LORDS' DAY LEGISLATION.

Mr. O'Meara Argues the Case on Behalf of the Attorney-General at Great Length.

MRS. RAMSAY SUES FOR ALIMONY

Mrs. Florence Thompson Claims \$2000 for Injuries Through a Detective Sidewalk.

Argument in the test case regarding the Lord's Day Act was kept up all day yesterday in the Court of Appeal by Mr. O'Meara, who appears, along with Mr. Patterson, for the Attorney-General. The matter will occupy the whole of Friday, when Mr. Marsh will reply.

Mr. O'Meara's argument proceeded along the lines set down by Mr. Patterson the day before. He contended that, as the Legislature could enact factory regulations restricting hours of labor, so it had the power to extend the principles to govern every seventh day. He reviewed Sabbath Day legislation for the last 300 years, quoting also many cases upon the point from a pile of law reports, which made the court look like a library.

Mrs. Ramsay sues for alimony. Two writs were issued yesterday against John B. Ramsay, a farmer, living near Aurora, Ont., on behalf of his wife, in which she asks for alimony at the rate of \$20 a month.

The other was issued by James Gamble of the same locality, in which he asks for \$2000 as compensation for necessities supplied to Mrs. Ramsay, and support extended to her.

Will Sue the City.

Last month Mrs. Florence Thompson of 9 Canton-street, suffered a severe fall on Spadina-avenue, just above Queen, caused by a broken plank, and sustained painful injuries. Yesterday she caused a writ to be issued against the city, claiming \$2000 damages.

Plaintiff's Appeal Dismissed.

Judgment was given yesterday by the Court of Appeal in the case of Bouch v. Henderson, which was argued before the court on Monday last. The judgment dismisses the plaintiff's appeal, and confirms the former judgment. The action was brought to recover the value of a shipment of \$100 worth of goods to the Army and Navy Company, at the time of its going into liquidation.

Robert Jeffrey a Defendant.

Miss Emily Brun, a nurse, is suing Charles Bagg and Robert Jeffrey for unpaid damages for injuries received in falling from an alleged defective veranda at the rear of 305 Yonge-street, which the defendants own.

POLICE COURT RECORD.

Robert Platt and Joseph Baillie, the two young men charged with stealing jewelry from the factory of A. H. Dewdney & Bro., where they were employed, appeared in the Police Court yesterday. They pleaded guilty and were remanded till to-morrow for sentence.

James McEwen, who went into the home of George Wright at 65 Ontario-street, and, after putting Wright into the cellar, committed an assault on Mrs. Wright, was sent to the Central Prison for 18 months.

Patrick and Michael O'Connor were charged with being disorderly. Patrick was fined \$10 and costs and Michael was let go.

Robert G. Liddell was sent to jail for 90 days for non-support of his wife, Catherine. Bernard Dillon and William Morison pleaded guilty to being disorderly. Dillon was fined \$5 and costs on 30 days, and Morison \$8, without costs, on 30 days.

Five East Toronto hotelkeepers were yesterday afternoon charged before John Richardson, J.P., with selling liquor after hours. James Haveron appeared for the defence, and secured an adjournment till Monday.

FOUR YEARS AT MIMICO

Was the Sentence on Arthur McIntyre, Who Was Found Guilty of Manslaughter.

Four years in the Mimico Industrial School was the sentence imposed yesterday morning by Judge Street on Arthur McIntyre, the boy who was on Tuesday found guilty of killing his father. Before pronouncing sentence, the judge addressed the boy briefly. He told him he had done a very wicked thing in stealing his father's revolver, and an even more wicked thing in trying to scare his father. For what he had done he would be placed under restraint and supervision, who he would not associate with criminals, and would not be allowed to read dime novels.

A Vessel From Newcastle, Eng.
