KETTLE VALLEY RAILWAY

Completed, Joining Republic Camp, Wash., and Grand Forks in British Columbia.

AN IMPORTANT INNOVATION

Republic Camp Ores Will Now Be Brought to the Granby Smelter for Treatment.

Grand Forks, April 17.—The Republic and Grand Forks Railway, known as the Kettle Valley Line, has been completed and opened.

The record of construction is regarded as noteworthy, considering that the first sod was not turned until June 5 last, and that the entire work was not under contract until August 3. This latest international link which will have a great economic effect on the development of the Boundary country and the Colville Indian Reservation, situated in the State of Washington, is 42.56 miles long.

The necessity of establishing railway communication between Grand Forks and Republic had long been obvious, more especially since the failure of the various methods for treating the Republic ores at home by various adaptations of the cyanide process. The Republic and Mountain Lion mills have both been closed for nearly a year, the largest and most unfinished stages, stands as a monument to the folly of capitalists, who disregarded the opinion of experts, that by smelting alone could the ores of the camp yield the highest returns at the minimum of cost.

There was the further dictum of metallurgists, since confirmed by actual experiments, that the highest grade could be obtained by blending the silicious ores of Republic with the sulphidic ores of the Boundary. This process, they averred, would prove mutually beneficial, the Boundary ores helping to reduce the cost of the latter, by their superior richness, contributing to enrich the matte.

Hitherto, the long and expensive wagon haul from Republic precluded the possibility of any but the highest-grade ores being treated at Grand Forks. Silicious ores, however, have been made from time to time, and only of picked ores, averaging, in some instances, \$500 per ton. These values cannot be regarded as characteristic of Republic, which, broadly speaking, is a camp with millions of tons of low-grade ore. Probably an average would be \$12 per ton. The project of a railway between the two points met with its hearty support. In fact, the management at one time contemplated building the line, only abandoning the idea when a charter had been secured by other parties.

The northern terminus is situated in the Buckle addition of Grand Forks, just south of the city limits. After crossing the C.P.R. track, the railway, following an air line, traverses the Kettle Valley north of the international boundary, less than four miles distant. Here it crosses the east and west, passing thru the village of Nelson, Washington, ascends the west bank of the river, over nine miles to a point one and one-half miles north of Curlew, Wash., and re-crosses the Kettle on a 45-foot Howe trestle.

Leaving the river at Curlew on its southeasterly descent from Canada, the line continues south thru the wide and open valley of Curlew Creek to the north end of Curlew Lake. Thence following the west shore of that beautiful sheet of water, the road begins the nine-mile ascent in a southeasterly direction to the summit, which is overcome thru a natural pass. Two miles beyond, on the opposite slope, the line taps the Tom Thumb mine, before ascending the Mountain Lion. Then the railway swings around the mountain from that point, along Granite Creek to the Morning Glory Hill, before going north up Eureka Creek, and passing the San Poi, Bodie, Black Tail, Lone Pine, Silver Dollar, Knox Hill and other well known properties.

The altitude of Republic is 1000 feet higher than Grand Forks. This elevation is overcome by a compensated minimum grade of one and one-half per cent. As the bulk of the traffic will flow in that direction the cost of operating trains on the descending grade should be moderate. From an engineering standpoint, the route was admirably chosen, and great credit is due the chief engineer, John A. Mansel. It is the most direct route that could be secured, and withal is characterized by the absence of steep grades or sharp curves, indeed, the only heavy work encountered along the entire line was at Trout Creek, near the summit, where the hard rock cutting was found to be necessary, and earth excavations, also on the north slope of the summit.

The Kettle River valley thru the greater part of its length is practically a level plain. At Curlew, Wash., it crosses the Curlew Creek valley, but they are seemingly one, flanked on either side by grass-covered hills, or rolling hills, which are in fact, wooded portions of the route thru the Kettle River valley extends for about eight miles north of Curlew, Wash., beyond Curlew and until the ascent from Curlew Lake to the divide in the mountains runs thru the Curlew Creek valley, which is a level plain.

The rapidly with which construction work was rushed is due to Charles Ferguson, a veteran Spokane contractor, with an experience of over 20 years in building railways. Mr. Ferguson (Ferguson & Co.) was the contractor on Aug. 1 last, and subsequently re-let considerable portions of it in small contracts, the largest not exceeding \$100,000. In this manner it was found that better and quicker results could be secured.

