Home Old Hun.

...is reported by merchants as follows: Large tulls, \$24 and \$27; medium, \$22 and \$24; matris, \$22 and \$24; matris, \$21 and \$22. Supplies of Newfoundland Scotch cured herring are now held within comparatively small compass, and there will be no important additions until the first lots of fall pack herring begin to come into market late in December or early in the New Year. In the meantime, it may be expected that the market will witness only a normal activity, for there is not a sufficient quantity of Scotch cured herring available to make it a big factor in the herring trade during the remainder of the season. In view of the shortage and the high cost of cold storage, losses in broken packages, etc., it is safe to assume that merchants here will not be able to sell at a much lower figure than is now being quoted. There have been some supplies of Norwegian cured herring from Newfoundland offering in the local trade, some factors holding as high as \$18 per barrel. In the absence of Scotch cure, it is probable that there will be a good demand for this grade during the remainder of the season.—N. Y. Fishing Gazette, Nov. 9.

...Household Notes... In using oil of peppermint in flavoring fake a tiny bit up on the end of a toothpick and it will not be too strong. Macaroni has a very high food value and mixed with cheese, oysters or dried beef makes a perfect meal all by itself. Winter squash is delicious cut in squares and baked in the oven, or steamed, then scooped out of the shell with a spoon. When a recipe calls for a few drops of onion juice a turn or two of a raw onion on a grater will supply those few drops. A delicious salad is made of cubed potatoes, apples, celery, capers and hard-boiled eggs. Marinate with French dressing. An excellent salad is made of cabbages and beets with French dressing; the cabbage should be shaved and the beets thinly sliced. When chilling anything, such as dessert in a dish of cracked ice, a little common salt sprinkled on the ice quickens the process. Sour milk griddle cakes are made with 1 cup each of buckwheat and graham flour, 2 cups of sour milk and 1 teaspoonful each of salt and soda. Once a month choose leg of lamb for the weekly meat—in a family of four or five persons it will furnish nearly all the meat allowable for the week. Delicious puffs can be made of jellied hominy or rice, preferably hot. 1 cupful of rice, 1/2 teaspoonful of salt, 1 tablespoonful of fat and 2 egg yolks beaten till thick; lastly fold in the beaten whites. Bake in a quick oven.

...Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring... The slackening of the demand for Newfoundland Scotch cured herring within the past few weeks has naturally weakened the market for this commodity somewhat, and within the past few weeks importers and merchants in New York have been quoting on a lower basis. While most factors are holding for \$27 for fancy quality, spring or winter herring, it is noted that the \$20 quote has disappeared entirely, and the inside price is now reported to be \$24 for large tulls. Kelly's Honor.

There died the other day a longshoreman whose name should be kept in memory wherever men love honor—Gordon Kelly, of Vancouver, President of the Pacific District of the International Longshoremen's Association. A word from Kelly at any time while he held office would have led up to shipping on all the Pacific coast from Alaska to Mexico. Not a shipload of munitions or other war supplies for the Allies would have moved from harbor, and there were scores of vessels ready to take on cargo and thousands of cargo waiting to be loaded. An agent of Count von Bernstorff approached Kelly in 1915. A bribe of a million dollars was offered the president to bring on a strike of the longshoremen. A poor man; a million dollars; little chance of detection. How many men would dare face the temptation? Kelly faced it. There was no strike. He reported the incident to the Secret Service. He might have become wealthy and concealed his dishonor from the world. He chose to keep his honor and remain poor. It is not Labor alone which should keep the name of Gordon Kelly in memory.—Sydney Record.

Items of Interest.

