The man I love doesn't love me. Tell me some way to make him, is the substance of the world-old appeal that occasionally appears in my mail in one form or another.

Dear folks, if I could give you any recipe for the solution of that trouble, don't you know that I'd be rich beyond the dreams of avarice or Midas or John D.?

All I can offer you is just a few suggestions. Take them for what they are worth. I really think that's a little something.

There is an old idea that if you want to win a man's love, it helps for you to act indifferent towards him. I think this is a great mistake. Indifference seldom serves as a spur except when your steed is already galloping. If I wanted to make a man love me, I should show him in a frank, open way—not holdy, or in a forward fashion, but just as I would a girl—that I liked and admired him. New York Aroused by Kidnapping Case.

New York, June 22.—One of the most energetic hunts for a lost child ever set on under way by the New York police is on to-day for three year old Michael Schneck, a son of a wealthy Italian physician, who was boldly kidnaped late yesterday, almost under the very eyes of his parents, by Black Hands, who for three years have been threatening to steal the child unless money was paid them.

Dr. Mariano Schneck, the father, one of the best known Italian physicians in the United States, has been the subject of Black Hand attention since far back in the Petrosino time. When his boy was four months old, and the physician, who had foregone a lucrative practice in a fashionable district to work among his own countrymen, was prospering in a modest way in the Italian quarters, envy of his accumulations prompted demands upon him by blackmailing hands. Letter after letter was sent him, accompanied by bloodthirsty threats and declarations that his son would be stolen if he would not pay the blackmailers \$1,000. He put the case in the hands of the late Lieut. Petrosino, and the activity of the noted detective soon caused the letters to cease.

Soon after Petrosino was assassinated in Sicily, the Blackhanders got busy again. Letters have come with increasing frequency lately, and yesterday the threats were made good by the kidnaping of little Michael. Bait in the form of candy is believed to have lured the child far enough to permit the kidnapers to carry him off.

Fishery News.

One of the largest fish firms in the city had news from Placentia to-day stating that there is a great improvement in the fishery there and at Argenta. The traps did well there yesterday, and one at Long Island Head had 100 quintals, which is a very fine haul. One of Jobs traps set outside this port, yesterday had fully 100 qtls. fish in it when the men went out to it, but it had become fouled with the bottom and all the fish except 13 qtls. was lost.

A SUGGESTION.—Considering that the Cornwall will be here a week, would it not be a good thing if the splendid band on board could be heard in our parks. It is not often that our citizens hear such excellent music as that given from the ship's deck last night. A concert of two would be greatly appreciated.

NORWEGIAN FISHERY FINISHED.—The Norwegian fishery finished yesterday, the total catch being 55,700,000, as against 56,519,000 for last year. The difference between this and last year is very little, and is thought that the catch will not affect the price of the staple.

BAND PRACTICE.—The C. L. B. band will meet to-morrow night for practice instead of Thursday as ordered.

Scamps Lie in Wait for Immigrants.

BOSTON, Mass., June 20.—Problems confronting immigrants are discussed at length in the annual report of the North American Civic League for Immigrants, made public here to-night.

The object of the League is to protect the immigrant on and immediately after his arrival. Speaking of conditions as the League officials found them at the docks when they began their work, the report says: "Little was being done to frustrate the legion of scamps who receive the incoming tide of strangers as soon as they passed the Federal gates and everywhere there was a lack of co-operation. Results are already noticeable although far from being sufficient."

Rickard holds out no hopes to him of allowing that contest to be staged as a morning preliminary to the Jeffries-Johnson fight.



Prince of Wales.

Last Thursday was the birthday of the Heir Apparent to the Throne, and the title of Prince of Wales was conferred upon him. When his father succeeded to the Throne as George V, Prince Edward of Wales became by right of birth Duke of Cornwall and Inheritor of the rights of that County Palatine. The revenues of the Duchy in 1909 amounted to £87,000. Under the new Regency Bill the Heir Apparent will attain his majority on June 23rd, 1912, when he reaches his eighteenth year. Till that time the revenues of the Duchy will be allowed to accumulate and will form a nice nest egg for the new Prince of Wales.

His Majesty the King has invited Parliament to provide suitably in the event of his Royal Highness marrying, for the Duchies of Cornwall. When Princess of Wales, Queen Mary was provided with an annuity of £10,000 a year, and the Prince of Wales with an annuity of £20,000. In view of the increasing values of the revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall, His Majesty considers it necessary to ask for the provision to be made for the Prince.

The Regency Bill provides that Queen Mary shall become Regent in the event of the King's demise during the Prince's minority, but that her tenure of that office shall cease immediately if she become reconciled to the Church of Rome. This provision of the Regency Bill should quiet the apprehensions of those who are disturbed at Premier Asquith's intention of introducing next week a bill taking away the words in the Coronation Oath offensive to Roman Catholics. The security of the Protestant succession to the Throne will be in no way endangered by this amendment. During Queen Mary's Regency she cannot assent to any change in the law of succession to the Crown. The Prince of Wales is being prepared for confirmation, according to the office of the Church of England, by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

COBINATION OATH BILL.

