A By-Law to sise the sam of Te Thousand Dollars, to aid in the con struction of Tile, Stone and Timber

The Municipality of the Township of Howard in the County of Kent, in ursuans to the Act of the beginning of Ontario, passed in the forty dirst year of Her Majesty's reign. ptered eight, of 1879, enacts as follows

Isr.—That the Reeve of the said township of Howard may, from time to time, subject to the provisions of the By Law, borrow on the credit of the Corporation of the said Mumicipality, such sums of money, not exceeding in the whole, Ten Thomasad Dolars, as may be deemed by the said Council, and may in manner hereinafter provided, issue debentures of the said torporation in sums of On-Hindred Dollars each, for the amount so borrowed, the said bebentures to have crupons attached, as provided in the fourth section of the said first mentioned Act.

2np.—That when the Council shall be of opinion that the application of any person or perform who may be assessed as owners of land in the said municipality, to borrow money for the purpose of constructing tile, stone or timber drains, should be granted in whole or in part, then the said Council may, by resolution, instruct the said Reeve to issue debentures as aforesaid, and borrow such sam of money as does not exceed the amount applied for, and loan the same to the said applicant or applicants on the completion of their respective drainage works.
