There is little or no change to report in the city markets so far as grain is concerned since last week; prices keep pretty close to what they were and business jogs along with the same quiet, lazy gait. All that can be said in their favour is that they are pretty steady. The supply in the Guelph market has not been large, but has increased under the influence of the last two fine days. Still the receipts of grain are far from being large, the deliveries of wheat not amounting to more than 600 bushels per day at best.