LONDON, June 27.—Premier Asquith has announced in the House of Commons that the budget will be introduced June 30th. The Prime Minister promised to give an opportunity for the second reading of David James Shackleton's bill for the Enfranchisement of Women, but said he was unable to promise further facilities in this respect at the present session. The Prime Minister also said that he hoped to introduce a bill in reference to the King's Accession Declaration next week. It would, he said, merely propose to alter the language of the declaration. It would not vary in any material respect the conditions of the accession to the throne. It is hoped that the Lords' Veto conference will be finished before the end of July.

CHINESE VENDETTA.

Special Evening Telegram.
NEW YORK, June 27.—Two Chinamen are dead to-day a third is badly wounded in a hospital, and seven are under arrest as the result of a renewal of hostilities in the never-ending Tong war in Chinatown. A Long Island laundryman was the first victim to succumb to the wounds he received when a fusillade of shot broke loose while four brothers of the Tong were celebrating yesterday. The On Long Tong, their rivals, score over the murder recently of one of their number, were gathered in force nearby and are alleged to have raided the arriving banqueters.

VATICAN ULTIMATUM.

Special to Evening Telegram.
MADRID, June 27.—The Vatican's latest note to the Spanish Government is regarded as practically an ultimatum. It insists upon the withdrawal of the Spanish troops from a condition precedent to the continuation of the negotiations over the revision of the Concordate. The Republicans and Basques have been active throughout Spain counter-manifestations against Catholic agitation.

The World's Walking Records.

Seventy-Two Miles in Twelve Hours.

The open twelve hours' walking race promoted by the Middlesex Walking Club at Stamford Bridge on Saturday did not attract a huge crowd, but those who were present witnessed some remarkable walking in which the record was handsomely beaten by the winner, T. Payne, who is a native of North Shields. From start to finish of the twelve hours' walk he never left the track for one moment, which is in itself probably a record, apart from the mileage totalled.

Of the forty-one entrants thirty-six were started at just before eight, among them being W. Brown, of the Polytechnic Harriers, who won last year's contest; J. Butler, of Brighton Road record fame; T. P. Fox, of the Vegetarian Athletic Club; H. V. L. Ross, of the Tooting A. C., and holder of the London to Brighton record of 8 hrs. 11 min. 14 sec.; A. R. Edwards, of Lancashire A.C.; and others.

J. Iles, the Treharris harrier, who walked well in last year's race at the Stadium, led in capital style for the first two hours. Later on W. Brown assumed the lead, and in the next hour Ross was in front. Between the third and fourth hours Iles left the track for good, having covered 13 miles 8 laps. During the fifth hour Ross retired, and this gave the lead to Payne, who at the completion of five hours had scored 31 miles 100 yards.

Payne continued to walk splendidly and still maintained a strong lead at the end of the seventh hour (43 miles 850 yards). About this period of the race several competitors retired, among them being J. Butler.

As fully anticipated by the speed at which Payne was moving, the record was beaten at 51 miles, the North Shields man doing 8 hrs. 16 mins. 22 sec. for that distance, and clipping 29 mins. 13 sec. off W. Brown's previous best. Thereafter Payne continued to hold the lead, and incidentally eclipse the record from mile to mile. Roberts, Fox and Edwards, who followed him in that order, were all within record figures.

Travelling faster than ever towards the last stage, Payne finished with the record total of 75 miles, 33 yds., beating the previous record by 3 miles, 352 yds. The second man was F. E. Roberts, with 70 miles, 1716 yds., and the third, T. P. Fox, 70 miles, 1,138 yds. These three all beat the previous record. A. R. Edwards, 68 miles, 1,130 yds., was fourth, and eighteen finished.—Daily Mail.

British Lady Wanted to Fly.

LONDON, June 22.—Graham White, the English aviator who was near a winner of the London to Manchester prize of \$50,000 recently, announced that he would take passengers in flight for £126 sterling. The second and third flights were to cost her £14 10s. The first flight took place yesterday. Soon after the start the engine of the machine failed and the biplane fell. "Remarkable cinematograph pictures illustrating the making of paper for The Daily Mail at Grand Falls, Newfoundland, and the printing and publishing of this journal in London and Manchester were shown privately at the Battersea Palace yesterday afternoon.
From the first cutting of the forest timber to the hurry-scurry of the publisher's vans in London, the pictures pulsate with life and activity. Mr. Mayson M. Beeton, president of the Anglo-Newfoundland Development and Paper Company, who saw the pictures yesterday, was amazed at the fidelity and completeness of the series. Every operation in the making of pulp and paper was shown.
Between the forest and the mills the cinematograph catches a brilliant view of the huge dam which supplies the power for the great 'Enterprise.' This is a beautiful picture of smooth-rushing water, falling and breaking into a cataract of waves. The life and play of rushing water is shown again in a fascinating picture of the cut and trimmed lengths of timber racing and tumbling down a water 'shoot.'
From this the picture-story passes to a score of interior scenes, each distinct with the energy of man and machinery. After the preparation of the pulp the making of the paper is shown, and then the scene changes from Newfoundland to London. Here is the whole process of setting the

