Official Circular No. 1.

OFFICE OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL,  
 TORONTO, 9th Sept., 1889.

To all Subordinate Courts :

We beg to advise you of some of the changes made by the Supreme Court, at its recent Session, which, by the way, was one of the most harmonious ever held in connection with the Order.

1. The Beneficiary members have been divided into three classes, viz. : The Ordinary Class, the Hazardous Class and the Extra Hazardous Class. Those in the Hazardous Class are those who are engaged in, or follow any of the undermentioned occupations or callings, viz. : Officers and crew and other employees of ocean or inland steamers, railway train men and other employees on passenger trains, engineers and firemen of freight trains, hotel keepers who do not attend their own bars, firemen, shovellers in elevators, grinders of edge tools, pilots, quarrymen, raftsmen, slaters, telegraph linemen and yardmasters. The rates which the Hazardous Class pay are the same as those of the Extra Hazardous Rates in the old Constitution.

2. The Extra Hazardous Class consists of all officers and crew and other employees on sailing vessels ; all engaged in blasting, surface mining, divers, glassblowers, manufacturers of fireworks, brakemen and conductors of freight trains, buzz sawyers and circular sawyers.

All the Tables of Rates for the Ordinary Class, the Hazardous Class and the Extra Hazardous Class go up to 50th birthday only.

3. Those who join between the 50th and 55th birthdays will come under the following :

(1) Any applicant in the Ordinary or Hazardous Class who is admitted to the Order, or any member who may be reinstated between the fiftieth and fifty-fifth birthday, shall pay on admission or reinstatement the rate for his actual age as given in the following :

Thereafter on each recurring birthday he shall pay the increased rate for his increased age as given in this table.

(2) No one who has passed his fifty-fifth birthday can be admitted to Beneficiary membership except as provided in Section 107, Sub-section 6.

(3) No applicant in the Extra Hazardous Class can be admitted after his *fiftieth* birthday.

4. The following are disqualified for membership:

All underground coal miners, lead and copper miners, employees in and around powder mills, all engaged in manufacturing dynamite or other explosives, saloon keepers and bar-tenders where intoxicants are sold, and all persons whose occupation may from time to time be scheduled by the Supreme Court or by the Executive Council as "Specially Dangerous," shall not be eligible for admission as Beneficiary members.

5. The Enrolment Fee in the Sick and Funeral Benefit Department has been made a uniform fee of \$1.00 and in future no assessments are payable for the month in which the enrolment takes place.

6. Urinary examinations are now compulsory in each and every case, and the Examination Fee for \$1,000 has been fixed at not less than \$1.50, and for \$2,000 or \$3,000 at not less than \$2.00.

All these changes come into effect on the 1st October next, and all officers and members are required to govern themselves accordingly.

7. The New Executive are desirous of commencing with a clean sheet, Court Deputies and other officers are therefore requested to immediately send to the Supreme Chief Ranger the name of any brother who has passed the Medical Board and who has not yet received his policy, also the name of any brother who has not received his certificate of membership.

Much delay takes place in the issuing of policies by reason of the fact that the Christian name of the Beneficiary is not given. Some with "Mrs. David Smith," instead of "Mrs. Mary Smith," etc. Others again sign the application for membership "John Smith" and sign the Medical Examination paper "John L. Smith." No policy can be issued unless the signature on the application for membership corresponds exactly to that on the Medical Examination paper.

8. Another important change is that in future the Capitation Tax will be paid direct to the Supreme Court. It has been fixed at

50c. a year, payable 25c. on 1st January, and 25c. on 1st July. For this the Supreme Court will send THE INDEPENDENT FORESTER free to every member of the Order. Recording Secretaries are therefore requested to send to Brother Atwell Fleming, London, the Business Manager, the names of each of the members of their Courts, giving P. O. address of each, and THE FORESTER will be sent to the individual members.

9. Brother John A. McGillivray, Toronto, was elected Supreme Secretary. All drafts and P. O. money orders should be made payable to "*The Manager of the Bank of Toronto, Toronto,*" and sent with all correspondence to the new Supreme Secretary.

10. Dr. Oronhyatekha was re-elected Editor of THE FORESTER, and all matter for the columns of the Official Organ should be sent to him at Toronto.

The space in THE FORESTER is getting so valuable that it has been decided to discontinue all "thanks" for moneys paid for benefits, also all condolences except in special cases. Do not therefore send any more of such literature.

11. All sick notices and all Sick Benefit Claims are in future to be sent to the Supreme Physician, Brother Dr. Millman, Toronto. Officers of Courts will please note this.

12. A Juvenile Department was authorized by the Supreme Court, and Juvenile Courts can now be organized in connection with any Court, to consist of at least 20 Charter members. The limit of age is from 12 to 17. Any member of the Order who will subscribe to the obligation of the Juvenile Court can become an honorary member thereof.

The Charter fee for a Juvenile Court has been fixed at \$10.

Courts desiring to form a Juvenile Court, can send in a written application, with Charter fee, when arrangements will be made to constitute the Court.

## Official Circular.

PORT PERRY, ONT., 27th Aug., 1889.  
*To the Officers and members of all Subordinate  
 Courts of the Independent Order of For-  
 esters within the Province of Ontario:*

MY DEAR BRETHREN,—At the meeting of the High Court recently held in the City of Kingston your representatives, there assembled, were pleased to elect me to the distinguished and honorable position of High Chief Ranger.

