Rear-Admiral Flet cher, to-day, landed a force of mar nes that took charge of Vera Cru; This action was taken as the result of a wireless message from Arlingto station by direction of the Presider at 4 o'clock this morning.

WASHINGTON, April 21. The American flag to-night flie over Vera Cruz. Four American were killed and twenty wounded whe a detachment of American marine and bluejackets seized the Custom House, raising the American flag and skirmishing around the Mexican gar ison. Firing was in progress late to-day, according to a despatch from Admiral Fletcher, received at 6 o clock. At first the garrison appear d to be withdrawing but when th American forces reached the Custom House the Mexicans opened fire. Th Americans immediately began shell ng the garrison, which clowly move out, and kept up the fire from the nouse tons and in the streets.

LONDON, April 21. Newfoundland Disaster.

APPEAL FROM GOVERNOR DAY-IDSON AND PREMIER MORRIS.

Urgent Need Of Assistance. To the Editor of the Times

Sir,-It is now known that 77 of he sealing crew on the steamer Newoundland met death on the ice floes off the coast of Newfoundland on the light of March 31st. The steamer Bellaventure has brought to St. John's the bodies of 69 of the crew who had een frozen to death, and of thos vho survive 50 have been disabled, probably for life. Eight bodies have not been recovered. Hope must now e abandoned for the safety of the Southern Cross. This ship has probably gone down with all hands, and at least 170 more of the best fishernen of the colony have perished with

These disasters, without parallel in he history of Newfoundland, signify hat probably 150 widows and some 300 or 800 children are bereft of their preadwinners and are left as a charge

ipon the colony. Of all the risks which beset th ishermen who seek their living on he seas around the coasts of Newoundland none are so hazardous a hose to be battled with during th ennual seal hunt in March. As th ime during which the seals can be aken is limited, the captains make : lash for the icefields and force their ships through the ice as far as possi ble: and the crew leave their ships and range over the floes for miles in he search for seals. It was whill so employed that the crew of the Newfoundland were overwhelmed by he sudden snowstorm. It needs for itude to withstand the cold often beow zero, as well as extraordinary skill to traverse the broken and raft ed ice; and no race of men, other han the Newfoundlanders, attempt this task; but when an unexpected snow-blizzard overtakes the men at distance from shelter it is beyond even their endurance to survive

The Government provides a grant of \$100 to the dependants of any fishrmen who has lost his life at sea The well-to-do classes, moreover, are exceedingly generous, and appeals for any good object are never made it vain; but the present disaster is be wond the ordinary scope of our enleavors. 


