Crippen Found Guilty.

Dr. Hawley H. Crippen, on trial in London for the murder of his wife, was found guilty of murder on Saturday afternoon last. His trial and conviction are a striking example of the swift sure justice dealt out in the courts of Great Britain. Crippen's trial commenced before Lord Chief Justice Alverstone, on Tuesday forenoon the 18th, and was concluded on Saturday afternoon before 3 o'clock. The jury were out only half an hour, when they returned a verdict of guilty, and the prisoner was immediately sentenced to be hanged on November 8th.

Britain's Workmen's Compensation act.

A Blue Book recently issued by the British Home Office presents some interesting facts showing the benefit the people in Great Britain derive from the Workmen's Compensation Act, which was passed in 1906. Last year under this act compensation to the extent of £3,000,000 was paid in 3,341 cases of death, and in 332,612 cases of disablement. It is shown that the average payment in

"A Peculiar Case."

Following a brief review of the recent suit brought by Mr. Mayes n the Exchequer Court against the Department of Public Work


