New York, Aug. 6.—A Geneva special says that as the Arbitration progresses the probabilities increase that the verdict will be against England, that it will be in the form of a declaration of her general responsibility for the acts of Confederate cruisers, and the award will be a gross amount of damages of some magni-tude. There is reason to believe that the case of the Georgia is the weakest, and has been practically abandoned. The case of the Shenandoah, however, is The case of the Shenandoah, however, is pressed closely, and indemnity for the losses to the whaling fleet is especially urged. The discussion proceeds faster than was generally expected. The English counsel give particular emphasis to the argument that the Tribunal, under the Treaty of Washington, has, no right to examine the conduct of England in her execution of the municipal law, and they maintain that no nation is responsible to another for its international demonstration.

Madrid, Aug. 5.—King Amadeus has arrived at San Sebastian, in the Province of Gniposcod. He met with a warm reception from the residents of the town, who manifested great enthusiasm over his presence. He was also visited by the Prefect of the adjoining French Department of Basses Pyreenes, who delivered a letter from President Thiers to the King, congratulating him upon his recent escape from assassination in this city, New York, August 5, 1:15 p. m.—No further press despatches have been received from North Carolina to-day. Specials from Raleigh now compute Merriman's majority at between 500 and 1,200.