GATHERED FROM EVERYWHERE. Haig commanded through the dark days, and he commands in the day of victory to which the British armies so mightily contributed. In the cricketing phrase, "he carried out his bat." Soon there will be a rush to the presses of the country, and a few days after peace is declared we shall read: "Agents Wanted—To sell a complete history of the recent war." Lieut. Krupp von Bohlen and Halbach, the head of the Krupp works, and his wife, Bertha, daughter of the founder of the works, have been arrested by the revolutionists. A young lady clerk employed by the Canadian Smallwares Co. in London, Ont., sold a package of tooth paste without affixing the necessary war tax stamp, the consequences was that the proprietor was obliged to pay a fine of \$100 in the police court. The Consolidated Whaling Corporation's combined fleets in Pacific waters are reported to have taken 978 whales from the commencement of this year's whaling season. It is stated that the British fleet, the best since 1911, was a record year, and British airplanes landed at Galates, a suburb of Constantinople, two days after the signing of the Turkish armistice (October 31). The first Allied officer to reach European Turkey was Flight Commander Henry Wiser, a Canadian, and a graduate of Yale in 1912. The general British view appears to be summarised in the question whether the cost of rehabilitation of Europe should be borne by the victims of devastation or by its authors, and the interests of Germany herself, thus making internal fighting less possible when the armies are repressed. The Vancouver Province states that it has information that Count von Bernstorff, former German Ambassador to the United States, offered Gordon Kelly a bribe of one million dollars to finance a longshoremen's strike. "Von Bernstorff," the Province says, "through an agent two years ago approached Kelly with a flat offer of a million dollars to finance a strike which would prevent the shipment of munitions out of American ports. Kelly reported the offer to the Secret Service."

"Joss."

(By Lewis R. Freeman, in the December Popular Mechanics Magazine.) There had been a distressing accident in the afternoon and the shadow of it brooded deep over the work from that evening. It was one of those swift little sea tragedies which cut into the even course of Grand Fleet life every now and then as the beam of a suddenly opened and closed searchlight slashes the darkness of a winter night. The survivors had been picked up and were returning to the ship in a drifter. They were in a good deal of a shiver from their half hour's immersion when they came aboard, but otherwise none the worse for the experience. He appointed Kelly to be their guide to rights and presently they drifted in to the ward room and pulled up by the fire. Something started them all to talking about "Joss," and though every one of them who tried to define it in words considered it impudently. In stories they told were all illustrative and indicative of the fatalistic doctrine of "You'll get yours when the time comes, whatever you may do to avoid it, but not a second before." I can well understand, as I heard a young but highly experienced officer declare, that a "Jossist" philosophy of life is the only one under which a man can compose himself for regular sleep in a sweeper, mine-layer, or any other kind of a craft where you're playing cross tag between kingdom come and high explosives. If Joss had made an appointment for you, you are all right even if your ship blows up or the heavens fall; but if he has, you'll jump into the air or dive into the sea to keep it. To what lengths he will go in this particular respect is attested by an incident told by the ward-room crew that night. It was a young lieutenant recently come to us from a mine sweeper, who spun the yarn, and I have since verified it in every particular. "Speaking of Joss," he said, "reminds me of the way the cards were stacked against poor old K. I was the skipper of the first mine sweeper I was in. She was one of the new sloops, built especially for the job, and about as near mine-proof as a ship of that kind can be. K—used to say that he reckoned he was as safe in her as he was at home in bed. "I remember distinctly that it was the very next run after that Joss stopped in. I was aft at the time, and before so that the shock of an exploding mine we had run into was my first intimation of anything wrong. I was thrown against the side of my cabin with an awful bang, for the jar seemed many times sharper than I had felt in the air and smaller sweeper in which I had been mined. There things had eventuated just about as K—had forecast they would—just about, but not quite. Just as he had anticipated, too, he himself was thrown cleanly into the air and deposited lightly in one of the net by clew-ropes which had been spread for that purpose. I started forward and when I reached the wrecked foc's'le, her skipper was clambering across the net. Just in time, I saw that his legs were dragging limply behind the trunk he was dragging up the side of the net by clew-ropes with his hands. We lifted him out as carefully as we could and

laid him on the deck. He was still conscious, but went into a swoon from which he never came out. Just after he had managed to tell me that something small and hard had plugged him while he was in the air. 'It's right here,' he said, in a falling voice, laying a weak hand on his abdomen. He was dead before they could carry him below, and it was not until after we had returned to port—slowly but under our own steam—that we learned, as the result of a post mortem, that the head of a rivet had pierced his body at about the diaphragm and rested against his spinal column. For sheer Joss, could you beat it? Poor old K— and that rivet had had an appointment to forage up there in the air, 20 or 30 feet above the bridge of his new mine sweeper, and because neither of them were able to get up there on their own, Joss sends that little packet of Fate T.M.T., along to provide the necessary motive power. If either of them had been the hundredth of a second behind or ahead of time, they would have missed the connection. But they were there to the dot—Joss never slips up on his schedules."