I take this, the earliest opportunity, to express my heartfelt thanks to them and to you for the high compliment paid me. I am fully alive to the fact that the office is one having attached to it important duties and responsibilities, and had I to rely upon myself alone I should not have accepted, but knowing I could, with confidence, look to one and all of you, and especially to the able Executive associated with me, for hearty co-operation and assistance from time to time, as occasion might require, I accepted the trust.

At the recent meeting of the High Court several matters were considered, some of the more important of which I shall briefly direct your attention to. Brother C. C. Whale, in 1888, was appointed Instructor and Organizer, at a salary of \$1,000. So satisfied was the High Court with his report that he was re-appointed for the current year at the same salary, with a provision, however, that in every case where, by his efforts, a new member was secured for an existing Court \$2 should be paid to him, which sum should be returned to the High Secretary, to be applied as follows: \$1 towards Brother Whale's expenses and the balance to form a fund for the defraying of the expenses of an assistant.

The \$2 per member is payable upon Brother Whale obtaining and leaving with the proper officer of the local Court the application and deposit of the applicant.

It was also provided that Brother Whale should visit only weak Courts. In order to define what shall be considered a weak Court, I have concluded that all Courts having a membership of less than 30 should come within the category.

I would therefore urge upon strong Courts not to ask for the assistance of Brother Whale, as the demands from those Courts really needing his services will require all the time at his disposal.

Courts requiring assistance will first communicate with me, when I shall arrange with the Instructor to visit in all cases where it is possible to do so.

A number of propositions for amendment to the Constitution were submitted to the High Court, which I regret to say, because of their importance, and the want of time, could not properly be considered. In order that hereafter ample opportunity may be afforded for all Subordinate Courts to see and consider like proposals, a by-law was passed requiring that all proposed amendments shall be inserted in THE FORESTER not later than the number for June next preceding the date of meeting of the High Court. So soon as the by-law has received the sanction of the Supreme Executive I shall cause it to be promulgated through THE FORESTER.

Another matter for your consideration, which was carried at the same session, was, that the Supreme Court should amend the Constitution by giving to High Courts power to reduce the representation from Subordinate Courts. Should the suggestion be carried out, you will have an opportunity next year to say if the representatives shall be reduced.

A matter of a serious nature which came under my notice, when at the High Court session, was, that by the High Secretary's report, it appeared so great a number as 109 of the Subordinate Courts were not clear upon the books of the High Court on the 1st day of July. Strictly speaking: had the votes of their representatives been objected to the objection must have prevailed. Whilst I readily admit that technical objections usually meet with disfavor, and often deservedly so, I yet must remind you that the stability and success of our Order are largely dependent upon strict adherence to the provisions of the Constitution respecting money matters.

I have thus referred to this matter that I might the more forcibly impress upon you the importance and necessity of seeing that your respective Courts are kept in "good standing" with the High Court, and especially, that your delegates be not disfranchised.

It was decided that the next meeting of the High Court should be held in the city of Guelph, on the second Tuesday in August.

It having come to my knowledge that individual members of the Order have been making a practice of writing the Supreme Court Officers for information, and in many cases not enclosing a stamp, I have to point out to you, that all such matters should be brought to the notice of the local Court, and if approved, the information sought be asked of the High Chief Ranger, through the Court Deputy, thus relieving the Supreme Court Officers of matters, with which, strictly

speaking, they ought not to be called upon to deal, except through a High Court.

I desire of all Subordinate Courts that they should, as soon as possible, advise me through their Recording Secretary of the name of a brother of their number whom, from his integrity and zeal for the Order, they would wish me to appoint Court Deputy.

Let me impress upon you the advisability of arranging within your respective Courts for one or more of your members to actively canvass for members, as a healthy influx of "new blood" is not alone an evidence of prosperity, but is a guaranty in itself of the stability of our Order.

I would especially urge upon all Deputies to put forth every effort to further the Order, as it is because of an abiding faith in their fitness for their respective positions and readiness to actively exert themselves, that they have been selected and appointed.

I have been favorably impressed with a pamphlet prepared for, and issued by the Supreme Court, which is so excellent a hand book for canvassers, that I have ordered a supply, and when received, one or more copies will be sent to each Court.

I direct that this circular be read in all Subordinate Courts as soon after being received as can be done.

Trusting, my dear brethren, that encouraged by the marked prosperity of the Order during the past year, one and all will go forward with even greater zeal, so that when we meet a 12 month hence I may be able to exhibit to your representatives, a record of success unparalleled in the history of our High Court.

That I may be favored with frequent opportunities of meeting with many of you in your Courts during the year.

And that the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, in His wisdom and goodness, may continue to extend prosperity to us and our Order.

HIGH CHIEF RANGER'S REPORT.

BRETHREN,—It gives me much pleasure, in submitting my report, to welcome you to the Limestone City of Kingston. As you honored me, a native of this city, with your confidence one year ago, by placing me in the responsible position of High Chief Ranger, entrusting to my care the welfare of the Order in this jurisdiction, the time has now arrived when I have the privilege of briefly reporting on the year's work and offering such suggestions as seem to me to be in the best interests of the Order.

INCREASE OF MEMBERSHIP.

