I herewith submit my report for the period covered from the 22nd day of January, the date of my appointment, to March 4th, 1918, for the Health District, No. 23,

County of Northumberland. I have had two meetings of the Board and got their consent to the principle that as vaccination is compulsory in this district, they would insist that all persons able to pay for vaccination be requested to do so but no person applying be refused vaccination. That section 80, No. regarding Schools be strictly enforced. That supplies for persons quarantined be given through the Almshouse commissioner applications being made through or the Councillors of the Parish. Tastructions being given to the Doctors to vaccinate all persons who have been exposed to Smallrox, or ming in contact with the disease Report for the Parish of Alnwick-At Portage River, one house quarantined, 3 persons sick of Smallpox. 11 inmates, all not showing disease vaccinated, also persons known to have been in contact with the lisease.
