### Fishermen Profest **Against Trawlers**

Gloucester Interests Name Committee to Conduct Campaign.

Gloucester, Oct. 4 .- A strong protest of the fishing and vessel owning interests against the use of the otter and beam trawl was voiced at the rooms of the Master Mariners' Association this afternooon, when at one of the most largely attended meetings in recent years, the association went of fishing, and appointed a committee to take up the active work of crystalizing this feeling among the master mariners, fishermen and fishing vessel owners at any and every possible port and later urge govermental ac tion in the shape of prohibition legis lation.

### The First Escalator.

In England in Operation To-Day.

London, Oct. 4.—The first escalator moving stairway, introduced into England is in operation to-day at the Earle Court Station. It will carry ten thousand passengers hourly, and will do more work than six ordinary lifts. The traffic by the deep level tube is so heavy at the busiest hours of the day that the lifts are overstrained and passengers are delayed. If the experiment succeeds, similar double-stairs, moving up and down simultaneously, will be constructed at other stations of the underground system. One was tried in Berlin ten years ago, and another was in operation at the Paris Exposition, but the system is still a novelty in Europe, although it has been satisfactorily tested in Canada and the United States.



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