The dominating spirit of this enterprise is Tracy W. Holland, Mayor of Grand Forks. Mr. Holland was the first to perceive the commercial possibilities of a railway between the American camp and the Canadian smelting centre, and to its accomplishment he has devoted his time and energies with rare singleness of purpose for nearly two years.

To arrange the preliminaries was no easy task. In August, 1900, he obtained from the British Columbia legislature, after a hard legislative fight, and by a majority of one vote, a charter authorizing the construction of a railway from Grand Forks to the international boundary line. There was yet to be secured the authority for building the American section of the road, between the frontier and Republic. The Colville Indian reservation is administered by the United States government. Mr. Holland found it necessary to pay half a dozen visits to Washington, the latest in December, accompanied by W. C. Morris, a bright young attorney of Republic. Mr. Morris now carries the position of general counsel and assistant general manager of the road.


Altho the obstacles at Washington at first looked insuperable, they both resolutely stuck to the task. They both overcame serious objections, and provided guarantees that the existing rights of the Indians would be safeguarded, and that ample compensation for traversing Indian allotments would be paid. The zeal of the Interior and Indian departments for the security of its dusky wards could not have been more scrupulous.

One by one, objection after objection was overcome, and, finally, the order authorizing the building of the railway was signed by R. A. Hitchcock, Secretary of the Interior. Every Indian claim for damages has been adjusted, and that, too, at the arrangement of officials of the United States government.

After the organization of the Republic and Grand Forks Railway (now known as the Kettle Valley line), Mr. Holland became its general manager. The capital required for building the road was raised in the East, the president of the enterprise being Hon. J. R. Stratton, who holds the portfolio of Provincial Secretary in the Ontario cabinet.

Mr. Holland has resided in this Province for six years. He is only 33 years old. He was born in Hamilton, Ont., and for a number of years was engaged in the banking business in Winnipeg. He removed to Vancouver as Provincial manager of the road.

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EVERYBODY MAY NOW LEARN.

Ten Thousand Copies of a Valuable Work on These Sciences to Be Given Away to Advertise the College.

Baker, a short time before his death, is said to have become estranged from a brother and sister, his only surviving relatives, and in a fit of anger decided his property to the United States government for the period of 90 years, the heirs at the expiration of that time to choose their own method of securing inheritance of the property. The property to which the claim is being laid is now conceded to be worth \$500,000,000, the land in some instances being worth at least \$5000 per acre. Vast sums of money have already been spent in the prosecution of the search for titles, and to all those who have applied directly to the United States government the same answer has invariably been returned, that no such property is available for claim. For some time claimants from the United States outnumbered those from other countries, but the knowledge of the fruitless nature of the work having become more generally known, their inquiries have almost entirely ceased, and contributions are now confined to Canada and more distant points.

Briefly summarized, the Journal's correspondent regards the whole matter as a colossal fraud, and as a means in the hands of unprincipled members of the legal profession for the extortion of money from the pockets of the unwary, who are unable in many cases to bear the loss.

NO UNIVERSAL SUFFRAGE.

Belgian Chamber of Representatives Will Not Revise Constitution.

Brussels, April 18.—The Chamber of Representatives to-day by 84 to 70 votes rejected the proposal to revise the Belgian constitution so as to provide for universal suffrage. Great excitement followed. A serious riot occurred at Louvain, near Brussels. Socialists held a demonstration in front of the residence of M. Scolaert, the President of the Chamber of Deputies. When the police attempted to disperse them they were repulsed with a shower of stones. The riot then spread to the town of Louvain, and altogether five persons were killed and twelve wounded. Some of the members of the Chamber were wounded in the Maison des Protestants. Another riot is reported to have occurred in Brussels. The rioters called attention to the fact that there was not a quorum of 21 members present in the Chamber when they were called to order. 

INTER-IMPERIAL TRADE.

From N. Y. Commercial-Advertiser.

