Mrs. Alger's Case Only One in a Widespread Swindle.  
FRAUD UNEARTHED BY THE WORLD

A Writ for \$20,000 Label was to Blind the Insurance Co's.

Dr. Francy, the Physician Who Examined Mrs. Alger, Swears that He Made a Favorable Report Despite the Fact that She was Suffering from Chronic Consumption—of the \$1000 He was to Receive.

Whitby, Nov. 8.—The preliminary investigation into the charge of conspiracy to defraud the Equitable Life Insurance Company, preferred against George Elisha Alger, of Pickering, Ontario, was opened here today before Major Harper, P.M. The circumstances of the placing of the insurance policy in the name of Mrs. Alger, who was in a dying condition, her death on Aug. 13, and the exhumation of the body from the cemetery on Sept. 10, and the subsequent action on the part of Alger to compel by a subsequent meeting of the policy, resulting in the arrest of Alger, are still fresh in the minds of the public.

Alger has been incarcerated in the county jail, his solicitors having been unable to find anyone who would vouch for Alger's appearance at the proper time.

The developments have caused no small sensation throughout the county and more especially in Pickering township, where the relatives of Mrs. Alger stood high in the public esteem. Her father having for many years been entrusted with responsible municipal positions, the entire township was shocked when it was known that Alger had been incarcerated in the county jail, his solicitors having been unable to find anyone who would vouch for Alger's appearance at the proper time.

Encouraged by the success in the Alger case, and urged on by their greed of easily acquired wealth, many in the county are turning to the Equitable Life Insurance Company for a policy, and are being misled by the agents who are offering them policies that are nothing more than a scheme to defraud the company.

Five Policies Cancelled.  
In the evidence before Magistrate Harper to-day, Mr. George H. Francy, of the Equitable Life Insurance Company, stated that his company had cancelled five policies on the ground that they were issued to persons who were not living.

**THE COUNTRY'S FINANCES.**

REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE FOR FOUR MONTHS.  
Nearly a Million Dollars Ahead of Last Year in Receipts, While Expenditures Are Substantially Less—Beaver Line Subsidy—The Premier on the Pacific Cable Project—Other Ottawa News.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—The statement of revenue and expenditure for the first four months of the current fiscal year, just issued, shows that the total revenue amounts to \$117,784,645, as against \$10,829,497 for the same period last year.

Expenditure totalled \$3,007,542, as against \$8,444,896 last year. Capital expenditure amounted to \$1,421,714, compared with \$1,510,950. The net debt, Oct. 31, was \$250,585,201, a decrease of \$83,000 in a month.

Saunders is chairman of a sub-committee of the Board of Works appointed to consider the advisability of changing the by-law which compels the contractor to pay for the material and labor used on city contracts in case the contractor is delinquent. Ald. Saunders' proposal was to pay for very fishy claims for material put in of late. Mr. Rust, Assistant City Engineer, is opposed to the proposition, but the balance of the sub-committee agree with Ald. Saunders, who will report to the Board of Works.

Senator Thurman Dying.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 8.-Ex-Senator Allen G. Thurman fell from a sofa in his library last Friday and suffered serious injuries which have developed into a serious nature, and he cannot possibly recover.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

On the local stock exchange yesterday the strongest security was Western Assurance, which sold at 165 1/2. There is an unsettled feeling with regard to Street Railway, which sold at 77 3/4. Canadian Pacific is lower, in sympathy with the decline in London, where all railway issues are depressed.

The decline of 3/4 in British consols from the closing price of Thursday was the prominent feature in financial circles yesterday. This is the most serious decline in a single day for many months, and is considered as an indication that the political situation in Europe is strained.

It is said that no gold will be shipped at New York to-day, although the usual rate of sterling exchange is up to \$4.39 1/4, which admits of a profit in the export of the yellow metal. Since Jan. 1 the net exports of gold from New York aggregate \$44,830,000, as compared with \$68,384,000 the corresponding period of last year, and \$12,479,000 in 1893.

The bears on Wall-street, so the story goes, are determined to make the Monetary Trust liquidate their holdings of St. Paul. This trust for some time past were the largest buyers of this particular stock. The price yesterday declined to 73, the lowest for several months.

Money is unchanged. There is a noticeable tendency of the part of lenders to discriminate against certain classes of collateral, but this has had no perceptible influence upon the general market.

The foreign trade of the United States for the year ended June 30 shows a large increase in imports. The total value of the imports is given at \$731,957,876, against \$654,994,622, an increase of 12 per cent. The exports for the same period amount to \$507,589,133, against \$522,140,572, a decrease from the year previous of 3 per cent. Of course trade with the United Kingdom was heavier than that with any other country, the imports amounting to \$119,438, against \$107,785, an increase of 10 per cent, while the exports were \$387,170,865, against \$461,085,207, a decrease of 16 per cent.

REDUCTIONS IN WARD ONE.

The Cuts Individually Small But in the Aggregate Large.

The Court of Revision got to work yesterday, making a large number of reductions for inconsiderable amounts. Joseph Simpson received a reduction of ten per cent on 781 feet of land on various streets in Ward 1. That on Marjory-avenue was assessed for \$2; on Bernard-street, \$6; Jones-avenue, \$4; Booth-avenue \$13 and \$14, Natale-street \$7. William Burton had his lots on Elliott-street reduced from \$22 to \$20 per foot. Patrick Foley's Broadway-avenue property was reduced from \$27 to \$25. Messrs. J. Cole and J. Argett appealed to have five acres on Danforth-avenue reduced from \$500 per acre. The rate was reduced to \$400. Detective Alf Cuddy succeeded in having \$5 knocked off an assessment of \$45 per foot for a lot on Queen-street east. Samuel Brown's Gerrard-street property was reduced from \$22 to \$18. Robert Sparks' land on Broadway-avenue was reduced from \$22 to \$20. Moses Aikin's land on Greenwood-avenue, assessed at \$700 per acre, was reduced by \$100. The Land Security got a cut of \$7 on land at 139 Queen-street, assessed for \$5. Many properties adjacent to these named received similar reductions, and the aggregate will mean a large sum.

The Two Canals.

Editor World: In to-day's issue of your paper, you say: "A glance at the map of Ontario discloses the fact that by far the shortest waterway from the upper lakes to Montreal lies by way of French River, Lake Nipissing and the Ottawa River. The Montreal, Ottawa and Georgian Bay Canal far outclasses the proposed Georgian Bay ship canal as a saver of time and distance."

The statement that the Ottawa Valley scheme "far outclasses the proposed Georgian Bay Ship Canal as a saver of time and distance" is wholly at variance with the facts. To begin with, the contemplated waterway by the line of the Ottawa valley will have a depth but nine feet - all that is practicable, owing to the enormous cost that would be involved in removing the rock formation necessary to give the contemplated canal a depth of practically a duplication of the Erie, and its use will involve transshipment to and from small barges at both ends to and from small barges to the much larger vessels in use on the lakes.

The proposed Georgian Bay Canal, on the other hand, will encounter no rock, and it will be possible to secure by this route a depth of 20 feet for the same cost as would be necessary in obtaining nine feet by the Ottawa Valley. It is really - owing to the necessity it would involve of transshipment and the use of small craft - not a deeper channel. Such a canal will be practically a duplication of the Erie, and its use will involve transshipment at both ends to and from small barges to the much larger vessels in use on the lakes.

There is, too, another very important consideration that should not be lost sight of. The still waters of the Ottawa Valley are clogged by ice for nearly two months longer than the Georgian Bay and Holland Rivers and Lake Simcoe. This fact alone is sufficient to show that the Ottawa Valley scheme out of court altogether.