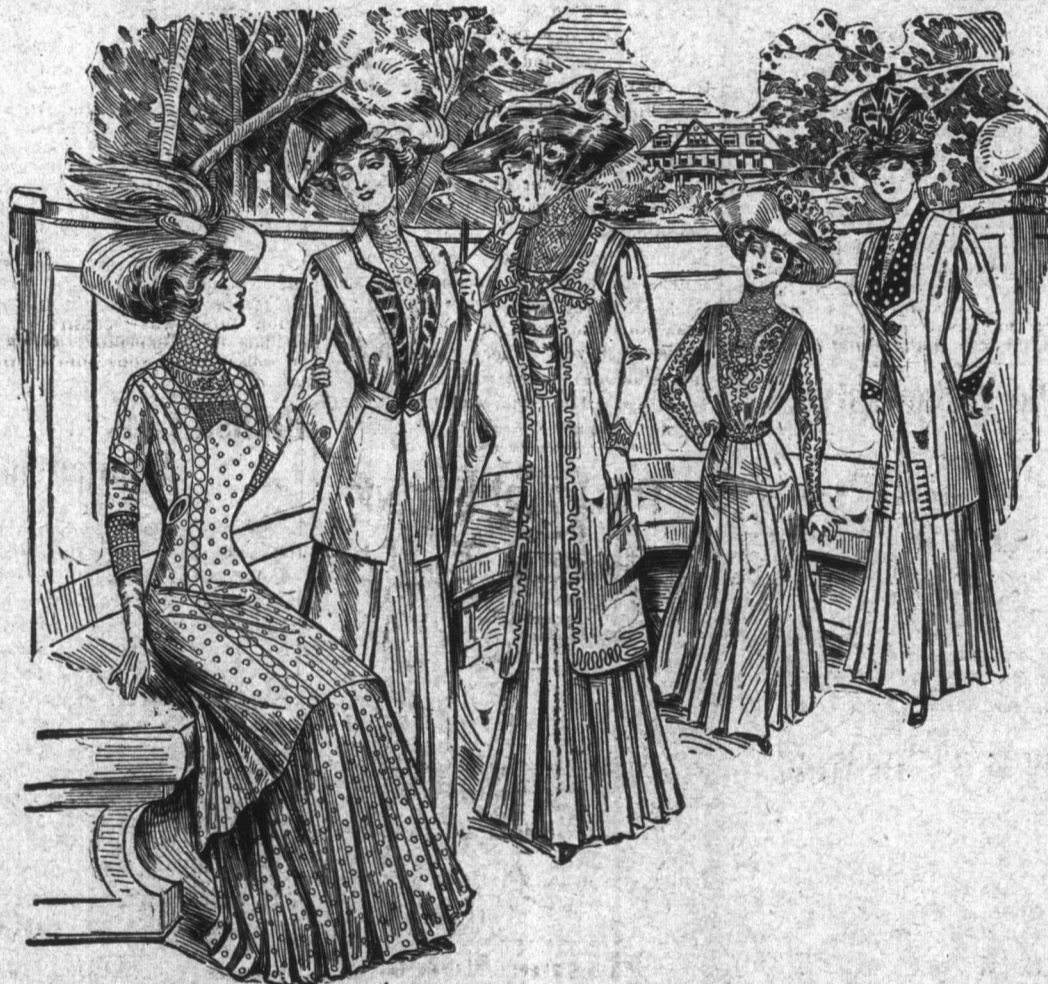

Steamers Royal Edward and Royal George, the first of which has already broken two speed records, has made the other companies take quick action to retain their supremacy, and several orders for new vessels capable of high speed have been announced. Success seems to have come to the new company immediately from the despatch of the first of its vessels, which are recognized as the fastest plying in the Canadian trade. The Royal Edward holds the blue ribbon for this route by making the run in five days and seventeen and one-half hours. Boys' Author Dead.

Dr. Gordon Stables' Great Love of Life in a Caravan.

Dr. William Gordon Stables, the well-known writer of boys' stories, has just died at his home at Twyford, Jerks, in his seventieth year.

For nine years Dr. Gordon Stables was a doctor in the Royal Navy, serving in various parts of the world. On the East Coast of Africa, where he was stationed for some time, he led an exciting life on the Penguin. With the armed members of the ship's company he was away in the open boats for six weeks at a time, chasing Arabs suspected of being "in the slave trade."

Being invalided on half-pay, he travelled all over the world, making two cruises in the Arctic regions. It was from these travels that he obtained material for the 150 books which he subsequently wrote. Such volumes as "The Cruise of the Snow-bird," "From Pole to Pole," "The Pirates' Gold," and "Every Inch a Sailor" have delighted boys wherever the English language is read.

During the last twenty years, when he was not engaged on literary work, Dr. Gordon Stables lived the life of a gypsy. There was nothing he loved so much as touring unfrequented parts of the country in his well-appointed caravan. He was exceedingly fond of animals, especially dogs, of which he always kept a large number.