The (British colonies) will get little encouragement from the grain and flour duties proposed yesterday in the Imperial House of Commons, unless these are accepted as preparation for a colonial preference. It would promote the chief object of the conference of colonial premiers, to meet in London next June, if Mr. Chamberlain could point to a beginning made in the scheme which the colonies had in mind to make. No thing but that, in fact, would convince the colonies that they will ultimately get a preference in the British market. Something is desired of more substantial benefit than the method by which Canada is treated, rather than an attempt at a British preference, which does not really prefer No. 413 of the County Orange Hall, last night. About 150 were seated around the festive board, at which the Worshipful Master, W. A. Foster, presiding. The usual toasts were honored, the speakers being John McMillan, Grand Master; Harry Lovick, Deputy Master; Alexander Hall, Grand Master of the L.O.Y.B.; Thomas Cooke, D. M.; Charles H. Noble, D.D.M.; of Centre Toronto; Joseph E. Thompson, D.M.; of East Toronto; Rev. G. A. Perry, J. C. Hopkins, Carr Simpson, W. J. Moore, Joseph Campbell, W. J. Sykes, Dr. G. B. Smith, R. G. Smythe, W. J. Moore, and others.

A pleasing feature of the evening was the presentation to John B. Fleming, by Grand Master McMillan. Mr. Fleming was Master of Cameron Lodge in 1881 and 1882.

LETTER CARRIERS NOT SATISFIED.

Proposed Salary Increases Do Not Go Far Enough.

A special meeting of the Letter Carriers' Association was held last night in Richmond Hall, when the provisions of the bill introduced in the House on April 10, by Hon. William Mulock, providing for salary increases for letter carriers were considered. The members, numbering 110, strongly disapproved of the bill, and a resolution was passed, instructing the Local Committee at Ottawa to inform Messrs. Puttee and Smith, who are looking after the interests of the carriers, to have the proposed act, in its present shape, withdrawn. The request of the letter carriers was for a maximum of 70¢, while the act only provides for 64¢.

The clauses in Mr. Mulock's bill, particularly referred to in the resolution passed last night, are:

"The salaries of those in grade 'A' shall be at the rate of \$1.25 per day; of those in grade 'B', at the rate of \$1.50 per day; of those in grade 'C', at the rate of \$1.75 per day; of those in grade 'D', at the rate of \$2 per day; and of those in grade 'E' at the rate of \$2.25 per day."

"If duties are especially arduous and of a responsible nature, promotion may, from time to time, be made from 'D' to grade 'E.'"

"In case of inefficient or unsatisfactory service of letter carriers, the local committee may, from time to time, be made."

CHAMBERLAIN AND THE BUDGET.

The more we consider the budget speech delivered by Sir Michael Hicks Beach in the British House of Commons on Monday, the more evident does it become that Mr. Chamberlain is the real author of the grain and flour duties proposed therein, and the more clearly does it appear that these duties were hit upon as a leverage for the scheme of an imperial customs union, which the Colonial Secretary has favored for some years.

No colonial preference is suggested in the budget, but a definite impost on incoming foodstuffs was necessary before Mr. Chamberlain could be in a position to broach his pet Zollverein idea.

The revenue obtainable by the grain tax is so small that it cannot be regarded as a mere financial expedient. The money secured by the impost could readily have been raised by an insignificant addition to the new government loan, and there can be little doubt that the duties were decided upon in furtherance of a principle. As The New York Commercial Advertiser says in a leader along these lines: "The insertion of the proteccionista wedge has been made with an aim broader than mere insular politics."

It is clear that the dominant personality of Mr. Chamberlain is responsible for the new British bread tax. He evidently desired to bring about such a fiscal situation as would facilitate the attainment of practical imperial results from the colonial conference to be held next June in London. It now remains for the colonial delegates to that conference to do their part.

THE NEED OF HOUSES.

It is asserted that Toronto is short 1500 houses, i.e., that 1500 families, unable to procure suitable homes, have stored their furniture and are living in hotels and boarding houses. It is stated, moreover, that the shortage is in that class of house which would rent at from \$20 to \$40 per month.

The demand for rental residences is likely to increase rather than decline, for there are evidences of prosperity on all sides, and people, during the hard times, hoarded, for economy's sake, are getting back into a position where they can afford to again take up house-keeping. Judging from the present outlook, the population of the city will grow steadily, from year to year. Mr. A. E. Ames, President of the Toronto Board of Trade, was quoted recently as prophesying that the city's population would reach the half-million mark before we knew it.

In view of all this, it would seem that the building of a large number of medium-priced houses in this city at present would prove a profitable investment for any man with a little surplus money.