The Government of Europe.

(From the Toronto Star.) Serious as the problem of reconstruction will be here and in the Allied countries, it is not to be compared with that which will arise in the disorganized parts of Europe—in Russia, in Austria-Hungary, in Poland, and in the Balkan Peninsula. In many of these places new Governments will have to be established—we mean Governments radically different from the old, with new functions and with territorial jurisdiction not yet defined. We may obtain a faint idea of the work to be done by recalling the history of the framing of the new constitution of the United States or of our own confederation. But these things were done in countries already enjoying orderly government and not ravaged by war. A large part of Europe will have to be rebuilt, politically and economically. The claims of various nationalities in Austria-Hungary will have to be considered, and territorial adjustments made as nearly as possible in accordance with justice and national and racial sentiment. The Peace Conference will have a tremendous work on its hands. The question is not merely of settling what reparations Germany is to make, what territory she is to give up, and what safeguards are to be erected against German treachery or ambition. That is important, but it is only the beginning. It is the clearing of the ground for constructive work. The old Europe, east of France, will be gone, and a new Europe must be built on its ruins. It is doubtful whether all this can be done in the few weeks or months in which the terms of peace will be settled. The Allies may have to create some permanent organization to continue the work. Take the case, for instance, of Austria-Hungary. When certain regions are allotted to the German-Austrians, to the Magyars, to the Slavs, how shall we guard against one quarrelling with the other and breaking the settlement made at the Peace Conference? It looks as if a League of Nations or some similar organization will be absolutely necessary for the orderly government of a large part of Europe. Mapping the Sky.

Few of us possess an intimate knowledge of the significance of cloud effects. A cloud-map would, therefore, be unintelligible to any but a meteorological student. But there have been cloud-maps printed for over thirty years, the first one, consisting of some 300 cloud pictures, being published by a German student. Cloud-maps are, naturally, a far more intricate and difficult study than a straightforward geographical atlas. They were first intended merely as a meteorological asset, but since the advent of the airman, have now become a vital side-issue in the work of our Royal Air Force. A certain professor, who has been experimenting with cloud phenomena in Aberdeen, has proved so successful that his photographs and sketches are to be produced in the form of a cloud atlas. This may be intended to replace the International Cloud Atlas, executed by German professors and published in Paris before the war.

War and the Sugar Bowl.

It cannot be too often emphasized that candy makers, sugar manufacturers and public eating places are admirably supporting the Food Board policy of saving sugar, but there are thousands of "slackers" in private homes. There must be, because there is so much hoarding. No doubt much of it is done without serious reflection. The home allowance should be 2 pounds a month for each one in the family. There is ample sugar coming into the Dominion but it comes in measured quantities only—that is all that is permitted under an international arrangement. Housewives can use corn syrup and glucose. They are the best patriots who do what the country wants doing.—Canada Food Board.

Dried Fish.

There has been practically no change in the dried fish business since last reports, the trade generally accepting the verdict of producers that there is relatively little available and that curing new stocks has been hampered considerably by the weather. There have been some lots of soft Labrador available, and there is talk of new developments in the export trade in this grade. Newfoundland codfish, particularly, has been taking the attention of the trade in New York of late, and sales of Porto Rico codfish in 44-lb. casks are reported to have been made here at \$70 for large and \$65 for medium. Some holders of Gaspe are asking high prices for limited stocks, and it is understood that the market, while not up to the level of the outside quotation of \$19 is advancing and has already reached \$18.50, according to merchants. The scarcity appears to be general throughout the East, and there is comparatively little dried fish from other parts to be expected. It is known, however, that New York merchants have taken advantage of the opportunity to purchase Behring Sea codfish and that there is considerable Japanese codfish already ordered and now in transit. With improved weather conditions it is probable that there will be more liberal supplies of dried fish available, but there is little likelihood of a decline in prices, at least for the present.—N.Y. Fishing Gazette.

Of these 67,836 were officers and 620,819 men. British casualties during the war, including theatres of activity, totalled 3,049,911. This was announced by Mr. Macpherson. The prospective directors are Alex. P. Barnhill, K.C., of St. John, and Thomas Cantley of New Glasgow, head of the Nova Scotia Steel Co. Nominally they will be elected by the Canadian Northern Railway Board, but it will be on the recommendation of the Government.