It has given me great pleasure in my term of office to view the rapid increase of membership in Ontario, the province having the distinction of being the birth-place of our noble Order in the Dominion

of Canada, and to note that Independent Forestry is heartily supported by a class of men any society might feel proud to have enrolled within its ranks. This is due in a large measure to our able and conscientious staff of medical examiners. While indebted to them, I have also to thank the many who have given their time and attention to the advancement of the Order, and who for their work's sake deserve to have their names handed down as earnest promoters of an Institution which has conclusively proved to be the stay of the widow and the support of the orphan.

VISITATIONS.

During the year I found it necessary in several instances, and in others expedient, to visit a number of Subordinate Courts with the view of assisting them, and in every instance, I am happy to say, good has been accomplished. My only regret is that want of time prevented me doing more in this connection, being enabled to make but 29 visits and attend 11 public meetings. To allow of more being done in the future, I recommend that a certain amount be placed to the credit of the High Chief Ranger, so that a larger number of Courts can have the benefit of visits by members of the High Standing Committee. I feel satisfied the making of an appropriation would contribute largely to the reduction of the present extensive correspondence with the High Chief Ranger's office. At the last meeting of the High Court you wisely appointed an inspector to visit weak Courts. I am pleased to state that Brother C. C. Whale, the representative selected, has given entire satisfaction to the High Standing Committee, and reports from Courts visited by him demonstrate that his work has been most beneficial. Persevering and painstaking, he deserves well at your hands, and I trust that this High Court will in its wisdom continue his services, as there is a large field yet requiring attention.

HIGH STANDING COMMITTEE.

Owing to the rapid increase of the Order and the extra amount of correspondence it was necessary to call the High Standing Committee together twice, to permit of your officers consulting for the more effective spread of principles dear to us all.

CHANGE IN CONSTITUTION.

Several changes have been suggested which will be brought under your notice. Meantime, I recommend that as this High Court has so rapidly grown in the number of its representatives, and the Subordinate Courts are constantly increasing, that at the present Session you memorialize the Supreme body to so amend the Constitution as to allow each High Court having the power to control the representation within its jurisdiction.

ACT OF INCORPORATION.

By the energy of the Executive Council and our brethren in the House of Commons we have secured an Act of Incorporation from the Dominion Parliament, a matter of the utmost importance to the Order and for which we are most thankful.

In conclusion, while I have endeavored to the best of my ability to discharge the duties of this office, I cannot close without expressing my high appreciation of the willing aid given me by my provincial and other deputies. I assure them they have my sincere thanks. It is also a pleasure to gratefully acknowledge the kind assistance of the Supreme Chief Ranger and his associates, and that of my colleagues in office, especially the very satisfactory manner in which the High Secretary and High Treasurer have discharged

their onerous duties. I feel that were I to overlook the exertions put forth by those two brethren to keep up with the extra duties imposed upon them I would fail in my duty towards you and them, and therefore I deem it a right and a privilege to allude to their valuable services. As those officers will submit detailed reports I now return to you the honorable office with which 12 months ago you invested me, in the hope that my efforts in discharging its duties will have your approval, and that by our united endeavors our beloved Order will long occupy its present proud position.

HIGH SECRETARY'S REPORT.

To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and Representatives of the High Court of Ontario:

BRETHREN,—In the good providence of the Supreme Ruler of the Universe we are permitted to again meet in the City of Kingston to review the past and to take counsel together for the further extension of our beloved Order.

Here, the seat of the banner Court of the jurisdiction, I had the honor, five years ago, to be elected to the position I still, by your favor, hold, and now it is my privilege to state that during the time which has since elapsed, steady increase and consequent prosperity have rewarded the labors of the officers and membership. While in 1884 we had but 1,631 members, we have to-day 9,483, and when in 1884 we had an indebtedness of \$1,881.15, in 1889 the assets exceed the liabilities by over \$500.

As regards the year just closed, 44 new Courts have been instituted, and the entire membership in Ontario is as follows:

Respecting the finances, full particulars thereof will be found in the annexed statements:

Last year, on the advice of the High Standing Committee, you were pleased to establish the office of Organizer and Instructor, and selected for the position Representative C. C. Whale. It affords me much satisfaction to inform you that the Brother has proved to be eminently fitted for the work. Active, energetic, always at his post, he has more than realized the expectations of the High Court, and my colleagues authorize me to recommend his reappointment. Should this suggestion meet with your approval permit me to point out the necessity for increased remuneration, for it is impossible to retain his

services and require him to ~~draw~~ his traveling and hotel expenses if only \$1,000 are appropriated for the purpose. This matter will, doubtless, receive your careful consideration, the more so, when you have the assurance that an Organizer and Instructor has become a necessity. Many requests were made, through my office, for the services of Brother Whale. These were complied with as far as possible, and to the entire satisfaction of the Courts, as the numerous letters in my possession testify. Assuming that the office will be retained I advise the continuation of the capitation tax as at present, viz.: \$1 per annum per member.

While Brother Whale could not, in the time at his disposal, meet with every Court, yet much of the work he was unable to overtake, has been attended to by the High Officers and Deputies. Notably has this been the case with the High Chief Ranger, who with an enthusiasm beyond praise, has been untiring in his efforts. At much personal inconvenience and the expenditure of time and money, he has rendered invaluable service in more firmly establishing the Order. Now, when thanking him for uniform kindness and courtesy, I deem it my duty to respectfully suggest he receive some tangible recognition of your appreciation of his conduct.