BRITAIN STILL IN THE LEAD.

The New York Journal of Commerce does not take a pessimistic view of Great Britain's commercial future.

"The fact of American and German competition is undeniable," it says, "but England is still pre-eminently the manufacturing country of the world, as well as its great sea power. There is nothing in the growth of this country or Germany to indicate that England is to be driven from the sea or from the world's markets, but henceforth she must divide it with two powerful competitors."

When Mr. Chamberlain's Imperial customs union idea is crystallized into an actual fact, so that the empire can be internally self-supporting in peace and war, Great Britain will not only continue to hold her own, but Greater Britain will, as a new entity, make the same rapid strides among the nations of the world as the German and United States confederations have done.

YORK COUNTY AND SUBURBS

Convention of West York Prohibitionists Held at the Junction on Friday.

CANDIDATES TO BE INTERVIEWED

And if They Are Not Satisfactory to Alliance, a Third May Be Put Up.

Toronto Junction, April 18.—The convention of temperance workers, under the auspices of the Ontario Royal Templars' Alliance, to-day was very largely attended. Among those present were: J. A. Austin, president of the West York Alliance, who occupied the chair; Rev. Dr. Parker, Toronto; Rev. R. M. Hamilton, Woodbridge; Rev. C. W. Follett, Woodbridge; R. J. Falls, Weston; Rev. Mr. Hudson, Davisville; Rev. W. P. Dady, Toronto Junction; Rev. Mr. Phillips, York Mills; Rev. J. W. Stewart, Edlington; Rev. J. B. Wass, Lambton Mills; Rev. M. McKinnon, Rev. H. S. Matthews, Davenport; and Messrs. W. G. Ellis, Robert Rae and Dr. Charlton, with a strong lay delegation from all parts of the riding.

The electoral policy of the association was placed before the convention by Cy Fossey, secretary of the Central Prohibition Campaign Committee. It contained the following recommendations:

That this meeting endorse the declaration of the prohibition conference of March 25, 1902, that only men who favor prohibition have any claim upon our support as temperance electors. It is, therefore, our plain and imperative duty to strive to elect in the approaching campaign such men as can be depended upon to carry out this principle.

That we deeply regret that the representative for this riding is among those who voted against the reasonable requisitions of the provincial convention of Feb. 25.

That for the purpose of advancing the interests of prohibition in this riding the executive secure, so far as possible, the organization of a prohibition committee for every locality, with an active executive and associates for each polling sub-division.

Thanks were passed to Rev. J. E. Starr and W. Munne for valuable services to the cause in addressing meetings on behalf of the association.

The executive was authorized to ascertain the views of the candidates in the field, and should the attitude of neither prove satisfactory, to call a convention to nominate an independent candidate.

A public meeting, in the interest of prohibition, was held by the Temperance League of West York in Thompson Hall this evening, with Mr. A. H. Smith in the chair. From the number of electors who attended, it is quite evident that, in the approaching provincial elections, the sentiment for or against prohibition is not likely to be much against party lines. Against the five newspaper reporters, vocalists and ministers, there were noted electors present, and whilst the addresses were clever and the plea for prohibition and temperance strong, there did not appear to be any connecting link between the subject and the campaign in West York.

Robert Ray of North Toronto, Mr. Crutechbank of Davisville, Mr. Nichols and Mr. Pessy were the principle speakers.

East Toronto. Burglars entered William Davies' store at East Toronto on Thursday

night and robbed the till of about \$4. The burglars gained admittance through one of the glass doors, by breaking out a large piece and undoing the fastenings of the door. County Constable Tiesberry is looking into the case, and expects to locate the burglars very soon. He thinks they are still in the vicinity.

Braconerie. The church services in connection with the Wesleyan Presbyterian mission will be held at 3 o'clock Sabbath afternoon, 7 o'clock Sabbath evening, and at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening. It is expected that these meetings will be particularly helpful during the coming months.

The closing business meeting of the Wesleyan Literary Society will take place Thursday evening, April 24, in Wesleyan Hall. It promises to be of full interest to the members.

Unlabeled. An organization meeting in the interest of J. W. Moyes was held in Webster's Hall on Thursday evening. The attendance was large and the greatest enthusiasm was manifested.

The meeting took the form of a smoker and was most enjoyable and thoroughly informal. The chair was occupied by J. W. Moyes and brief addresses were delivered by T. M. Higgins, T. L. Church, Mr. Moyes and others.