SOLDIERS RETURNING.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19. It is expected that some ten thousand soldiers will within a few days leave England for Canada.

WITH DUTCH SANCTION.

PARIS, Nov. 19. It appears to be a fact, says the Temps, that German troops returning to Germany from Belgium, crossed the Dutch territory with the sanction of the Holland authorities. This, the newspapers contend, constitutes a precedent which the other belligerents would be justified in following.

WILL PRODUCE THE GOODS.

PARIS, Nov. 19. In order to end the discussion as to whether William Hohenzollern has really abdicated as German Emperor, it is understood the German Government intends to publish his decree of abdication. This consists of an attempt to justify the war on the ground of Germany's isolation.

BELGIAN CABINET TO RESIGN.

LONDON, Nov. 19. The Belgian Cabinet will resign after King Albert meets Parliament this week, according to a despatch to the Daily Telegraph from Bruges. M. Delacroix, a Brussels lawyer, will be asked to form a coalition government.

RETURNS FROM CAPTIVITY.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 19. Adolph Max, Burgomaster of Brussels, returned from captivity today, and was given an enthusiastic ovation by the population.

SCRAP IRON CHEAP.

PARIS, Nov. 19. Iron Crosses are now being sold in Germany for five pennies, or about one American cent apiece, says a telegram from Amsterdam.

NELD, CASUALTY.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19. Today's casualty lists include: Infantry, killed in action, D. McClelland, Templeman, Nfld.; Engineers, Ill. H. Wall, Herring Cove, Nfld.

U. S. WAR LOANS.

We will all admit that one of the characteristics of a Christian should be love of country, and it is a great boon to any country to have the leaders in Church and State endeavouring with all their might to inculcate and foster that spirit. Alfred Harris, of the Canadian Infantry, had been admitted to the 1st Southern General Hospital, Birmingham, on the 13th inst. (having been wounded in the thigh in the fighting). Pte. Harris was formerly a member of the C. E. W. but has resided for the last 5 years abroad, where like his brother, Pte. B. B. Harris, of "Ours," he enlisted to fight for liberty.

Klark-Urban Co.

Many old admirers of the Klark-Urban Company greeted them at 8.15 last evening, in the Casino, when the curtain rose on the comical comedy, "The Mis-Leading Lady." The generous applause given by the delighted auditors was sufficient evidence of the esteem in which the company is held. Perhaps more than at any other engagements given previously by the Klark-Urbans, this season will be enjoyed without alloy, the great war having ended, and nothing existing to prevent genuine happiness. The play was a three-act comedy, Miss Malise Cecil taking the leading role, and Mr. Frank Urban that of Fitzpatrick Parker, both evoking great mirth and amusement. Billie Webb was good as Stephen Weatherby, a young sport. He also took the part of "Boney," a harmless fellow who has made his escape from "Sunnyvale," Sanitarium. Harden Klark was Jack Craigien, the victim, and as such, was very good. The comedy will be repeated to-night. On Thursday and Friday nights, the bill will be "Which one shall I marry?"

Presence of Mind

Yesterday afternoon while a horse was tethered opposite E. J. Horwood's grocery, a motor truck coming down Prescott Street drew up nearby. The horse immediately took fright and plunged most violently. The driver of the horse standing nearby immediately sprang to the horse's head and by dint of soothing words and a strong hand on the bit soon quieted the horse to its usual docility, thus averting what might have easily been a tragedy as many pedestrians were passing at the time. The action of the driver is to be commended for its promptness and effect.

The Epidemic.

No cases were admitted to Grenfell Hall Hospital yesterday; two were discharged, and two removed to the convalescent ward. The City Health Officer received the following message yesterday: From Pilley's Island—Forty-two cases and seven deaths. From Lush's Eight—six cases and one death. From Head's Hr.—One death and 14 cases. Nothing further has been heard of the outbreak at Bay de Verde district since last week, when there were 11 cases at Job's Cove, 56 at Gull Island, 20 at Long Beach, 9 at Northern Bay, and 18 with one death at Ferry's Cove. Dr. Fraser received a message yesterday from Dr. McLeod, of Bay Roberts, saying the Terra Nova had arrived there from North Sydney at 4 a.m. He had, moreover, placed the ship under quarantine as five members of the crew were ailing, and it was feared they had the Spanish influenza. Visitors to Bay of Islands, who arrived in the city yesterday, speak very highly of the work performed by Dr. Fisher, since the outbreak of influenza there. He had over 1,005 cases to attend to, and at one time was 68 hours on duty. Nurse Lindsay has rendered very valuable assistance.