Much as the work of my office had increased in 1887-88, it has been even greater in 1888-89, the number of letters received and dispatched being more than trebled on any previous record, while the transmission of large quantities of supplies has entailed excessive labor. In the discharge of my various duties I gratefully acknowledge the kindly aid and support given me by the Executive Council, my colleagues in office, and the entire Brotherhood.

The utmost harmony and prosperity exist throughout the jurisdiction, and nothing of special moment has come under my notice requiring your attention, unless the several recommendations of various Courts for amendments of the Constitution, and which I table with this report.

We mourn the loss of 45 brothers, who, faithful unto death, have preceded us to the haven of rest, where sorrow and pain are unknown and all tears are wiped away.

Such, brethren, is a brief *resume*, of what has been accomplished. May the work done be an incentive to greater effort. In that earnest hope this report is respectfully submitted by

#### REPORT OF THE HIGH AUDITORS.

The report of the High Auditors was then presented and distributed to the members, and is as follows :

*High Chief Ranger, Officers and Representatives of the High Court, I. O. F. of Ontario:*

BRETHREN,—We beg respectfully to submit to you the report of our labors as Auditors.

We have examined the books, vouchers and accounts of the High Secretary and Treasurer for the year ending 30th June, 1889, and find the same correct, and the books well kept.

We recognize with pleasure the very large increase in the membership, and cannot omit referring to the exceedingly large increase of work which has devolved upon these officers during the year.

We are pleased to notice an increase of revenue, and although the expenditure has necessarily been greater, the assets of the High Court have improved.

We have taken the liberty of suggesting to the High Secretary that by adopting certain forms the same accuracy will be secured with less labor to himself.

Consequent upon the increase of work in all the departments of the High Court, there has, of course, been a corresponding amount of responsibility resting on the Auditors. We have found the time at our disposal altogether too short to complete an audit as thoroughly as we would desire, and beg to recommend that hereafter a half-yearly audit be made, and that the final audit be finished prior to the printing of the reports, sufficient time being allowed for a perfect audit.

From what we have seen, it is apparent to us that the success of the High Court has attained proportions far ahead of what the High Court expected a year ago, and we look forward almost with certainty to our Order numbering 15,000 members in Ontario by next annual meeting. In view, therefore, of the immense work now and in prospect devolving on the High Secretary, we, with pleasure, recommend that his salary for the coming year be \$800, the said amount to cover any cost to which he may be put in procuring clerical assistance.

#### REPORT ON MEMORIALS AND APPEALS.

Brother E. Botterell, Chairman, brought in the first report of the Committee on Memorials and Appeals, which was ordered to be considered *seriatim*, and upon such consideration was adopted, and is as follows :

*To the High Court of Ontario, I O F. :*

The Committee on Memorials and Appeals beg leave to submit their first report.

At the annual meeting of this High Court held in August, 1888, at Toronto, it was resolved that all motions to amend the Constitution and memorials to the Supreme Court intended to be brought up at the next or any subsequent meeting of the High Court, be sent to the High Secretary at least two months prior to the meeting of the High Court.

Having regard to this resolution we find that the following notices of proposed amendments and memorial were not received by the High Secretary at least two months before the date of the present meeting of this High Court :

- (1) Notice from a committee of the several Courts of the City of London.
- (2) From Court Welcome, London.
- (3) From Court Ottawa.
- (4) From Brother J. J. Mix.

Referring to the notice from the committee of the Courts of the City of London, we may state that one of the proposed amendments is to dispense with the affidavit in proof of claim for Sick Benefits. Upon examining the Constitution we cannot find any provision requiring such a proof, and we would recommend that the attention of the Supreme Court be drawn thereto with a view to an amendment requiring solemn proof of claim in every such case. We would also direct attention that proofs of claim in any case should not be by affidavit, but by statutory declaration as provided by the statute of the Dominion Parliament respecting voluntary and extra-judicial oaths, to be used in all cases arising in the Dominion, and that in those States or Countries where an affidavit is permitted by the laws of such State or Country an affidavit be used.

The notices from Court Lambeth and Court Laurentian were received in proper time by the High Secretary and by him published in THE FORESTER.

The notice of proposed amendment from Court Lambeth proposes. 1st, to amend clause 2 of section 44 of the Constitution by providing that a delegate to a High Court must be a member of the Subordinate Court he represents. Your Committee think such a change would be inadvisable. Each Subordinate Court now has it within its own power to appoint its delegates, and should the power to appoint a brother from another Court be exercised members of other Courts cannot fairly object thereto. 2nd, that the High Court pay the necessary expenses of representatives attending High Court meetings. Your Committee cannot recommend any such radical change. The finances of the High Court would not admit of any such payments, to make which would require a substantial increase of the capitation tax or the formation of a separate fund to be raised by some form of assessment.

The notice from Court Laurentian asks that the High Court, before close of the session, fix the date for the next meeting. Sub-section 3 of section 5, page 9, of the Constitution provides that such shall be done, so that the proposed amendment is wholly unnecessary.

#### JUVENILE FORESTERS.

The report of the General Superintendent of Juvenile Foresters was presented, as follows, and referred, on motion, to a special committee on Juvenile Forestry :

LONDON, 13th August, 1889.

