

(b) Voyages in the North Atlantic and Arctic Oceans between Meridians 10 degrees West and 44 degrees East from August 4th, 1914, to November 11th, 1918. (c) All seas in the following peri-

> 4th August, 1914, to 11th April, 1915. st January, 1916, to 4th March. 1916 November, 1916, to ruary, 1918.

(d) The Atlantic Ocean North of the Mediteranean ,White Sea and United Kingdom waters, from February, 1917, to the Armis-tice (11 November, 1918).

(e) Voyage in ships held up in the Baltic and Black Sea at the out-break of war which were afterwards used in these areas by the Government of Russia.



last night's meeting of the M. C. rary Institute, the subject for was: "Resolved that the enciple of Uniform Wages as recognized by the various Unions is unjustifable." The leaders for the affirmative were Messus. Wm. Drover and G. gushve; for the negative, Messrs. R. I Templeton, W. Moore and W. goight. The affirmative presented sound arguments and endeavored to show that the principle of uniform wages contributes largely to the unsettled state of the world to-day, and has been the means of imposing a finncial burden on a helpless public, hecause employees have to pay as nuch for inferior as for superior sork. The principle is destructive to he industrious workmen as he is reneed to the level of the careless or indifferent artisan. The affirmative made it clear that it was not hostile unionism as a principle, but rather looked with dismay upon the application of uniformity in wages which was eating as a cancer into the vitals of unionism. The application of a minimum wage was considered by he affirmative as more calculated to bring about better conditions for lafor and greater fairness to the pubto than the principle to question. The negative argued that the position labor in the individual world skes it imperative that uniformity wages be paid and is essential to he well-being of the worker. It was cinted out that unions do not apply this principle without discretion but rather put a fair classification in abor and discriminate between unkilled and skilled labor and also lassify various degrees of skilled laor. Uniformity is a principle applying to every avenue of life and that noney paid does not destroy the emiency of man. Except for its aplication a great hardship would be reed on older men who have orne the burden and heat of the day. If there was not the protection such uniformity, men in advanced would not get a living wage, bese of the fact that their producing power was lessened. Much useinformation was brought out during the debate and on a vote being ken, it went in favor of the affirmtive. Next week's subject will be: Resolved, that a System of Educaon along the lines of Commercial raining would be more adaptable to the needs of our young people than he system of Higher Education now

TAKES A CYNICAL VIEW.

I have spent nearly nine years nexplored regions of Canada from the Klondyke to Hudson Bay, and I have known and lived much of the life Doctor Grenfell must so thoroughly enjoy. I know its fascinations and its charms and I possess neither the heart nor the soul of a martyr or a medical missionary. Many of us Newfoundlanders have only recently returned from the maeistrom of the accursed war and we have seen the hollow mockery of nearly two thousand years of missionary activity. We have seen a great deal more, and the church and missionary societies as a whole must pardon us if we take a cynical view of what constitutes modern civilization.

A WIDER FIELD IN THE U. K.

Doctor Grenfell may be doing plendidly on the Labrador but he ould do a great deal more in the land of his birth and he would have much wider field for his activities. have seen more drunkenness, more moral and social degradation in one square mile of an English industrial tre during war-time than it twenty-one years of my life in Newfoundland, and ten years sojourning in the States and Canada. I have seen worse in England and ten times worse in the countries of Southern Europe, and we have been supplied with missionaries from over there since Cabot made his first landfall on this side of the Atlantic. There is something radically wrong somewhere and we have come to a period in life when we question many things and think a little for ourselves. If Doctor Grenfell must continue his work on Labrador (since he finds the beautiful summer climate so conducive to his health and happiness), I have no objection, but as a Newfoundlander who has the pride and best interests of his country at heart, strongly object to those abominable lecture tours, and the methods by which he secures old clothes and pennies from the charitably disposed and hopelessly deluded people abroad. If the people of Newfoundland and Labrador were possessed of only one-half of the primitive instincts and missionary-eating proc livities that Doctor Grenfell's hearers believe them to possess, he would have disappeared from the scene of his activities long ago, and would have been a real martyr to the missionary cause, and I am firmly convinced Newfoundland would have gained considerably by the transac-





BRILLIANT MINISTER **VICTIM OF INFLUENZA**

Rev. Dudley B. Ashford, Noted Preacher and Lecturer. Well Known on Three Continents, Was Ordered to Give Up

Reverend Dudley B. Ashford is an extraordinary man. Although still on the sunny side of forty, he has crowded more service to humanity into a few years than most men accomplish
