode rays. When those rays encounter an atmosphere they recoded that he warmth, and enable

of producing cathode rays. When those rays encounter an atmosphere they produce light and warmth, and enable us to see the moon. But certain disturbances of the atmosphere permit some of the rays to reach the earth, and that is why they are only to be found intermittently.

Petroleum Fuel on Warships.
Oil burners on a system invented by an engineer named Cunniberti have been put into all the new Italian warships, and have also been adopted by the German Government. The fuel used is not crude petroleum, but petroleum residuum, which is more economical, and has the advantage of not producing smoke when burnt. 