*To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and Members of the High Court of Ontario, I.O.F.*

DEAR SIR AND BRETHREN,— I have the honor to present this the first report of Court Excelsior, No. 1, Juvenile Court I. O. F., located in the city of London, Ont.

After permission had been granted by the High Court at its last Session for instituting a Court of the above in the above City, I am pleased to report that we, the Committee of Management, have succeeded beyond our expectations in instituting a Court of as fine a lot of young boys as were ever seen together, but not until the Committee of Management had done some very hard work evening after evening in Session.

On the 30th of November last, after making preparation we instituted the above Court, with some 50 boys, ranging in age from 10 to 16 years, and up to the present a strong increase has been going on, till we now number about 65 members, but we expected by the next meeting of the High Court to have over 100 members, and no doubt would have had, if we had had a Constitution, for the parents of a large number of boys ask to look at the Constitution and By-Laws, and when we told them we have none till after the meeting of the High Court, and then it will be settled whether it will be universal or not; after being told this, scores of them have declined to let their sons join until the matter is finally settled by this Body. This is the reason that our Court is not twice the number it now is, but we are satisfied if the High Court adopt this report, and make the institution of Courts general throughout its jurisdiction, it will become one of the best features the Order ever had. You therefore can see the necessity of making it gen-

eral, and adopting a Constitution and code of By-Laws.

In addition to the boys we have some 25 honorary members from the Courts in the City, which are a great help to them. We have provided them with a very pretty badge for all the officers and members of the Court, Ode Cards, Gavel, Minute Books and Financial Secretary's book and other articles which were needed. Have paid a few boys sick benefits, and paid the Doctor his salary for the past half year, and rent, and are pleased to say we have a surplus of a few dollars to their credit in the bank.

One more word and I am done. We have established a drill class, and the boys are taking great interest in it, but not so much since the weather has turned out so warm, but as the evenings get cooler there will be a large attendance. It would do you good to be present at some of these meetings to notice the way the officers perform their duties, and the large numbers who turn out to the meetings, and notice the interest they take in the business.

Before I close I here take the opportunity of thanking the different Courts in London for their kind assistance, as well as the members of the Management Committee, who have worked so nobly in giving their attendance and advice to assist me in the important office I now hold as General Superintendent.

Before I close I hope and trust that the seed we have sown here in London may take root and grow throughout the Order at large, as I am fully convinced that it will be the means of building up our noble Order, for as we the older ones are called home to our Reward, the young ones will step into our places.

God grant that this High Court and all the members now present may live to see the new Order extended all over the world.

That inasmuch as public notice was not given of the meeting of High Court two months before the date fixed by the High Standing Committee for this meeting, and that consequently it was impossible for Subordinate Courts to carry out the spirit of resolution adopted by High Court last year, providing that all memorials and proposed amendments to the Constitution be in the hands of the High Secretary two months before the meeting of High Court, resolved that that resolution be suspended for this Session of High Court, and that the several notices of amendments to Constitution referred to in the first report of the Committee on Memorials and Appeals be again referred to that Committee, with instructions to report upon them at this Session, as if due notice had been given. Carried.

Moved by Brother Daniel Rose, seconded by Brother Dr. Oronhyatekha,

That out of the sum of five dollars initiation fee of members procured by the Organizer, the sum of two dollars shall be remitted to the High Court, one dollar of which shall be appropriated to the Organizer, to defray his expenses, and the other dollar to be placed in a fund for the payment of organizers.

Referred to the special committee on the High Organizer's report.

A memorial was received from Brothers Fred. Cook and John A. Ewan, proposing to publish a monthly journal, as the organ of the High Court of Ontario.

Referred to the Committee on Finance.

The following notice of motion given by Brother Gadsby, at last annual Session, was called up and entered as a notice of motion :

"That the Supreme Court Executive be requested to so amend or word the Constitution that a loss of a hand (right or left) be considered a disability sufficient to come under or within the meaning of the clause permanent disability, this disability to be considered in connection with and governed by the trade, occupation or profession the disabled has been engaged in, and so registered in the books of the Supreme Court."

The Supreme Chief Ranger at this stage, stated that he had been deputed by Brother John A. McGillivray, P.H.C.R., who is now in Europe, to convey to the High Court his regret at being unable to attend the present Session. The speaker referred in feeling terms to the eminent services of the distinguished brother whose absence is so deeply regretted by the body. The High Court, in musical form, voted him a "Jolly Good Fellow."

The Supreme Chief Ranger also presented a letter of regret for absence from Brother G. L. Dickinson, M.P., which was ordered to be read on the minutes, and is as follows :

*To Oronhyatekha, S.C.R., High Court, Kingston.*

MY DEAR DOCTOR, — Much to my regret I am prevented from attending High Court, both on account of the interesting proceedings of the meeting, the marked satisfactory progress made by the Order, thus missing the opportunity of renewing the acquaintance of so many members of the Order that I had the pleasure of meeting at Hamilton and Montreal, during 1887. The society of goodfellowship enjoyed on those occasions is indeed a pleasing memory to me, and I beg that you will convey to them my kind regards and my best wishes for the success of both the meetings of the High and Supreme Courts. May their deliberations prove of great benefit to and thus appropriately mark the *grand* progress and success of our Order. I also regret that my absence prevents my bearing testimony to the marked zeal, ability and "no surrender" policy displayed by your worthy self as S.C.R., and the Supreme Counselor at Ottawa, during the last Session of Parliament, that resulted in the marked success of securing the Dominion Incorporation Act of the Order, without a dissenting voice being raised in Parliament to the passing of the Act, the result of the good work done by yourself, Brother Botterell and Brother McGillivray before the committee of the House, which to my mind was the chief factor in our success. Unanimously adopted.

#### REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Brother W. W. Fitzgerald, Chairman, brought in the first report of the Finance Committee, which was ordered to be considered *seriatim*, and upon such consideration was amended in the third section, and as amended is as follows :

*To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and Members of the High Court of Ontario, I. O. F.*

Your Committee beg leave to report as follows :

1. That they have duly considered the several matters referred to them, and have great pleasure in reporting that the duties of the several officers of the High Court have been faithfully and well performed, and we congratulate the Order upon the able manner in which the work has been carried on, and the marked progress made during the year.

2. The reports of the High Secretary Treasurer, are so complete in themselves that marks or comments of this Committee are unnecessary.

3. From the several reports laid before High Court and referred to us, we notice that the membership has largely increased, causing a corresponding increase in the labors of the High Secretary, which your Committee think should be met by a cor-

responding salary, and we therefore recommend that his salary be placed at \$500.

4. In reference to the work of Organization and instruction, this High Court not having decided as to the advisability of continuing the services of an organizer and instructor, we do not at present recommend any amount for that purpose, but we beg leave to point out to High Court, that if the work is carried on, the sum of \$1,000 is not a sufficient sum to carry on the work efficiently.

5. The capitation tax has been considered by your Committee, and we find that the capitation tax \$1 per member heretofore paid, is divided as follows, namely, 25 cents go to the Supreme Court, 30 cents are applied to supply each member of the Order with a copy of THE INDEPENDENT FORESTER, leaving only 45 cents to be applied for the purposes of this High Court, and we are of the opinion that, considering the purposes to which the same is applied, the capitation tax is not excessive, and should be continued.

6. We recommend that the salary of the High Treasurer be the same as last year, namely \$200.

7. We recommend that the salary of the Auditors be the same as last year, \$15 each.

And we ask leave to bring in a supplementary report at a later stage.

#### REPORT ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

Brother Rev. W. B. Carey, Chairman, brought in the report of the Committee on the State of the Order, which was adopted and is as follows:

*To the High Chief Ranger Officers and Members of the High Court of Ontario:*

The Committee on the State of the Order beg respectfully to report.

That they again this year have to congratulate the High Court on the unparalleled measure of success vouchsafed by the Supreme Ruler of the Universe, to the I. O. F. in this jurisdiction. Last year your Committee recorded with no small degree of justifiable pride the fact that the Order had increased from 4,841 to 6,696. This year the increase has been from 6,699 to 10,002. If from this number we subtract the number of suspensions, and the number of deaths we find the net membership on the 30th June last to be 9,483, an increase of 45 per cent. during the year. It is only just to state that this large increase has been largely due to the valuable assistance rendered the Order by Brother C. C. Whale, the High Organizer and by High Chief Ranger's agent, Brother Bawden. Four Courts and 543 members having been formed and initiated by the former, and ten Courts and nearly 400 members by the latter. These numbers do not include the Courts instituted by the Supreme Court Officers.

Your Committee have further to congratulate the Order on the fact that while there has been an increase in the percentage of membership, there has been a decrease in the percentage of death rate as compared with last year. For this result our special heartfelt thanks are due to Almighty God. This very satisfactory condition of our affairs is no doubt largely due to the thorough and searching medical examinations, and the very great care taken in the admission of members. We have also to congratulate the Order

on the passage of the Act of Incorporation by the Dominion Parliament, and the status which this Act gives our Order throughout this Dominion.

Your Committee again this year have to call your attention to the fact that while great and praiseworthy efforts have been put forth for the increase of our Order, there is a great danger of having a number of weak Courts formed throughout this jurisdiction. We have to reiterate the statement made in our report of last year, namely, that our true increase does not consist in Courts but in membership. Your Committee would recommend that the special attention of the Organizer or organizers be given to the working up of these weak Courts.

In conclusion, your Committee beg to tender their sincere thanks to the High Chief Ranger and officers of the High Court, for the faithful and efficient manner in which they have discharged their respective duties.

(1) That we approve of the adoption of this report.  
(2) We recommend this High Court to memorialize the Supreme Court to make at its next session this Juvenile Branch general throughout the Order.

(3) That the Supreme Court be requested to instruct its Committee on Constitution and Laws to frame a code of By-laws for the Juvenile Department.

#### REPORT ON HIGH ORGANIZER AND INSTRUCTOR.

Brother David Millar, Chairman, brought in the report of the Special Committee on the report of the High Organizer and Instructor, which was adopted, and is as follows :

*To the High Chief Ranger, Officers and Members :*

The Committee to whom you referred the report

of High Organizer Whale, and the resolution anent the same by Daniel Rose, beg to submit the following:

(1) That we are pleased to know that the work accomplished by C. C. Whale has been satisfactory to the High Standing Committee.

(2) We recommend that his services be retained for another year.

(3) We recommend that his salary be \$1,000 a year.

(4) That his expenses be paid from the source set forth in Brother D. Rose's resolution, namely, that \$2 be kept out of the \$5 initiation fee of every member brought into the Order through his instrumentality and sent to the High Court to be placed into a fund for organizing purposes.

