Yesterday's Election.

Very little interest was apparent in the election held yesterday to fill the vacancy in the Council caused by the resignation of Mr. Chamberlain as Mayor. The vote was consequently small and resulted as follows:

Davison, the deputy, Dr. Morse replying for the "Lily of the Valley." An excellent joint program was given which reflected much credit upon all who participated. Mr. W. S. Sanders, representing the Grand Division, was present and gave an excellent address. At the close suitable refreshments were served.

Rev. D. E. Hatt, the well-known interpreter of Drummond, whom Wolfville audiences always delight in hearing, gave a most enjoyable evening's reading before the Current Topics Club of the Seminary last week. Dr. DeWolfe met the Club on Wednesday evening of this week and delivered an address on "The Things That Make for Peace," a most clear and strong outline of the influences in modern life that tend to banish war as a means of arbitrament between nations. In a letter received on Wednesday last by Mrs. J. W. Vaughan from her brother, Mr. D. W. Eagles, of Newton Centre, Mass., he told her of having the old elm tree in front of his home taken down. There were five feet through at the place they sawed it off, seven feet above where the three main limbs started. The limbs spread over a space one hundred and twenty feet in diameter. It took two men more than a week to take it down and cut it up and split what they could. The rest was split by dynamite.

Parliament at Ottawa.

Business is progressing at the first session of the Twelfth Parliament of Canada, with more or less satisfaction to those engaged in its work, as well as to all interested.

The habit of being in opposition, is perhaps, without any reflection on their ability, still hampering the Borden administration. When a party which has long been accustomed to pull back on certain or various lines is at once placed in a position where it is obliged, or necessary to take up a go-ahead policy, relationship change, and time is required to get down to the proper gait. This applies no more to the government than to its rank and file. This would equally apply to the Opposition which finds it hard, at first, to adjust itself to different conditions.

The government is moving ahead cautiously as though each step might explode some mine planted by diabolical enemies with malice and revenge aforethought. But, since no such mines have been uncovered, it is safe to assume that the enemy has been too busy, so far, in repairing its own injuries to have time, or material, for offensive operations.

So far the government has been one of few words, and absolutely no oratory, for which the country should give thanks. Ministers who suspected themselves of wishing to make speeches have given the country the benefit of the doubt and kept silent reserving ability for departmental duties. Upon the Premier and some of his colleagues has fallen the burden and any stress there was of debate. The Opposition is just as slowly wearing of the habit of governing. Sir Wilfrid is an exceedingly wise man with long experience in Parliament, and has met the altered conditions without repining. Most singularly the Opposition has been rather noted this session, so far, for its interest in details and its disregard for the perspective. Almost any suggestion of the Government, any clause of a bill, is received the same attention that is, or could be, bestowed upon any fundamental principle of legislation, or upon its effect. This excessive zeal to destroy is natural, but it is not wise or noticeably effective.

The extension of the boundaries of Manitoba have been discussed in the House this, and will probably be on the carpet next week. The Nationalists have been represented as pressing the claims of the Catholic minority to separate schools in Keewatin, while the foolish section of the Liberal press represent the government as yielding to these demands. That certain of the French Conservatives would like to see an educational clause inserted in the bill is without doubt. The bill has been presented and so such clause exists as these agitating newspapers forecast. It deals exclusively with territorial boundaries and financial terms. This omission of any provision for schools simply preserves the provincial autonomy and leaves the subject in the hands of the province.

What final attitude the French Canadian members will assume in regard to the omission of an educational clause, is a pure matter of conjecture. In some quarters it is believed that they will get over the traces, but should that occur the break will be of small proportions. All indications point to a peaceable adjustment. There is no foundation for the story published by the Morning Chronicle, and in similar trouble seekers, that Mr. Bourassa was at Ottawa on Sunday looking for blood. He has not been at Ottawa for a month. Manifestly by the bill introduced on Tuesday, by Premier Borden, is to receive generous treatment for which she is amply deserving after the treatment handed out to her by the Laurier government since she, herself, became Conservative.

Dante's Inferno at Opera House.

Speaking of this wonderful exhibition in St. John last week the 'Globe' of that city said:

'Not even the most ardent exponent of the fire and brimstone theory of the hereafter, among evangelists, ever expounded the tortures of lost souls in perdition to so good advantage as did the Italian poet Dante, in his immortal masterpiece, the Inferno.'

A representation of this poem last night cast upon the screen at the Opera House amazed the audience with the accuracy of detail and wonderful effect of the production.