An association was formed under the name of the Young Men's Liberal-Conservative Association, with the following officers: President, Alban Elliot; secretary-treasurer, R. G. Allan. The next meeting of the club will be on Thursday, April 24, at 8 p.m., in Webster's Hall.

MAY RAISE THE WATER RATE

City Treasurer Reports That the Waterworks Don't Pay Under Present System.

SHOULD BE SELF-SUSTAINING

Board of Control Has Not Yet Got Thru With the Estimates—City Hall Notes.

City Treasurer Coady was a patient waiter at the meeting of the Board of Control yesterday afternoon, and as soon as he got a chance he presented a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the waterworks system for the years 1900 and 1901, the first two years that have elapsed since the water rates to ordinary consumers were reduced.

A one expenditure in 1900 exceeded the revenue and receipts by \$28,000, but this deficiency will be reduced by \$4,500 when debentures are authorized to be issued for certain mains, reports Mr. Coady.

Should Be Self-Sustaining. "I am of opinion that the waterworks should be made self-sustaining and that the tariff be adjusted accordingly," concluded the Treasurer.

The total receipts, as shown by Mr. Coady's statement, were \$340,142 in 1900 and \$347,250 in 1901. The expenditure for 1900 was \$368,142, and in 1901 \$352,500.

Contracts Awarded. The contract for blank books and stationery was awarded to Brown Bros. at \$653, which is an increase of about 15 per cent. over last year, but is considerably necessary owing to the increase of the amount of business to be done at the City Hall.

Arthur Bryce will get the contract for the crib work for the new wharf between Bay and Yonge streets. The figure is practically \$90,000. Purdy, Mansell & Co. get the contract for the connecting pipes in the new pumping station at \$234 a foot.

Can't Afford It. Capt. R. M. Melville submitted a proposal that the city should advertise its advantages in the coronation day numbers of The London Times, but the board is doing business on an economy basis, and will not approve of the plan.

The Toronto Poultry Association was well represented in a request for a grant of \$250. The matter lies over.

Why the Mayor. A deputation concerning the Avenue road street car extension was the Mayor's excuse for a grant, on the Board of Control for 40 minutes after the appointed time of meeting.

Can Have Special Car. A strong plea was made by Chairman Richardson of the Property Committee for an interim appropriation of \$10,000 for the cattle market. The board will likely vote the market, as Alf London has written from the G.T.R., which offered a special car for the controllers at any time to go and inspect the market improvement. The railway is naturally interested.

Concrete Walk Contracts. New tenders will be advertised for the concrete walk contracts, which were closed by Frank Zahnbach, as the lowest tenderer. Mr. Zahnbach has withdrawn, admitting that he was not a contractor.

The City Engineer has taken a favorable view of the smoke consumption of the city. He thought it would be of great benefit to the citizens to get rid of the smoke, and pointed out that several cities in the world had passed ordinances compelling the abatement of the nuisance arising from the use of soot coal. He would commend any particular device in Toronto, owing to lack of information as to efficiency.

He thinks a lot of the trouble could be prevented by proper stoking. Mr. Burns says that, if the Board desire him to go thoroughly into the matter, it will be necessary for him to personally examine some of the smokers.

GRIM STARVATION IN RUSSIA
Scurvy and Typhoid Fever Are Devastating the Famine Districts.

NO SPRING CROPS ARE GROWN
Houses Are Unhatched in Order to Save Lives of Cattle and Horses

St. Petersburg, April 18.—The reports received here from the famine-stricken districts of Russia more than justify the anticipations of acute suffering in those localities. Scurvy and typhoid fever are devastating the peasantry throughout the whole of the Altai region, formerly the chief granary of Siberia. The starving people there have consumed even the last remnants of their seed grain, and no spring crops have been sown.

The gravity of the situation is evidenced by the latest disease statistics. At Menzinsk, government of Oufa, there have been upward of 4000 cases of hunger-typhoid and scurvy; at Belzinsk, 822 cases of hunger-typhoid and at Akmolinsk over 1000 cases have occurred. Similar reports come from Boronej, Kassar, and other districts. The Red Cross Society is furnishing all the aid at its command, in the way of free kitchens and medicines.

EXPOSURE KILLED HIM.