(5) That the charter fee for organizing new Courts be forwarded to the High Treasurer.

(6) That his services be under the sole control of the High Standing Committee.

#### REPORT ON MEMORIALS AND APPEALS.

The consideration of the second report of the Committee on Memorials and Appeals, adjourned from last night's session, was then resumed, and upon such consideration the report was amended, and as amended reads as follows:

##### *To the High Court of Ontario, I.O.F.:*

The Committee on Memorials and Appeals beg to submit their second report.

Of the several matters referred to them they have considered the following:

##### *From the London Courts—*

(1) To amend the Constitution so as to substitute 24 weeks for 12 weeks' allowance in cases of brothers entitled to sick benefits, and the amount to be \$5 per month for the first twelve weeks, and \$3 per week for the second twelve weeks. Your Committee consider such a change not in the interests of the Order, the more especially so as the charges upon the Sick and Funeral Benefit Fund are so large as to materially reduce the fund itself, and they believe any increase in the way suggested would necessitate increased rates or assessments.

(2) To reduce the representation to the High Court to one in fifty. The resolution of Brother Carson, referred to us, is to the same effect, as is also that of Court Welcome. Your Committee, whilst admitting the force of the contention that our own High Court, owing to the rapid and large increase of members in this Province, is becoming somewhat unwieldy, they nevertheless must not forget the interests of other High Courts wherein the membership is not nearly so large as with us, nor yet the fact that the large attendance at the meetings of the High Courts is one of the best means of making known to the outside public the importance of our organization. They would suggest, however, that the Supreme Court be memorialized to amend section 44, subsection 1, of the Constitution, by adding the following:

"Provided that any High Court may, by by-law passed at any regular meeting, reduce the representation from Subordinate Courts within its jurisdiction."

(3) "That THE FORESTER become an exclusively official organ, doing away with all advertisements and the chess board." Your Committee understand that THE FORESTER is now an exclusively official organ; that the advertisements are mainly the cards of Subordinate Courts inserted in pursuance of a former suggestion of this High Court, and that any space now occupied by other advertisements is owing to the fact that a sufficient number of Courts do not advertise to fill the space thus occupied.

(4) "That \$30 be set apart out of the Sick and Funeral Funds for the expense of burial of members' wives." Your Committee do not recommend such proposed amendment. They would direct attention to the fact that local Courts now have the power to set apart a sum not exceeding \$25 for such purposes, though how far this may be affected by the Act of Incorporation of the Order your Committee are not prepared to say, as they have not a copy of the Act before them for reference.

##### *From Court Ottawa—*

(1) "That the Supreme Court invite tenders for future printing." Your committee understand that such has been regularly done in the past, and they recommend its continuance.

(2) "To amend section 233, subsection 1, by providing that the expense of insuring when going on a Foresters' excursion be borne by the Supreme Court." Your Committee do not recommend such change in the Constitution, but they would suggest that the Local Courts apply to the Supreme Executive to arrange, if possible, with Insurance Companies for a reduction of rates in such cases.

##### *From Court Frontenac—*

(1) "That proof of age be required to accompany application for membership." Section 98 of the Constitution provides for forfeiture of all benefits by any member who shall fraudulently conceal his true age, and section 143 makes provision for corrections where the age, through mistake, has been erroneously given. In the opinion of your Committee the Constitution makes ample provision in such cases.

(2) "To amend section 134, subsection 2, by substituting 50 for 55." Your Committee recommend that the Supreme Court be requested to amend the section so as to provide that any person can be initiated into the Order after the age of 50 up to 55 only upon agreement to pay additional amounts each year as per actuarial cost of insurance.

(3) To amend section 137, subsection 1, by erasing the words "officers and crews in sailing vessels."

(4) To amend section 171 by inserting after the word "vessels" the word "barges."

Your Committee would suggest that these two matters be referred to the Supreme Court without recommendation, and that the attention of the Supreme Court be directed to the fact that the language of section 171 is such as to admit into the Ordinary Class, seamen who are employed upon steam crafts on the ocean, whilst mariners employed on like crafts on inland waters are placed in the Extra Hazardous Class, which in the judgment of your Committee was not contemplated by the Supreme Court when adopting the clause. Also that the Supreme Court more clearly define what is meant by the words "officers and crews in sailing vessels" in section 137, subsection 1.

Brother Mix has submitted fourteen propositions for amendments to the Constitution and Laws. Your

Committee feel warranted in urging upon this High Court, the absolute necessity of some provision whereby proposed amendments intended for discussion at the sitting of the High Court should be made known before the meeting at which it is proposed to introduce them, as in the limited time at the disposal of the Committee it is impossible to properly and sufficiently consider all matters submitted to them, and they would recommend the passage of a By-Law at this Session, requiring that all propositions to amend the Constitution or Laws should be published in THE FORESTER not later than the number for June next, preceding the meeting of the High Court at which it is intended to introduce them.

(1) "To amend section 15 by striking out the first line and inserting the words 'the members of the Executive Council.'" Your Committee do not recommend this proposition as the members of the Executive Council do not all have the handling of funds of the Order, whilst those who do are always under heavy and satisfactory bonds.

(2) This is disposed of by the first.

(3) Not recommended.