Enquiry Continued.

Yesterday afternoon the preliminary hearing in the case of James Walsh, who was in charge of the launch which ran down a boat in the harbour some time ago, resulting in the drowning of Robert Burden, was continued before Judge Morris. Dr. J. S. Tait who conducted the post mortem examination gave his evidence, as did also Pte. James Taylor, E.H. Notball, Willie Jones, William Butt and John Burden, the other occupants of the boat at the time of the tragedy.

The bride wore a navy blue costume and large hat and fox furs, and was attended by Miss Addie Hedges, while Co-Sergeant-Major Samson acted as father-giver, and the groom was ably supported by Sgt. Gooby. After the ceremony the wedding party drove to the residence of Mrs. Porter, Gower Street, where supper was partaken of. The presents received are numerous and valuable including a clock and carpet from the nurses and staff of the Military Hospital.



Fish Notes.

(N. Y. Fishing Gazette.) The advancing market on hard salted salmon from Newfoundland and Nova Scotia seems to have been occasioned by Pacific Coast prices. Now that Halifax salmon is about at the level with that from Alaska, probably the market will strike a balance at the present level.

Although New York consumers have

been offered a quantity of soft Labrador codfish "direct from the unpolluted waters" of the north, it is of trade interest to note that it is difficult to find a quality of this fish to ship overseas to Spain or Portugal, or Greece, or Italy.

Scotch herring recently offered to the trade in New York is pronounced as of generally good quality, but the prices as rearranged and confirmed in the trade are indeed a revelation.

According to the "Colonist" of Victoria, B.C. the season's whale catch by boats of the Victoria Whaling Company so far amounts to 230 whales, with the whaler St. Lawrence leading the Black second and the White third.

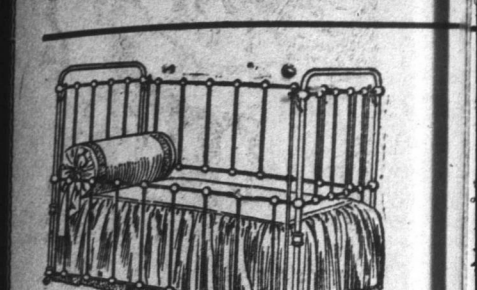

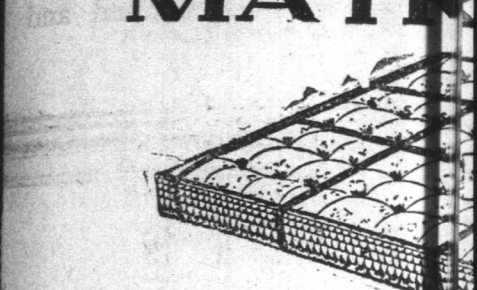

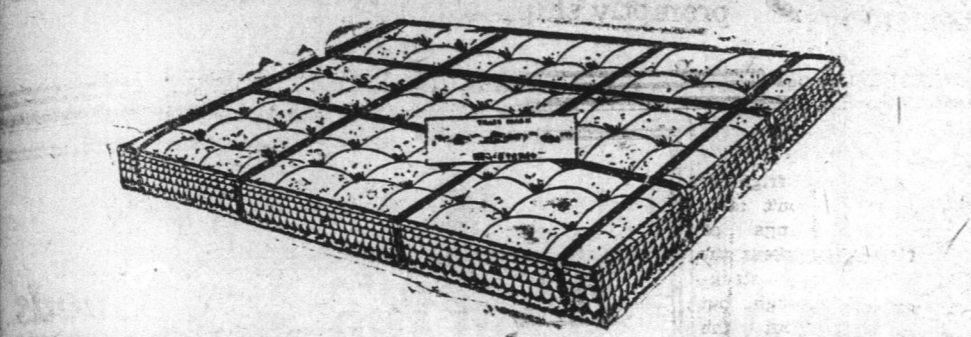