Although some doubt existed in the minds of many as to whether or not a film such as this would constitute a desirable entertainment, those who attended the two performances yesterday were amply rewarded for their time. The production was in absolutely good taste and could not offend the sensibilities of the most sensitive.

The Inferno consists of five reels, comprising over 100 scenes. The pictures as thrown upon the screen are explained by a lecturer who is thoroughly familiar with the poem.

This makes it possible for the audience to follow the pictures, and also to acquire some knowledge of the original poem.

The films are a masterpiece of the photographer's art and in the scenic effect no pains have been spared.

Boy Scouts. His Worship the Mayor (Mr. Chambers) presided over a meeting in connection with the Canadian Boy Scouts (Borden Powell's) at the Town Hall, on Saturday evening. Scoutmaster Percy Brown briefly reported the progress made in Wolfville since April of last year when he started with a patrol of eight, which he afterwards registered as the 'First Wolfville Troop.' The boys were very keen on the work and their discipline in camp was really admirable. They had all passed their Tenderfoot tests and had, by their persistent energy, succeeded in earning all the funds required by the Troop to date.

District Commissioner, the Rev. George T. Bryant, of Berwick, picking up the thread where Scoutmaster Brown had dropped it, pointed out that the Wolfville Troop had reached the point where it no longer could be carried on by one man, and the scoutmaster was face to face with two alternatives: (1) to organize the necessary local association, or (2) to disband the Troop. He (Mr. Bryant) was there to help form an association and he congratulated them on their good fortune in having the Mayor present on a Saturday night which must have involved considerable sacrifice and inconvenience to himself.

The Commissioner then outlined the functions and constitution of such an organization as was essential and invited the audience to regard him as a target at which to fire questions. An interesting discussion followed, in which Dr. Archibald, Rev. Mr. Webber, Scoutmasters Brown and McKinnon and the chairman took part. The ten laws which a scout pledges his honor to obey, and the scout's three promises as indicated in the 'Scouts' Salute and Secret Sign, having been impressively recited and explained, Mr. Bryant enumerated the various tests for efficiency badges, which reminded him, he said, of a request which he had to make to the Mayor. He had just received the badge won by the Berwick Troop, which had arranged an entertainment for next Tuesday night, when these badges were to be distributed. But Leader Morgan Tamplin was now in Wolfville and it occurred to him that the present was an opportune moment to make a presentation. This young man had also won his first class and King Scout badges—the first King Scout in Nova Scotia (applause), but these latter badges had not yet arrived from England. He therefore asked the Mayor to put on the right arm of Leader Tamplin, one above the other, these three badges, namely, (1) Ambassador; (2) Marksmanship, with 90 marks (3) Path finding.

The Mayor having done accordingly, addressed the much badged scout, congratulating him upon his record and heartily welcoming him to Wolfville. It occurred to him that a boy with such distinctions achieved won for him such distinction should prove a very useful acquisition to the fire brigade of the town. He wished the Boy Scout movement in Wolfville every success and as far as he was able he would heartily support it. He wished every boy to realize that there was work for a boy as well as for a man, and especially that the one could not discharge the duties of the other. Each must perform his allotted task.

On the motion of Scoutmaster Brown, seconded by Rev. Mr. Webber, it was resolved to form an association for Wolfville on the lines indicated by the District Commissioner. Subsequently the following nominations and elections were duly made:

Honorary President:—His Worship, the Mayor of Wolfville, ex-officio. Hon. Vice President:—Dr. G. B. Catten, President Acadia University. President:—Dr. W. L. Archibald, Principal Horton Collegiate Academy. Vice Presidents:—Reverends R. F. Dixon and E. D. Webber. Scoutmaster:—Percy Brown. Secretary-Treasurer:—Morgan Tamplin (Sr.). Council:—R. W. Ford (Principal High School), T. L. Harvey (ex-Mayor), Joseph Howe (H. C. A.), Dr. E. Fraser Moore, Dr. McKenna, Scoutmaster McKinnon, Rev. G. W. Miller, Rev. J. W. Prescott, Councillor Wm. Regan, H. Stairs, Mr. Stems and Captain Tingley.

A draft copy of regulations in vogue elsewhere was read and submitted by the Commissioner and provisionally adopted by the meeting, the Council being left at free hand to amend and confirm so it may be deemed expedient after due examination at its first meeting, which was fixed for Tuesday evening, March 27th, in class room no. 2, Acadia College.

The usual votes of thanks closed the proceedings, after which a number of interesting charts and photographs descriptive of the movement in Kings county, were closely inspected.