(4) "To strike out subsection 3 of section 34." Not recommended. Your Committee, however, would direct the attention of the Supreme Court to the fact that words have been omitted by the printer. To amend subsection 4 by inserting certain words. Not recommended, as the word "payment" there used is wider in its significance than the proposed additional words.

(5) To strike out subsection 6 of section 43. Not recommended.

(6) To strike out subsection 3 of section 44. Not recommended.

(7) To add a fourth subsection to section 65. Not recommended.

(8) To amend subsection 1 of section 73. Not recommended.

(9) To amend subsection 2 of section 79. Not recommended.

(10) To strike out subsection 5 of section 80. Not recommended.

(11) To strike out subsection 2 of section 142. There is no such subsection.

(12) Several amendments to section 187. Not recommended.

(13) To strike out section 220. Not recommended.

(14) To strike out section 223. Not recommended.

(15) To amend section 248. Not recommended.

Provided always that notwithstanding the foregoing provisions, any proposal to amend not so published may be submitted at a sitting of the High Court upon the assent of two-thirds of the members of the High Court being obtained thereto.

The Hamilton Carnival.

In the society parade which took place at Hamilton Carnival, on Wednesday 21st August, the Independent Order of Foresters made an excellent showing, members from all the city Courts turning out strong to assist in making the procession a success. The ranks of the Hamilton brethren were augmented by the addition of Courts from Dundas, Simcoe, and Barton Township. The streets of the city were crowded with people, a large number of whom were visitors from all parts of the Dominion and the United States. Everybody admired the triumphal car, which headed the Independent Foresters. It was drawn by four of Hendrie's finest jumbo horses, each animal being gaily decorated with carnival colors. The car consisted of a large lorry, upon which was erected a covered platform, the top of which was decked off with a fantastic piece of woodwork painted in bright colors. The roof in sloping to the supports was covered with the carnival colors, red, yellow, blue, and pink. Festoons of evergreens and natural flowers covered the pillars, the sides of the car being artistically draped with bunting, which encircled well painted signs giving the name of the Order, together with the amount of Reserve Fund. In the centre of the platform was placed a stuffed elk, his horns decorated with ribbons; around him were seated ten pretty young girls dressed in white and wearing gilt crowns; eight of the girls supported bannerets, made of white satin, red plush, and gold lace, and upon each was worked the name of a province where Independent Forestry existed. Several other cars were in the procession that day, but everybody unanimously declared "the one that brought up the rear of the procession" was the handsomest of them all. A prize of \$20 was offered by the Carnival Committee for the best car, the marshals of the procession being the judges. They unhesitatingly granted it to the Independent Order of Foresters. The following day the *Hamilton Spectator* had this to say:

"The prize car, built at Cooper's Carriage

Works, and which headed the Independent Order of Foresters in the rear of the societies' procession, attracted a great deal of admiration, and succeeded in carrying off the \$20 prize for the most artistic turnout. Mrs. Bowen and Mrs. McBride are responsible for the fine appearance of the young ladies who took part, while the following brethren worked hard yesterday morning in decorating the car: H. Cooper, J. F. Davis, J. M. Robinson, H. T. Drope, W. Milne, C. R. Cutler, Alex. Souter, R. McBride and J. G. Pocock. These gentlemen were ably assisted in their work by Miss Nettie Brewer, of Buffalo, who at present is a guest of Mr. and Mrs. H. Cooper, Park street south. This young lady has the hearty thanks of the Hamilton Foresters."

The route of the procession was somewhat lengthy, most of the brethren covering the ground without any apparent fatigue till the terminus was reached at Dundurn Park. There the afternoon was spent in fraternal greetings, enjoying the beautiful scenery, listening to the music of several bands, the main attraction being the games, under the direction of Chief McKinnon, the best athletes in America and many from over the sea taking part.

In the procession was a carriage containing Dr. Oronhyatekha, S.C.R., E. S. Cummer, S.S. in full Royal Forester Regalia, Wm. Griffith, P.H.C.R., and James Slater, C.D.

Brother F. J. Bowen acted as Marshal of the parade. Arrayed in a three-cornered hat with Royal Foresters' regalia, and seated on a fine little bay mare, he looked a regular swell.

Brother Capt. Spence was another Marshal. He sat in stately dignity on a horse built to carry him. He wasn't a bit tired, either, when he got to the Park.

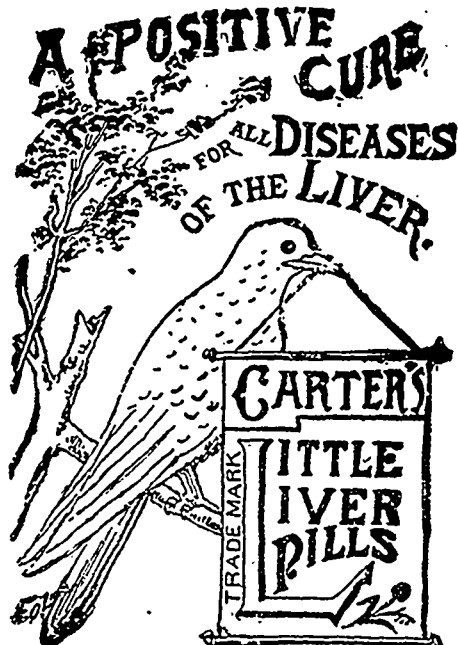
